Malthouse Clean Up Project in Sight

Village officials are now saying an end could be in sight for the malthouse demolition that started about two years ago on August 1, 1999.

The Wisconsin DNR halted the completion of the demolition project in October of 1999 because of a call they received on asbestos contaminating the area around the malthouse. Since that time the remains lay in a pile just waiting for a potential disaster, not to mention an eyesore that village residents say they've put up with for too long.

Since the project was halted with no end in sight, village administrator Dan Schmidt contacted the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in April of 2000. Schmidt said he did this because he knew the EPA has greater authority on the issue.

In January of 2001 the EPA ruled that site was considered a superfund cleanup. This site though is not on the national priority site

Congress established the Superfund Program in 1980 to locate, investigate, and clean up the worst sites nationwide. The EPA administers the Superfund program in cooperation with individual states and tribal governments.


The office that oversees management of the program is the Office of Emergency and Remedial Response (OERR).

Since that time property owner Martin Kluge of Mayville has not begun to clean up the mess.

This week Schmidt stated that Kluge has now removed himself from the project and turned the project over to the mortgage holder, Malthouse Enterprises LLC.

In an interview Tuesday with Thomas Turner counsel for the EPA, Turner stated that Malthouse Enterprises LLC will take over the cleaning of the site

In a letter to the EPA from Malthouse Enterprises LLC's attorney they stated



"the principals of Malthouse Enterprises recognize the community interest in having this site cleaned up"

Their attorney also created an outline of the clean up process. This has been received by the EPA and will

be forwarded onto Callie Bolattino, the EPA's onscene coordinator.

Bolattino, who is on vacation said she is committed to the project and will review the letter and make her final recomendations to the outline. Once her recomendations are received Malthouse Enterprises can commence the clean up project.

The elements of the plan proposed by Malthouse Enterprises LLC are as follows:

 Prepare a workplan with sufficent detail to indicate the direction and methodology of removal for the rubble pile, including segregation of asbestos-containing materials. workplan would include input from a licensed asbestos abatement contractor with respect to methods for maneuvering the pile, segregating asbestos-containing materials and properly containerizing and transporting such material.

◆ Section by section spreading of the pile with appropriate wetting and

containment segregation of asbestos-containing materials. The methods will be initially checked by the licensed removal contractor.

· Segregation of directly recyclable materials such as iron with ultimate sale to local recycling firms.

· Conveyor system for bricks, concrete or stones to be conveyed to a crusher in one corner of the site.

• Prewashing system for items on the conveyor belt with wastewater to be collected and transmitted to the sanitary sewer (with approval by the Village)

· Crushing of bricks, concrete and stone into construction stone or road aggregate. All such material to be recycled in construction projects.

· Asbestos containing materials to be properly handled, bagged and disposed of by methodologies approved by licensed asbestos removal contractors.

· Any miscellaneous non-recyclable materials to be disposed of at local landfill as demolition debris.

♦ Inspection of remainder of building to insure no asbestos containing materials and final demolition with similar disposition of materials.

◆ Documentation of work and completion of workplan.

According to Turner, work could begin a week after Malthouse Enterprises agrees to the final outline of the project.

If Malthouse Enterprises fails to clean the site the EPA will then begin clean up on it's own. The super fund grants would be used and the EPA would seek reimbursement from Kluge and Malthouse Enterprises.

There is no idea when the EPA would start the project but Turner is confithat Malthouse Enterprises will be coopera-

According to Schmidt right now, "it's out of the village's hands."





25 Years Ago

July 23, 1976

Kewaskum artist Dan Meilahn was the painter of the portrait of Chief Kewaskum that was recently unveiled for the first time. He began thinking about the idea of doing a painting of Chief Kewaskum in June of 1975 when his mother, Mrs. Ada Meilahn, mentioned the idea to a member of the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee. It was not a simple matter to begin a painting of that type, however. Before the brush could be put to the canvas there was a great deal of research that needed to be done. Approximately 100 hours of painting were necessary to complete the job, not including the countless hours of research. The painting shows Chief Kewaskum with his hand extended in a gesture of welcome, standing on top of a wooded hill, designed from photographs of a hill located south of the village that some believe is the site of "Indian Hill." Since Kewaskum was a member of the Bear clan, there is a bear hidden in the foliage in the background, and he is shown wearing a bear's claw necklace. On the opposite side from the bear is an oak tree, which provides balance and has a symbolism of its own, as the acorn was an important part of the ceremonial bag used by the Bear Clan.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Barbercheck of West Bend have recently purchased the Ceramics Ltd. building on Main Street where they will open Papa Joe's Pizza on Monday, July 26. The Ceramics Ltd. was owned and operated by Mrs. Jackie Gruss. The Barberchecks had previously operated a pizza restaurant in Indiana.

A unique mixture of the past and present is offered for sale to the public by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee. It is an aluminum tray with a gold finish, produced locally at Regal Ware, which are rapidly becoming collectors' items, since they show where they were made and are dated 1776-1976. The design that was stamped on each tray was done by Berni Trapp and shows the head of an Indian Chief, having

been patterned after the die that was used by the Aluminum Kewaskum Company, Regal Ware's predecessor on their "Kewasko"

Reserves included Butch Gengler, Al Rohlinger, Jim Staehler and Roger (the Dodger) Reindl, who was brought up from the farm club. Roger pitched only three innings in Sunday afternoon's game because he said that was all his contract allowed, but he also assisted as warm-up guy. Manager was John Kudek, whose contract was not renewed after the tourney and coaches were Duck Ehnert, Roger Schmitt and Bill Harbeck. Batboys and liniment suppliers were Joel and Jeff Kudek.

This will remain a one-way exit from the school parking lot unto either Reigle or Second.

The dedication for both the Kewaskum Elementary and Administration Community buildings will be held on Sunday, October 7, 2001, from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. We are hoping for a tremendous turnout so we can celebrate this major accomplishment within the community. 





West Bend Company Observes Ninetieth Year in Business

WEST BEND - The West Bend Company recognized their 90th year in business at an employee-wide celebration on Saturday, August 25, 2001 at their West Bend, Wisconsin facility

The company was founded as the West Bend Aluminum Company September 27th, 1911 in West Bend when articles of incorporation were signed by local businessmen Bernard C. Ziegler, Stephen F. Mayer, Martin Walter, Andrew Pick and Edwin Pick. Joining them were Carl and Robert Wentorf, originally of Two Rivers, who had experience in the growing aluminum processing industry.

The company's first product was a frying pan; with the manufacture of saucepans, pudding pans, pie plates and water dipper following soon thereafter.

One of West Bend's most popular products was the Waterless Cooker, introduced and patented in 1920. The Waterless Cooker enabled cooks to prepare an entire meal - meat, potatoes, vegetable and dessert at one time over one burner. The design of the Cooker prevented steam from escaping during cookings so that meals could be prepared without the addition of water. By the mid 1920s, roasters, skillets and sauce pans were manufactured which utilized the Waterless Cooker technolo-

The Kitchen Craft¤ Waterless Cooker by West Bend earned the Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval as far back as 1925. Quality stainless steel cookware products utilizing this cooking method and marketed direct-to-the-consumer through authorized distributors continue to be a hallmark of The West Bend Company today.

Throughout its history the West Bend Aluminum Company adapted to the changing marketplace. The 1930s saw the introduction of copper giftware and the Trig Singing Tea Kettle. More than 3.5 million units of the Trig were sold by the early 1950s.

The company also did its part during the war years. Within three weeks after the United States entered World War II, three shifts were at work around the clock seven days a week producing brass cartridge cases.

More than 300 different items were eventually produced under defense contracts. In recognition of the Company's fast conversion to war production and exceptional productivity, the Navy presented West Bend with six "E" Awards from May 1942 to March 1945.

By the late 1950s the

West Bend Aluminum Company had diversified its product offerings to include such items as outboard motors, percolators, coffee urns, popcorn poppers, and skillets. In 1961 the company officially changed its name to The West Bend Company to reflect its use of materials such as plastics, copper, steel and brass in addition to aluminum.

The Company remained privately held until it merged with Rexall Drug and Chemical Company in July of 1968. Rexall Drug and Chemical Company later changed its name to Dart Industries. Under the Dart Industries umbrella in the late 1960s and 1970s the Company expanded its specialty electrical appliance line to include buffet appliances, the automatic egg cooker, drip coffee makers and electric woks.

In 1980 parent company Dart Industries merged with Kraft, Inc.; and in 1986 The West Bend Company became part of Premark International, Inc., a newly formed corporation, which split off from the Dart and Kraft conglomerate. The West Bend Company divested itself of its retail non-electric cookware lines in the 1980s, choosing instead to concentrate on high-quality stainless steel Waterless Cookware sold direct-to-the-consumer through authorized distributors.

At the same time the Company adapted to the emerging health and fitness craze through its acquisition of Total Gym exercise equipment, Borg electronic scales, and Precor exercise equipment.

In 1989 the Company entered the residential drinking water treatment market with the acquisition of Environmental Products Corporation (EPCOR) of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada. This new division operated under the West Bend Water Systems name.

In 1993 The West Bend Company solidified its reputation as a housewares industry leader when it became the first U.S. manufacturer of the Automatic Bread and Dough Maker.

This would prove to be the Company's most successful product for the 1990s.

In November 1999 West Bend became a business unit of Illinois Tool Works, Inc. (ITW) when that company merged with Premark International. Since that time West Bend has reconfigured its operations for efficiency and has placed renewed emphasis on its core-business as a major manufacturer of high quality stainless steel cookware.

As the Company moves into its 91st year, it has recommitted itself to operate upon the philosophies began by its founders and refined by it successors: to be the industry leader through the manufacture of first class quality products, to provide first class quality service, to achieve growth in its chosen markets throughout the world, and changing to meet the needs and lifestyles of its consumers.

The West Bend Company today is a manufacturer of high quality cookware, small electrical appliances, and drinking water treatment equipment. The Company is a business unit of Illinois Tool Works, Inc., Glenview, Illinois, a \$9.3 billion diversified manufacturer of highly engineered components and industrial systems.

Wisconsin Students Continue To Outperform National Average


MADISON - State Superintendent Elizabeth Burmaster announced Wisconsin's SAT scores and commended 2001 graduates who took these tests for their diligence toward their education. "These young people show dedication to their studies, and their scores on the SAT college admissions test demonstrate their accomplishments."

The 4,173 seniors who took the SAT during their high school career posted a verbal score of 584, the same as last year, and a math score of 596, one point down from the prior year. Nationally, 1,276, 320 studdents took the SAT. The national verbal score was 506, up one point from 2000, and the math score held steady at 514.

Students in Wisconsin who took the SAT represent just six percent of 2001 graduates. Last year, seven percent of graduates took the exams. Students of color were 12 percent of SAT-takers in Wisconsin. Their scores were between 30 and 110 points higher than scores for students of color nationally.

Scores for economically advantaged and white students were significantly higher than scores for students of low-income families and every other racial or ethnic group both in Wisconsin and nationally.

"The gap in achievement between economically advantaged students and stu-



dents of color and students from low-income families is a pervasive problem that needs attention both at the state and federal level," Burmaster said. "The education agenda in Wisconsin should focus on initiatives that we know work for children: four-year-old kindergarten (4K), smaller class sizes with strong reading instruction, and investing in the Minority Pre-College Scholarship Program."

Sixty-one percent of Wisconsin SAT-takers reported they were "A" students compared to 35 percent nationally. Thirty-five percent of SAT-takers in Wisconsin were ranked in the top 10 percent of their class compared to 17 percent nationally. Forth-three percent said they came from families with incomes over \$70,000 compared to 25 percent nationally.

"Our high school gradu-

ates performed well on the SAT," Burmaster said. "Wisconsin students can compete with their peers nationally, but we are not in the business of simply producing good test takers. Our goal in Wisconsin is to provide all students with the tools they need to apply their knowledge in the real world."

She noted that earlier in August, scores for 43,691 graduates who took the ACT were the highest in the nation, an achievement spanning nine years with the state claiming the No. 1 composite score on the ACT the past five years.

"We have a lot to be proud of in Wisconsin, but our work is not done. We cannot let our applause quiet a call to increase our efforts at narrowing the achievement gap in Wisconsin," Burmaster said.

Summer Travelers Planning One Last Getaway for Labor Day Holiday Weekend

Auto travel over the LAbor Day holiday is projected to be slightly higher than a year ago, according to AAA.

"Vacationers will end summer travel season on a high note," said AAA Wisconsin spokesman Michael Bie. "Labor Day weekend is the last major summer travel holiday and more than 33 million people are preparing to squeeze in one last getaway."

AAA notes that airline travel is competitively priced currently as reduced demand this summer has resulted in lower airfares for the upcoming holiday. AAA surveyed advance purchase fares for 20 major U.S. markets and found a 16 percent decline from fare levels a year ago.

Gasoline will not be cooperating, however, as pump prices inch higher in and around Wisconsin.

In all, 33.2 million travelers plan to take a trip 50 miles or more from home this Labor Day holiday, up from the 32.6 million estimated to have traveled last

Of those traveling, 27.7 million are expected to go by motor vehicle, compared to 27 million in 2000. Another 5.5 million plan to go by air, train or bus, down slightly from 5.6 million a year ago.

The current average price for self-serve regular unleaded gasoline in Wisconsin is \$1.598 per gallon, according to AAA's Fuel Gauge Report.

That price is approximately 20 cents higher than one month ago and 13.8 cents higher than one year ago at this time.

The Wisconsin per-gallon price breakdown from AAA's Fuel Gauge survey is: Average Self-Serve

Unleaded regular: \$1.598 Unleaded mid-grade: \$1.659

Unleaded premium: \$1.736

Other average prices for regular unleaded gas in the region are: Illinois, \$1.597; Iowa, \$1.443; Minnesota, \$1.541; and Michigan, \$1.549.

In the Great Lakes region, which includes Wisconsin, 4.3 million people are projected to make a trip of 50 miles or more away from home, up 1.7 percent from a year ago.

AAA Wisconsin predicts peak travel times will be noon to 8 p.m. on both Friday, August 31, and Labor Day, Monday, September 3.

AAA's Labor Day travel projections are based on a national travel survey of 1,300 adults by the Travel Industry Association, which conducts special research for AAA.

AAA Wisconsin is a notfor-profit membership organization offering travel, insurance, financial and auto-related services to more than 589,000 members through office locations statewide.



AMENDMENT OF TOWN **FENCE ORDINANCE**

At its next meeting at 8:00 p.m. on September 10, 2001, the Town of Auburn Town Board will consider and take possible action upon the following amendment of section 13-1-141(f) of the Town Fence Ordinance:

No rural residential or rural district fence shall be constructed which is a picket fence or which is of an otherwise dangerous condition, or which conducts electricity or is designed to electrically shock or which uses barbed wire, provided, however, that barbed wire may be used in industrially zoned areas if the devices securing the barbed wire to the fence are ten (10) feet above the ground or height and project toward the fenced property and away from any public area, and further provided that a fence which conducts electricity or is designed to electrically shock may be used in the rural district on properties for which a special exception has been granted and is in effect, so long as any terms and conditions of such special exception are compiled with.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of

On a motion by Trustee Kevin Scheunemann, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the July 23, 2001 meeting were approved as printed.

Gwendolyn Dreher, the President and Jean Moe, the 2nd Vice President of the Kewaskum Women's Club, were in attendance to present the 2001 5th Annual Beautification Awards as follows:

 For floral, shrubbery and tree arrangement M/M Norman & Shirley Gruber of 815 Bel Ric Drive were recognized.

 For good selection of colors and lawn ornaments M/M Alex & Claudia Laubach of 262 Timblin Drive were recognized.

3. For creative use of landscaping materials M/M Randy & Diane Schickert of 280 Dream Catcher Drive were recognized.

President John Kenworthy congratulated the recipients and extended a thank to the Women's Club for a job well done.

A public hearing was held on "An Ordinance to Annex Territory to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin." President John Kenworthy asked the Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer and Administrator Daniel Schmidt if the paperwork was in order to proceed. The answer was yes. It was further noted the documentation and filing was received on April 10, 2001, the State Department of Administration has informed us it is a legal annexation, the Town has not filed an objection and also has provided their necessary paperwork. Attorney William Hickman spoke first on behalf of the Lehmanns, Kaehnes, Tibbets, Spoerls, Remmels, and Mr. Averil. It was noted that none of his clients were opposed to the annexation to the Village of Kewaskum, but that his clients did not want to pay for the sewer and water mains. Scott Sager, the Chairman for the Town of Kewaskum, informed the Board that the Town did not have any objection to the annexation and that they realize it is eventually going to happen so public services can be provided. He agreed that the layout for annexation is not the best, but was caused by everyones greed. It was noted those would include the dedication, construction and payment of the easterly half of Edgewood Road, signing of consent & waivers, consent & waiver for easement granted to LB Entreprenurs, agreement to pay for work to be accomplished on the Repinski lot and a general consent & waiver on all O & R land to be annexed. On a motion by Trustee Andy Pesch, seconded by Trustee Mathew Heiser and unanimously carried by voice vote the points as noted by Attorney Kiefer need to be resolved prior to the publication and enactment of said ordinance if

The Board Members commented, regarding how they felt regarding the matter before them. Trustee Robert Stoltzmann indicated he would be voting against the Trustee Ordinance. Kevin Scheunemann indicated that within another community going through 3 larger annexation, that they had the zoning and developers agreement in place prior to annexation and he felt we should have done the same. Trustee Mathew Heiser asked some questions and noted he was concerned about the division of parties involved. 
