Ulrich, DEA Special Agent, to speak to parents on Monday, October 15 from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in Kewaskum Elementary cafeteria large instruction room.

Red Ribbon Week, a nationally celebrated event, is observed in Wisconsin from October 14 through October 20 in all schools and their communities to bring to the forefront the benefits of a drug-free lifestyle.

Mr. Ulrich, the Demand Reduction Coordinator for the Chicago Field Division, will speak to parents about drug abuse prevention, Raves, club drugs, and warning signs of drug use among young people.

Ulrich began his career in Federal drug law enforcement in 1985 after serving as a Deputy with the Marion County Sheriff's Department. He is a specialist in

clandestine laboratory investigations, and thermal imaging. He also served as the Domestic Cannabis Eradication Program Coordinator for Indiana for four years. In his present position, he oversees the demand reduction in five states: North Dakota, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois and Indiana.



Efforts Combined for Blood Drive Here Oct. 17

On Wednesday, October 17, the Kewaskum High School Student Council and the Community Blood Drive coordinators will join efforts and host a blood drive at Kewaskum High School in the choir room from 1 to 5 p.m. Parking will be available in the front and back of school.

More than 600 units of blood are needed each day to meet the needs of patients in 34 hospital sites in ten counties. There is no substitute for blood. If people lose blood from surgery or injury or if their bodies can't produce enough, there is only one place to turn, volunteer blood donors.

When you donate blood, you give a second chance at life to all kinds of people, young and old, a chance to recover and a chance to live. This is your opportunity to help others who might find themselves in need. Organizers of this blood drive are hoping to reach a goal of 80 or more donors.

Donors must be 17 years old or older, weigh at least 110 pounds, be free of symptoms of a cold, sore throat, flu or allergies on the day you donate and not have had hepatitis.

All donors are asked to provide your social security number and must present some form of identification when making their blood donation. Acceptable forms of identification are a picture I.D., blood donor I.D., or identification with a signature.

The actual donation of a pint of blood takes approximately seven minutes. Plan 20 minutes prior to the donation to give medical history and to have your temperature taken and 10-15 minutes after the donation for some refreshments. The whole process takes about one hour.

You will feel special for having done something so important. You may help a total stranger or someone in your own community.



Shoo the Flu and Pneumonia Too! Vaccination Clinics Scheduled

The Visiting Nurse Association of Wisconsin has scheduled its Shoo the Flu and Pneumonia Too! vaccination clinics for October 15 through December 1. Hundreds of clinics will be held in community locations, including many in Washington County.

This year the VNA expects to receive its full supply of flu vaccine. The initial clinics will focus on vaccinating people at high risk of getting the flu. These include:

*People age 65 and over. *People under 65 who have a chronic illness.

*Women who will be entering their second or third trimester of pregnancy during flu season.

Since flu strains change from year to year, it is necessary to be vaccinated annually. All the viruses in the vaccine have been killed, so people cannot get the flu from a flu shot. Flu shots are recommended for everyone who wishes to reduce their risk of getting the flu. Shoo the Flu and Pneumonia Too! clinics will offer vaccinations to people age 13 and up; those 13 to 18 must be accompanied by a parent.

The pneumonia vaccination is also available at the clinics. It is recommended for people who are over 65 years old or under 65 with certain chronic health conditions such as diabetes, or heart or lung disease.

Medicare Part B covers the cost of the vaccinations. For people not on Medicare, the charge is \$15 for a flu shot and \$25 for a pneumonia shot.





Restore Some Common Sense in Law Enforcement

Much has been made in the media the past few years about racial profiling. This is the supposed practice of law enforcement of questioning certain ethnic groups more than others when it comes to traffic stops or other contacts. I personally believe the press over-reports this practice.

Like all activity that could involve lawsuits, a backlash exists that causes people to be overcautious to avoid lawsuits. At least twice in the two years prior to the events of September 11th, Middle Eastern passengers have been detained or questioned prior to boarding flights and have sued airlines. Two Saudi Arabian students sued America West Airlines after they were detained for tampering with a cockpit door and asking strange questions. Turkish woman and her son sued an America West Airline in another incident the following year.

While no one condones discrimination, when it is so easy to file lawsuits, law enforcement or airlines may not engage in responsible behavior out of fear of legal fees and investigations. We have already heard in big cities that law enforcement is reluctant to perform their job as aggressively as they used to because they are afraid of complaints being

On September 11, the hijackers that killed over 6,000 people showed up at Boston's Logan Airport. They bought one-way tickets. Some of them paid cash at the high fares paid by people who don't pay in advance. How often do people by one-way tickets with cash just prior to an airline flight? Aren't young men the most likely to cause trouble? Would the young men have been questioned if they weren't of Middle Eastern descent? We may never know the answers to these questions.

Under current law there is no penalty for filing frivolous lawsuits in civil rights Damages can actions. exceed any real damages caused the victim. combination has on a state level caused over seventyfive percent of the filings to lack even the bare minimum finding of probable cause. In fewer than ten percent of the filings is discrimination eventually found.

It is time our state and federal governments wakeup to the fact that you are not prejudice if you want to limit these actions by forcing the plaintiff to pay legal fees on frivolous actions and

remove provisions which allow for excessive damages. (Punitive damages and multiple damages) We may even have to go further and in cases involving law enforcement acknowledge that in our hunt for terrorists, the threat right now comes from Middle Eastern countries and while no one should be illegally detained, additional questioning when it comes to high risk areas such as airlines, power plant, etc. should not be out of line.





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





The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President John D. Kenworthy presided. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a moment of Silence, noted to recognize and honor those affected by the tragedy of September 11, 2001 and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann seconded by Trustee Kevin Scheunemann and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the September 4, 2001 meeting were approved as printed.

Mr. Richard Schlice a resident from the area, KES Principal*Keith Kriewaldt, Mr. Paul Reichardt Business Manger for the School District and Lori Heisler of Johnson Bus were present for the discussion. It was noted the Ordinance calls for the designation of a specific color of paint to be used for curbs and signs used adjacently to the elementary school limiting parking. Fall Turkey

MADISON -- With a few days remaining until the October 13 opening of the 2001 fall wild turkey hunting season, Department of Natural Resources wildlife managers are cautioning that turkey hunting may be a little more difficult this season than in past years.

Reports from all regions of the state indicate that spring 2001 turkey production may have been hurt a little by repeated June rains and cool temperatures.

In past years, up to 50 percent of the fall harvest has been juvenile birds, according to Keith Warnke, DNR upland ecologist.

There were 71,600 permits available for this fall's season, compared to 68,600 last fall. The statewide spring 2001 harvest reached a record high of 39,211 turkeys.

"Due to the observed poor hatch this year, we'll be carefully monitoring the proportion of juveniles in the fall harvest," Warnke said. "We wait for fall harvest figures to be reported before we finalize spring permit levels."

During the fall, turkeys spend more than 70 percent of the daylight hours in hardwood habitats. Both brood flocks and adult male flocks make extensive use of areas dominated by oak and hickory.

Turkey hunters should monitor the acorn crop in the area they hunt, as the success or failure of acorns may determine where turkeys will be feeding. In years of poor acorn production, turkeys spend proportionately more time in cornfields with wastecorn being an important food source.

Most turkey hunting occurs on private land so Warnke says it is important for hunters to keep landowner relationships a high priority. Landowners in Wisconsin are usually willing to allow hunters to use their land as long as they ask politely for permission to do so.

Bag limit is one turkey of any age or sex per turkey permit.

KEWASKUM - Organizers of the Kettle Moraine Amateur Golf Tournament had put in an order for two days of good weather for last weekend's 28th annual event. Unfortunately, they only got one, and the tournament was shortened from its scheduled 36 holes to just 18 as rain pelted the Hon-E-Kor Country Club layout on Sunday.

Randy Warobick, a member at West Bend Country Club who lives in Brookfield, was declared the winner after players waited two hours Sunday to see if conditions would improve. Doherty said he had 15 good holes, but went fourover-par during a three-hole stretch on the Blue Nine, which put a dent in his plans to gain the "double" (club title and KMA title).

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




Jill Wittmann was the high assist leader with 14. She also had three kills.

in the conference.






