If you were anywhere near the high school last Friday night, you would have seen an obvious contrast presented to people attending the school play in Rose Hall, and those attending the play-off football game held in Kewaskum (game played on a "neutral site"). Having attended both, I had the opportunity to listen to people, to observe people, and to observe something we don't often think about, i.e., people visiting our community tend to buy things here and dine here. As a member of the Chamber of Commerce it is very clear that any function or activity held in the Kewaskum community results in a cash flow into the area, plus community pride in what I refer to as Kewaskum Pride. Activities always allows visitors to see and experience Kewaskum, primarily in a very positive way. extremely positive community exposure, things that sometimes forget. Approximately 2000 people came to Kewaskum as a result of one thing: The new football/track complex. A Father's Concern

On Sunday, Veterans Day, we do well to reflect on the war that has been set before us and on those who serve.

What follows is a story from a dear friend. His son is a soldier, who has been deployed in the war on terrorism. The words are especially poignant, because they speak for thousands of mothers and fathers and husbands and wives who are today anxiously waiting for word from their loved ones:

"It both ends and begins with a phone call.

'Hey Dad...Just got the word that we're moving out, pronto. Like we talked before, it'll be a while before I can call again. I love you. Don't worry about me. Put Mom on for a sec, will you?'

"It's the end of the waiting for military orders. The end of hope that they don't come. The end of uncertainty about deployment. He's

"The end is bad, but the beginning is worse. It's the beginning of long months of silence. Long nights of worry. Watch the news. Search the internet. Wait for the phone to ring...but it doesn't

"He might be in Turkmenistan, or Uzbekistan, or a dozen other countries I didn't know existed before September 11. I knew it might happen. After all, this is what he was trained for. He's a soldier. I know he's proud to do his duty. And I'm proud of him.

"I hug my wife and tell he's going to be okay, but we need something more to cling to. 'Lord give him strength. Lord protect him. 'Still, I have to focus. I have to keep on living, despite the hollow numbness in the pit of my stomach.

"My boy's gone to war.
"I've been there - but I've
never been here. I've been
the one to go to war, but not
the one left behind... to
wait... to worry... to wonder.
I didn't want this for him.

"Only yesterday he was a

little kid pleading for me to go outside and play ball. Today he's a man doing his duty, defending his nation.

"He's special to me, but really no different from thousands of others. Your sons and daughters, grandsons and granddaughters, friends and neighbors. They're all doing their duty, leaving their homes, leaving their families to fight an enemy who wears no uniforms, swears allegiance to no country, and recognizes no rules of war.

"America's troops may be gone for weeks, even months or years. Some may never come home, yet all will be with their family."

"Not blood relatives - not mom and dad - but with other young men and women with whom they serve in the military uniform of our country. Come what may, none will fail those with whom they serve.

"They are today's 'Private Ryans' and 'Band of Brothers.' Their platoons and air wings and ship's companies are their families, their brothers and sisters

"Each has pledged his life and entrusted his safety to the other. All have forged a scared bond that will last a lifetime, a bond none can understand; except those who share it.

"We are praying as a family, because, in a very real sense, every Soldier, Sailor, Marine, Airman and Coast Guardsman is a part of our family. The American Legion family, and we love them all and we're proud of them.

"No words are sufficient to describe our national sense of resolve or our collective feeling of concern for those young ones who have gone into Harm's Way on our behalf. Instead let us pray to the God of us all that we gain victory and rejoice in the safe return of our family.

"Nonetheless, let us also pray that His will be done, and that He give us the strength to bear it - be it sorrow or rejoicing.

"God has blessed America with much bounty and many fine men and women through the years who have risked their lives and given them - to preserve our liberty and our way of life.

"So today let this be our prayer, as in ages past, "God Bless America."

I do this best when painting from life and allowing my reactions to the natural elements and personal feelings to play a part in the painting process."

An article in the West Bend Daily News on 10/30/01 reports that the Kewaskum School Board has announced that the milrate on this district's property assessed value has been reduced by 7-1/2%. In the meantime my property's assessed value has increased by over 12-1/2%, this by my figures, means there is 5% more assessed value to my property to apply the mil-rate to. Therefore, in reality,

according to my figures, there will be at least a 5% increase in my school taxes this year instead of a reduction. I will have to wait until December to find out.

I am assuming the Kewaskum School Board is publicizing this rate reduction in order to promote their anticipated referendum to build a school auditorium, etc. I certainly am not against these suggested improvements, but I don't think it is the right time for it. With the financial mess the state government has gotten us into, they are now threatening to either reduce or eliminate their 65% share of school costs, leaving us their expensive mandates. Also since the war on terrorism the federal government is no longer promoting increased financial aid for schools. All this suggests huge increases in property school taxes in the near future. I would advise extreme caution when considering this referendum's proposals and in no case referendum. It would be a good idea for the teachers and school boards in this county to use their influence in getting our county board to cut down their extravagant spending on fun and games so the overburdened taxpayer could afford things that are truly needed.



MADISON -- A preliminary tally of deer registration stations across the state indicated hunters harvested 44,449 deer during the 2001 Zone T Hunt held October 25-28. Hunters faced cold, windy weather and in some areas, rain and snow during the first two days of the hunt.

With 76 deer management units included in the 2001 Zone T hunt, wildlife officials expected a somewhat lower harvest than the 2000 hunt, which took place in 97 management units and totaled 66,417 antlerless deer. Last season's December Zone T hunt added an additional 15,661 antlerless deer.

The weather could hardly have been less conducive for hunting during the first two days of the Zone T season in south central Wisconsin, noted Alan Crossley, the Department of Natural Resources regional wildlife biologist. Cold temperatures, strong winds and intermittent rain made it tough to keep hunting and deer were hunkered down, not moving around much, he said.

Cumberland based conservation warden, T.J. Edwards, had much the same to say about Thursday's weather, noting at times visibility was limited to under 200 yards due to blowing snow.

"Hunter pressure was down from last year but there were also fewer Zone T units in this area this year," said Edwards. "The hunters I talked to were relaxed and not feeling any pressure to hunt hard or long. Many had sons and

daughters along and in a number of cases, the dad had put the kid on a stand and was working to direct deer toward the young hunter."

Conservation warden, John Lacenski, worked in the field in Shawano County. "It was a very laidback hunt. People I met seemed relaxed about it and hunter pressure was spotty. Some areas were busy and some were very lightly hunted. It was windy and there was a little bit of snow but the wind also knocked down most of the remaining leaves improving visibility."

Edwards noted that his office received far fewer calls about illegal buck shootings during the Zone T hunt compared to last year. "Hunters were doing a great job at carefully identifying their targets this year. I talked to several who passed up shots because the head of the animal was not clearly visible and they just weren't sure."

"The deer were sitting pretty tight, said Greg Kessler, DNR wildlife biologist out of Brule. "But so were some of the hunters after a short rush of shooting early Thursday morning. I registered several first-time kills for some youth hunters and they seemed pretty happy with the day, regardless of the conditions."

The numbers presented in this story are preliminary and will likely be adjusted before a final harvest report is issued following the close of the 2001-02 deer seasons.

Hunting, Fishing Licenses Can Be Purchased Online

MADISON -- Gov. Scott McCallum and Department of Natural Resources Secretary Darrell Bazzell have announced that DNR hunting and fishing licenses can now be purchased over the Internet. The new service became active on Tuesday, October 30.

"The ability to purchase hunting and fishing licenses online is one example of how Wisconsin's E-government initiative is making state services more accessible and convenient to our citizens and our visitors," said Governor McCallum.

'It took a lot of work and planning to get us to this point -- there are other states using the Internet to sell hunting and fishing licenses, but we're part of a very small number that allow the customer to actually print a valid license" said DNR Secretary Bazzell. "From this point forward, hunters and anglers will be able to purchase licenses from their home, business or through the services of a resort or campsite that offers Internet access.

"Both resident and nonresident customers can now buy licenses 24 hours a day, seven days a week."

Customers can access online license sales site http://www.wildlife license.com/wi> through the DNR website http://www.dnr.state.wi.us or through the state's portal, http://www.wisconsin.gov, and then clicking on the licenses

Most DNR recreational license types will be available for purchase online. Some license types like fish-

ing, small game, and turkey can even be printed at home for immediate use. Licenses that include a backtag, carcass tag or harvest report are not printable but will be mailed to the customer within seven days. Visa or MasterCard are accepted for payment and there is a \$3 convenience fee for this

The site also has links to current hunting and fishing regulations and other useful information.

"DNR issues approximately 3.6 million recreational licenses to more than two million customers each year. We now offer outdoor enthusiasts three convenient ways to purchase licenses: using the Internet, by visiting any license agent location, or by telephone" (toll free at 1-877-945-4236), said Marilyn Davis, Director of the DNR Bureau of Customer Service and Licensing.

"When the weather is good and you want to get outside and enjoy what Wisconsin has to offer, the last thing you should have to worry about is how to get a license. We want to make it easy for people to get what they need and take to the waters and fields of the state," she said.

All purchase requirements and restrictions that apply to automated overthe-counter sales via the DNR's Automated License Issuance System (ALIS) are reflected in the design of the Internet sales site.


and Mike Wagner.
