A 12 year old boy was followed home from Kewaskum High School Tuesday, November 27 at 8:24 p.m.



VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM **NEWS NOTES**

"Snow and Ice Removal

The snow and ice season has arrived bringing along some problems. To alleviate these problems or to clarify a few items, let us refer to the Municipal Code, Chapter 82.6, which covers "Snow and Ice Removal."

SIDEWALKS TO BE KEPT CLEAR. The owner or occupant of any lot or lands within the village abutting upon a public street along the line of which a sidewalk shall have been constructed shall, whenever such sidewalk shall be encumbered with snow or ice, clear the same therefrom within 24 hours after cessation of each storm. If it is impossible or impractical to remove the ice therefrom, he shall treat the same with sand, cinders, ashes, salt or some other substance continuously until removed so that such sidewalk will not be slippery or dangerous to pedestrians. If any such owner of occupant fails to remove such snow or ice from such sidewalk or to treat such ice, the director of public works may do so; and the expense of such removal or treatment shall become a special tax or charge against the property to be collected in the manner specified in subsection (c). If the director of public works orders such removal of snow and ice, a minimum charge of \$25.00 per occurrence shall be affixed as the expense of the removal or treatment. If the cost of removal or treatment exceeds the \$25.00 minimum, the actual cost for such work shall be charged plus a ten percent handling charge.

SNOW NOT TO BE DEPOSITED IN STREETS. No person shall cause to be deposited snow from his premises on the sidewalk abutting thereon onto any street in the village without a permit from the director of public works, who may require to be paid a fee sufficient to reimburse the village for the cost of removal of the snow. The expense of such removal or treatment shall become a special tax or charge against the property to be collected in the manner specified in

Assessment of cost. After clearing or treating any such sidewalk as provided in this section, the director of public works shall file with the village clerk/treasurer a written report containing a description of such lot or tract charged and the amount of the expense chargeable to the same. The clerk/treasurer shall thereupon make out and mail to the owner of such lot or tract at his last known address an itemized statement of the cost; and, when paid, the amount so paid shall be credited to the village general fund. If the same is not paid within 30 days, it shall bear interest at the rate of six percent per annum from the date on which the work was completed. If any such bill shall remain unpaid on October 1 next following the clearing or treating of the sidewalk, the village clerk/treasurer shall insert such charge in the general tax roll of the village and the same proceedings shall be had thereafter for the collection of such taxes as in cases of other taxes extended upon such roll.

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



LIBRARY LEDGER

A patron came back with Andrew Carrolls War Letters and slid the book toward me. I just can't read this now, not with everything thats going on, she said. But reading through the book now myself, I find the letters strangely com-

Carroll, also author of the collection Letters of a Nation, is the executive director of the American Poetry and Literacy Project and has been featured many times on National Public Radio reading letters he has collected. His War Letters, which was actually published in late July of this year, predates the tragedies of September but offers solemn evidence of the American spirit of patriotism, individuality, and the unique outlook on life during times of war that our democracy creates. From the Civil War to the Gulf War, Carroll binds together the thoughts of men, women, and children from many generations with surprising unity. A Civil War soldier writes, Surely the time has already arrived to take hold of the work before us with energy and determination. Over one hundred years later, a soldier in the Gulf War writes, We gathered around a radio. . .to hear President Bush's speech of his decision to go to war. . . No one clapped or

cheered but the pride and determination showed. Im sure no one will forget those words. These two soldiers, divided as they were by decades of social and cultural change, show how Americans share similar perspectives no matter what their background simply by virtue of their being Americans.

But the book is not just a collection of letters from soldiers, there are also the thoughts of spies, diplomats, celebrities, protestors, nurses, and doctors. A female spy sends a scathing letter to the Secretary of State during the Civil War; a doctor aboard a battleship in the Philippines details the many horrific injuries of the wounded: John Steinbeck sends a letter of sorrow to a grieving widow. These diverse reports reveal the collection in another lightnot just as a history of wars, but as a history of every day people. Left in are all spelling errors, grammar errors, politically incorrect statements; everything that makes each one of us unique. These many perspectives invite many different emotions from sadness to unexpected laughter to indignation. A collection like this does more to make history alive than all of the biographies and historical essays written by degreed scholars, no matter how

well-intentioned. And as I read War Letters, even with a war in our headlines every day, I do feel a certain kind of comfort. Whether the letters conceive of war as being something just or as a hellish mistake, the writers are united in their belief in America as something wholly larger than themselves. No matter how cynical or jaded a generation becomes, they cannot deny that who they are depends on the many rights and freedoms we enjoy as Americans. What I find most comforting is that a book like War Letters can, through unconnected people and places and opposing viewpoints, define what it means to be an American in such a clear way. As one World War I soldier puts it, I'm not over here to die for my country. I came here to live for it and . . . make it possible for oth-

ers to live in peace and happiness.

Trustee Andy Pesch, the Plan Commission Board Representative, reported a Plan Commission meeting was held October 23, 2001. It was noted the Commission reviewed a request of Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic to a request kennel license to allow for the boarding of healthy dogs and cats and the allowing of this through a conditional use permit. Mr. Rick Kania was present to discuss the zoning ordinance update. The meeting dates of November and December were adjusted to December 11, 2001 at 7:00 p.m.

Trustee Mathew Heiser, the Library Board Representative, informed the Board that Mr. Frank Beesten, the current Village representative on the County Library Board, has been asked to serve a new three year term. The Village is supportive of this appointment and appreciates Mr. Beestens commitment to the Library.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt explained what and how the budget proposal was prepared, reflecting the dollars indicated. The difference between revenue and expenditures was discussed and several alternatives how to reduce the separation was discussed. It was agreed by consensus that dollars be moved from the open space fund in the amount of \$10,00 to help cover the \$21,000 budgeted for a new piece of play ground equipment and related fall zone and a total of \$29,644 would be moved to the revenue side of the budget from the designated fund for the following accounts: Municipal Building Annex (\$2,000),Machinery & Equipment (\$25,000), refuse (\$856), recycling (\$1,230) and celebrations (\$524).

Following the placement of almost everything asked for, the difference between revenues and expenditures was \$221,713 which would equal an increase of \$1.61 or + 24.5%. Numerous cuts were implemented in the budget through to the Board reflecting an increase of \$89,510 which will equal an increase of \$.67 or + 9.89%. All departmental accounts in general have seen decreases with one exception, that being the Library budget. A review of those cuts and even the increase were reviewed and after a lot of discussion the Board did not feel any further adjustments should be made at this meeting.

The overall tax rate for the village and all other entities would equal an estimated gross rate of \$25.301345 or an increase of .665853 or 2.7%. It was noted the County & State tax rate was still unknown but a 4% increase was used and that the tax credit information is not available to project the net tax rate. Several other alternatives were discussed as to additional cuts. It was noted by several Board Members that the budget is very tight with no extra funds and it was further noted that if further cuts were imposed it would compound the problem in future years as did tight budgets of the past. On a motion by Trustee Larry Ammel, seconded by Trustee Kevin Scheunemann and unanimously carried by voice vote the Board directed the administrator and staff to prepare the public hearing notice reflecting the above information. The Public Hearing is scheduled for

November 26, 2001 at 7:00 p.m. A review of the Debt Service Fund, Special Revenue Fund, Library Fund, Water Department and Water Pollution Control budgets took place with several adjustments. With the above noted action of the Board, the Board directed the information reviewed be included with the public hearing notice.

More Than 150,000 Permits Available

Spring Turkey Application Deadline is December 10

MADISON -- Turkey hunters have until December 10 to apply for a permit for the 2002 Wisconsin spring turkey hunting sea-

Preliminary permit levels for the spring season are 156,240 permits available in the 43 turkey management zones, and 261 permits available for the state parks that are open for spring turkey hunting, for a total of 156,501 permits available for the 2002 spring season.

That is an increase from 150,403 total permits issued for the 2001 spring season. Also, there are two new zones open for turkey hunting in 2002.

Turkey productivity has been down the past two years due to cold and wet weather during the nesting season, according to Nancy Frost, assistant upland wildlife ecologist with the state Department of

Natural Resources. "This year's brood surveys show preliminary number of poults per hen as 2.76, down from 2.97 poults per hen in 2000. The percent of jakes in the spring harvest has also gone down the past two years. This is probably due to the productivity the past two springs and selectivity for toms by hunters," Frost said.

"Hunters should not be alarmed by these numbers. We are still expecting a good hunting season, just not as great as the past couple of years. The population is still expanding its range and we expect good hunting

Winter weather can also affect the turkey population, Frost said. Deep, powdery snow is more of a problem than extremely cold weather because it limits the ability of turkeys to forage on the ground. "But, Wisconsin's turkeys are tough birds," she added. "They can remain in roosting areas for up to two weeks during especially severe weather.'

Wisconsin's turkey range has many south-facing slopes or wind-swept fields that lose snow quickly and are available as foraging areas for turkeys. Frost said many people ask if they should feed the wild turkeys on their property during the winter.

We recommend against artificial feeding. There are several risks involved with artificial feeding: turkeys can become tame and dependent on the food; artificial feeding concentrates turkeys and makes them vulnerable to predation; and artificial feeding sites increase the chances of potential disease transmis-

Mold, which grows on wet or damp grain can

cause respiratory diseases in birds which can spread easily when birds are concentrated in one area. To keep Wisconsin's turkey population healthy, habitat management is the key, not artificial feeding.

The 2002 spring turkey season starts on April 10 and consists of six, five-day time periods that end on May 19. Any applications postmarked after the December 10 application deadline or filled out incorrectly will not be considered for the drawing.

Applications and the required \$3 permit application sticker may be purchased at all Wisconsin DNR service centers, ALIS vendors or by calling toll free, 1-877-945-4236 (applicants must use VISA or Mastercard and there is a \$3 handling fee).

TURKEY AND BEAR PERMITS APPLICATIONS NOW CAN BE DONE ON-LINE

Starting in 2002, hunters can apply for their spring and fall turkey permits as well as for their bear application permits (deadline January 18) on-line.

Currently licenses and the stamp privileges can be purchased on-line by visiting the DNR On Line Service Center (from the home page, click on the "Licenses, Permits and Registrations" button and follow the links; applicants must use VISA or Mastercard and there is a \$3 handling fee).

Applicants who use the on-line process will receive immediate confirmation that their application was received for a specific time period and hunting zone. All applicants will be notified at a later date through the U.S. mail whether they were successful in the drawing for the time periods and zones for which they applied.

Hunters Take Nearly 300,000 Deer During Nine-Day Season

MADISON -- A preliminary call-in tally of registration stations across the state shows hunters taking 291,563 deer during the regular nine-day gun deer hunt that closed last Sunday.

While that figure is about 33 percent lower than the preliminary call-tally of more than 437,000 from Wisconsin's 2001 record season, it is only about 12 percent lower than the 10-year average of about 330,600. However, with the addition of the four-day October Zone T harvest, the total gun harvest for 2001 is two percent above the 10-year record.

Department of Natural Resources wildlife managers had expected a reduced harvest from 2000, when Wisconsin had a record deer herd estimated at 1.8 million animals, and hunters set an all-time national record harvest for all combined hunting seasons of more than 618,000 white-tailed deer.

The deer population was estimated at about 1.65 million going into the 2001 hunting seasons, more than 20 percent over goal -- from 97 last year to 76 this year. Additionally, last year

hunters received two free antlerless deer permits that could be used in any Zone T unit, while this year, hunters received just one free antlerless tag for those units.

"The 2001 fall white-tailed deer population was eight percent below last year, but by far the biggest factor in the drop in harvest had to be the weather," said DNR Deer Ecologist Bill Mytton. "Last year we had near perfect hunting conditions throughout the entire season. This year, although it was very mild, hunting conditions were really pretty poor."

The mild weather did allow hunters to remain in the field for longer periods of time, but it also meant they had to take any deer they shot in to be processed right away, instead of being able to hang the deer and return to hunting, he said.

Also, because the weather was so mild, "deer were able to sit tight longer too. It wasn't as easy to get them to move, and if they did move, there was no snow statewide for hunters to track them," Mytton said.

"The double whammy on this year's nine-day hunt was that both weekends had extremely mild weather," he said. "The importance of these weekends is that this is when most hunters are in the woods."

"Generally, opening weekend accounts for more than half the harvest, so when hunting conditions didn't improve through the week, it was apparent that the numbers would be down for the entire season this year," Mytton said.

This reduced harvest was most significant in the antlerless kill and that is why deer biologists from around the state continue to stress the importance of the Zone T early and late hunts to buffer weather situations like we saw this year.

Hunters shot about 44,450 deer during an early Zone T hunt that was held in October, compared to nearly 66,500 in 2000. A special hunt for people shooting muzzleloader rifles -- one shot rifles for which the powder and shot is loaded through the end of the barrel -- ran through Sunday, December 2, and then there will be the second antlerless-only hunt in the designated Zone T units from December 6 through 9.

Gun Deer Season is Fifth Safest on Record Despite Hunting-Related Fatalities

MADISON - Wisconsin's 2001 gun deer season ranks as the fifth safest on record, despite seven firearm-related deaths that were reported during the nine-day season that ended last Sunday.

Department of Natural Resources conservation wardens are investigating a total of 19 hunting-related firearm-accidents that occurred during the season.

"The gradual decline of hunting-related incidents during the gun deer season is proof positive that hunting is safe and getting safer every year," said Tim Lawhern, hunter safety administrator with the DNR. "There's room for improvement but it's clear that more hunters are practicing safety in the field. Hunter education is working in Wisconsin."

The 19 incidents that took place during this year's hunt rank the 2001 gun deer season as the fifth safest on record. Ten accidents in 1997 make that year the safest, followed by 15 in 1996 and 17 in both 1993 and 1998.

While juveniles typically account for a third of all hunting-related incidents in Wisconsin, this year's accident figures show improvement among those hunters younger than 18. Reports show that juveniles were identified as the shooter in four firearm-related inci-

dents, or just over 23 per-

"What's disturbing," Lawhern said, "is that in three of those four cases, a 12-or 13-year-old was hunting without adult supervision as is required by state law. There's a reason that young hunters must be directly supervised by an adult while in the field. Many of these boys or girls lack the experience to automatically perform safely all the time. It takes a couple seasons for their actions to become more practiced and deliberate.

Several of this year's accident statistics fall in line with previous years. For example:

* Self-inflicted injuries accounted for 31.5 percent

of incidents

* Incidents involving members of the same hunting party accounted for 63.2 percent of the total.

* Forty-two percent of all accidents occurred during a deer drive.

* Group bagging was involved in 26.3 percent of firearm-related injury incidents.

* The average age of the shooter was just under 34 years. (17 incidents; the identities of two shooters remains under investigation).

What's unusual about this season is the number of fatal incidents. There were two fatal accidents in 2000. The last year with more fatalities was 1987, during which there were eight fatal accidents.

"The only explanation we can give with any certainty concerning this year's fatalities is that at some point, someone did not follow a basic rule of firearm safety," Lawhern said. "Other circumstances -- such as the warm weather or the lack of snow -- might have played a role, but those factors don't cause a person to pull a trigger. Firearm safety, whether it's in a hunting situation or otherwise, begins and ends with the person holding the firearm.'

"The statistics of this season probably don't mean much to the families of those people involved in hunting accidents this year," Lawhern added. "We are truly saddened by these events and we'll continue to work to help make future seasons safer."
