

Session two- Division two preliminaries at 10 a.m. on mats one through three; Division three preliminaries at 10 a.m. on mats four through six; Division one consolations at approximately 12:30 p.m. on all mats; Division two quarterfinals at approximately 1:30 p.m. on mats one through three; Division three quarterfinals at approximately 1:30 p.m. on mats four through six.

Session three- Division one semifinals at 7 p.m. on mats one and two; Division two semifinals at 7 p.m. on mats three and four; Division three semifinals at 7 p.m. on mats five and six.

Saturday, Feb. 23

Session four- Division one consolations at 11 a.m. on mats one and two; Division two consolations at 11 a.m. on mats three and four; Division three consolations at 11 a.m. on mats five and six.

Session five-Division one championships at 6 p.m. on mat one; Division two championships at 6 p.m. on mat two; Division three championships at 6 p.m. on mat

According to a press release by the W.I.A.A. there will be champions crowned in 13 weight classes in three divisions. Wrestlers who finished first or second in each weight class at last weekend's eight Division 1 sectionals qualified for the state tournament. The top three finishers in each weight class at each of the four Divisions two and three sectionals qualified for the tourney. There are 208 qualifiers for the championships in Division one and 156 for Divisions two and three. There are 216 teams represented at this year's individual championships, including 87 from Division one, 63 from Division two and 66 from Division three.

There are 15 former champions returning to the field this year, including two who are trying to win their fourth state title and three attempting to win their third title. Only five other wrestlers in WIAA history have won four state titles.

There are 29 wrestlers who enter the State tournament this weekend undefeated, 15 of them in Division one, eight in Division two and six in Division three. Nearly as impressive are the 45 wrestlers who enter the tournament with only one

Campbellsport's Brian Bowe will wrestle in the 119 lb. class. He is the only undefeated wrestler in that class. His record is 38-0.



What can a quarter buy you?

I do believe it was the best 25 cents I had ever spent. It went into a parking meter last Wednesday on the corner of Sheboygan Street and Marr in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, one block off of the downtown area. My quarter bought me exactly one hour of time.

Now I'd parked in this spot before. Many times. From here, there is easy access to the public library. That morning, however, instead of turning left, crossing the street, and entering the library, I headed to the right where the Windhover Center for the Arts was located. A friend telephoned me the day prior to let me know about a traveling VSA (Very Special Arts) exhibit on display there through the end of the month. "You really must see this," she told me of the collection of artwork done by disabled children.

And so here I was, beneath a bright blue sky on a crisp, very February morn heading toward a magnifiolder building, restored to its original grandeur only a year-and-ahalf ago or so.

I entered and ascended several polished, wooden stairs. Atop them, a burgundy and ivory oriental rug was laid, and I paused on it to sign the visitor guest

From where I stood, the children's artwork was visible already, hung from just beyond the double doorway entrance into the lovely gallery. The first painting colorful, vibrant and seemingly alive - faced me. It was titled The Dancing Flowers. I read this and smiled, and would do so again and again during the time I spent among these children. They were not here physically, and yet they were here, having painted a piece of themselves onto these canvases in watercolors and oils and pastels. You could sense their presence, and you could sense who they were and what they loved in paintings they called It's Great Being Me, My Playroom, Swimming Along, Enjoy It and The Magnificent Sunflower.

I'm stirred when someone says, "You can't do it." I find the statement "You can't" offensive to the human spirit. We can be anything. Maybe this entire experience is a series of lessons to learn that you can yes, you can.

Beside each piece, a framed biography was hung listing the name, age and disability of the child. These little artists suffered from impairments: many Palsy, Cerebral Down Syndrome, Autism, Spinal Muscular Strophy, seizures, and other varied physical and emotional disabilities. Some lived in wheelchairs, like 10-year-old Brittany. There were no easy paths here. This was clear.

Yet despite challenges so enormous I could not even begin to imagine what these youngsters must face daily, each expressed his or herself from a place of beauty within. Like Sarah, although crippled from a disease that prevents her from even grasping onto a paintbrush, she brought forth her masterpiece, Harvest. How did she do this? By having a paintbrush attached to her forehead. I stop for a moment and consider Sarah, amazing Sarah, her courage leaving an impression on me that will not be forgotten. Of this I am certain.

Courage is a way of life for these youngsters. And so is hope. You see it in their art, and you hear it in their words hanging beside their paintings. Eleven-year-old Julia tells us that one day she will fulfill her dream of becoming a famous woman artist. Twelve-year-old John A. Magnusson believes we can all experience the hopes our hearts harbor. He writes, "You can do anything you put your mind to. Anything. All of us. Thank you, John, for being our reminder that dreams can take flight like the hummingbirds and butterflies and bumblebees that fill this room, painted by those disabled in body, but not in soul, painted by those "focusing on their ability and not on their dis," as one little gal so wonderfully put

I left there that day a different person than the one I had been when I arrived. I knew this as I sat

in a little coffee shop around the corner from the gallery sipping tea afterwards, lemon ginger with just a bit of honey, and thinking about starfish swimming in the ocean. Ten-year-old Diane Jacobson had painted several. I thought about her starfish as I stared out the large window and watched the world go by. Miss Diane believed that starfish enjoy, most of all, being together, another wonderful word.

Together, we open one another's eyes to truths we know, but have sometimes forgotten. Together, we help those unable to help themselves in some ways, and they, in turn, will help us in others. Someone, somewhere has helped these children, and I find myself profoundly grateful to each of these persons who I know not the name of, nor they mine.

We place a paintbrush in these young hands, and it is grasped. Then something within is awakened. Or we attach such a paintbrush to a forehead and for doing so, we will be taken to places where we can see the world through beautiful, beautiful eyes, and we will be taken to places where we can look upon hope so bright where a Light shines there.

I finished my tea, and set down the sage green and orchid-colored ceramic mug I drank it from. For a while, I simply sit there and admire this magnificent piece of pottery, handthrown and crafted by a local artist with an extraordinary talent and an ordinary name: John Smith. His work is incredibly interesting for many reasons, not the least of which is that Mr. Smith is blind.

Hello friends,

I should have become a sturgeon spearer at least 15 years ago. I guess I was too hung up on ice fishing to give up a week of the hard water season to try a sport that, until this past week, I knew absolutely nothing about.

Friday, February 8 High 40 Low 30

Dave Dutscheck is my neighbor. He is also my stepson Kevin's Pop Warner football coach and a very active outdoorsman. On New Year's Eve, I accepted an invitation from Dave to go spear fishing with him and his brothers, Joey, Jamie and their friends, Ben Reinke and Kurt Heid.

Kurt Heid, who has harvested eight sturgeon in 10 years, was the unofficial leader of our group. Lake Winnebago, which covers 137,000 acres, becomes the home of up to 17,000 license holders.

Today was a work day for thousands of people on the frozen waters of Winnebago. In spearing terms, it's called "cutting in." Cutting in is the job required to spear sturgeon. The group leader chooses where the group will set up on the lake. Then a chainsaw with a minimum bar length of 36" is used to cut the ice. In our case, we cut seven 3x5 foot holes, one for each of the shacks we would be using. The shacks, or dark houses, are much like your typical ice fishing shack, except all of the windows are covered. Complete darkness is a must.

After our shacks were set this afternoon, we sat inside one of them and watched our TV, which in this case was a large hole in the ice. We had walkie talkies in each shack and talked regularly back and forth about the large walleye that swam by. It was interesting to listen to the obvious excitement the guys had for the next morning's opener.

Saturday, February 9 High 35, Low 27

Until this year, sturgeon spearing began at midnight and went until 6 p.m.

Spearers telling stores of the past always mention the exhaustion, excitement and boredom of watching a hole lit up by underwater lights and the challenge of the weather.

This year, because the spearing has become so popular, the hours have been changed to 6:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. This allows the season to last longer and reduces the chance of over-harvest. Four hundred adult females is the limit set by the DNR. A larger amount of males and juvenile females have been harvested. When 80 percent of the limit, or 320 adult females have been harvested, the DNR closes

the season after the next day's spearing.

Today our group of nine saw a few walleye. That was about it. Kurt Heid made some calls and was getting pretty much the same report from the other spearers. As is tradition with a high percentage of spearers, if nothing is spotted by the group, it's time to relocate.

We took on the job of moving six shacks and left the ice late in the day with high hopes that a seven-footer would swim under one of our holes the next morning.

Sunday, February 10 High 25, Low 15

Three inches of blowing snow made the drive to Quinney from Oshkosh a challenge this morning. Without a GPS, finding our shacks that were out on the ice six miles would have been impossible.

Sturgeon spearers are required to have a sense of humor, especially this year with the poor ice conditions. The big joke this morning was the bail-out plan should Dave's suburban sink with the five of us in it, and the problems a person would have should they fall asleep in their shack and fall into their hole.

We hunted sturgeon for three days. Three were spotted; one spear was thrown in an unsuccessful attempt. Most of the members of this gang, as well as thousands of other people in the Lake Winnebago Area are not reporting to work this week. All it takes is one stop at a registration location and unsuccessful spearers are thinking: new move, and who they can get to work for them the next day.


Port Washington Beats Kewaskum

Travis Kempf led the team in points and rebounds with 19 and 13. Josh Timblin led the team in assists with four.



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
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Ice Conditions, Cloudy Water Slow Sturgeon Harvest First Weekend

OSHKOSH - Shorter spearing hours, coupled with poor ice conditions and cloudy water, kept the sturgeon harvest down significantly from the frenzied pace of the previous two seasons and increased the likelihood the 2002 season would stretch into a second weekend.

Through the end of spearing hours Monday, spearers had registered 462 fish, including 172 adult females, according to preliminary harvest totals. The season closes the day after spearers reach 80% of any one of three harvest caps set to keep harvest of the latematuring, slow growing fish at a sustainable level. The harvest cap figures for 2002 are 400 adult females, 400 juvenile females, and 1,375 males

"We're about halfway there right now," said Ron Bruch, Department of Natural Resources sturgeon biologist, late Monday afternoon. "Given the current harvest rates, the trigger of 320 adult females could be hit either Thursday, Friday or Saturday."

Poor ice conditions are forcing spearers to seek out areas with stronger ice in areas they normally don't fish in. Cloudy water, partly resulting from algae blooms fueled by sunlight being able to penetrate the thin, clear ice made it difficult for spearers to see the fish.

The prospect of the 2002 season extending into a second week in February contrasts starkly with the 2001 and 2000 seasons. In those years, good water clarity and ice conditions allowed spearers to hit the 80% triggers on opening day in both years caused the season to close after two days.

The reduction in harvest as a result of the conditions and the emergency spearing hours "is a positive outcome" Bruch said. "We're able to protect the sturgeon population and ensure there will be future spearing seasons

while assuring that everybody who wanted to participate this year could."

"There were nearly as many spearers out there this year as last year but there was a reduction in actual spearing effort - the amount of time people actually stared into the water, waiting to spear a sturgeon."

Spearers in 2002 killed 227 fish on opening day, down 79% from the record opening day harvest of the 2001 season 1,074 while the count of 4,368 shanties in 2002 was down only 13% from the opening day record set in 2001 of 4997 shanties.

The Natural Resources Board in December 2001 approved emergency rules for the 2002 season that cut in half - from 12 to six - the number of hours people could spear each day of the season. Spearers now can begin spearing at 6:30 a.m. instead of midnight, and must stop spearing at 12:30 p.m. instead of 6 p.m.

The emergency rules were intended to prevent a repeat of the 2001 season, when spearers harvested 52% more adult females then the harvest cap allowed. Adult females are the most critical to sustaining the Lake Winnebago sturgeon population but are also the most vulnerable because they are larger than

males and are more frequently targeted by spearers, Bruch says. Because female sturgeon do not start spawning until they are 20 to 25 years old and then only every three to five years, killing too many of them would cause the population to crash and take generations to recover.

"Generally, the half-day emergency rule has been well accepted by the spearers," Bruch says. "The local establishments are very pleased with it. They've got booming business now in the afternoon."

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

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
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
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Activities Keep FFA'ers Involved






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

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FFA Year in Review

As current president of the Kewaskum FFA Chapter for the 2001-2002 school year, I would like to take this opportunity to reflect on the year and the history of the chapter.

I would like to start by telling you about myself. My parents are Ken and Carol Ramthun, and we live on the family farm. I am a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in West Bend as well as attended elementary school there.

The first two years of high school I went to West Bend East. It was because of the agriculture classes, and all of the opportunities that the FFA has to offer, that I transferred to Kewaskum High School for my junior and senior years.

Last year I served as the chapter's reporter. I had the opportunity to travel to as far away as Washington D.C. for a leadership conference, attend the National Convention in Kentucky, State Convention in Madison, and other leadership workshops. I participated in many activities and contests at the state and local levels, and have received much knowledge, all through the FFA.

When I think back, I think that transferring schools was one of the best decisions of my life! After high school, I plan to attend the U.W. Madison Farm and Industry Short Course program, and then continue to farm on the family farm.

FFA at Kewaskum High School was established in 1951. The original list of the first 45 members and officers still hangs in the Agriculture

room today.

This year the chapter consists of 100 members, eight of which are officers. The officer team is as follows: Dave Rizzardi is the Adviser; myself as President; Peter Marx is Vice-President; Niky Fischer is the Secretary; Lee Schacht is Treasurer; Melissa McKee is the Sentinel; Lisa Beck and Matt Dwyer are the Reporters, and Artie Klemme is this year's Historian.

A lot has changed in the FFA over the last 50 years. FFA no longer stands for the Future Farmers of America.

Because of the decrease in farmers and the increase in agriculture related industries and a greater concern for the environment, the FFA now represents the largest youth organization in the world.

The FFA works to promote positive leadership skills in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through agriculture education. For over 50 years the FFA motto Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve, has stood true.

Since 1951 the FFA has also introduced a FFA magazine, the FFA New Horizons, which all FFA members receive. It has also established an international exchange program, opened it's membership to people of all races and women in 1969, and organized the national FFA Alumni organization in

In the Kewaskum chapter alone many things have changed as well. In 1951 the chapter was led by advisor Dan Scheid and chapter president Sylvester Hawig. The agriculture department was located in the area of the high school kitchen, cafeteria and garage.

At that time, the high school was the old Kewaskum Elementary School, which was recently torn down. Following the footsteps of Dan Scheid as adviser, were Orv Behnke in 1954, Bernard Murray in 1958, Roy Esser in 1960, Paul Redig in 1973, Larry Becker in 1976, Gordon Darmody in 1977, and Dave Rizzardi started in 1978. The agriculture department is now located on the northwest side of the current high school.

The Kewaskum FFA chapter keeps their members busy all year. When school ends in June, the FFA continues its activities. State FFA Convention is held during the second week in June at the Madison Expo Center. This year Michelle Weber was a Creed Speaking finalist, Matt Propson received his State FFA Degree, Niky Fischer was recognized for being a Growmark Essay Contest

finalist, and Bridget Beck received a gold award for her Equine Science Proficiency.

In the last week of June, Peter Marx and I traveled to Washington D.C. to participate in the Washington Leadership Conference. This was a week-long conference where FFA members from all around the nation gathered to share ideas for great activities, build strong leadership qualities and tour the city.

In July the chapter works hard at the Washington County Fair. Members again showed award-winning entries such as dairy, beef, swine, sheep, rabbits, horses, poultry, crops and crafts. The members work hard on their projects all year long to make their projects as successful as possible

After the county fair, our chapter teams up with Slinger and Hartford chapters to run an ice cream booth at the Wisconsin State Fair. 


Jim Wand, master hypnotist, will visit our school on March 21. Watch the newspaper for more details.
