Kohlsville Fire Department Responds Kewaskum Fireworks To Basement Fire in Town of Wayne May Be In Jeopardy



The Kohlsville Fire Department along with the Washington County Sheriff's department responded to a fire in a basement at 9293 Midland Dr in the town of Wayne early Tuesday evening. The home is owned by Stephanie Schaeffer. Kohlsville fire chief Ray Dornacker stated that the owner of the home dumped an ashtray into a pail of garbage and left the home to run an errand. When she came back 15 minutes later, the upper level of the house was full of smoke and the basement was in flames. He indicated she thought the contents of the ashtray was no longer a fire hazard. The fire had been put out upon the arrival of Kohlsville's equipment as a firefighter went directly to the scene and was able to extinguish the flames. Kewaskum Fire Department was called to provide assistance with their tanker but the call was cancelled as they were not needed. Dornacker also indicated there was smoke throughout the home but damage was mostly contained to the rec room of the basement. There were no injuries.

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

Dr. Connor Visits KES





Dear Editor.

This is a plea to the family members of the elderly population. As a Registered Nurse with 23 years of experience in geriatric nursing, I feel it is important to share this information with you. The news has recently sent out warnings giving examples of situations that are occurring in long term care facilities. These situations are extreme and very upsetting to hear. The situations include a variety of abuses. The good news is that there are many facilities in our society that give outstanding care to the elderly.

Elderly people and their families need to carefully choose facilities. This takes planning. Check out facilities ahead of time. Even if the facility is not yet needed, get your loved one on a waiting list. When a situation arises that a facility is needed, then it will be your choice, not the first facility with an opening.

Don't be afraid to ask questions that are pertinent to the care of your loved one. Many facilities are run without the guidance of a nurse or medical staff. Some questions to ask are: What are your staffing patterns? What is the level of education and training of your staff? Look around and evaluate how the staff interacts with each other and the residents.

Cost is another issue. Be aware of the resources available to the individual. Remember that Medicare is not a long term payer but intermittent. Medicare is available in skilled situations. County funding is available in some cases. All facilities have a different way of billing. If assisted living is an option, make sure you understand what costs are provided under the monthly fee. In many cases, facilities have a tiered way of charging people. Medication management, laundry, bath cares are sometimes extra fees. If this is the case, the basic fee in addition to all the added costs is not very reasonable. Cherish the elderly. They have lived a longer life than the rest of us. Learn from what they have been taught and experienced. Protect them from harm by

preparing for their needs in advance. Find the right people to question for information. Prevent situations of abuse by monitoring the care of your loved one.

the row behind us had at least three of his questions answered, but others in the audience were ignored. It was made clear from certain town board members that "the people know the true costs of fire protection so they can be informed" and this is how it should be -however, when I asked about the cost for a year of fire protection for an average house in the township, I was ignored. How can the public make a decision when they don't know how much it will affect their personal pocketbook? Also when questioned about conflicting budget figures, no one could answer the questions, or totally ignored them. Why didn't they have answers?

The fire department members and their families from the Beechwood and Batavia areas are understandably upset with the proposed advisory referendum and the way it was brought about. For one thing the Town Board never approached the fire departments first to see if they could find ways to reduce their budgets. Both departments have very dedicated people. They are all volunteers -- they do not get paid for all the hours of commitment per month which includes monthly meetings, monthly practice sessions, Fire Chief meetings, fire commission meetings, regular maintenance on their trucks, controlled burns, carbon monoxide testing on homes, fire inspections of businesses in their areas. mutual aid with neighboring fire departments when they need help with fires, and the list goes on and on. They are on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week. If you have not been fortunate enough to have a volunteer fireman living in your household, you have no idea of the dedication involved. I have been left in a restaurant and had holidays interrupted because a fire page went off. When their fire pagers go off, I have learned to stay out of the way because they are in a hurry to get to the firehouse and get to the scene to do their jobs. Yes, I said jobs -- even though they are not paid. They put their lives on the

the fire scene safe. Yes, they have been trained (a minimum of 60 hours of classes through Moraine Park) but remember New York? They were rushing in to help as they were trained to do, while people were rushing out to safety. Granted, we do not have high rise buildings in our area, but we still have natural gas lines and LP tanks to be concerned with. These are just as dangerous to our men. How many of your volunteer activities could cost you your life?

I also had a conversation with my homeowners insurance people. When I asked about the possibility of the insurance going up for the people in the township if a department were eliminated I was told they were aware of the situation from the newspapers but hadn't considered the homeowners insurance rates going up. They said it could very well cost homeowners more in insurance if there were only one department. If the town budget goes down but each of our homeowners insurance goes up, where is the savings to the taxpayer?

Lastly, all the firemen want is some respect and appreciation for the job they do to keep our communities safer. Is the town budget your main concern when your house is on fire? I seriously doubt it.

Remember to vote on April 2.

Dear Kewaskum School District Residents,

This is the second letter in a series aimed at providing information to help you make an informed decision about my ability to represent you properly on the Kewaskum School Board. Last week's letter dealt with education issues. This week's topic: Revenue Caps (or spending limits).

We've all heard the talk

Finance Committee (I don't mean to slight the Democrats, but as of this writing, they have registered their objections to these proposals but have not yet made a proposal of their own). Regardless, it all boils down to one thing -your property taxes. I am here to defend the much maligned revenue caps that you've been hearing about in recent ads.

Revenue caps, or more accurately, spending limits, were imposed on school districts across the state back in 1993 as part of the threepronged plan to reign in skyrocketing property taxes from previous years. While Kewaskum was never 'spend-happy," we were spending money on a much freer basis than we are now. Revenue caps limit the amount of money school districts can spend each year. Coupled with the QEO and two-thirds state funding, revenue caps have made school boards much more conscientious with your tax dollars.

Some people blame the revenue caps for a school district's financial problems. I strongly disagree. When Wisconsin lawmakers imposed revenue caps on school districts, they included a mechanism that allows any school district to exceed the spending limit by as much and for as long as school boards wanted. All school boards have to do is get voter approval via the referendum. The State did not tell us we could not exceed the revenue caps. They said we could not exceed the caps without your approval. So, despite the Ed Asner radio ads, revenue caps are not hurting our schools. We can exceed our revenue caps by millions of dollars for hundreds of years. All we need is voter approval. I also want you to know that I would not support legislation that takes away our right to seek your approval to exceed revenue caps.

I've heard people complain that only schools, but no other governmental bodies, are subject to such spending limits. Yes, that is true; but the solution is not to bring school districts out from under the caps. The solution is to put the feder-

While standing on the street corner beside the soon-to-be world famous Waldorf Astoria Hotel, the


young clerk, George C. Boldt, was titled its first manager.

al, state and local governments under one!

Regarding a referendum, I've always said that a person would have to be nuts to vote to have his taxes increased (which is often what a referendum does). However, even I -- the biggest "penny-pincher" that I know -- have seen the need for two past referenda.

As you know, there is a referendum study group currently analyzing the need for improvements at KMS and KHS. I applaud these good citizens for their willingness to put forth the time and effort to explore all the possible options. It is thankless work. One needs only to take a stroll through the older part of KHS to recognize that a need exists for major improvements. I just hope that the committee is sensitive to the timing of any referendum they may propose. These are very difficult economic times and some folks in our district have been hit pretty hard. While the need for facilities improvements is there, I believe we shouldn't alienate our families who are experiencing some temporary financial difficulties by presenting a referendum that economically, they just could not support at this time. We are a community; the idea is to work together.

Keep in mind our folks on fixed incomes, as well. While the current low interest rates may make borrowing seem attractive, the interest-earning accounts on which some of our senior citizens are living is at an even lower rate, making it more difficult to manage daily living expenses. Low interest rates can be a positive or a negative, depending on one's perspective.

I try to take great care in overseeing how your tax dollars are being spent. Have I made any errors? Perhaps. However, I have always tried to vote with the taxpayer in mind. I believe it is the job of our school administrators and teachers to be advocates for the children. It is my opinion that the school board should represent the entire district, and that includes those who don't have children in the schools but are helping to pay the bills.

That's about it on this subject. If you agree with me, I'd appreciate your vote and God bless you. If you don't agree with me, God bless your anyway.


Tuesday, March 12 High 50, Low 28



To hunt rabbits with a beagle, you have to understand that when a rabbit is flushed, it will almost always run in a circle and end up where it was flushed. With the cottontail season closed, snowshoe would be our quarry. Matt led the dogs into a section of oak and pine forest. Then he told me where he thought a rabbit might run by if the pups should flush one out.

KHS Track Athletes Named to All-State Team

MILWAUKEE -- Kewaskum High School track and field athletes Charlie Sparks, Chris Canter, Tony Fitts, Tom Ogi, and Kevin Miller were named to the 2001 Wisconsin Track and Field All-State Team based on their performance at the WIAA State Track and Field Championships held last spring at UW-La Crosse.

Charlie Sparks finished second in the Division Two discus at the State Meet with a throw of 160'11". His throw was the third best overall in all three divisions and placed him at the "bronze" level on the All-State Team.

Gavin Ball of Monona

Grove's throw of 171'8' earned him the "gold" level and Mike Sracie of Deerfield's throw of 165'6" earned him the "silver" level on the All-State Team. Three other discus throwers also earned the "bronze" level behind Spark's distance.

Sparks also earned All-State honors by anchoring both the winning 4x200m relay and the winning 4x100m relay teams at the State Meet in Division Two.

The Kewaskum 4x200m relay team of Chris Canter, Tony Fitts, Tom Ogi and Charlie Sparks set a Division Two state record with their winning time of 1:30.04 (one minute and 30.04 seconds). Their time ranked them third fastest

when times were compared with all three divisions.

Division One Stevens Point recorded a time of 1:29.63 and Milwaukee Vincent, also a Division One school, had a time of 1:29.94 to take the "gold" and "silver" marks respectively on the All-State Team.

The 4x200m relay teams from La Crosse Central, Germantown, 1:30.27; 1:30.55, and Waukesha North completed the "bronze" level on the All-State Team.

The Kewaskum 4x100m relay team of Canter, Fitts, Kevin Miller and Sparks were also state champions in the Division Two race.

Their time of 44.0 seconds in the finals was the fifth fastest overall at the State Meet and they were also named to the All-State Team in the 4x100m relay.

Milwaukee Vincent's 42.48 earned them the 'gold" level and Racine Horlick's 43.31 seconds earned them the "silver" level. The 4x100m relay teams from Oshkosh North, 43.37; Middleton, 43.54, all of Division One schools, were right before Kewaskum. West Bend East finished in 44.07 seconds to claim the last "bronze" level on the All-State Team in the 4x100m relay.
