School District Leadership Team Presents Balanced Budget

The temperatures weren't the only thing hot at the School District's Special School Board Business Meeting on Monday night. The board met with the leadership team and residents to discuss the proposed 2002-2003 Working Budget.

Students and parents Farmington Elementary School were standing outside the high school greeting the attending community members with signs and a letter. Parents who wrote the letter highlighted some of what they thought were the more serious issues the board proposed cutting. They highlighted the importance of reading specialists, the curriculum director, the Gifted and Talented program, and not replacing retired teachers or teachers that have resigned.

Parents, staff and other community members were much more pleased with the budget proposed this time around. Items added back to the budget included: .5 time Reading Specialist, Athletic Coordinator/Directors/Secretary, .5 KHS Art Teacher, Field Trips, Clerical Overtime, 1.0 KMS German teacher, 1.0 KMS German

teacher, employee travel, .5 KHS Music teacher, extended contract for Agriculture teacher, athletics/activities at all three levels and the Curiculum Director.

Athletics and activities that were added back to the budget included:

HIGH SCHOOL - JV sports, NHS, newspaper, Forensics, FACE, FFA, senior and junior class advisors, Key club, PEERS, FBLA, yearbook, student government, Pep band, Art club, Swing choir, cheerleading, and the musicals.

MIDDLE SCHOOL - one team per grade per sport, Forensics, musicals, outdoor camp coordinator, yearbook, newspaper, student government and Destination Imagination.

E L E M E N T A R Y SHCOOLS - All intramurals and Destination Imagination.

Cuts to the high school inculded freshman teams, the varsity assistant coach, math club, chess club, weight room advisor, sophomore and feshman class advisors, FLAGS, Lit club, POPS, Jazz band. Middle school cuts include two teams per grade per sport, cheerleading and all intramurals. Nothing was cut from the elementary

Other items eliminated or reduced included: two Title I Instructional Aides, 10% across the board expenditure reduction, Gifted/Talented coordinator position, 5% reduction in Instructional Aides, one sixth grade teaching position, distance education and an additional 2% expenditure reduction.

With \$55,533 in revenue adjustments, this balances

Village oks Purchase of New \$45,000 Accounting Software

VB Says No to Smoking Ban in Restaurants

The Kewaskum Village Board met Monday evening and discussed a petition brought to them by a group of citizens asking the board to enact an ordinance prohibiting smoking in indoor restaurants. Village administrator Dan Schmidt drew up an ordinance for the board members to review.

No one that initiated the petition was in the audience.

Owner of The Rustic Inn William McDonald was present and stated his business would suffer, "if people don't want to eat where there is smoking then don't come," said McDonald.

Todd "Woody" Kleinhans owner of Woody's Steakhouse stated he saw how awful things are in Fond du Lac since they enacted their ordinance. "I think you need to find out how this affected Fond du

The petition asked the board to "pass a ruling to the effect that there would be no smoking in public buildings, including restaurants, supper clubs and coffee shops in Kewaskum."

There were 125 people that signed the petition but only 43 were residents of the village.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann stated he would never in a million years vote in favor of an ordinance like this. He further stated that if any ordinance like this ever passed he would fight it's constitutionality.

Trustee Larry Ammel stated he was a former smoker himself and would never ask a restaurant to do this.

Trustee Mathew Heiser was absent. Trustee's Bob Stoltzmann, Andy Pesch and Tom Piwoni said nothing.

Village President John Kenworthy made the initial motion to turn down the ordinance, and Scheumann seconded. It was voted unanimously not to enact the ordinance.

Shortly after the vote Kenworthy thanked the restaurant owners for coming to the meeting and stated, "I would hate for folks to think that the Village condones smoking, because we certainly don't, but freedom of choice is the great arbiter in matters such as this. We don't need an ordinance to dictate common sense. If smoking bothers people, they don't have to go to those restaurants that allow smoking. As far as I know there is no inalienable right to have smoke-free dining."

Later in the meeting the board made the authorization to purchase new accounting software to update software from 1989 that is now obsolete because support for the software is no longer available. The cost of this project will cost tax payers \$45,000. This price tag includes all hardware upgrades, training and the software itself.

The software should save taxpayers money in the long run once fully operational. The firm producing and selling the software is affiliated with the accounting firm that audits the village annually and comes highly recommended by them.

The software will be responsible for doing all the village's accounts payable, cash receipting, general ledger, payroll and utility billing.

Gillies updated the board on a department of public works water utility test done annually by the DNR. He stated everything went fine but reported that because of population growth they will now have to submit four BACT water samples to the state instead of three. Gillies indicated that so far this year none of the samples have come back with a problem. Hydrant maintenance and valves also passed.

"This is one of the best inspections we've had per the DNR," Gilies said. He also stated the DNR commended the crew on their inspection.

Also in his report he concluded the village spring clean-up went well, and six 20 yard dumpsters were filled. This cost taxpayers \$2,072.46

Schmidt also reminded the board that Board of Review will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. on Monday, May 13 in the council room.

the budget at \$0.

The followin is an exerpt from the letter that the parents handed out as people enterd the high school. "We believe the Kewaskum School District, including it's Budget Manager, School Superindenant, various Directors of Education, and the full School Board, have forgotten that WE the parents and voters, define what is 'acceptable' regarding out children's education and they are in place to meet these standards. If they are not up to the challenge, they need to step aside, or risk being replaced. What haprecently Country Milwaukee Government certainly shows what a 'grass root' effort of concerned citizens/parents can accomplish in a very short time frame! You have underestimated our concerns and determination to ensure our children receive the very BEST education in the Kewaskum School District."

All the board members and leadership committee members agreed that they did not want to see anything cut. But the fact of the matter was with the QEO limits on revenue raises, and with the revenue cap they have very limited options.

Board member Lisa Maul pointed out that "80% of the budget goes to salary and benefits; insurance rates went up 37% alone." She further noted that the board would like to shop around for lower rates but cannot due so due to the fact that this insurer is the one stated in their contracts. "You are paying for a Cadillac plan," she finished. "Teachers pay 5% out of pocket. This is a big chunk of change we have to come up with." She urged parents to talk to teachers about this part of their contracts.

Business manager Paul Reichert also didn't see this budget as ideal. He made as many cuts in the maintenance category as he could. He brought up the fact that there is a part of the high school roof that should have been fixed last year and it will have to be put off again next year because there just

isn't enough money to have it done.

Also pointed out by board member Mark Steinhardt was the fact that the mill rate for district taxpayers keeps dropping. During the 1996-1997 school year, the rate was \$10.56, where is stayed for the 97-98, 98-99 and 99-00 school years. In 2000, it dropped to \$9.83 and went down again for the 2001-2002 school year. "This is part of the reason we're in this position," he pointed out.

Board member Gordie Dickmann stated, "It's not a one year problem, it's a continual problem."

Football coach, business teacher and district parent Tim Rohlinger presented the board with a question, "How much do we stand to lose due to open enrollment?" He was answered with \$5,175 per student. He then continued, "We stand to lose approximately \$5,100 per student. It takes approximately three kids to move out of the district to equal the cost of keeping freshmen football." Other community members pointed this out wondering how the board could rationalize losing these students to other districts in order to "save money."

The issue of saving sports came up numerous times by various audience members. Denise Spaeth asked about fundraisers to make up some of the costs. Another idea offered numerous times was the raising of athletic fees. Board member Mary Meisser asked for a show of hands from the audience as to who agreed with raising the rates. She reminded them that the rates had just increased. Almost all the hands in the room went up. Donna Gajewski from the Booster club pointed out that if the Booster club had the help, they could raise the money needed to fund the sports with minimal or no help from the district.


Lynn Molenda rounded up the comments with a simple "I just ask you to remember where our priorities are."

John Schulte ended the meeting with two motions. One to raise athletic fees to a rate recommended by the leadership committee; and two, to present a recommendation for a possible referendum including the amount they would recommend and what kind of referendum they would like, either recurring or just for one year.

The budget will come before the board again before being tentatively approved.







I remember our tiny backyard and the enormous oak tree that grew smack dab in the middle and whose expansive shade kept any grass from growing beneath. Any. Given our lawnlessswimming pools, sprinklers and plastic water slides (mud slides) were a lot of work and a lot of mess. They went up anyway.

I remember never missing a baseball game, school concert or piano recital. Nether did you.

I remember the 1974 4-H county fair and the red pant suit I entered in the blue ribbon and \$30 cash prize. Instead of working on my project during the weeks were right.

before the fair, I stuffed it under my bed.

A few nights before judging day - a very few - I pulled it out. Heading for the sewing machine, changed course and ended up in your arms instead. You were there to help me finish (and start) my project.

The day of the fair, we were both up early to bake brownies for my cooking entry, too. They also received a blue ribbon and cash prize. I also recall, vividly, the yellow potholder I entered that same year which placed last. (You didn't know how to knit.)

I remember patience with our low-quality tents (club-houses) which were erected all summer long. The problem was that every time it rained, they collapsed and fell apart. Completely (and usually with us kids sleeping inside.)

Then you continued repeating the gesture and repeating the words as you circled the table, touching each of my children, as well. Then you sat down to continue eating your porkroast and I felt rich. Because I

Bicycles Must Be Licensed

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle licensing laws and bicycle safety.

Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5.00. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. The license not only aids us in finding violators but also is the way we identify the rightful owner if the bike is lost or stolen. Any bicycle not licensed is subject to confiscation, redeemable only by the purchase of a license. Bike licenses will also be available at the bicycle safety clinic to be held on May 11, 2002 at 9 a.m. at the Kewaskum Middle School.

Also, Wis. Statute 346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle..." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, including, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abiding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the sidewalk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file.

A few safety tips to everyone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good working order, wear bright colored clothing to make it easier for motorists to spot you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.

Earn a Buck



Three years ago, Jeff Neitzel, a buddy of mine from bomb loading days in the Air National Guard, told me he would like to put together a remote bow hunt somewhere in northern Wisconsin.

He wanted a place where we could take a boat or canoe so far from most roads that we could escape each fall for seven days, and over a period of years, put together a top notch big buck shooting hunt. I chose a remote section of Iron County on a river that feeds in the Flambeau Flowage.

Last fall, we spent the second week of November living in the bush. We saw 13 different bucks and not another person. Our goal was met. This past weekend, Jeff and I spent two days doing some big time hiking to try to learn the land and see how the local wildlife made it through the

Until today, Jeff and I have always made a three-mile boat or canoe trip to the area we hunt or camp. Today, because of flooding and a desire to learn the land, we explored via a compass, map and knee boots

To be perfectly honest, we really had no idea of what we were getting into. There were plenty of interesting observations throughout our day. After the first two hours of hiking, there were no roads. Wolf, grouse and deer are plentiful in this sec-

tion of Iron County. Had we been carrying shotguns, Jeff and I could have limited out on ruffed grouse. Providing the weather warms up and dries out, there should be an excellent hatch and a great hunt this fall.

Our entire day, during which we covered over 10 miles in eight hours, provided us with almost non-stop deer and wolf sign, especially the farther we got from civilization. Not once did we find a wolf-deer kill, which usually consists of shredded pieces of deer hide.

By the middle of the afternoon, after being temporarily misplaced several times, Jeff and I came to the river we were looking for and took a break at a campsite where we had spent seven days back in November of 2000. We were lounging in the sun on the banks of a flooded, swollen river when Jeff heard and spotted a deer directly across the river from me.

Luck was on our side as we were laying on a deer trail, and it started swimming the river with an obvious desire to get out of the water where we were lying. A strong current grabbed the large deer, which had nubs on the top of its head, and took him down stream 20 yards. He then climbed out of the water and went about his business. This fall, those nubs will be antlers.

At this point, our trip was successful. It was now time to get deep into the bush and explore the land we had wanted to see the past two falls but were afraid we'd

scare rutting bucks away. By the end of the day, Jeff

and I witnessed three inches of snow, located a total of eight seemingly good spots to ambush a buck, and became big time lost. We got lost in the last two hours of the first day and kept coming to water we couldn't cross. We were both aware we may be spending the night in the bush.

In the end, the compass brought us within 100 yards of my pickup. For the next six months, Jeff Neitzel and I will dream about that buck that swam the river. We will hope this fall he is carrying a heavy rack, comes within bow range and in the end, is hanging in a tree at our

News From The Capitol

The Budget Stalemate

The legislature is currently deciding how to deal with a \$1.1 billion deficit. Negotiations are going on between the senate, which has a Democratic majority, and the assembly controlled by Republicans. Both parties have what I consider totally irresponsible plans in that both are using more than \$900 million of money which will not be available in next year's budget (actually the Democratic plan relies on \$150 million more in one time money than the Republican plan). Democrats are spending \$125 million more of future tobacco revenues and are spending some of the state retirement fund to encourage early retirements. This will save \$60 million this year, but cost \$420 million in future years. Both plans do not reduce the 45% of the budget which deals with K-12 education and even encourage new expenditures for 4-year-old kindergarten and \$15 million more a year than current law for class sizes of 15 children. Nevertheless, the differences are instructive.

The Democrats use this opportunity to actually spend more in several areas, \$27 million more a year in special education in public schools, \$8 million more a year for Milwaukee Public Schools, \$10 million more a year for anti-smoking programs, \$6 million more for taxpayer money for political campaigns, and \$400,000 more to improve the Green Bay public TV station.

The Republicans will spend \$3.5 million to open new prisons in New Lisbon and Stanley. The state currently saves money by leaving these prisons empty and sending these prisoners to cheaper, out-of-state pris-The Republicans increase spending for University of Wisconsin scholarships by 8%- another \$700,000, while Democrats increase spending by 13% for \$1.3 million dollars more. Both sides are starting a new prescription

drug plan, which will cost \$75 million a year.

Both sides are making significant cuts in most operations. Republicans are cutting 11.5 % and the Democrats are cutting 11%.

The Democrats are also cutting \$15 million a year of positions management appointed by the governor, an additional \$4 million from the prison system, \$3 million in grants for business, \$3 million in grants to start up an ethanol program, and \$1 million from the state fair.

The Republicans are freezing state wages, saving \$54 million. They reduce the University travel budget by \$8 million, the University advertising budget by \$4 million, and require state employees to pay \$10 a month for health insurance, saving \$7 million. Democrats will require \$60 million a year for purchasing new parkland, and the Republicans will spend \$35 million a year on new parks. The Republicans will reduce grants to cities and counties by \$250 million a year, beginning 2003.

Both sides have added non-monetary policy to their proposals. The Democrats will require businesses to pay for unlimited mental health expenditures for their employees, require school districts to negotiate teacher preparation time with their teacher contracts and require state-approval for the building of new hospitals. The Republicans will require school referendums be held on the date of regular elections, and exempt non-profits billboards from

I personally submitted over 30 additional proposals to reduce spending, which were rejected Republican Assembly, which is increasingly afraid to question our current level of spending. Nevertheless, I feel the Republican plan is less irresponsible than the Democratic plan.

Graham also placed second in the pole vaulting

The Kewaskum 4x200m relay team continued to struggle with their handoffs and finished third with a time of 1:36.4 behind conference foes Sheboygan Falls and New Holstein. Falls won with a meet record time of 1:33.3 and New Holstein was just 0.1 seconds behind in 1:33.4. The Kewaskum 4x200m relay team includes Matt Hartmann, Tom Ogi, Josh Uelmen and Tony Fitts.

Matt Hartmann finished third in the 300m intermediate hurdles with a time of 41.4 seconds and Fitts placed third in the long

jump with a leap of 20'6-1/2". Buechel of New Holstein won the long jump with a jump of 20'8-1/4" and Swart of Oostburg finished just 1/2" ahead of Fitts.

The Kewaskum 4x100m relay team of Uelmen, Ogi, Hartmann, and Fitts finished fourth with a time of 45.61 seconds. Southern Door won with a time of 45.0 seconds, Falls finished third in 45.2 seconds and New Holstein finished third in 45.59 seconds.
