Scott Sager Submits Letter of Resignation

Lettow Takes The Reins As Interim Town Chairman

Still in shock Monday evening, the Kewaskum Town board of supervisors and it's clerk, elected senior supervisor Michael Lettow to take over as town chairman after Scott Sager resigned from the position last Wednesday. Two town residents attended the posted meeting.

Lettow opened the meeting by reading Sager's letter of resignation. Sager was not present.

"For personal and family related reasons I am submitting a letter of resignation as chairman for the Town of Kewaskum effective immediately," stated Sager in his letter to the board of supervisors and clerk.

Supervisor Bill Butzlaff motioned to accept the letter and Lettow seconded the motion.

The next order of business was to appoint a chairman. Butzlaff motioned that Lettow take the position. Clerk J. Sandra Stern seconded the motion.

Lettow has been serving on the board as supervisor since May of 1995.

The issue of appointing another supervisor to fill Lettow's position was discussed. It was decided the town would post the position in the official newspaper and would take letters of intent until the next town board meeting being held June 17, at 7:30 p.m. All letters must be in the town office at that time. Kewaskum Loses Rep. Grothman

A federal court's decision on boundary lines for Wisconsin legislative districts has left Kewaskum without one of it's finest politicians.

In what he called one of the hardest decisions he has ever encountered and one he has labored over for two weeks, Assemblyman Glenn Grothman has decided to leave the current district he serves which includes West Bend, Kewaskum, Wayne Farmington, and Belgium.

In January he will serve

residents in the 58th district that includes Addison, West Bend, Slinger and Jackson.

If he decided to stay in the 59th district he would have had to leave West Bend and serve constituents in Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Wayne, Barton, Belgium, Oostburg, Cedar Grove, Random Lake, Adell, Waldo, Cascade, Fredonia, Theresa, and Eden.

In an interview Tuesday, Grothman stated this was, "The most difficult decision I have made in eight years in Madison. I have lived in West Bend for 18 years and have many good friends there who wanted me to stay. I have purchased land in Kewaskum and had intended to build there and if Senator Panzer ever leaves her position I hope to represent that senate district and then live in and represent the people of Kewaskum."

Grothman has been assemblyman in the 59th district since December of 1993.

The seat for the 59th district is up for election this fall. Thus far only one candidate has stepped forward. Richard C. Karshna, Jr., 41, of Belgium, announced Monday he is running for the State Assembly in the 59th District.

The Republican candidate is currently serving on the Ozaukee County Board of Supervisors, where he is a member of the law enforcement committee, county board of health, solid waste management committee and eastern shores library board.

In April he was re-elected to his second term on the Cedar Grove-Belgium school board, where he serves as board president.

Karshna earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee. For

143 Acre Property Provides Greatest Guarantee of Future Success

St. Joseph's Selects Site For New Hospital at Hwy 45 and PV

St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend, a member of SynergyHealth, announced recently that a 143-acre property located at the northwest corner of Hwy. 45 and County Highway PV will be the site for its new hospital. The board made the final selection Wednesday, May 22 at its monthly meeting, completing its due diligence process following months of comprehensive research and study to locate a site. With the site selected, the design process can proceed and be customized to a specific site.

"Today we begin the next chapter in our hospital's long tradition of service to the community," said Dan Johnson, hospital board member and chairman of the facility committee. "Together we will build a hospital that will make this community proud - a healing environment for our children and grandchildren."

"Seventeen months ago our board of directors articulated a clear vision for a new hospital that will provide a high level of service and care, hold promise for long-term success and future expansion, and serve the greatest number of people in our community at the lowest possible cost," said Elaine Shanebrook, board chair. "Today the board selected the site that will best make that vision a reality."

The board's decision to select the PV site over other locations was based on several major considerations:

*Projected financial performance is best at the PV site, including cost of operations (less than three-fourths of one percent) at both the PV and current sites.

•Capital costs of remodeling the current facility and building new are comparable

•Patient population will be the greatest at PV.

•Given the patient volumes, the PV site allows the hospital to offer a greater variety of higher levels of service.

•A freeway location is the most competitive location given to the potential behavior of other health systems.

•The capital cost of building new at PV is comparable to building new on the current site.

•The PV site allows for planned growth and efficient layout.

"On this site, the hospital is making a wise investment in the future, providing the community with a new hospital, designed and equipped for 21st Century medicine and providing the greatest guarantee of future financial success," said Tom Bast, board treasurer. "Financial success for our

non-profit, community hospital will translate into more locally available specialities, more cost-effective health care, and increased patient care and safety for the whole community."

"The new hospital will be designed and built from the ground up with a focus on enhancing quality of care and patient safety," said John Reiling, St. Joseph's president and CEO. "Designing the hospital to offer private rooms, a quieter environment, and reduced staff fatigue will not only make the hospital experience more pleasant for patients, but it will also provide a safer health care environment for patients and staff."

St. Joseph's began the process of designing a hospital that will advance patient safety by hosting a learning lab, "Charting the Course for Patient Safety: Designing Safety through Facility Design." Held in April, the conference featured national leaders from a variety of industries and health care disciplines with expertise in safety, human factors (the science of how people make decisions), and quality. Their findings are being used in the design and development of the new hospital to enhance the quality of patient care and services by improving work processes and systems, technology and equipment, the physical environment, and other areas.

In addition to private rooms, a quieter environment, and reduced staff fatigue, the learning lab group also recommended:

•Designing the hospital to meet the needs of the region's most vulnerable populations

•Engaging patients in the facility design process

*Identifying equipment and technology needs early

RECYCLING TIPS

Aluminum Beverage Containers and Tin & Steel Cans

TYPE OF ALUMINUM: Aluminum cans generally used in the beverage industry.

TYPE OF TIN/STEEL: Tin and steel cans generally used in the food industry.

PREPARATION: Simply empty, rinse and remove any labels. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Aluminum, steel and tin containers that are contaminated with residue cannot be recycled.

Place aluminum, tin or steel containers in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Flattening containers, although not necessary, will save space in your recycling bin or bag. Place the bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and reyclables. Multifamily dwellings of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

COMMENTS FOR CITY OF WEST BEND PUBLIC HEARING ON AIRPORT EXPANSION PROJECT PROPOSAL May 22, 2002, 4 p.m.

To West Bend Economic Development Corp., DOT Representatives and West Bend Area Economic Leaders:

My main concerns regarding this proposed project are: 1) Destruction of the environment, waste of taxpayers dollars, and longterm detrimental effects. My father, George Wendt, lives on and owns 20 acres in the heart of the proposed project. He has lived and worked on this land for 52 years, finishing the large brick home in the late 1940's and early 1950's and planting hundreds of evergreen trees and gardens, and dredging the large pond. I lived on this land for 18 years, and growing up on

20 acres has led me to desire and acquire in the mid-1990's 20 acres of my own in the Town of Kewaskum. Preservation of the land and appreciation for the environment has been a major concern for both of us most of our lives.

Environmental Haven

While studying biology at the University of Wisconsin (West Bend and Milwaukee), I always had a handy, not to mention, amazing resource for plant collections, mushroom hunting and field studies. My classmates were in awe at the samples I was able to bring back to the classroom for study or for permanent collections for the University. But there were some things I couldn't bear to collect because they seemed too rare or beautiful to destroy, such as the Blue Flag Iris and Wild Orchids next to the pond. While teaching at the Lac Lawrann Conservancy, I collected in a two-hour period, 30 frogs for my nature camp students, and at the end of camp that day, I returned every one of those frogs back to my Dad's pond (their home). While mushroom hunting in the back 10 acres, I was shocked to find so many Birch trees, in addition to a plethora of mushrooms that would make any mushroom hunter gasp in amazement. I hadn't been back there much as a child because of high water levels, vast hummocks which are difficult to walk upon, and large natural fences of Prickly Ash. It is a whole different environment from the area where the pond and houses are located.

Wildlife Haven

In the 1950's my Dad planted hundreds of White Cedar, White Spruce, Scotch Pine, and Balsam Fir. Many of these trees were sold in the 1960's for Christmas trees. Others were transplanted around the pond and house. My Dad did all the tree planting and transplanting because he is fussy and wanted it done right. His vegetable gardens over the years had been something to envy for anyone who tried to garden in any soil other than the rich fertile flood plain soil. A colony of Balsam Poplar (a shrub-size tree) is growing in an area next to the old Christmas tree farm, just west of the house. This is a northern species and you would be hard-pressed to find it in Southeastern Wisconsin. If you place a small branch of Balsam Poplar in your back car window in the sun, the whole inside of your car smells terrific. The major effect of all of the tree planting has been the food source and protection and homes for wildlife. Because of the wide variety of plant life and the pond, bird species are abundant. Did you ever

watch a Great Blue Heron catch a frog? If you come to visit my Dad, your eyes will pop out of your head when you see the size and height of his front door fern garden. Only this moist muck soil will allow ferns to grow this large and healthy.

Wildlife Resource Sportsman's Paradise

Every year since George Wendt first acquired the land on the north side of Highway 33, hunters have asked permission to hunt on his property for deer, turkey, coyote, pheasant, squirrel, rabbit, and (in the 1950's and 1960's, fox and quail). He has estimated about 30 hunters, although I'm certain there were more, throughout the years. He has always said "yes" to them, even allowing them to park 500' into his driveway (this way he knew who was hunting and how many). There were times when there were so many hunters at one time that he had to turn some of them away, but only for that reason. One deer season I remember a story of two hunters who argued over tree-stand rights, and since the argument couldn't be resolved, one of them had to leave. He deer hunts on my 20 acres now. Dad was happy to accommodate them, but more importantly to keep the deer population down, as too many deer cause traffic accidents and place stress on the plant life.

Wetlands Destruction A Major Concern

Besides the esthetic and wildlife value of wetlands, there are climate-and-water resource related values to saving large areas of wetlands. Since there are in excess of 60 acres of wetlands involved in the rerouting of Highway 33 alone, not counting the acreage loss for the airport expansion, this is a major environmental concern. Wetlands soak up excess rain and snow melt like a sponge. Without the large acreage of wetlands which are now present, flood waters in the spring of the vear will have no where to go. When the Milwaukee River overflows, excess water will flood the roads and many homes left in the area. Road deterioration will continue as annual flood waters eat away at the concrete and blacktop. Road repairs will need to be extensive and taxes will go up to repair them. Trees and other plants in the wetland adapt to water level fluctuations. So do wildlife. Concrete will not adapt.

Protect Groundwater Resource

Wetlands provide fresh groundwater by allowing rain water and snow melt to move downwards to underground reservoirs, sifting out impurities along the way. During flood periods, wetlands are a "holding tank" for the excess water.

Destroy the wetlands, the water remains at surface level; in roadside ditches or in man-made holding ponds impurities remain for a longer time period. After a time this could create a health hazard. Long-term detrimental effects are unknown, but changing the landscape as much as this proposed project indicates, will create more harm than good.

Is Airport Expansion

Really Necessary? My questions to the Airport Expansion Project Supporters: Has an indepth study been completed on this proposed project? What exactly is needed and why? How many jets are needed and what size? What kind of planes are you planning to bring in? How many jets per day? What is the predicted traffic? Is this expansion for a UPS hub? What studies have been done? Where are the data? What is the specific plan (planes, cargo, passengers)? More importantly, where is the specific need? Is it military? Is this an immediate need or something predicted for the future? How far into the future? Has this expansion project satisfied all of the DNR regulations? Has the DNR given the go-ahead? As for the City of West Bend and surrounding area, are enough businesses really booming? Do these businesses all need the jet transportation in order to survive? Could they survive and thrive without major additions to jet service? Could this project be cut down to say, a just somewhat longer runway? Could this runway be built over the top of the existing Highway 33, like a freeway overpass? Could the runway point SE and bridge over the Milwaukee River?

Waste of

Taxpayers' Dollars The estimated cost for this proposed airport expansion project is \$15 million. This money will come out of state of Wisconsin Taxpayers' pockets. Everyone in the state of Wisconsin should be aware and concerned about this major expense. Questions for the DOT representatives: Is this money already allocated for this project? Or will the cost of the project take away money needed for other projects? Or will taxes be raised? Questions for West Bend Economic Development Corporation: Is the money for the airport expansion already allocated for this project? Or will the cost of the project take away money needed for other City of West Bend projects? Or will City of West Bend Taxpayers have their taxes raised for this project? And a question (or thought) for everyone: Will the estimated cost of \$15 million really be the final cost? Look what happened to Miller Park.

Conclusion

It is my hope that ten or twenty years from now I will drive into my Dad's driveway, see a sign that says something like, "George Wendt Nature Preserve, drive into a scenery of evergreens, a pond, a sturdybuilt and well kept-up house with out-buildings also well-kept, a huge fern garden, birds and wildlife galore; and know that all the work over 60 or 70 years was not in vain, but for future generations to enjoy. I pray that I do not see concrete landing strips, runways, taxiways, and airplane hangars, jets coming and going like General Mitchell Field. I pray that I do not hear deafening jet engines and I pray I do not smell the choking exhaust fumes

When I close my eyes I pray I will hear the songs of birds, wind whistling through the evergreens, frogs plopping into the pond, and mosquitoes buzzing in my ears. The smells will be of fresh green plants, fresh mowed lawn, fresh mushrooms, and rich black earth. The air will be clean and easy to breathe. The ground will be soft and easy to walk. The earth will be saved.



Everything seemed so organized, especially the parking. They had people directing where you should park, to allow for more parking places and have leaving more organized so everyone was leaving in the same direction.







The Toughest Decision

During the past eight years I've made many difficult decisions while in the State Legislature. None was as difficult as the decision I had to make regarding what to do when a federal court redrew the lines of the Assembly districts last week and I had to decide where to live.

Every ten years when there is a census all congressional, legislative, and county board districts must change. This is because each district should contain the same number of people as determined by the census. The state of Wisconsin must be divided into 99 Assembly districts of equal population. Each must contain about 54,179 people from the year 2000 census.

Because the city of Milwaukee lost population and because of big population gains in Washington and Waukesha counties, there were major changes in district lines. Sadly, my district was split in half with West Bend and its 28,000 inhabitants separated from the rest of the district.

I have been a resident of West Bend for 18 years, and have many friends there. I had purchased a lot in Kewaskum intending to build here. I of course enjoy representing the Kewaskum, Wayne, and Farmington areas and love their con-

servative values.

After a week of agonizing, I decided to stay in West Bend. This was easily the most difficult decision for me since elected to the Legislature. I have not sold my lot and I like to tell myself that if someday Senator Panzer moves on I could run for the Senate in which case someday I could represent Kewaskum again.

Since I will represent Allenton in the new district, Lana and Andrew Kuehl have assured me my column will continue to appear in the Statesman. I have always enjoyed being able to write a column in which I could disseminate information, which was not reported or under reported in the Journal-Sentinel or other media outlets. My new district will also include the villages of Slinger and Jackson. The new district will have no incumbent and a new Assemblyman will be elected this fall. The new district also includes Campbellsport, Eden, Theresa, Fredonia, Belgium, Oostburg, Cedar Grove, Random Lake, Adell, Cascade, and

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
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

Hello friends,

The job I have as an outdoor adventure writer enables me to meet and spend time in the outdoors with a wide variety of unique people.

Ron Schilling is semiretired, lives in the Milwaukee suburb of Greendale, and is an avid salmon fisherman on Lake Michigan.

Schilling bought his boat, Empty Pockets, which is a 22' Cruiser Barnegat, back in 1980. And, as I had the pleasure of finding out, he knows how to find and catch salmon.

Tuesday, May 28 High 77, Low 52

Empty Pockets and its crew of three hit the big pond at 5 a.m. We took a short journey from the McKinley Marina to a secret spot where Ron has been catching a good number of 8to 20-pound Chinook (King) salmon in 40 feet of water.

I met Ron two years ago Milwaukee Sport Show. This morning, I met his son, Chris, who is a sales manager with Pepsi.

The first impression I had of this father/son team was that they knew exactly what they were doing when it comes to handling a boat and catching fish.

The Schillings had just set their second pole in the water, which was a rigged with a Dipsy Diver, and baited with a black and white Andy Reeker spoon, when a monster from the deep inhaled it.

Being perfect hosts, the Schillings let yours truly have the first battle of the

The sun rose over the Milwaukee harbor at 5:15 this morning. At the same time, Ron netted our first fish, a 12-pound Chinook. Everything was perfect in our world.

We fished until 11 a.m. and iced three Kings and Coho. We then headed to shore for a mid-day break.

Watching Ron and Chris and listening to their stories reminded me of the great times I had with my dad before he passed away back

Today, I learned that Ron Schilling, who is 69, has more get-up-and-go than most 20-year-olds.

This afternoon, it was just Ron and me. We tried fishing in 100 feet of water for Coho or whatever might be hungry. After three hours of trolling, we had a couple of three-pounders in the box and then decided to spend the last hour of daylight fishing in the shallow water, where we had fished this morning.

It took us about a half hour to figure where the Kings were feeding. Yours truly iced a 12-pounder and then as the sun set, Ron got the catch of the day with a dandy 15-pounder, and we had a plan for sunrise.

Wednesday, May 29 High 80, Low 55

Our butts were dragging, and there were no complaints when a dense fog kept us from launching Empty Pockets until 6 a.m. On the short ride to our honey hole, we were both wondering if we had missed some prime time fishing.

Schilling, who is a long time member of the barber shop quartet Shear Delight, was all smiles when a hungry King hit a blue and silver magnum, Tad Polly. After a hard-fought battle, the 15 pounder was in the box and the captain and his crew both knew they were living the good life.

An hour before noon, Ron Schilling and I put our 10th fish in the box, which was a 16-pounder. This was the biggest fish of our twoday adventure.

Today we ended up with a limit which consisted of Chinook, Brown Trout and

At the Milwaukee Sport Show, two strangers committed to a fishing Trip. Ron Schilling put me up in his home, and a couple of days

later, we were a pretty awesome fishing team.

I hope I have his energy when I'm pushing 70.

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

UW-LACROSSE - The Kewaskum High School girls 4 x 400m relay team finished third at the 107th WIAA Track and Field Championships on Saturday, June 1. 




