### Fredonia Teen Charged With Stealing Car in Village

17 year-old Fredonia boy has been charged with operating a vehicle without motor owner's consent Washington County Circuit

Nathan J. Feiereisen will be back in court August 28 for his connection to taking a 1998 Chevrolet Cavalier from an open garage on Highland Ave in the village.

A resident on that street noticed three teens with flash lights looking through vehicles in the 700 block of HIghland Avenue this past Sunday shortly before three a.m. He called police but by

that time two teens took off with the car. The third teen hid in some bushes at the scene.

Washington County Sheriff's deputies assisted the lone Kewaskum officer and eventually located the vehicle.

According to the criminal complaint issued by the district attorney the three teens conspired to steal things out of unlocked cars.

Police chief Richard Knoebel attributes the arrest to the watchful eyes of Kewaskum's citizens. He further stated that without that call officers could still be seraching for the suspect and the vehicle.

## Crime Spree Ends With Crash Here

For the West Bend robbery Pointkowski faces up to 17 years in prison if convicted. Drow faces 25 years.

Pointkowski's bail was set at \$8,000 cash and Drow at \$10,000 cash. The suspects will appear back in court on September 17.



#### Teachers and Students Leave Lasting Impressions on One Another

"Professor Tyree's philosophy class is right down

The above words were spoken by the character of Indiana Jones in the 1980's blockbuster movie, The Last Crusade. They blended into the story line inconspicuously. But interestingly, and unbeknownst to viewers, these words were not included in the original screen play, but rather, were 'plugged in" by Harrison Ford who starred as the adventurous Indiana Jones. Harrison wanted to pay tribute to one of his teachers, a real life Professor William Tyree who taught young "Harry" Ford at Ripon College here in Wisconsin where he attended school from 1960-1964.

Teachers. They influence us in many ways, leaving lasting impressions on our lives

And students influence their teachers. One such teacher who has had many impressions left on her life by those who shared her classroom over the years is Shirley Nennig. I met her in a local bookstore about a year ago and in this short time now consider her among my dearest friends. This is for many reasons, not the least of which is her dedication to students with educational and social challenges. What amazes me most about Shirley is that she is more ready to share stories of what she has learned from these students who she has committed herself to reaching than what she has taught them. To hear her speak, and to look in her eyes when she does so, is to become very much

aware that she desires to make a difference in every life entrusted to her, like the life of a young fellow she tutored and later wrote about in a story titled "Love Labyrinth" shared below. She writes:

Working as a teacher, I was privileged to have developed a unique tutorial program for at-risk, High School students considered emotionally disturbed. It was my job to prepare them to complete some sort of educational equivalency program. A challenge I just knew felt right, for this treasure is a worthy one.

Most students I taught had as much inner turmoil as that from outside sources.. For some, they chose to keep their life in chaos while having a loving, supportive home life. For those parents I send a shield of valor.

Others were given little model for success. The lives of these students were barbaric in some cases, something out of the middle ages. By the time they got to school, if they made it, they may have bailed a parent out of jail for intoxication or even more severe, forced to run drugs for a parent,s profit.. Some knew hunger so strong we cannot fathom its depths. Still others had no money to wash their dirty laundry or groom properly. Is it any wonder they had trouble making school a priority? Growing up for these youngsters came fast and furious and with many burdens.

Attendance at school was poor even though receiving special education services. Environment and

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mental health reeked double havoc on these young lives. The lives of these children so different from their peers made them an oddity out of their own control. They are children. Our children. A treasure buried beneath the castle of doom.

My program was a last ditch effort to get them to believe in themselves enough to earn a high school equivalency degree. There was hope in each student. It was masked so deep, but there was always a flicker if I looked hard enough.

Darren, a 15-year-old attractive youth with a talent for guitar, made his way into my life one year. After all attempts were made to keep him at the High School, his behavior and attendance excruciatingly poor, he agreed to attend my program.

He came in tempting me to knock the many chips that had befallen his shoulders over the years, chips that some found offensive, but I saw as a mark of his difficult environment.

I'd meander through his complex labyrinth, knocking chip after chip while tossing academics his direction, but more importantly bombarding with positive praise. We continued this game playing for months. At times, I wondered if I had enough optimistic weapons to conclude the battle. He was indeed a master. What would it take?

It seemed to me that students such as my pal spent a great deal of time slaving the elements to defend themselves from feeling much of anything. Suits of armor were worn to block the blows, a shield of sorts erected to deflect further the

internal strife. These defense systems were firmly in place even when involved in affirmative measures.

The risk that caused me the most concern for Darren was not his academic soundness, but that he was at risk of not knowing love for himself. This drove me to carry on. He must know that one person in his life finds him worthy.

I continued knocking chips. One victorious day, exhausted by my fortitude, frustrated, or just plain curious, my pal looked at me and asked me profoundly, "Why do you care?"

Stunned, my eyes began to tear. I pinched myself to hide the sting in a manner that he must have used so many times in his battered life and responded the only way I knew how.

"Why Darren, because you were born. There does not need to be any other reason."



August 26th to September 1 is the first National Multiple Myeloma Awareness Week. What is Multiple Myeloma? It is a form of cancer in the blood.

\* \* \* \* \* \* \*

We have a family friend who has been diagnosed with Multiple Myeloma. Seven years ago, in the winter of 1995, he had a lot of pain in the upper part of his right leg. (A rod was placed in his leg when he was hit by a stock car at the Plymouth Racetrack in 1988)

He went to see an orthopedist, who took X-rays and found a huge tumor on that hip. It took over four months to find out and diagnose Richard Witt with Multiple Myeloma. At the time he did not fit the criteria for the disease.

Richard had been on some experimental drugs. He started a drug called Thalidomide and after six months had to stop taking the drug because his kidney failed in March of 2001 and there were other neuropathy problems.

Today, Richard is on a new drug, Zometa, which is the treatment of hypercoldemia of malignancy. This drug has been approved by the FDA.

In spring of this year, former Democratic Vice President candidate, Geraldine Ferraro, was diagnosed with Multiple Myeloma. The doctors at that time had given her seven years to live a "normal" life. She continues to fight for cancer research and has played a key role in the US House of Representatives passage of the Hematological Cancer Act. The act will continue the research which is so desperately needed to help

find a cure for this type of cancer and any other forms of cancer.

Our friend, Richard Witt, has to go for kidney dialysis three times a week, and it takes a lot out of him. Although he can't work on a regular basis due to the strong medications he is taking, Richard continues to beat the odds.

He is active in his love for winged-spring car racing, where he continues his "job" as the "starter" or flagman for the International Racing Association (IRA). The IRA is an organization which travels and supports the World of Outlaw circuit, besides their own schedule.

With the many highs and lows in dealing with this form of cancer, his wife of 15 years, Lynda, continues to "stand by her man" and promote interest in Richard's fight with Multiple Myeloma. They continue to learn more about this form of cancer every day. During the week of August 26 through September 1, keep Richard and Lynda in your prayers and anyone else who is dealing with this disease.

## Safe Design For New Hospital **Featured in UM Publication**

WEST BEND - An innovative process by St. Community Joseph's Hospital of West Bend, a member of SynergyHealth, to build patient safety into the design of its new hospital is highlighted in a recent publication by University of Minnesota.

"Designing a Safe Hospital" is the first in a publication series by the Center for the Study of Healthcare Management, part of the Department of Healthcare Management at UM's Carlson School of Management.

The publication details St. Joseph's innovative approach to the hospital design process, based on the belief that improving the design of the hospital facility will not only increase patient safety directly but also promote a safety-oriented organizational culture.

It also documents 10 facility design principles developed by local and national leaders in patient safety, quality improvement, and human factors who participated in a spring conference sponsored by St. Joseph's Community Hospital held in Milwaukee. Those principles, now being incorporated into the design process for the new hospital include:

Designing FMEA (Failure Modes and Effect Analysis) at each design stage to anticipate, identify and avoid failures in the operation of a new system while still on the drawing

\* Standardize location of equipment, supplies, room layout, and care processes.

\* Involve patients and families in the design

\* Use an established checklist for current/future design.

\* Bringing critical information for decision-making close to the patient.

Reduce noise.

\* Use adaptive systems that will allow function in the future.

\* Articulate a set of principles by which everything is measured.

Begin equipment planning on Day One.

Begin mockups on Day

Groundbreaking for the 80-bed, 166,500 square foot facility is set for October. The hospital will open in May 2005 at the new site of a 143-acre parcel at the corner northwest Highway 45 and PV just south of West Bend.

The Center for the Study

of Healthcare Management was established in 1999 and facilitates the conduct of high quality research on management healthcare issues, coordinates local and national collaboration with researchers, and shares results on important issues concerning health care management.





### Funding Approved for Statewide AMBER System to Issue Alerts for Abducted Children

A new system designed to alert the public when a child abduction has been reported will be in operation statewide later this year following approval of a funding authorization request by the state Department of Administration (DOA).

DOA Secretary George Lightbourn explained that the department has authorized the expenditure of \$65,000 by the Department of Justice (DOJ) for equipment and other program expenses. Restitution received by DOJ from judgments awarded against three telecommunication firms will be used for this purpose.

"Recent reports of child abductions in other states demonstrate the value of this concept," Lightbourn added. "This is a much-needed system for Wisconsin that could make a life-saving difference when time is of the essence."

The program, called AMBER Alert, would mandate that law enforcement agencies send an Emergency Alert System message to state radio and TV stations using the same technology now used to warn of floods, fire and other disaster when officials learn a child has been abducted and is in danger.

Under federal law, stations would decide whether the emergency message and its telltale three highpitched tones - would interrupt programming. Radio stations could interrupt programming and TV stations could either scroll information or interrupt programming. Alerts would describe the child, suspect, vehicle or other clues that could enlist the public's help in recovering the child.

AMBER stands for America's Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response and is also named for Amber Hagerman, a nine-year-old Arlington, Texas, girl kidnapped while riding her bicycle in 1996 and found dead four days later.



## Eligibility Requirements for Free, Reduced **Price Meals Announced by School District**

The School District of Kewaskum, announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program or milk for split-session students served under the Special Milk

Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals, or free milk if a splitsession student does not have access to the school lunch or breakfast service.

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Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children for whom households receive Food Stamps or Wisconsin Works (W-2) benefits, an adult member needs only to list the names of the school children, give Food Stamp or W-2 case number for each child, sign his/her name and return the application to the school office. Households must inform the school authorities when they no longer receive food stamps or W-2.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving food stamps or W-2, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, and the social security number of the adult household member

who signs the application. In lieu of a social security number, the household may indicate that the signer does not possess a social security number. Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.). Households are required to report increases in income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy, Director of Food Services, 262-626-2166, ext. 4118 will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally, or in writing to: Gordon Dickman, Board President, 499 Braatz Dr., WI 53040, 262-626-3363.

If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible

for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the level shown above, and they may reapply at that

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals, the household should complete an application for a family of one or contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 does authorize the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state educational programs.

In the operation of the child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or disability. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to USDA, Director, Office of Civil Rights, Room 326-W, Whitten Building, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC, 20250-9410.

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
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## 979 Rules

Twenty-two years later, I married Laurie. A year ago, we had a reunion with Patti and her husband Jeff Rouse at their vacation get-

"Roscoe's Dinghy" is a 25-foot StarCraft Chieftain. Is the boat Jeff and Patti rig up for fishing salmon on Lake Michigan. I have said this before, and I will say it again: Of all the outdoor sports I partake in, none earn more respect from me in regard to preparation, than that of a Great Lakes salmon fisherman.

Money, knowledge and guts are all a prerequisite to rigging a boat for either of Wisconsin's big ponds.

The alarm went off long before the sun hit the eastern horizon. Seventeenmonth-old Selina Walters, my daughter, easily woke up, and we soon were headed down the Ahnapee River. Jeff put out four downriggers with a fly-dodger combination and three rods rigged with Dipsy Divers and spoons. We were trolling in water that ranged from 70 to 140 feet deep, and we listened to other fishermen telling their stories on the marine radio.

I might add that like last year, all four of us were entered in the Shanty Days fishing tournament.

In most cases, for this style of fishing, people take turns when a pole is tripped. Last year, I caught a 24pound chinook and Laurie caught a 16-pounder, so it

was Jeff and Patti's turn.

Selina was getting a bit cranky three hours into our journey, so I decided to take her down below for a snooze. This type of action often creates good luck, and today was no exception.

I had just gotten comfortable when a rod tripped. Jeff landed an 8-pound chinook on a fly-dodger combination. We were all celebrating the catch when another downrigger released

Patti began to do battle with a good-sized fish. Five minutes later, I netted a 20pound King and we were on a roll. Unfortunately, about this time, Laurie began feeling quite ill and over the next hour, lost a lot weight. Just before noon we called it quits and I helped Jeff bring in the lines. I had just released a downrigger set at 60 feet and was slowly reeling the dodger-fly in when a good fish smacked it. A few minutes and a lot of laughs later, Jeff netted a 13-pound king chinook.

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
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
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### Gridiron Club Awards First Scholarship

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
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
