illage Board Discusses Fee Impact Study

The Kewaskum Village Board met on Monday, March 24. Among numerous items discussed was a Tornado Watch class to be held on April 24, 2003. There will be one class held from 1 to 3 p.m., and the other will be held from 7 to 9 p.m.. For more information contact the Kewaskum Police Department at 626-2323.

From there the trustees reviewed sealed bids received on March 13, 2003 for the First Street reconstruction project, including the Municipal Building parking lot project. The project will start at USH 45, (Fond du Lac Avenue) and end at Railroad Street.

Payne & Dolan, Inc. of Waukesha was the lowest bidder, at \$80,8772.40. This bid was below the amount budgeted, and was approved and seconded by the Village Board.

Next discussed, was a possible

Impact Fee Study. The study would be conducted by the Village Engineering Firm, Ruekert and Mielke at a projected cost of \$15,000. The board is considering adjusting fees such as the open space fee and the sewer connection fee and adding a water connection fee, Library and Fire Department service fee. The Board decided to look into this possibility further, and obtain more information regarding the Fee Impact Study. It will be addressed at a later

A motion was made and seconded to acknowledge the receipt of the Petition for the Annexation of Kettle Kountry Estates which is to be located on the east side of the village limits, adjacent to STH "28" and Johnson Bus Company. If the request is approved it will bring 67 new single family homes into the vil-

A motion was also made and seconded for the acknowledgement of the receipt of the Petition for the

J.O. Reigle Scholarships Awarded

Annexation for the land located on the west side of the village limits, adjacent to CTH "H". Both acknowledgements will be sent to the Village Attorney, Plan Commission, and Village Engineer for review and recommendations.

The Planning Commission met Tuesday evening and both were approved and sent on to the village board. A complete report of that meeting will be in next week's edition.

Finally, a motion was made and seconded requesting State Mandate Relief from Wisconsin Statutes 61.32 and 65.90(5). The Statutes that the Village Board is requesting relief from require villages to publish all ordinances adopted by the governing body, including resolutions pertaining to appropriation changes and numerous notices. This means residents would be unaware of passed ordinances and resolutions unless they attend the meeting.



Pastor Frederich and his wife will be back April 7th to answer questions.

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

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

Two Running for Supreme Court Hot Race Unfolds In

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday to pick who they would like to see replace Judge William Bablitch who retired.

The position carries a 10vear term

First on the ballot is Chief Judge Ed Brunner who currently is serving his third term as Circuit Court Judge for Barron County.

Ed Brunner

Born in Akron, Ohio, in February of 1948, Judge Brunner first came to Wisconsin to earn his Bachelor of Arts at Marquette University in Political Science. returned to Ohio and began working as the Assistant Regional Director Delinquency Juvenile Prevention Services for the Ohio Youth Commission. While working there he realized that learning the law was a way for him to continue improving juvenile justice while working to change the system. Working full-time, Judge Brunner attended law school at night and earned his Juris Doctorate from the University of Akron School of Law in 1974. With his law degree in hand he became the Executive Director of Youth Services, Inc., in Loraine, Ohio, and managed a one-half million dollar agency budget operating two group homes, a runaway shelter, two drug abuse drop-in centers, and a staff of fifteen delinquency prevention and substance abuse outreach counselors for the schools and community.

In 1979 Judge Brunenr moved to Rice Lake with his wife Linda and their two children, Jason and Alexis. There he opened went into private practice and was Rice Lake City Attorney for seven years. Brunner cofounded the Barron County Family Support Guardianship Agency that year as well.

As far as community involvement Judge Brunner is a past president of the Rice Lake Optimists Club, the founder and incorporator of the Rice Lake Area Men's Club, and past board member and president of the St. Joseph School, Rice Lake. For three years he was the

Organizer Chairman for Indianhead Special Olympics and for two years was a member of the Wisconsin Special Olympics of Directors. WEST BEND - Colon cancer is highly preventable and curable if diagnosed at an early stage, yet many men and women are not regularly screened for colon cancer. 





Local Teacher Participates in Workshop on Food Science

Mary Koch, West Bend resident and teacher at Kewaskum High School, was one of almost 30 teachers nationwide who received a \$400 grant to participate in a food science workship developed and implemented in a partnership between the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA) and the Albertsons, Inc. The two-day workshop for middle level and high school science and family and consumer science teachers took place in Chicago, IL on January 31 through February 1, 2003.

Goals of this program were to provide greater opportunity for the professional development of science teachers in food safety issues with training in the use of the FDA/NSTA "Science and Our Food Supply" curriculum, and to nurture the development of local school and community partnerships through leveraged support provided to local science teachers and to increase student and community awareness of food safety issues.

At the workshops, teacher participants learned first-hand about the development and spread of food borne illnesses, the use of antibiotics, the vulnerability of attrick

populations, and the use of disinfectants. Teachers also talked with scientists from FDA and conducted laboratory experiments to further increase their understanding of food science.

For example, the teachers investigated how a single bacteria cell can mulitply to millions in just a few hours. and they observed how different temperatures (heating, room temperature, chilling, freezing) affect the growth of bacteria. The teachers explored these concepts by putting their culinary skills to the test. After cooking hamburgers to various temperatures, the teachers tested them for bacteria and other organisms that cause disease.

The food science program is centered on a standardsbased curriculum developd by The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in partnership with NSTA. The award winning "Science and Our Food Supply" curriculum explores the science behind the production, transportation, storage and preparation of our nation's food supply, and it contains a video, hands-on experiments and activities, and tools of evaluation.

Dear Editor:

In recent weeks I have been disappointed and slightly discouraged by the reactions to the upcoming referendum. It would appear that many people hold the opinion that Kewaskum schools are academically behind other Wisconsin schools, and the district should not be "wasting" money on such "frivolous" things as auditoriums and improvements to the current high school building. I disagree with this belief!

In a March 20th letter to Statesman, Barb the Kamrath reported information she found at a Wisconsin website. In the information presented, it was stated that Kewaskum's ACT results for 2001-2002 had an average score of 21.6. This is the average score on the reading section of the ACT. The actual average ACT composite score for Kewaskum High School was 21.8. In comparison, the ACT composite score for the state of Wisconsin was 22.1. As for other schools in Washington County? Slinger boasts an average 22.1, West Bend West a 22.5, and West Bend East a 21.9. While these averages are higher than those at Kewaskum, they are not significantly so.

In the same letter to the editor, Kewaskum fourth grade state test scores were also reported as low. The letter failed to note the performance of the tenth graders at the Kewaskum High School on these state tests. percentage The

Kewaskum students scoring in the advanced and proficient levels of the five tests ranks Kewaskum in the top eight schools of the 43 schools in our CESA district on four out of five tests.

These statistics should not, however, convince you that Kewaskum students are currently receiving the best in quality education. Updates in technology and textbooks are greatly needed. For example, the current "Modern Organic Chemistry" textbook used in class was published in 1984 (some students are even using a 1981 edition). An even worse example: in AP Statistics, a course designed so that students may earn college credit, 24 students are sharing seven textbooks. Under conditions like these, it is perhaps a testimony to the quality of Kewaskum teachers that students are able to perform as well as they do on the ACT and state tests.

As for the auditorium, it has always been a source of embarrassment explaining to relatives and friends of other school districts that our school productions are performed on tables clamped together, and lighted from lights mounted to basketball hoops. This, to me, is unacceptable and the most obvious mark of a lack of

progress.

importance given to education is begun at home. How can we expect the future generations to perceive education as important if the adults of our school district are not willing to support improvements to our school? How can we expect stellar academic performance if the tools and facilities for teaching are insufficient?

Let us not disregard the massive amounts of time individuals have invested in preparing this referendum. If these proposals were not truly needed, so much time and effort would not have been spent on them! As voters, our choice is this: Kewaskum academics can be strengthened by the support and involvement of the community to create a healthy, well-rounded learning environment; or, voters can choose to do nothing. and the Kewaskum schools can fall further and further behind in a highly competitive world where education is the best asset.


No one member of the town board is solely responsible for what appears on the agenda. The Town Chairman receives information from other board members and the Town Clerk as the agenda is developed each month. Township meetings I have attended have been orderly and kept mov-

As far as I am aware, an audit is only necessary in a township where there is only a clerk or a treasurer. In townships were there is a treasurer and a clerk, such as ours, internal audits can be done between these two individuals. This is the way the law is written.

Attending seminars and learning is something that should never stop. However, the flip side of this argument could be - attending seminars just to attend "seminars" is not cost effective to our township either. At a township meeting it was decided to give the board the authority to approve or decline seminars, to keep these costs in check.

I believe that since Howard Laubenstein has been our town chairman, he has worked to keep costs down for all of us. The snowplow truck is an example of this. I attended several meetings at which the replacement or repair of our truck was discussed. Howard encouraged township residents to walk through the issue and he brought in people qualified to speak to us about our options. As a result, we approximately saved \$70,000, which was used to pay off our town hall debt. We have had no problem with our repaired truck in the past two years. Howard has been working diligently to get state dollars to help us with road repairs, as

I would like to take issue with the recent editorials written regarding Howard Laubenstein and the Town of Auburn.

of Auburn.

The snowplow lawsuit was because of an accident with another vehicle. The Town's insurance company is handling the claim. At a regular meeting, the Town Board discussed the hiring of snowplow drivers. The motion was made and passed to advertise for new drivers and that previous drivers

would also have to reapply for the job. All three town snowplow drivers are experienced in driving quad-axle dump trucks and/or tractor trailer rigs. The previous "experienced" drivers are what caused part of the repairs of the 1991 plow truck. On the issue of reparing the 1991 snowplow versus purchasing a new one - a sales representative from a truck dealership was at the Town Meeting. He stated the Town should get close to 20 years out of that truck and that most of the problems were a lack of maintenance. The bids were opened. The low bid for a new truck was \$92,800, with trade-in of the old 1991 unit. The low bid of \$21,796 for repairing the old truck was received from a firm in Waupun and one person in attendance said the company he worked for had done business with them and they did excellent work. The Board Chairman reported at one of the following meetings they could get it done for \$14,080.91 with certain repairs left open. I suggested they not lock themselves into that figure, but rather cushion more money in for any needed additional repairs. Board passed motion to repair \$14,080.91. plus extras. The final bill of \$20,138.81 was still less expensive than the firm's original bid of \$21,796. Motion by Minz, seconded by Laatsch, and passed to pay final bill. Chairman Laubenstein suggested the \$70,000 saved from not buying a new truck be applied against the loan on the Town Hall, thus saving additional money on inter-

Another issue - The Town Chairman, by State statute, appoints members to the Town Planning Commission and the Board of Appeals.

The subject of not attending seminars was not Chairman Laubenstein's motion or statement. Those present at the Town of Auburn Annual Meeting discussed the money being spent on attending these seminars and meetings and said prior approval from the Board was necessary.

On August 6th, 2001, Attorney Paul Rosenfeldt, representing the firm of Attorney John St. Peters, our Township's legal firm, answered questions raised by Supervisor Minz regarding the town's policy on computer access by people outside the three board members, secretary and treasurer. The board, after ques-

tions, was informed everything was legal, but recommended a change in zoning administration to avoid future conflict of interest. Supervisor Minz must not have been pleased with this, because he then phoned Attorney John St. Peter directly, but got the same answers. The total cost for attorney fees, his attendance at the meeting and the phone conference was a waste of \$448 of town money.

Also, you should know that Chairman Laubenstein received over \$39,000 in grants from the State of Wisconsin for road work done by a previous board, but which was never requested.

The above information was received from Town of Auburn minutes or my attendance at meetings and not based on second-hand information.

Howard Laubenstein does an excellent job as Chairman of the Town of Auburn, and you can be sure he will continue to work in the best interest of you, the taxpayer. I urge you to vote for Howard on April 1st.



and the ramifications, we once again encourage you to study and reconsider the referendum questions so you can make a well-informed decision.

Do not underestimate the need to pass the first question on the referendum. which covers the need for textbooks and upgraded technology. Failure to do so will have devastating effects on all grade levels of the school system; books that need to be replaced won't be, computers that need to be upgraded or replaced will be removed, and our children will be put at another disadvantage. Or we will be forced to cut other programs, such as sports or club. How many of you want your children go to a school where there is not an opportunity to participate in sports or clubs? That will be a possibility we soon may have to face if this question is not

The second question deals with the facilities at the high school. It will be a comfortable environment where all our students can showcase their talents in the arts, a place that the whole district can enjoy and benefit from.

Finally, the fifth question deals with funds for the operating cost of the audito-

The needs of the district must be addressed and they will not go away. Waiting another year or two will not only shortchange the educational value to the students, but it will cost the taxpayers more in the future. Members of this community need to look at the long-term needs of the district and make a smart investment.


it, we can vote yes and say we can and want to move our district forward!

Tuesday is Election Day! On April 1 there will be an important School Board election with four individuals vying for three seats. There is also an important school referendum.

There are two incumbents seeking re-election, Lisa Maul and Gordie Dickman. Beth Steiner, who was recently appointed to the Board, is seeking election for the first time and the fourth candidate is Jean Goeden. Your vote for three of these people will have an impact on the school district, and how it influences education in the district, for many years to come.

The school referendum consists of five questions, all of which can be found and studied on our district web site listed above. Nineteen groups in the district have had informational presentations made by members of the Board, administration and Ad Hoc Committee. I need to say, "Thank you", for inviting us in to present this very important ballot item to your group.

Almost four years ago, October of 1999, I wrote about the importance of people taking a stand on issues, particularly issues that will have a lasting impact on not only the students' themselves, but the community as well. I hope that these informational presentations have helped people learn the facts, perhaps replacing previously held opinions or impressions. Hunting, Fishing Licenses Expire March 31

Current Wisconsin hunting and fishing licenses, including Conservation Patron and Sports licenses, expire March 31. Licenses valid for the new license year starting April 1 are available for purchase now over the Internet, by phone or at any license sales loca-

Licenses may be purchased in any of three ways:

* Internet sales: Customers can access online license sales through the Licenses, Permits & Registrations pages of the DNR Web site or on the state's portal at <www.wisconsin.gov> by clicking the licenses button. While some types of licenses, such as fishing, small game and turkey can be printed at home for immediate use, deer hunting licenses and others that include a backtag, carcass tag or harvest report are not printable and will be mailed to the customer within seven days. Only Visa or MasterCard are accepted for payment, and there is a \$3 convenience fee for this service.

Telephone sales: Customers can purchase licenses using a Visa or MasterCard by dialing, toll free, 1-877-945-4236. There is also a \$3 convenience fee charged for this service.

Counter sales: Hunting and fishing licenses are available from nearly 1,500 license sales locations throughout Wisconsin, Illinois and Minnesota.

Licenses have a new look, new feel

Customers will notice that their licenses are now printed on a new fluorescent yellow paper that does not have an adhesive backing. Because of this change, customers will now use a string or similar fastener to attach carrass tags to their harvest using a pre-punched horseshoe shaped notch found on each license square.

New application proc dures have also been developed to apply for permits in the following programs: Hunter's choice/bonus antlerless deer, turkey, sharp-tailed grouse, bear, goose, bobcat, fisher and otter. Applicants will no longer have to purchase stickers to apply to application forms. Instead, applicants will pay the \$3 application fee at any license sales location, online, or by phone and then submit their application using one of the following options:



Casualties of CWD



Chronic wasting disease has creating hardship for Wisconsin elk farmers.

Hello Friends,

Since the discovery of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) near Mount Horeb in February, the lives of hundreds of thousands of people have been negatively affected in one way or another.

This week, I spoke with a Vernon County couple, Roger and Kathi Sterba, who switched from a 300 dairy cow operation to building a herd of elk. They had hopes of earning a living by selling velvet and hard horns. They also sold starter herds to people just entering the business.

> Tuesday, March 18 High 48, Low 33

Roger and Kathi Sterba had built a 300-cow milking operation hoping they would be able to sell their milk for \$12 per hundred pound. The Sterbas milked their last cow this past November. They were receiving \$10 per hundred weight, not enough to break even.

Seven years ago, believing they should invest in an alternative farm income, they started an elk herd. They did some research and found that there was a profitable market for both hard and velvet horns.

Velvet horns must be harvested from a male elk within 65 days of his shedding his button. The button is the stub left after the velvet antler is removed. Velvet antlers are sold by weight and size. For the most part, Koreans purchase them. The soft hornsweigh between and seven and 20 pounds a stick (side). They bring about \$30 a pound. When the Sterbas first started elk farming, the price was \$100 a pound.

A decent set of hard horns is worth about \$150.

The investments for this business include breeding stock, fencing and a handling system for controlling the elk, animals that can be difficult to control.

The enjoyment the Sterbas receive from their elk is obvious. In fact, they find it nearly impossible to eat any of the animals.

Last year's discovery of CWD in Wisconsin changed the outlook for area elk farmers and the Sterbas' long-term retirement plans. As of today, a mature bull elk is worth almost nothing on a farm that is not enrolled in the Wisconsin Chronic Wasting Disease Program (WCWDP). The Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection monitors the pro-

I need to make it clear that nobody is complaining. I am just writing about another way CWD has affected people throughout the state.

The expenses and record keeping required to meet the WCWDP make it very difficult to enroll and still earn a living from raising elk. Without being enrolled in

WCWDP, it is virtually impossible to market a prod-

I listened to several stories that conveyed the Sterbas' true love for their elk. Lobo the llama takes charge of the elk calves after they are weaned. The Sterbas give tours to local school children.

They told me about both the emotional and financial loss created by a mean bull. He was goring and killing other bulls when no one was looking, including one that the Sterbas had paid \$5000

I believe the toughest pill to swallow is this. After switching from dairy farm-

ing, which is almost impossible to make a living at, to raising elk, the loss created by CWD for these alternative farms is almost as tough to take emotionally as it is financially.

Roger and Kathi both expressed a hope for the future. They believe that the CWD hype will slow down as it did Colorado.

I hope this couple in their early 50s will be able to continue to follow their dreams of raising and having an income from elk well into their retirement years.

Volunteers Needed for 'Sturgeon Guard'

teers, especially those willing to fill night shifts, are needed to help protect lake sturgeon spawning in the Wolf River from poachers.

Each spring, hundreds guard volunteers Wisconsin's oldest and largest fish as the fish swim from Lake Winnebago to their spawning grounds. When sturgeon spawn along the rocky shorelines of the Wolf River, they pay little attention to people and are very susceptible to illegal harvest, according to Todd Schaller, Oshkosh warden supervisor for the Department of Natural Resources

To protect the vulnerable fish, the volunteer "Sturgeon Guard" maintains a presence at the spawning sites 24-hours a day throughout the spawning season. That season usually begins in late April and lasts through early May. DNR law enforcement staff direct the protection effort, which is funded in part by Sturgeon for Tomorrow, a local sturgeon conservation organization.

When spawning begins, pairs of sturgeon guards are assigned to the sites for 12hour shifts. Before assignment, guards check in at Sturgeon Camp" just north of Shiocton, where they are fed a good meal, given a generous sack lunch and an identification hat (that they keep), and directed to their

OSHKOSH - Volun- site. At the end of their shift, guards return to camp for another hearty homecooked meal before they make their way home, Schaller says.

While it's impossible to predict the exact dates that spawning will occur each year, guards are routinely scheduled from April 15 through May 5. Spawning generally occurs for a fiveto seven-day period within that time window. "While we do our best to get all scheduled guards out on the riverbank to see fish, invariably we must cancel some scheduled shifts if the fish are simply not active,' Schaller says. "We try in those cases to re-schedule guards into an active period.

"Protecting spawning sturgeon is a great way to spend a spring day, evening, or night on the banks of the Wolf, often with sturgeon clearly visible," Schaller says. "Many guards bring spouses and children, and have made guarding a family tradition. Oganizations or groups are also welcome to participate."

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

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Washington County, on April 1, 2003, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballots below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the spring election, where lever machines are used, the elector shall depress the lever or button at the right of the name of the candidate for whom he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the elector shall depress the lever or button at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall depress the lever or button at the right of "no" if opposed to the question.

Where marksense voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for whom he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name

of the person of his or her choice in the space provided and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

On referendum questions, the elector shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official marksense ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve (if one is provided) so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

nsin have the right to fish, hunt, trap nd take game as they have done before the state was founded. And such a is implied in the statutory and administrative rules that have been enacted to regulate fishing, hunting, trapping and taking game in this state. However, no current provision of law expressly grants a right to fish, hunt, trap and take game.

The proposed amendment to the Wisconsin Constitution would expressly recognize that the people have a fundamental right to fish, hunt, trap and take game. This right would not be absolute, however, but would This right be subject to reasonable restrictions prescribed by law. Fishing, hunting, Fishing, hunting, trapping and taking game are presently restricted by laws prescribed by the Legislature and rules having the force of prescribed by the Department of Natural Resources

A "yes" vote on this question would mean that a right to fish, hunt, trap and take subject to reasonable restrictions would be expressly recognized by the constitution.

A "no" vote on this question would mean that a right to fish, hunt, trap and take game would not be expressly recognized by any provision of law in this state.
