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Washington County Mourns Loss of Sheriff Jack Theusch

ashington County suffered a huge loss Tuesday morning as Sheriff Jack Theusch was found dead in his Town of Farmington home.

Sheriff's deputies, Kewaskum Rescue Squad, Boltonville First Responders along with the West Bend Fire Department Intercept Unit responded to the scene and Kewaskum Rescue transported Theusch to St.
Joseph's Community
Hospital in West Bend where
he was later pronounced
dead

Sheriff Theusch started his distinguished law enforcement career as a the with patrolman Police Whitewater Department in 1970. In 1972 he was appointed Deputy Sheriff with the Washington County Sheriff's Department. He continued to serve with the sheriff's department for 31 years,

during which time he was promoted several times through the ranks of the department.

In 1976 he was promoted to Juvenile Officer, and in 1980 he was promoted to the Detectiveposition of Investigator. In 1989 he was promoted to Operations Captain, second-in-command of the department. In 1996 after the retirement of Robert Schulties Sheriff Theusch was elected to the position of Sheriff in a successful race against Jim Grover. He ran three other successful campaigns in 1998, 2000 and 2002. He was in the first year of his current four-year term.

Sheriff Theusch's closeknit community of Farmington was very important to him. To the people of Northern Washington County Theusch was a friend and a sheriff. He served as Chairman for the Town of Farmington, and was currently chairman of the Planning Commission. He was also a member of the Boltonville Fire Department.

Harley Camping and Zoning Freeze on Farmington Agenda

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t the Town of Farmington monthly board meeting on election night regular agenda items included a hearing on a moratorium issue first presented to the Board last month and a decision on permitting a temporary campground on Highway M and Newark Drive.

Bob and Sheila Susen were granted permission to provide up to 700 RV sites on a twenty-acre parcel of the Wilkens farm during the 100th anniversary Harley reunion from August 27 through September 1, 2003. The pair promised 24 hour security, electricity, garbage removal, running water and showers. Sheila Susen looked into the proper state permits and licensing, as well as a conditional permit from the Town. Bob reported that he had spoken to all of the close neighbors, and they "did not have a problem." In fact, another close neighbor planned to host 32 bikers at his place. It was passed to allow the Susens to pursue the matter, with the conditions that no alcohol be provided on site, nor entertain-"We're just ment offered. giving them a place to sleep," said Sheila.

Supervisor Roell's agenda item of a moratorium on subdivisions in the Town merited a great deal of discussion. Karen Christianson of the O'Meara Law Office was invited to participate. Upon question from the audience regarding adopting a moratorium at this meeting, she stated that there were three steps needed to pass a resolution. They include review and recommendation by the Plan Commission, placement of a Class two notice of a public hearing on the revision to the ordinances and finally, adoption of the revi-

Offers of help came from an unusual quarter. Two self-identified guests from Waukesha, a land developer and a real estate agent with

First Weber, offered further discussion and a sample of Developer's Agreements, which includes the possibility of limiting the number of building permits in a given time period. There were no agenda other addressed by the gentlemen. Developer's Agreements are adopted between the Town and the Developer, with specific agreements about landscaping, density, etc. The Agreements are enforceable by the Town, whereas the Neighborhood Covenants currently in place in newer subdivisions are not.

High school student Mike Wagner questioned the Board as to updated services possibly needed by the new neighborhoods in Fillmore, such as sewer and water, and perhaps even a constable.

This motion passed despite opposition from Town Supervisor Joe Minz who disagreed with the lodging fee because he has attended many workshops for town officials and has never been paid for lodging.

The Town Chairman and Town Supervisors will also be attending a workshop designed for new and returning board members.

Finally, Camilla Butzke completed one of her final duties as Town Clerk, she swore in the newly elected town officials. Camilla has served as clerk on the Town Board for thirty-six years, and is retiring this year.



He was then a Priest at St. Nicholas in Random Lake and also at St. Matthew's in Campbellsport. Father Kemmer has now been "retired" at St. Kilian's for the past 17 years.

Although he is supposedly retired, Father Kemmer keeps busy with Mass every morning, visiting nursing homes and the sick, Bible study on Monday mornings, also with weddings, baptisms, and conferences. Father Kemmer is a great listener. "Whenever people have any troubles, they always bring it to me, Father Kemmer said.

When he is not at the church, Father Kemmer can be found up north. Fishing is a favorite hobby of his and he has gone hunting every year for as long as he has been able to go.

Through his years of experience, Father Kemmer has learned many things. One of the main things he has learned he said is "People are the same all over. Basically, all people are good." Although Father Kemmer is retired, he said he does not feel like he is. "I will continue [at St. Kilian's] as long as I am able to," said Father Kemmer. "I enjoy what I am doing, it's the only thing I know.

Chairman Jim Dieringer replied that each home paid for all services but recycling on its own, and there were no plans for a Town Constable with arresting Discussion on both sides

of the moratorium issue resulted in the chairman thanking the audience for an enlightening discussion. Before the meeting I was in favor of a moratorium. Now I question it. Concerns regarding collecting fees can be changed rapidly, and Developer's Agreements that include phasing building all would keep growth to a minimum.

In supporting Supervisor Roell's motion, outgoing Supervisor Guttman said "How many more subdivisions will pop up before we can get some of these agreements in place?" Plan Commissioner Susen noted that it has been six years since a land use plan was developed. It may no longer be appropriate to the times.

The motion, under the direction of Attorney Christianson, freezes current zoning ordinances while the consideration of new comprehensive planning is adopted. Upon further questioning, the attorney said

that while the freeze prevents smaller land divisions, it does not allow rezoning to accommodate development or change from agricultural use to residential use, and vice versa. It does not stop the issuance of building permits for land already zoned residential. The Town's attorney will be directed to draw up an ordinance for the Town to adopt at a future meeting. "We want to be on the safe side," said

In other action, a picnic permit for the Fillmore Fire Department Fish Fry on April 11, 2003, was granted, and Plan Commissioners Jack Theusch, Dale Spaeth and Jim Dieringer were reappointed.

Chairman Dieringer noted future meetings at the Town Hall: The Annual Meeting of Town Electors is to be held April 8 at 7:00 p.m. following an informational presentation by the DOT regarding the upgrading of Highway 144, and a meeting on April 21 at 7:30 p.m. by the DNR regarding purchase of preservation lands in the community.

Other States in Same Fiscal Boat

Wisconsin is sharing a boat with thirty-five other states that are also facing budget deficits. According to the National Conference of State Legislators (NCSL), the fiscal year 2004 total budget gap for these states is \$68.5 billion. These statistics do not include the eleven states that did not have the data available yet when the survey was conducted in January of 2003. Wisconsin's \$3.2 billion deficit is serious, but we must put things in perspective by looking at other states such as California, which has a deficit of \$26 billion. Things could be

More importantly, this information shows that there are a number of factors that led to the state deficit above and beyond excessive spending. According to the same NCSL survey, a faltering national economy, declines in the stock market, contractions in the manufacturing and high-tech sectors and soaring health care costs have all had an impact on state budgets. The Governor and the Legislature in Wisconsin have committed to solving our budget crisis without increasing taxes. Every state is approaching the deficit in different ways, but many are relying on increases in taxes:

Income tax increase -California, Missouri, New

Excise tax increase (alcohol and tobacco) - Georgia, Montana, Nevada

Sales tax increase - Idaho, Montana

Cigarette tax increase -Idaho, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, West Virginia

* Business tax increase -Kentucky, Nevada

Not all states are relying on tax increases to bail them out of their fiscal dilemmas. In Arizona, legislators are pushing a proposal that would limit spending. The budget that came out of Florida's Senate Appropriations Committee included cuts in health care. prisons and education. However, when the bill got to the Senate as a whole, the bill was altered to add on another \$2 billion in spending. Other states are considering selling off their share of the tobacco settlement like Wisconsin did last year.

In looking at what options other states are exercising to fix their deficits, it is obvious that there is no silver bullet. Ideally, state government would be able to continue the level of services that have been provided without raising taxes or borrowing against future rev-

For Wisconsin, this budget crisis is not going to be easy to fix. We must understand that there is going to have to be some belt tightening and sacrifices are going to have to be made at all levels of government. However, what is important is that we solve our fiscal crisis in a manner that puts us on solid financial footing for the future and allows our economy to grow and expand.

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

Weather Cooperates For Balloon Launch

Mr. Drexler's Aerospace human flight but because of Technology class was finally the weather, the balloons able to launch the tissue had to be put in storage until now

Ideal conditions would be a calm, sunny day. This day finally arrived recently and with much anticipated excitement the balloons were taken out of storage.

A rod with a hook on the end was used to support the balloon above the heat source, which was a camp stove with a stove pipe setting over the burner, and with the help of the crew supporting the balloons, the balloons were inflated one at a time. The inflation took approximately two to three minutes and after the proper count down, the balloons were released. Then it was the responsibility of the recovery team to chase the balloons down.

All six balloons were successfully launched and recovered with all of the balloons making it up and over the school and one making it as far as the bank of the river one quarter mile away.

This project gave the students the opportunity to experience first hand what it takes to construct and fly a hot air balloon and relate to some of the trials and tribulations that man experienced in the early days of human flight.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS. The Village President and Village Board do rec-ommend the amending of the Municipal Code in reference to the Citizen's Advisory Board to reflect a broader type Committee to help to improve and to promote economic development.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WIS-CONSIN WISHES TO AMEND 1.36 TO CREATE A CLEAR, CONCISE ROLL FOR THE EDAC AND ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1.36 ECONOMIC DEVELOP-MENT/ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

(1) Purpose of chapter/section. The Economic Development/Advisory committee, referred to in this chapter as ED/AC, shall be a citizens advisory committee whose purpose shall be to advise the Village Board on matters of economic development promoting economic development promoting economics. Village Board on matters of eco-nomic development, promoting eco-nomic development activities that will assist in improving economic conditions in the Kewaskum area, developing and promoting the vil-lage industrial, commercial and resi-dential base and to assist on specific matters assigned to it by the Village Board.

(a) MISSION STATEMENT:

"Promoting the economic development of the Kewaskum area."

(2) Composition.

The ED/AC shall consist of seven members and one ex-officio member see follower:

(a) The Village President; (b) A member of the Village Plan

Commission; (c) Three citizens whose principle occupation shall be business owners or managers of business in the Village of Kewaskum with known interest in local economic develop-ment, of which two may be nonresi-

dents;
(d) Two citizens having general knowledge of the affairs of the village and interest in local economic development;

(e) An ex-officio member who shall be the Village Administrator (or alternate Deputy Clerk) and shall serve as secretary;
(f) The chairperson shall be elected from the members and shall serve for a period of one year.

(3) Appointments; terms;

(3) Appointments; terms; vacancies.

(a) All appointments shall be made by the Village President and confirmed by the Village Board.

(b) Appointments of the five citizen members shall be for staggered three-year periods, except that those first appointed: one shall be for one year; two shall be for two years and two shall be for three years.

(c) The Plan Commission member shall serve a two-year term and will be appointed in May of odd-numbered election years.

(a) Guide and coordinate the efforts of local individuals and organizations concerned with the economic development of the village when applicable.

(b) Assist if requested with the possible retention of existing

possible retention of existing employment opportunities and encourage the expansion of existing business and industry in the village by helping to meet the needs of

existing employers.
(c) Assist if requested in the creation of new employment opportuni-

(d) Support and promote economic development in the village through the improvement of the provision of the communities facilities and services that will assist in the expansion of employment opportuni-

ties.

(e) To assist the village in marketing coordinating and facilitating the development of any proposed and future Kewaskum Business Parks.

(f) The committee may act as liaison between the Village Board, Plan Commission and private development groups, such as the Chamber of Commerce and shall recommend to the Village Board such action of the Committee as determined as neces-Committee as determined as neces-

(g) When necessary, solicit community input to establish a vision of the Kewaskum area. Hold informational workshops for local businesses, officials and residents to broaden the base of viewpoints when and if

(h) When necessary, the Committee may utilize the services of the Village's Engineers, the Village Attorney and other Village Officials and employees, upon such basis as shall be mutually agreed to as may be determined by the

village Board.

(i) The committee may suggest, develop and recommend feasible methods of financing and other measures of public input into the Economic Development process.

(i) The committee shall have the authority to make all necessary rules governing its own proceedings, but generally follow Roberts Rules of Order.

(k) The committee shall annually report to the Village Board or report on any type of achievements regard-ing the fulfillment of any of such

programs.
(I) The committee shall work with

(f) The committee shall work with the County and State as well as any other agency or governmental body that would best benefit the goals of said committee, in the promotion of economic development for the Village of Kewaskum and area.

(5) Meetings. One regular/annual meeting of the Economic Development/Advisory Commission shall be held in May of each year. Special meetings of the Committee may be called by the Chairperson or any two members upon reasonable notice to all other members. (The notice to all other members. (The Village Board may request the Committee to also meet to address

an issue of community importance.)



There's No Place Like Home

Hello Friends

No matter how much we enjoy our jobs or other pastimes, for the majority of people that occupy this world, their favorite place is home. After this week, I will gradually return to the travel adventures of this outdoor column.

Tuesday, April 1 High 72, Low 37

I am sitting at a picnic table in my backyard with my two-year-old daughter, Selina. My three golden retrievers, Star, Pearl and Ice are lying at my feet.

We have heated our house with wood for the past two winters. My stepsons, Kevin, Travis and Joey, and I cut the wood. Our home is located in the sand country of Juneau County, about four miles outside of Necedah.

Long before Laurie and I meshed our lives, we were both gardeners. This will be the third summer we have owned this piece of property. Our first two gardens have made for pretty slim pickings on the yield side. The bottom line is that there are very few nutrients in the sand to produce a tomato, ear of corn or even a potato unless we use a large amount of fertilizer.

Last spring, I decided it was time to at least partially return to my farming roots and raise some calves. My plan was, and still is, to produce some beef for the family, build up the soil with manure and take the earnings from two or three calves to pay our property taxes. We purchased three 1-dayold calves last August and put Travis, age 11, in charge of them.

I am well aware that there will probably be no monetary profit when we sell the steers. But the quality of beef, work ethic Travis is learning, the free soil additives and no worries come tax time are a greater

All through my childhood, my dad taught me how to admire and grow trees. I have carried on the treeplanting tradition I learned since I was Selina's age.

Ever since I bought my first home in Mellen in 1994, I have planted 75 to 100 trees each spring. Last year,

Schicker Breaks Pole Vault Record

KHS Girls' Track Take 6th At Oshkosh Invitational

OSHKOSH The Kewaskum High School girl's track and field team scored 30 points and finished sixth at the annual Oshkosh Invitational on Tuesday, April 1st.

Johnnajo Schicker had the best day of her career in the pole vault when she vaulted two feet better than her previous best. Schicker came into the event never clearing better than 7' 6" in the pole vault. "She just started bending the pole and I told her to just sit back and ride it and she did it," exclaimed KHS pole vaulting coach Nate Wesemen.

And rode it she did as Schicker cleared 9' 6" to win the event and establish a new KHS indoor record. The old mark of 8' was held by her teammate Jessi Graham who was unable to compete because of an injury.

Kewaskum had to wait until the last event of the evening to record their next best finish of the night. The 4 x 400m relay team of Lindsay Keller, Jenna

Roecker, Breyan Donath, and Amanda Donath finished second in a hard fought battle for second

Keller did a great job staying with Two Rivers' first runner, but Two Rivers quickly showed why they are the defending state champions in this event. Kewaskum found themselves in third place when Amanda Donath received the baton. Donath immediately passed the Mayville runner on the first curve to put Kewaskum into second place on the last leg. The Mayville runner repeatedly challenged Donath on the last leg but to no avail.

The 4 x 200m relay team of Amanda Magnus. Jenna Roecker, Breyan Donath, and Amanda Donath finished fourth with a time of 1:56.96. Two Rivers also won the 4 x 200m relay with a time of 1:54.68.

Kewaskum also managed three seventh place finishes and an eighth place. Amanda Donath, in her third event of the night, finished seventh in the 400m dash with time of 66.56 seconds. Fellow sophomore,

Magnus placed seventh in the long jump with a personal best of 15' 2 2". Jenna Roecker finished seventh in the 55m high hurdles with a time of 9.91 seconds and Kayla McCormack placed eighth in the high jump by clearing 4' 8"

The 4 x 800m relay team of Danielle DeGroot, Kayla McCormack, Jenny Bischoff. and Rachel Shea finished 17th with a time of 11:56.43.

Other Kewaskum athletes competing, their place and time, distance or height were as follows:

Lindsay Keller finished 17th in the 400m with a time of 69.02 seconds.

Danielle DeGroot - 23rd in the 800m with a time of

Amanda Magnus and Rachel Dums each ran the 55m dash with time of 8.33 and 9.02 seconds, but did not qualify in the top eight for the finals.

The Oshkosh Invitational is the last indoor meet for Kewaskum this season because the State Indoor Track and Field Championships scheduled

for Saturday, April 12th in Madison were canceled this year due to a conflict with the Wisconsin Badgers annual spring game.

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
















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
