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

May started out with the staff at the society putting the finishing touches on our permanent World War Two exhibit that opened May 26th. Another splendid event was our Annual Preservation Awards Program that was held on May 20th. The final event for the month of May was our Memorial Day Program held on Monday, May 26th.

The Washington County Historical Society was pleased to announce the recipients of the Society's Annual Preservation Awards at their bi-monthly meeting on Tuesday, May 20, 2003. 

Village Board Rezones Land For New Subdivision on East Side of Village

A Village of Kewaskum Board meeting was held on Monday June 2nd. First on the agenda was a public hearing on a rezoning request for Solid Rock Development, LLC of a parcel of land adjacent to 708 Main Street.

The parcel is located on the East Side of the village, northeast of STH 28 and Stark Street. The lots are currently zoned as R-2 Single Family residence district (7,200 sq. ft. minimum lot size), Solid Rock Development, LLC requested for a rezoning to R-1 Single Family Residence District (10,000 sq. ft. minimum lot size), with the exception of one lot located at 708 Main Street remaining R-2.

The Village's planning commission gave a positive recommendation to rezone the area. The board decided to adopt Ordinance No. 2003-08, an Ordinance amending the zoning for the

parcel of land.

In addition, the board reviewed a request of Solid Rock Development, LLC for permission to use the village's engineers for the design work on the sanitary sewer lift station for their

subdivision, Kettle Kountry Estates. This was at no cost to the village, so the board approved the request.

The Park and Recreation Committee report included a discussion regarding the fall zone for the new playground equipment, for Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. The new equipment that is being donated by the Kewaskum Junior Women's Club and the relocation of the existing apparatus with the placement of a fall zone beneath that one as well.

Because of liability reasons the equipment company, without a fall zone already in place, will not install the playground equipment. The fall zone beneath the new apparatus is about 32X49 sq. ft. Rubber matting has an estimate cost of \$16,920, with no other maintenance costs, it has been known to last over ten years. Wood chips have an estimate cost of \$3,000 plus labor, and have vearly maintenance costs.

The Board agreed to place the rubber matting under the new playground equipment and wood chips under the relocated piece of playground equipment. This money will be taken out of the open development fund, designed for park upkeep.

The board approved Resolution No. 2003-16.

This is a resolution accepting by dedication the east half of Edgewood Road. Once accepted the village will be able to complete the boulevard.

The board then reviewed the request of Nextel to enter into an agreement to place antennas on water tower #1, located off of Reigle Drive. Currently Kewaskum is leasing some of the space on its water towers, and the Board plans to look into Nextel's request

Finally, the board accepted the proclamations of appreciation for Raynor Herriges and Frank Beesten, retiring

Committee/Board members.

Herriges was recognized for serving on the board of appeals for the village for six years. Beesten dedicated nine years to the library board. Beesten continues to serve on the planning commission.

Dave Stradtman replaced has replaced Beesten on the library board.

Charles Boegel, who previously was an alternate on the board of appeals, has taken over Herriges' position. Boegel's alternate position is open and anyone interested in filling it can contact the village hall at 262-626-8484.

Town of Scott Holds June Meeting

The Scott Town Board has approved payment of \$1,000 to assist the Beechwood Sportsman's Club toward financing the cost of weed spraying for three acres of Beechwood Lake. It is estimated that the project of controlling the growth of Eurasian water milfoil weeds in the lake will cost approximately \$3,000. The club is working with the DNR to obtain a grant to assist in the spraying.

The Scott Highway Department has completed seven miles of crack filling and is beginning roadside grass cutting. A stop sign on the corner of CTH D and Boltonville Road had broken off and has been replaced. New culverts have been replaced on Boltonville Road.

Littering violations occurring at the Town Recycle building are being investigated. Discussion led to the possibility of installing a surveillance camera, however a final decision did not come about.

Consideration was also given to parking the dumpster inside of the building to have better control on what is deposited into it. An undetermined number of people have been leaving appliances containing freon in the dumpster after hours. When brought to the collection point during normal hours, there is a charge of \$25 to \$35 for disposal. This is the amount, which the town must pay for disposal, which means that every property owner in the town is assisting in paying for the individual's garbage disposal.

Under a plan proposed by the town to its two fire departments, the town would create a contingency fund, which would be department specific. A current balance of \$30,120.73 would go to Batavia Fire Department and the \$2,003 budgeted amount would be divided equally. \$15,000 would be designated for the 2004 budget depending upon availability. In future years, 3% would be added annually to keep up with inflation.

These amounts would be maintained for a period of 3 years and reviewed at the end of each three-year period, adjusting it as needed. Batavia and Beechwood Fire Departments would be able to obtain State loans by going through the town for the purchase of new fire trucks when needed. It would be the Town's objective to pay off any loans as quick as possible. All monies received from the sale or trade of old vehicles will need to go back into the contingency fund of each specified department. ISO certification would need to be maintained.

Spring Time is Bike Time

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle safety and laws pertaining to them.

Wis. S346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle..." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, incluidng, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the sidewalk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file.

Also, Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8 a.m. at 4 p.m.

A few safety tips to everyone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.



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



Let Dad Relive His Childhood this Father's Day

(ARA) - Chances are the special Dad in your life played with Erector Sets when he was growing up -more than 30 million sets were sold between 1913 and 1966. Now celebrating its 90th birthday, the Erector Set has an incredible following of collectors as well as consumers who continue to be intrigued by the buildand-play toy.

science and science fiction. "We did a lot of things, I think, that was not originally intended that helped me with my own scientific background. The Erector brand has experienced resurgence in the United States in the past couple of years. The made-for-television movie called "The Man Who Saved Christmas," and a book, "The Man Who Changed How Boys and Toys were Made," highlighted the toy and its inventor.

The original multi-model metal sets are still around, but there are also five additional categories that will appeal to younger children, builders, collectors and kids of all ages. Erector's new Design line features flexible pieces with molecular memory, which allow for more realistic models. This unique flexible metal bends for building and springs back to its' original shape when starting something new. "This material has increased the building options and realistic look of the models," says Kay McCardle, senior product manager for BRIO Corporation, the company that distributes Erector Sets in the United States. "It's come a long way," echoes

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



Government is an organization established to represent the wishes of the people. Its goal is to protect the environment as well as the welfare of the citizens. Voters express their opinions and desires by electing those candidates whom they trust to carry out those

Town government should be no different. However, in the Town of Wayne, elected officials don't always represent the general populace. When voters recently eliminated a town supervisor through the election process, the board went into a closed door session to reappoint him to the planning commission.

petition Recently a requesting a moratorium on development was circulated in the Town of Wayne. Over 450 people signed the petition, expressing their concern for too much/too fast housing development in the township. It was hoped that further development should be subject to the Smart Growth land use plan. The petition was totally ignored and discredited by the town board. It is of major concern that some of the pending developments are situated on wetlands. It is vitally important that the 30% of

the township that is wetlands be protected.

In April, the Rock River Land Use Coalition held a seminar/informational session on protecting the farmlands and wetlands along the Rock River basin. Only one board member, a newlyelected person, cared enough to attend the meet-The Rock River ing. Coalition is attempting to develop a common goal among landowners, environmentalists, and others to preserve our rural landscape: agricultural, woodland and wetland. They recommend to county and town boards specific planning strategies to develop and use land in an orderly and logical way.

The Town of Wayne officials must start paying attention to the concerns of town's Residents of the Town of Wayne, please make yourself aware of the situation and the actions (or inactions) of your town board. Let them know how you feel about maintaining the rural character of the township. Express your concern for protecting farmland and wetlands. They say no one ever calls them. It's time they know that there is a silent majority out there that wants changes. Call your town chairman, or call

a representative of the Concerned Citizens group at (262) 629-5165.

Presently, the Town of Wayne does not adhere to a land use plan. A suggested land use plan was prepared for the town by the Wisconsin Southeastern Regional . Planning Commission in 1999. It hasn't been acted upon. A 2020 land use plan should be formulated by the people of the township. However, town leadership doesn't want this to happen, perhaps because they want to maintain full control. It is mandatory that the town have a land use plan that satisfies the majority of the town residents--not just a select few. The zoning ordinance that is supposed to enforce the Land Use Plan does not do

Town of Wayne residents, let's hear from you. Call your town board members or the number indicated above. Your silence is your approval of the present situation. Be heard!

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

Tessi Graham of the Kewaskum High School girls' track team tied for third in the pole vault at the 108th WIAA Track and Field State Championships on Saturday, June 7, 2003. Graham cleared 10 feet in the pole vault and teammate Johnnajo Schicker finished tied for ninth at 9 feet. Graham placed eighth in the pole vault last year at 8' 6".

"They were both disappointed that they didn't do better. I told them to look at the season as a whole. They had a great season. They both made a lot of improvement," commented vaulting coach Nate Wesemen. Last year, Graham's best was 9' 3" and Schicker's best was 7' 6". At one time during this season both Schicker and Graham held Kewaskum school record at 9' 9". At the regional meet Graham raised the school record to 10' 3" and then at the sectional meet she cleared 11' 0" to establish the current record.

Laura Massey of Lancaster/Potosi broke her Division 2 state record of 11' 3" set in 2002 by clearing 11' 4". Julia Heinrich of Notre Dame placed second with a height of 10' 9". Two Rivers won the girls Division 2 title as expected with 49 points. Columbus was runner-up with 41 points, followed by McFarland with 34 and Kiel with 32 points. Kewaskum finished 25th with 10.5 points.

The Kewaskum 4 x 400m relay team of Becky Herriges, Jessi Graham, Breyan Donath and Amanda Donath finished fifth on Friday in the preliminaries with a time of 4:10.41. In the finals on Saturday they moved up one spot to finish fourth with a time of 4:08.73.

The Kiel 4 x 400m relay team ran very inspired and not only defeated Two Rivers for the first time all season, but also set a new state record with a time of 3:58.94. Columbus also broke the old state record of 4:01.55 with their second place time of 4:01.15. Two Rivers finished third with a time of 4:02.07.

"The Kewaskum 4 x 400m relay team struggled all season to get their times down. Graham and Herriges were both out an extended time with injuries and missed valuable training time. And then one of their replacements, Lindsay Keller showed good promise until she was lost for the season with a stress fracture."

"They finished fourth the hard way - having to come from behind to get into the race. I give them a lot of credit. They kept working hard during the season and never give up their dream of returning to the state meet for the third year in a row. We will definitely miss these seniors. They did such an excellent job in the hurdles, pole vault, sprints, and relays," commented coach Jerry Gosa

Two years ago the Kewaskum relay team of Herriges, Graham, Jenna Roecker and Breyan Donath finished eighth. Last year the same foursome finished third with a time of 4:04.73. This year sophomore Amanda Donath broke into the lineup and ran anchor for the relay team resulting in changing the composition of the relay team. This year the unit of Roecker, Graham, Herriges and Amanda Donath qualified for the state meet in 4:08.8.

Amanda Donath qualified seventh in the 400m dash on Friday with a time of 60.49 seconds. Donath finished ninth in the finals on Saturday with a time of 1:01.41. "Amanda made great progress this season. She came off a stress fracture after the cross country season and worked her way back into shape before the start of the season. Then she worked hard all season and accomplished her goal of breaking the school record in the 400m dash," reported coach Gosa. Amanda Donath set the school record with a time of 59.7 seconds at the sectional track meet.

Troy Koeferl finished 12th in the shot put on Saturday with a throw of 49' 4.5". "We were very happy that Troy qualified for state. He was up against some real tough competition, but he gave 110%," commented throw-

ing coach Katie Jungers.

Rachel Dums ran the 300m hurdles in a time of 49.41 seconds on Friday and did not finish with one of the top nine fastest times needed to advance to the finals on Saturday. "Rachel made admirable strides in improving her hurdling technique and lowering her times this year," hurdling coach Ellen Kuphal commented her sophomore hurdler. Dums ran her best time of 47 seconds in the 300m hurdles at the sectional meet.

Lake Sturgeon to Return to the Milwaukee, Manitowoc Rivers

first time in more than a century, lake sturgeon are cruising the Milwaukee River, capitalizing on improvements in water quality and the removal of the North Avenue Dam that once blocked spawning runs of this ancient, gigantic fish.

On Monday, May 12, fisheries crews from the Department of Natural Resources and a University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee **Great Lakes Water Institute** scientist transferred about 51,000 weeks-old sturgeon to the Milwaukee River at Grafton. Later this week, A similar stocking of up to 100,000 young sturgeon is planned for later this week in the Manitowoc River.

The stockings are milestones in the resurrection of the two rivers, and for Wisconsin's lake sturgeon management program, which is 100 years old this year. Having protected and nurturea 1 n Lake Winnebago what is now the world's largest lake sturgeon population, the program is focusing on restoring lake sturgeon in other parts of its

MILWAUKEE -- For the original range in Wisconsin.

This represents the first stocking in a Lake Michigan tributary that we know of and is an important step in a multi-agency effort to help restore lake sturgeon to Lake Michigan," says Brad Eggold, DNR Southern Lake Michigan fisheries team supervisor.

'It also signifies to a great extent the work that's been done in the Milwaukee River watershed to clean up pollution and to remove dams that blocked the fish's passage, most importantly the removal of the North Avenue Dam in 1997. That progress makes the return of sturgeon possible after more than 100 years."

'It's the same story in the Manitowoc River -improvements in water quality and removal of dams," says Steve Hogler, the DNR fisheries biologists leading the Manitowoc River effort.

The Milwaukee project is funded in part by a grant from the National Marine Fisheries Service and a contribution from the Milwaukee River Revitalization

Council. Future lake sturgeon rehabilitation efforts in Lake Michigan will be guided by a lake-wide plan being developed by a task group of Michigan Lake Committee. That committee establishes broad fish community objectives for Lake Michigan and coordinates management activities of mutual interest among representatives from the Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana, and Illinois Departments of Natural Resources, and Chippewa-Ottawa Resource Authority.

Lake sturgeon can grow to 200 pounds and live 100 years. Female sturgeon don't start spawning until they are 20 to 25 years old, and males start at 10 years or so, so most of the current biologists working on the project will be retired if and when the fish start their spawning

Getting to adulthood will be a challenge. DNR surveys of the river reveal good habitat for overwintering and spawning, but the lake sturgeon will be only about three-quarters of an inch long at stocking, and must first survive these initial months, and then subsequent years of eluding predators and finding sufficient food. Even then, as the survivors begin their spawning runs, they'll still encounter some obstacles. such as remaining dams on the Milwaukee River.

Programs requiring wastewater dischargers to meet pollution limits, and the investments that those public and private dischargers made, greatly reduced pollution in two rivers from industry and municipal wastewater treatment plants. State and local efforts to reduce polluted runoff from farms and urban areas have also helped.

For the Milwaukee River, a critical improvement came after 1997, when the City of Milwaukee, DNR and the U.S. Environmental

Protection Agency spent \$4.5 million to remove the 17-foot high, 350-foot wide North Avenue Dam and to reclaim habitat and improve conditions along the river. The removal of the structure, which was about three miles upstream of the Milwaukee River confluence with Lake Michigan, marked the first time since 1835 that that stretch of the river flowed freely.

Today, 30 species of fish have been documented in the Milwaukee River, including the Greater redhorse, a state threatened species, and under suitable flow conditions, trout and salmon have migrated about 30-miles upstream to the Village of Grafton and Cedarburg on Cedar Creek.

This is really a great day," said Ray Krueger, who chairs the Milwaukee River Revitalization Council and was among several members of that group watching the stocking. "This is important because it's a benchmark for the river...It's a part of our past being reintroduced to the river.'

Continuing Education

It might sound like a dirty phrase to 2003 class of graduates. "What comes next" is on most of their minds, though. Kewaskum High School students are fortunate to have a number of continuing education opportunities within easy driving distance. Both Moraine Park Technical College and the University of Wisconsin-Washington County offer programs of nearly every interest to prepare today's graduates for tomorrow's workforce. Officials of both institutions agreed that the top field of choice was healthcare.

washington.uwc.edu Application and registration are available on line, and is scholarship information and schedule planning. Fees for the 2003 fall semester were listed at \$1,720 for a full time class load of between 12-18 credits, with some variances and special fees extra.

At the University of Wisconsin-Washington County, Janet Brown, the Interim Director of Student Services, was enthusiastic about education choices in West Bend.

"Of the two 'hot' fields today, I would have to say, nursing and other healthcare professions and business are it. Most students will earn an Associate of Arts or Science and then transfer. Students can also earn a certificate of business.

UW-WC has several joint programs with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee which allow students to complete a four-year degree right here in West Bend while enrolled at the Milwaukee campus. advantages are that students do not need to travel, and can work at a pace which meets their lifestyle,' Brown said.

The healthcare field is being driven by an aging US population with growing healthcare needs. UW-WC is even beginning to offer some clinical courses here to meet the four-year Bachelor of Nursing degree. Mostly, though, UW-WC is a feeder program into a bachelor program.

As far as business degree opportunities, there are several options in finance and accounting.

Brown also sees a future need in education. "As far as we know, jobs are available. In the long term, as the economy improves, there will be a need for teachers."

UW-WC students enroll with a high school diploma, or need to have taken an appropriate amount of credits for admission. Some students returning to advanced

education after an absence may also be considered. High school students may enroll for some basic courses while at high school if they meet proper requirements. There are several scholarship opportunities available. "Coming to UW-WC gives students a good start in their college career and allows them to save money by living at home and being able to keep a job," Brown conclud-

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




Moraine Park Technical mercial engineering is gain- lists shouldn't deter stu-College, said it was difficult to pinpoint two or three popular courses, as they have so many different pro-

grams. A favorite course is the nursing program, which has a waiting list of two years to get into the clinical portion of the degree. "Health care is very much highly in demand and commands good salaries," Ruback said. MPTC will accept applications for the program beginning again in September. Many of the fall enrollments are "very full." The auto technician program is "brimming," as is cosmetology, which is full for this fall and nearly filled for 2004. Structural Engineering, a technician's course for design and regu-

ing in popularity.

"Right now there is a huge demand of retraining due to downsizing, and businesses We work with Workforce Development in rapid retraining. This year was a record number of business closings. People are shifting into more stable jobs as businesses downsize and there are layoffs. These people need to be trained and get out of factory jobs and do something different." The backlog at MPTC is due in large part to uncertain economic times, Ruback said. The state budget setbacks affect their funding directly. "We can't afford to hire more teachers, and have no money for more of the special labs and class-

lation of industrial and com- rooms needed." The waiting dents from enrolling, however. Although many courses are full, high school graduates can get in and take reducing their workforce. their basic courses. When they get to the academically rigorous portion of the degree, such as nursing clinicals, they can concentrate on those specific cours-Ruback encouraged high school juniors to apply early if they are interested in healthcare and other popular programs. "Many students don't know that if they take courses in high school like chemistry, it works with the requirements for nursing. Students should plan ahead in high school (for their future)."



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
