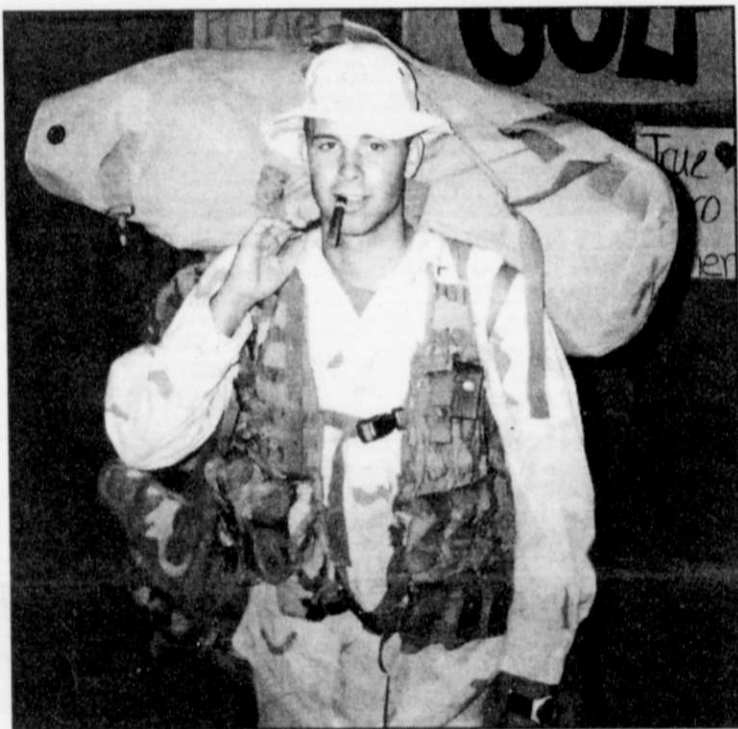

LCPL Chris Koth Returns Home After Stint in Iraq

Character is the result of defining and refining events in our lives. Christopher Koth, alumnus of Kewaskum High School, class of 2000, has endured a lot of refining since graduation. Chris, son of Perry and Joann of Kewaskum

and twin brother of Curt, recently spent some time at home after several months overseas.

Sand, sun - sounds like a nice place to visit, you say? Well, it would be, except for the nasty bullets and bombs going off all around you. Chris was in Iraq. He joined the marines when three

semesters at UW-Wisconsin playing football didn't work out like everyone hoped.

"I've always liked to do things the hard way," Chris said. "Nothing against the army or navy, or anything, but the recruiter said the marines did things the hard way. That appealed to me," he said of his service choice.

Chris was assigned to the 1st Battalion 5th Marines, with Bravo Company, and is a Lance Corporal with his unit. The 1st, 5th's history can be traced back to deployment in WWI to France. It was assigned to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, at various times through WWII, then sent to New Zealand, participating in battles at Guadalcanal, Okinawa, China and Guam. The battalion has been involved with every worldwide conflict since then. Of the five regiments, one serves at Headquarters, while one unit - Alpha, Bravo, Charlie or Weapons - is deployed outside of the US at all times. "Our unit was the first battalion to cross into Iraq of the land troops," said Chris. "I was probably the fortieth person to go over the line. We took out the Ramallah Oil

Field and one of Saddam's palaces in Baghdad."

If he wasn't completely convinced about their mission while his unit waited around in Kuwait for a month, he changed his mind once they went into Iraq. "We take things for granted here, the way we live. They have nothing. No water, no food. The people welcomed us - we were like angels to them. I think it needed to be done."

Chris was trained to use an M16 with M203 (rifle with a grenade launcher), and could shoot an AT4 (shoulder rocket launcher). He learned to jump out of a helicopter safely if he needed to. "My scariest moment was when my squadron leader got half his face blown off and I had to help get him out of there. When guys are going down around you, that makes it real." His squadron leader was expected to make a full recovery, though. He'll have more surgery and plastic surgery. Will Chris get some kind of commendation for his actions? "I suppose I could have, but I didn't make a big deal out of it." His unit was expected to receive several awards when the paperwork

settled.

Chris brought back some money, called denarii, and an Iraqi gas mask as souvenirs.

Kewaskum manufacturer Regal Ware, Inc. has sold its West Bend® Retail Housewares Division to U.S.-based Focus Products Group, LLC of Vernon Hills, Illinois according to documents signed by executives from both companies Tuesday.

The West Bend® Retail Housewares Division has been marketing small electrical appliances through establishments such as department and specialty stores since 1911. Terms of the sale between the two privately-held companies were not disclosed. Closing is expected by July 31, following due diligence and necessary

approvals.

Offices, warehousing and distribution of West Bend® Housewares products will remain at its current location of 1100 Schmidt Road in West Bend, Wisconsin.

"We are impressed with the high quality of the West Bend Retail Housewares organization and products, and are committed to strengthening the West Bend® brand name in the retail industry," said Focus Products Group President Keith Jaffee.

Regal Ware acquired the assets of West Bend's Direct Sales Cookware, Water Systems, and Retail Housewares business units in

November 2002. "The sale of the Retail Housewares unit will not affect the Direct Sales Cookware or Water Systems businesses," according to Regal Ware President and CEO Jeffrey Reigle. "This move is consistent with our strategic direction to focus on the Cookware and Water Treatment direct sales arena, while maintaining our growth position in sales to Commercial businesses such as hotels and restaurant supply houses." Regal Ware, a privately held company founded in 1945, is a widely respected name in the cookware industry. Regal products are available throughout the

United States, Canada, Mexico, Asia and Europe, and include such quality items as range-top cookware, commercial coffee urns, and home drinking water treatment systems.

Focus Products Group currently has two wholly owned subsidiaries, AMCO Houseworks, LLC and Sensible Storage, LLC. AMCO sells kitchen utensils to specialty retailers and department stores. Sensible, marketing its products under the Wiretech name, primarily sells wire based storage products to retailers and DIY home centers.

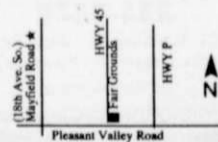

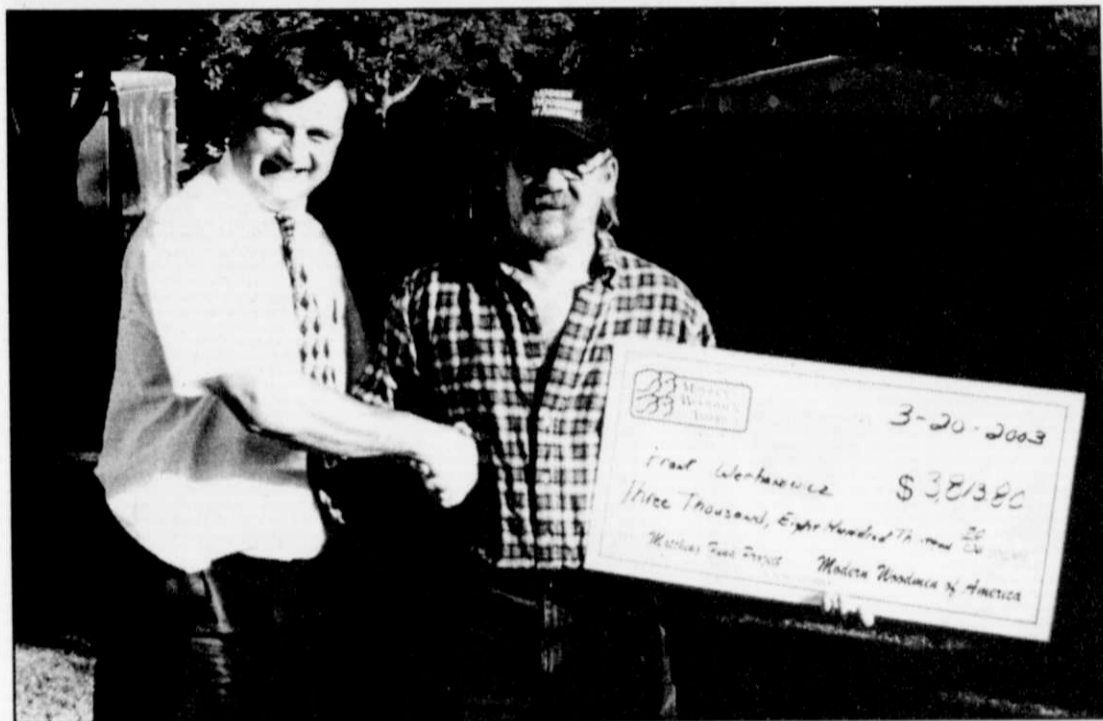

Social Security Messages For People of All Ages

Most folks tend to associate Social Security with older people. To be sure, most older Americans are very interested in Social Security. And we always have plenty of information they find useful and helpful. But we also have messages for the millions of people who wouldn't know the difference between Lawrence Welk and Lawrence of Arabia.

So here are some samples of the kinds of Social Security messages we have for the younger crowd.

Brian is a 40-something computer software engineer. Maybe a decade ago, he would have been classified as a "yuppie." He was working long hours and making good money as he quickly moved up the corporate ladder. But in the past few years, he and his wife have slowed down a bit. They now have two kids to think about, and a big mortgage, and lately, long-range financial plans have replaced short-range vacation plans. Our message to Brian is to pay attention to his Social Security Statement. We've been sending him one every year for quite some time now. But they always seem to have found their way into the "circular file," instead of his file cabinet. The statement can be a very helpful financial planning

tool. It lets Brian know not only the future Social Security benefits he will be due when he retires, but also the benefits he could get now if an injury or illness suddenly forced him out of the workplace. And the statement also gives his wife an idea of the benefits she and the kids would get if Brian were to die.

A message for Anne, a newlywed, reminds her to change her name in Social Security's records. She should do that because she is now using a hyphenated version of her maiden and married name (or is taking her new husband's name). If her employer is reporting her earnings under a different name than we have in our records, her Social Security records cannot be updated and she won't get any credit for the taxes she's paying. That's important because her future Social Security benefits are based entirely on her earnings. Getting a timely tax refund is another good reason to make sure her records match.

Brad is a 20-something who virtually lives on the Internet. He found his job and his apartment online, he uses an online dating service, and he bought a car off a popular website. Our message to Brad and others like him is to safeguard his Social Security number. Although many businesses request a Social Security number as part of their record-keeping systems, there is no law that requires Brad to give it out. (There only are a few officially authorized uses of the Social Security number that require you to disclose it, such as when paying taxes or applying for government benefits.) So if the dating service won't set Brad up with the "Attractive SWF who loves romantic strolls on the beach" unless he provides his Social Security number, Brad will have to decide if it's worth the risk.

New Corporate Statue Added to West Bend's Collection

A new corporate sculpture has become part of the city's overall collection in the form of "Wheelman."

West Bend Mutual Insurance Company has purchased the piece from sculptor Norm Christianson of Milwaukee and dedicated it in a ceremony held on May 12. "Wheelman," made of cast bronze, stands over

seven feet high.

West Bend Mutual Chairman John Dedrick said, "The new piece that stands in front of the main entrance to Mutual's corporate headquarters was a welcome addition to its collection of more than 300 art works, most of them from Wisconsin."

West Bend Friends of

Sculpture president, John Torinus, commented that "corporate pieces would be considered a part of the city's overall collection. We are trying to add one or two major pieces to our collection every year. And corporate pieces certainly help make that happen."

Torinus noted that this was the second piece brought to the city by West Bend Mutual. The first was "West Bend Resolve," which depicts the west bend in the Milwaukee River. It is located at Riverside Park and was donated in honor of West

Bend Mutual's 100th anniversary in 1994.

During the dedication Torinus said, "Even as a beautiful woman is enhanced by accessories, so a beautiful city like West Bend is enhanced by a necklace of sculptures."

The citywide collection now includes 15 purchased pieces, two corporate pieces, and three historical sculptures at the old courthouse. In addition, there are three works that are part of the "Sculpture Showcase" - pieces loaned to the city for temporary display.

From Boltonville to God's Ears

Ann Enright went to Rome to see the Pope. She joined Archbishop Timothy Dolan and 600 others from the greater Milwaukee area and St. Louis on a pilgrimage, from June 26 through July 7 of this year. "This was a spiritual renewal for the whole Archdiocese," said Ann. She traveled with several others from our area.

For Ann, the highlight of the trip was to see the actual pallium ceremony, when the Archbishop received his symbol of authority as Archbishop of the Milwaukee Diocese, from his Grace, Pope John Paul II, in St. Peter's Square. It was estimated about 35,000 people representing forty countries, as well as dignitaries, including royalty, attended the ceremony. Especially interesting was the Eastern Orthodox church representatives participating and giving their blessing. "You just couldn't believe you were present for such an historic event," she said of the experience. The ceremony is held every year on June 29, the feast day of Saints Peter and Paul. Tradition has it that both saints were martyred for their faith on this same day.

They were seated about three hours before the actual ceremony, and found themselves in good view, thirteen rows from the front. The group met others from Brazil and Nigeria sitting nearby. Because of seniority, Archbishop Dolan was the first to receive his pallium. The archbishops were all dressed in their red vestments and made quite a tableau on the stage.

"We had a souvenir brochure about the ceremony, but it was all in Latin," said Ann. "We were able to follow along, though. Some of the prayers we said right along in English because we knew them by heart. The Orthodox Bishop addressed the group in English with a message of peace."

Ann found out about the trip through a biography of then newly-appointed Archbishop Dolan over a year ago. Although Ann was in Rome several years ago, "it's a place you want to see more than once. Every Catholic should try and go once," she said.

The group heard mass every day in a different basilica, accompanied by the archdiocesan choir. "It was very heart-rendering," said Ann. "Having the choir there added an extra ambience. To think you were walking in the same paths of such ancient people. What a wonderful

experience - to see the art, architecture and scenery. Seeing the work of Michaelangelo up close - he's probably the most famous artist in the world." Tourists have a strict dress code going into the churches. Women have to wear skirts - nothing above the knees, the shoulders must be covered. "People were being turned away. We brought a shawl or extra blouse with us," said Ann. Archbishop Dolan's mother went on the trip, as well as the choir, and a television reporter from Milwaukee. Many of you may have seen or read about the historic trip in the Milwaukee media.

The entire group had two lunches and two dinners together with the Archbishop. Three-course meals were the norm, with wine. "We ate lots of pasta. Pasta with every meal. I don't think I want pasta again very soon," she said. "Meat, vegetables and dessert were included." It was so hot, over a hundred degrees the first two days and in the nineties through the rest of the time there. "And we walked - and walked, up and down streets." She showed on a map where the group traveled. "Everything was very clean," she said. "The smell of baking bread, walking past the bakeries, and incense in the churches," Ann recalled. "We don't use incense in church much anymore, except for special occasions." They were also privileged to visit the Vatican Gardens, available only by appointment.

The Archbishop was a wonderful host, Ann said. He had quite a sense of humor. After visiting the Coliseum, several folks said they liked the Brewer's stadium better. The Archbishop replied, "Yeah, we could use a few gladiators on the team, too." The entourage took a day trip to Assisi to visit the sites of St. Francis and St. Clare.

While most of the group returned to Milwaukee after Rome, Ann and a few others traveled to Florence and Venice. They took a four-hour bus ride through the Tuscany Valley farm country. "We saw lots of corn tasseled out, and they were nearly finished combining the wheat," she noticed. The artwork of Florence was impressive. Coming through the hills and seeing the skyline of the city against the Arno River was amazing. The Plaza del Duomo with its pink, green and white marble was a highlight. "The bridges all have names," she said, and shops are cantilevered out over the river. Stopping in Padua, Ann shared that it was eerie to walk over the graves of well-to-do families buried under

the church floors.

Another five hours over the beautiful highways brought them to the harbor on the Adriatic Sea where they boated out to Venice. The city is actually built on swampy islands, once a desperate attempt to evade ancient enemies. "There are as many canals as streets," Ann said. "The streets are very narrow. The ocean breezes were wonderful, after the heat of Rome." She enjoyed a gondola ride while there, though their guide would not sing.

"I have the utmost respect for the Pope and the Archbishop. I looked at all the palaces, and it taught me that the importance in life is family. All the wealth those people had - and they couldn't take it with them. 'Catholic' means 'universal'" she said. "There were forty different countries at St. Peter's, yet we said the

same prayers, just in different languages. It all started with Jesus, and here we are with the same faith 2,000 years later."

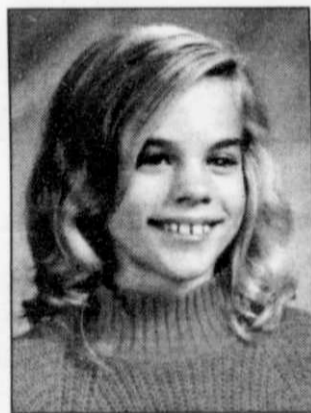

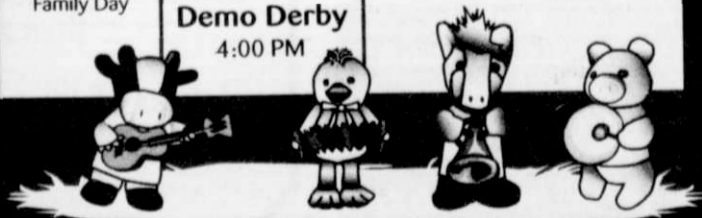


