### Washington County CVB Holds Last Meeting For Harley Task Force

Members of the Washington County Convention and Visitors Bureau met Tuesday afternoon with members of the Harley 100th Anniversary Task Force. The committee has been meeting for the last six months to discuss the county's involvement in the celebration.

The County Fair park will play host to over 53,000 members of the Harley Owners Group. According to event officials this will be a private party open only to card carrying members of the group.

All over Washington County special events will be held in conjunction with festivities in Milwaukee. Some of the items planned include:

KEWASKUM-The Washington County Republican Party will hold a brat fry on Thursday afternoon at Mike's Country Meats in the Downtown area. Friday, another brat fry will be held by the newly formed Friends of Kewaskum at that same location. Saturday the Friends group will hold a HOG roast and dance from 5

p.m. to midnight in Riverhill

HOLY HILL- will hold a special mass and blessing of the bikes at 4 p.m. on Saturday, August 30th.

SLINGER- A.B.A.T.E. has planned a campground that has over 150 campers registered. They expect 600 to be registered and can hold 1,150 campers. The campground will also play host to a wedding by a member on Thursday.

WEST BEND- Missy Propper spoke on behalf of the Downtown Association. She stated that a street dance is planned with two bands, a beer tent and a fish fry from 5-11 p.m. on Friday, August 29. The Old Courthouse Museum has already started a special display of Harley motorcycles that will be running for several months.

Diane Boudry-Rodd, who is one of the organizers of the A.B.A.T.E. campground in Slinger was concerned about local business owners and community members not being properly prepared to handle the influx of visitors to

the county. Her concerns were answered by members of Harley Davidson's event planning team who stated they could not say any number of riders will be in any one place at any one time.

Boudry-Rodd asked that people be made aware of what is happening and hopefully business owners will be prepared to handle the event.

# FdL County Man Infected With First Case of West Nile Virus

MADISON - State health officials recently announced the first probable human case of West Nile virus in the state in 2003. Test results from the Wisconsin State Laboratory of Hygiene indicate that a Fond du Lac County man has tested positive for antibodies to West Nile virus. The test sample will be sent to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for confirmatory testing.

Because the patient traveled outside of Wisconsin during the time in which he could have been infected, it is not possible to determine where he was exposed to West Nile virus. However, because Wisconsin has confirmed West Nile virus infections in animals this summer, he could have been infected while in-state.

West Nile virus is transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. WNV is not transmitted person to person. Although not all mosquitoes are infected with the virus, the best protection Wisconsin residents have against the disease is to reduce their risk of getting mosquito bites. Personal protective behaviors and reducing mosquito breeding habi-

tat on one's property are the best tools to prevent disease. Personal protective measures include:

 limiting the time spent outdoors at dawn and dusk during mosquito season (June to September) or other times mosquitoes are active.

 wearing light colored long sleeve shirts and pants, shoes and socks when outdoors,

 applying insect repellents containing 30% DEET or less when outdoors,

### Senator Panzer Visits With KSD Board Members



Senator Mary Panzer met with the Kewaskum School Board on Monday night to discuss the district's budget and future state.

Senator Mary Panzer met Monday night with the Kewaskum Board of Education to discuss the district's future state. Board

President Gordie Dickman started out the dialog by summarizing the district's financial woes regarding the failed referendums, stating, "we're in a desperate state and we don't know what to do."

Dickman said he understood that nobody wants or can afford to pay more taxes, but doesn't know how to remedy the situation.

Senator Panzer, who supported the freeze that Governor Doyle vetoed, stated that there are districts in the same position, and even though she supports the freeze, is willing to work with districts to find another way to find funds. She further stated that the two-thirds funding, spending caps and QEO put in place by the state need to be reformed, but all three items need to be done at the same time.

Panzer pointed out that \$8.2 billion of this year's budget went into K-12 education and that property taxes are not an endless source of revenue. She stated that in regards to property taxes she

has "seen the fear in people's eyes" stating that it's not just that they don't WANT to pay more taxes, they CAN'T.

In regards to the issue of healthcare, where costs are skyrocketing at an increase of approximately 30% this year, she stated that something needs to be done. Board member Beth Steiner pointed out that at the current trend, healthcare will eat up the ENTIRE budget in 6 years.

The board then addressed the issue of mandates. The board expressed their concern for having to put mandates in effect, but then the funding sometimes does not follow. Panzer stated that there are times when the state does not get paid from the federal government for its portion of the mandates and the money never gets handed down. Panzer asked for a list of the district's most troublesome mandates to have her committees look at.

Panzer hopes to come back to discuss more issues with the board.



#### Legislation Concerning I-43 Crash

MADISON Representative Dan Le Mahieu (R-Oostburg) has begun to circulate legislation geared toward allowing local protective service units to be more directly reimbursed for traffic accidents responded to on state highways.

In the aftermath of the deadliest traffic crash in Wisconsin history, protective service units, like the Village of Cedar Grove Fire Department, who were one of the first units responding to the accident scene, used a majority of their yearly departmental budget on this one accident. Under state law, a fire department can bill the State of Wisconsin for expenses incurred only after they attempt to recover costs from the individuals involved in the traffic accident. In the case of the Cedar Grove Fire Department, by law, they were forced to send a billing statement to individuals involved and families who may have lost loved ones in the accident. As local departments attempted to recover costs they were intensely criticized for being heartless and insensitive for billing families that had already suffered so

Therefore, after extensive work with local protective service units and groups like the Wisconsin Fire Chiefs Association, Representative LeMahieu has drafted a piece of legislation, currently being circulated for co-sponsorship that would allow local protective service units to bypass billing individuals and/or families involved in state highway traffic accidents and allow local protective service units to bill the vicitm's insurance company directly, thus protecting local fire and emergency personnel for undo criticism, allowing local municipalities the ability to respond to traffic accidents that have occurred out on the state highway system.

"The traffic accident on October 11, 2002 that claimed 10 lives will be in our memories forever. As a Sheboygan County resident, living no more than five miles from the crash site, I will forever be mindful of the tragedy that occurred and the duty that was performed by our local protective service units that gave time, energy and emotion on that fateful morning," concluded

LeMahieu.

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

Transportation: Johnson Bus Company will be sending out information soon on bus rules and pick-up times. 

Project Update







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



dow and door screens are in good repair to prevent mosquito entry.

In addition to taking personal protective precautions, Wisconsin citizens should make every effort to ensure that they are not breeding habitat for mosquitoes in their own yards. Steps that can be taken to eliminate mosquito breeding sites include:

- Disposal of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or similar water-holding con-

- Removal of discarded

- Making sure roof gutters drain properly and that down spouts are clean.

Changing water in birdbaths regularly.

- Turning over wheelbarrows, wading pools, boats and canoes when not in use.

- Landscaping to prevent water from pooling in lowlying areas

Keeping weeds, vines, and grass trimmed, because mosquitoes use these shady areas as resting places during hot daylight hours.

Symptoms of West Nile virus infection usually show up between three to 15 days after being bitten by a mosquito infected with WNV. They can include headache, high fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, disorientation, tremors, convulsions, paralysis and coma. Healthcare

providers are urged to be on the alert for patients who have symptoms consistent with West Nile virus infection. People who are ill should contact their health care

Most people infected with West Nile virus will have no symptoms at all or will display only mild symptoms of illness. People over the age of 50 are at greater risk of developing severe illness. It is estimated that fewer than one out of 150 people who become infected will get severely ill.

West Nile virus has been found in birds or horses in 13 Wisconsin counties so far this year, and a mosquito pool in Milwaukee County has also tested positive for the virus. Nationwide in 2003, 182 humans cases have been reported in 17 states and five people have died. Last year, 52 Wisconsin residents were ill with West Nile virus and three died.

The Division of Public Health continues to monitor the spread of the disease using surveillance of dead crows, ravens and blue jays as a tool to determine the presence of West Nile virus in the state. These dead birds should be reported to the West Nile Virus Hotline at 1-800-433-1610 or to local health departments.

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
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

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

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WIS-CONSIN WISHES TO CREATE UNDER ARTICLE II. PLATS SEC-TION 86-45 SUBMITTAL PROCE-DURE AND ORDAINS AS FOL-

NOW THEREFORE the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum wants to amend ARTICLE II. Under Chapter 86 Subdivisions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, do ordain that Section 86-45 of the Municipal Code of Kewaskum is created as follows:

Sec. 86-45. Submittal Procedure. (a) Any request for development in the form of a subdivision requiring action by the Village Plan Commission for conceptual, preliminary or final actions must be filed with the necessary application forms and relevant information with the Village Administrator/Clerk on Monday, four (4) weeks prior to the Village Plan Commission meeting at which action is required by the petitioner. (An exception may be made in reference for conceptual review, but shall not be less than eleven (11) days before the next Plan

Commission meeting.) (b) The Village Staff, Village Attorney and Village Engineer then have until fifteen (15) working days prior to the day of the Plan Commission meeting to evaluate the proposal and make preliminary comments and recommendations. The Village Staff, Village Attorney and/or the Village Engineer will notify the Developer or Agent, concerning the items for any changes and/or additional information necessary for the

Village Plan Commission review.

The applicant has until ten (10) working days prior to the Village Plan Commission meeting, to submit to the Village Administrator/ Clerk, Village Attorney and Village Engineer any additional information or corrections so as to be placed on the Village Plan Commission Agenda for that month. If the additional information requested is not submitted, it will be denied or removed from that months agenda if a written extension is received by the Village Administrator/Clerk and will then be placed on a future agenda

(d) The applicant has until six (6) working days prior to the day of the Village Plan Commission meeting, to submit 16 copies of the final request for development in the final form of a subdivision or certified survey map required for conceptual, preliminary or final action to the Village Administrator/Clerk or designee.

(e) The final request for development in final form, plus Village Staffs, Village Attorneys and Village Engineers and all pertinent review information will then be forwarded to the Administrator/Clerk or designee who will then forward the information to the Village Plan Commission members.

(f) The action of the Village Plan Commission will determine the course of action and the timeframe the Village Board will be using for their approval process as well as the need for the appropriate agreements and zoning adjustments needed.

(g) Any request for development in the form of a subdivision requiring action by the Village Board for conceptual, preliminary or final actions must be filed with the necessary application forms and relevant inforwith the Village mation Administrator/Clerk on Monday, four (4) weeks prior to the Village Board meeting at which action is required by the petitioner. (An exception may be made in reference for conceptual review, but shall not be less than eleven (11) days before the next Plan Commission meeting.)

The Village Staff, Village Attorney and Village Engineer then have until fifteen (15) working days prior to the day of the Village Board meeting to evaluate the proposal and make preliminary comments and recommendations. The Village Staff, Village Attorney and/or the Village Engineer will notify the Developer or Agent, concerning the items for any changes and/or additional information necessary for the Village Board

The application has until ten (10) working days prior to the Village Board meeting, to submit to the Village Administrator/Clerk, Village Attorney and Village Engineer any additional information or corrections so as to be placed on the Village Board Agenda for that month. If the additional information requested is not submitted, it will be denied or removed from that months agenda if a written extension is received by the Village Administrator/Clerk and will then be placed on a future agenda.

(j) The applicant has until six (6) working days prior to the day of the Village Board meeting, to submit 16 copies of the final request for development in the final form of a subdivision or certified survey map required for conceptual, preliminary or final action to the Village Administrator/Clerk or designee.

(k) The final request for development in final form, plus Village Staffs, Village Attorneys and Village Engineers and all pertinent review information will then be forwarded to the Administrator/Clerk or designee who will then forward the information to the Village Board members.

Items g and h may have the number of days adjusted if the Village Staff, Village Attorney and Village Engineer concur with such an adjustment.

(m) It is noted that the Village follow the turn around time frame as provided by State Law and that if the Village can not meet the 60 days or so because of not having the appropriate information/documentation the submittal would be rejected verses having an automatic approval forced upon the Village.

(n) It is understood that if all pertinent/necessary information is not submitted in the specified time action will be tabled or the approvals rejected (denied).

(o) It is also understood that if some information or other aspect of the review can not be met by the applicant or the village by Mutual Agreement the timeframe may be extended/adjusted.

(p) The Fee Schedule as set from time to time by the Village Board.

NOTE: Meeting information. The Village Plan Commission meets the 4th Tuesday of each month routinely, however some months the meeting may get canceled or adjusted by the Plan Commission. The Village of Kewaskum, Village Board meets the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month routinely, however some months the meetings may get canceled or adjusted by the Village Board. (Note: The possibility may permit the scheduling of special meeting of both the Plan Commission and Village Board if actual cost are paid by the developer/applicant.)




