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

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

Probable Human Case of West Nile Virus Infection Found in **Washington County**

MADISON - State health officials announced recently a new probable human case of West Nile virus (WNV). A Washington County man has tested positive for antibodies to West Nile virus by the Wisconsin State Laboratory of Hygiene. The sample will be sent to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for confirmatory

Because the patient traveled outside Wisconsin during the time in which he could have been infected, it is not possible to determine where he was exposed to West Nile virus. However, because Wisconsin has confirmed West Nile virus infections in animals this summer, he could have been infected while in state. Test results from the UW Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory indicated a horse from Washington County has tested positive for WNV. The horse was euthanized.

West Nile virus is transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. Although not all mosquitoes are infected with the virus, the best protection Wisconsin residents have against the disease is to reduce their risk of getting mosquito bites. Personal protective behaviors and reducing mosquito breeding habitat on your property are the best tools to prevent disease. Personal protective measures include:

- Limiting the time spent outdoors at dawn and dusk during mosquito season (June to September) or other times mosquitoes are active (until after a hard frost).
- Wearing light colored long sleeve shirts and pants, shoes, and socks when out-
- Applying insect repellents containing 30% DEET or less when outdoors.
- Making sure your home window and door

screens are in good repair to prevent mosquito entry.

Symptoms usually show up three to 15 days after being bitten by a mosquito. They can include headache, high fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, disorientation, tremors, convulsions, paralysis and coma. Healthcare providers are urged to be on the alert for patients who have consistent with West Nile virus infection. People who are ill should contact their healthcare provider.

Most people infected with West Nile virus will have no symptoms at all or display mild symptoms of illness. People over the age of 50 are at greater risk of developing severe illness. It is estimated that fewer than one out of 150 people who become infected will get severely ill.

In addition to taking personal protective precautions, Wisconsin citizens should make every effort to insure that they aren't growing mosquitoes in their own yards. Steps that can be taken to eliminate mosquito-breeding sites include:

 Disposal of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or similar water-holding containers.

Modern Woodmen Adds To Scholarship Program

Modern Woodmen of America recently expanded its fraternal college scholarship program for members, adding to the number and type of awards.

students, selected randomly from remaining qualified applicants, will receive onetime, \$500 awards.

A new grant program can assist students age 25 and over who are working toward an undergraduate degree or certificate from an accredited college, university, or trade or technical school. Modern Woodmen will present onetime \$1,000 awards to 10 students selected randomly from qualified applicants.

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





Anderson Wins KM Amateur Golf Tournament at Hon-E-Kor

KEWASKUM - Craig Anderson of West Bend got two sets of handshakes after Sunday's final round of the annual Kettle Moraine Amateur Golf Tournament at Hon-E-Kor Country Club

The first came when spectators watching the final hole on the White Nine learned Randy Warobick fin ished with a 73 Sunday for a 36-hole total of 147, one off Anderson's mark.

But, hold the phone, the congratulations were a bit premature as Paul Bartelak of Waukesha, playing in the foursome with Warobick, looked at his card and said he also finished with a 146, prompting a sudden death playoff for the championship crown.

After playing the first and second holes on the Blue Nine, Anderson's fellow Hon-E-Kor clubmates and others who followed the sudden death lined up again to offer their good wishes again. This time it was for real as Anderson's par putt found the heart of the cup on the 405-yard par-4 hole, right after Bartelak's comebacker lipped out.

The win gives Anderson, who coaches both the boys and girls golf teams at West Bend West High, a sweep of titles at Hon-E-Kor this summer. In May, he teamed up with Bruce Henning of Hartford to win the Two-Man Bestball, and on Labor Day weekend, he was convincing in the men's club championship at Hon-E-Kor.

Actually it looked as if Anderson would win the title on the first extra hole after sticking his approach shot a mere three feet from the cup. The putt broke slightly to the right, however, and caromed off the corner of the cup. Thus the two men moved on.

Bartelak had a longer drive on the second hole but his second shot nestled into the area between the fringe and the first cut of grass. He decided to go with his putter, but was a bit strong and the ball went seven or eight feet past the hole on his first try. Then he missed the par attempt coming back.

The Kewaskum Indians boys soccer team faced the bottom of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and the Little Ten Conference in matches last week with mixed results. In spite of winning two of the three games, the Indians learned that regardless of the respective records of the teams involved, the games had to be played where they mattered most on the soccer pitch - not on paper or in what-if scenarios.

The first game was on September 16 Tuesday, against the Falcons of Sheboygan Falls. The Indians started off the game aggressively when junior Noah Olla, after narrowly missing on his first attempt, netted a fine goal with his second shot. 

The Indians got the ball first. In high school overtime, each team gets four chances to score from the opponent's 10-yard line, and then the other team has the opportunity to match or beat that score.


