



News From The Capitol

Senate Eases Regulations on Business

Earlier this summer, the Senate created the Select Committee on Job Creation, which looked at ways the state, in particular the Legislature, can bring business and jobs here. The committee worked hard to come up with ideas and legislation that could be brought to the Senate floor this fall.

One of the areas the committee studied was business regulations and the per-mit process. The Senate recently passed three bills to ease regulations on business and streamline the permit process. The Small Business Regulatory Bill of Rights reduces the negative impact of regulations on small businesses and helps to spur the creation of more small business. Government regulations, many of them unnecessary and needlessly complex, are an enormous and costly burden for Wisconsin's small businesses.

This summer, the committee heard testimony from the regulated community and state regulators on the need for reform. The strongest theme that emerged from the hearings was that Wisconsin's permitting process is too cumbersome and time consuming. Business groups and state agencies agreed. In fact, Governor Doyle and members of his administration indicated have that Wisconsin's permitting process takes too long and is ripe for reform.

The permit deadline bill, which was also recently passed by the Senate, is the first step towards true regulatory reform and improving Wisconsin's business climate. This legislation will give job providers in the regulated community the streamlined process and

date-certainty they need to stay in Wisconsin. The bill makes no changes to environmental standards; rather, it gives the regulated community a fighting chance to get a ruling on their permit applications in a timely manner. In fact, under the bill, these permit deadlines will be determined by the agencies themselves.

Another piece of legislation recently passed allows a business or public entity to conduct a self-audit of their facilities to determine if they are in compliance with certain environmental laws. If they are not, they can reveal the results of the audit to regulators and agree to voluntarily eliminate the problem in a timely manner in return for reduced civil penalties. Currently, thirty-five states and the US Environmental Protection Agency have some form of this program in place. Thus, the bill is necessary in order for Wisconsin to compete with other states that currently have more flexibility in their environmental regulations.

The Select Committee on Job Creation will continue to hold hearings and look at creating pro-business initiatives. Some of the other issues they will be taking a look at are increasing venture capitol opportunities and improving Wisconsin's infrastructure to accommodate a growing economy.


John Warnecke of West Bend is playing for football for the 2003 Carthage College team in Kenosha.



'State Fair' Coming to Kewaskum



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

Well what was this? That's what those involved called it. I truly don't believe it was intended as anything else.



Challenge Will Push YMCA Campaign Over Goal

The Kettle Moraine YMCA \$1,000 or more will have their membership is expected to has received notice of a challenge grant from the Melitta Pick Charitable Trust, S. which will match \$1 for every \$2 raised in new or additional capital campaign pledges. The Trust will provide up to \$100,000 towards the YMCA Building on a Legacy campaign, subject to local donors' contributions between July 1 and December 31, 2003.

The campaign has already raised \$1.8 million and with \$200,000 in new donations the challenge grant will push the campaign over its \$2 million goal.


For example, for every \$1,000 in pledges, the YMCA will receive an additional \$500 from the Trust. Pledges up to \$20,000 per donor will be matched two-for-one up to \$10,000. Any pledge over \$20,000 will be matched at the \$10,000 level.

"This is just the kind of push we need to go over the top," indicated Vic Albiero, campaign co-chair.

The Building on a Legacy campaign will allow the Kettle Moraine YMCA to expand and renovate its current facility to accommodate its growing membership. The first phase of the \$2 million expansion is expected to be completed by February 2004 and will include a youth and family center, a larger interior lobby/check-in area and exterior plaza/gathering area, an expanded circuit weight room and "spinning" studio, and increased space for classes and other community activities. The second phase, which will be completed over the next five years, will include a recreation pool and expanded locker rooms.

"Let's face it, public budgets are strapped. We, in the non-profit sector have to step up to the plate if we are to continue investing in this community's social infrastructure," said Executive Director, Jon Lange.



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

In a game against the KHS Indians on Monday September 21 at Plymouth, they demonstrat-ed why. With crisp passing, good movement of the ball, uppering shocting and All unerring shooting and All-State caliber performances from Forward Ryan Vanderkin and Midfielder Nick Deering, the Panthers showed they are still the team to beat in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (despite dropping a previous game to Kiel.) 

Sophomores Jon Olla (defender) and Nate Kenworthy (Goalkeeper) both nursed sore backs which made their starts questionable, but both decided to tough it out and have a go. Junior Midfielder Noah Olla immediately buoyed the spirits of the Indians by taking a beautiful pass from Senior Adam Hickman early in the game and striking it solidly into the back of the net. This was the third goal of the year for Olla whose solid runs are starting to pay off with goals.

refused to concede defeat and actually controlled the pace of the game for much of the remainder of the match. With a 1-0 lead at halftime, Kewaskum relied on courage and solid defense to carry them through in the second half. Senior Aaron Olla once again lead the way for the Indians with his attacking speed and aggressive play to the ball. Time after time, Olla would make the seemingly impossible run to clear the ball effectively.

On the referee's whistle, the KML striker hit the ball squarely sending a rocket shot flying toward the box. Kenworthy fought off the two forwards as he leaped high, fully extending himself to forcefully punch the ball clear of the goal and preserve the win for Kewaskum. This sealed one of the best per-formances of Kenworthy's two-year high school soccer career and rewarded all the Indians with a 1-0 win for their perseverance and hard effort as a team. However in the second half, Kiel showed their true mettle as they scored two more goals to earn a hardfought 3-0 victory. While the Indians failed to score on Kiel's Goalkeeping-phenom Brad Konz, they still played aggressively with good efforts in relief roles from Freshman Jacob Cochran, Sophomore Jon Radzitis, Junior Todd Warnecke and Senior Shane Harlacher in the goal. The Indians faced off against Kiel on Tuesday, September 30, and will face Sheboygan Falls on Thursday, October 2,




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
