Rev. David Wernecke Installed First Elementary Early At Salem and St. John's UCC

The Kewaskum Board of Education approved three new courses for the high school and four early release dates for the elementary schools at Monday night's board of education meeting.

The first date for an early release day for the KSD elementary students will be Wednesday, October 29th. Keith Kriewaldt, director of elementary education stated that the staff enjoyed having these days to work together on things they don't normally get the time for. Kriewaldt also stated that the teachers are required to be in the building during the in-service hours.

The board also approved three new classes for the high school. Christine Horbas, KHS principal, presented seven new courses. After much discussion, four of the courses were put on hold until the next meeting because the board felt that one of the courses needed to be changed and the others the board wanted costs for. The courses approved were Advance Physical Fitness, Web Page Design and Principles of Food Science.

Mr. Dave Bertelson was on hand to ask the board for approval for a band / choir trip to Orlando in March. The board approved the trip wishing them well. The group will leave on March 24th and return and be in school on March 30.

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

Elementary students created colorful posters for the KEYS run/walk as a new activity this year. First place winners were displayed at te registration headquarters for all to admire.

Staff members at all Kewaskum public and private schools publicized the rce, created motivating activities to increase registration, collected and organized all registrations at their buildings, and packaged boxes of t-shirts and race numbers for their teams to be distributed at each of the schools. Businesses had captains who also formed teams and distributed race day materials to their members.

On race day many other volunteers assisted by setting up the race course, donating and setting up refreshments for runners and walkers, collecting race day registration and pledges, helping hand our race numbers and shirts, and assisting with timing the race and recording results.

The management of a race with over 800 participants is a monumental task and could not be handled without the assistance of so many willing and helpful volunteers from our wider com-



News From The Capitol

Family Planning Waiver

One of the most offensive areas of increased government intrusion is in the right of parents to instill their own values in their children. The state of Wisconsin began earlier this year to provide free birth control, and other family planning services to girls as young as fifteen without parental knowledge. Sadly, this was largely caused by Tommy Thompson, both in his former capacity Governor and now, Secretary of Health and Human Services.

In 1997 a coalition of liberal legislative Republicans and Democrats inserted a provision in the budget requiring the state to apply for federal grants for family planning services to women aged 15 to 44 from families below 185% of the Federal Poverty Level. This would be about \$16,000 for one person and \$28,000 for a family of three.

The no-longer conservative Governor Thompson refused my request to veto the provision. Then, Thompson's own administration ignored legislative intent and decided not to count a teenager's parents income in determining poverty. Since almost no high school students make over \$16,000 a year, this clearly was an effort to make the pill available to every fifteen-year-old girl in the state.

The program is funded with 90% federal dollars and 10% state dollars. The federal Department of Health and Human Services under Donna Shalala did not grant the request over the final three years of the Clinton Administration.

Unfortunately, in 2002 with former Governor Thompson as President Bush's Cabinet Secretary the waiver was approved and the program was implemented by the Doyle Administration earlier this year. Under federal law, agencies receiving these funds will not be able to require any parental notification.

The program is horrible for two reasons. First, authority figures who approve of contraceptive use for teens inevitably encourage sexual activity, as they break down teen's natural reticence regarding sex. This

means more disease, more emotional problems and more pregnancies.

Some people may doubt the last statement, but in Britain, a similar program was temporarily shut down for a year and a half for legal There was no reasons. increase in pregnancies. The idea that a fixed number of teens will always engage in sexual activity has also been proven false over the past few years, as the AIDS epidemic and abstinence education has resulted in decreased pregnancy rates and sexual activity among teens.

The second concern is as to who the providers are. Planned Parenthood and similar organizations are the primary advocates and presumably financial beneficiaries of this program. A review of a Planned Parenthood website for teens will quickly show they cannot be expected to encourage any religious values when discussing appropriate sexual behavior.

Are these groups who you would trust to advise your fifteen year-old daughter?

I have tried to terminate this program and the committee I am co-chairing has introduced a bill restricting its use to adults. The Doyle Administration advocates for the program. In my opinion, the current department is showing embarrassment over the program in that their primary defense appears to be focusing on health care services related to health care check-ups and sexual diseases, which are incidental to, but not the primary intent of the program.

Some of our freedoms are specifically stated in our Constitution. I believe some freedoms were so taken for granted they weren't listed. A right closely related to the freedom of religion is the right to instill your values in your children including your religious values. For our state and federal governments to generously fund and encourage organizations whose values are an anathema to most parents is an outrage that must be stopped.

Hickman showed Senior leadership as he was involved in practically every aspect of Kewaskum's Sharp passes, success. attacking defense, smart onfield communication are all hallmarks of a mature player and they were certainly part of Hickman's arsenal against Sheboygan Falls.

If the exemplary play of Senior stars is somewhat expected on the athletic field, the emergence of a young star is always a welcome surprise. Freshman Jacob Cochran earned his first start of the year on Thursday and quickly
