motorcycle she was driving and a full size pick up truck.

The crash occurred at around 9:26 p.m. on Auburn Lac County's ninth 2004 traf-Ashford Drive less than a half mile from CTH V.

Brenda A. Harter was driv-

ing her Harley Davidson motorcycle when she allegedly attempted to pass a vehicle in front of her. While passing she collided with a truck driven by Scott S. Ebert, 29, of Kewaskum. The two vehicles crashed and Harter was thrown from the motorcycle.

Harter was taken to St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du-Lac where she was pronounced dead.

Ebert was carrying an adult female passenger who required medical transport. She was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital where she was treated and released. Two child passengers were also involved in the crash.

Campbellsport fire and EMS responded to the scene along with Fond du Lac paramedics and West Bend Ambulance.

Sesquicentennial a Hit in Boltonville

As Abraham Lincoln spoke from the steps of the Modern Woodmen Hall, Union and Confederate soldiers surrounded the crowd. With their rifles at their sides, they listened to Honest Abe tell his story, surrounded by a community celebrating its own.

Thousands of people took a step back in time last weekend to celebrate Boltonville's Sesquicentennial, which featured everything including, pancakes, polkas and prayers.

"Everything went very well," said Ann Enright who chaired the arrangement committee. "The comments very were we got positive...We had people from 13 states, plus several members of the Bolton family came from Virginia, Texas and California."

On Saturday, after a Mayoral Proclamation and a pancake breakfast, many people participated in the Dump Run/Walk to the old dump-

site on Paradise Drive. Surrounded by swimming pool and palm trees, members of the Steier family donned in Hawaiian shirts greeted participants. Everyone who "Found Paradise at the Dump Run" received a Hawaiian Lei.

The encampment on the banks of the Mill Pond had a steady stream of history seekers. Encampment members mingled through the crowd at the Firemen's Park in character and costume.

"The people filled the grounds both days," Enright said. "We had people spending hours looking through the genealogy display."

The children's tent was also a big success, Enright said. "We got so many thank you's from the parents." Activities included making butter, yarn dolls, spinning buttons and shelling corn, and guessing the gadgets

The country music on Saturday was a big hit and Sunday's Celtic music was also popular.

Dean Schmidt's horse-

drawn carriage rides throughout Boltonville went off without a hitch. The extra bit of history made the ride educational and enjoyable.

The walking tours also went well, Enright said. One popular tour spot was Tom's Old Country Mill, which is also 150 years old and the reason for Boltonville's existence. "Boltonville was founded because of Stony Creek," Enright said. "The town was built around that mill." She said Ben Wierman, was delighted to show his great grand kids the mill that great grandpa used to live in.

Norbert Dettmann's cemetery tours were also well attended. Dettmann is a member of one of the founding families of Boltonville. Enright said during each cemetery tour, Encampment members gave a gun salute to honor all of the veterans buried in the cemetery. According to Enright, there are several Civil War Veterans buried in the



Town of Scott June Meeting News

Town of Scott residents will now have the opportunity of viewing the monthly meeting agenda as early as two days previous to the meeting.

State statutes require that postings be done no less than 24 hours in advance of the meeting. At it's annual meeting in April, several citizens inquired of the possibility of having the agenda posted by Saturday at the recycling building. This would eliminate having to return on Sunday to look at the agenda.

The board has passed a resolution requiring that the agenda for the regular monthly meeting of the town supervisors be posted 72 hours (Saturday and Sunday included), prior to each meeting.

With the new posting time, the deadline for agenda items must also be changed. The clerk must be notified 96 hours prior to the Monday night board meeting. The board meets on the second Monday of the month, so agenda items must be at the clerk's office by 7 p.m. on the Thursday before. In order to comply with the law, items received after the 7 p.m. deadline will be delayed until

the next months meeting.

A Town Board order to clean up the former Wisconsin Pallet Co. property in Batavia has been ignored. The property is filled with pallets and other debris and is considered a nuisance. A letter is being sent to Community Bank Officials, informing them that if it is not cleaned up within the next 90 days, the town will hire someone to do it and costs will be placed on the tax roll.

Paperwork for placement of a 250 ft. communication tower proposed to be placed on town property near the Scott Community Center has been placed on hold for the time being.

It would be erected on the southwest corner of the property abutting the area which has been set aside for the Batavia Fire Department building site. Jim Weinmann, representative for US Cellular met with the board on June 3rd and will be obtaining more information before final arrangements can be completed.

Purchase of a used crack filling machine for \$3,500 from NR Asphalt, Highway 144, West Bend is being considered. Supervisor Ira Weber would like to be able to "try it out" for 10 days before making an offer to purchase.

By a 4 to 1 vote, NR Asphalt has been awarded the contract to seal coat the Scott Community Center Parking Lot for \$950, and the Town Hall property for \$1,275. Supervisor Bruce Birenbaum was the no vote.

An increase for sludge spreading applications is being considered along with some possible changes in the sludge ordinance will be on the July agenda. Currently the hauler pays \$75 per site, per year. A new rate may be determined by acreage.


Knee High by the Fourth of July? Not This Year!





Charm Can be Found Most Everywhere in Spain

How will I possibly be able to condense 10 whirlwind days of fun and adventure into one story? What words would be best to describe Espana and its people?

It sounds like a couple of \$1,00,000 questions, yet I

jumped out of bed the day after arriving back home and thought, I've got it, Spain is charm. It is (en)chantment, and churches and, last, but certainly not least, churros.

So what made Spain seem so We charming? need go no farther

than our first stop, Madrid, to answer that question, starting with several of the people we crossed paths with during our three day stay there.

One was Tonio, our waiter in the Plaza Mayor, and there was the little Spanish woman who volunteered her opinion on a good restaurant in the area, and Miguel, the waiter at that good restaurant, and finally the LSU professor I sat next to during the plane ride home from Madrid to New York City.

The Plaza Mayor was one of our favorite stops on the trip ... we felt drawn to go back there because of its charm. Just looking around at this mammoth edifice -I'm guessing it was 150 yards wide and at least 185 yards long with beautiful red brick walls covered on one side with murals and a huge statue — and thinking that over the centuries, authors, philosophers and artists spent time there, discussing their work or perhaps politics or maybe even the cost of Sangrias.

The art of conversation is a strong trait of the Spanish people, and we observed they appear to use their hands as much as their mouths in getting their points across. And the more excited they get, the faster

they talk. Tonio made our visit to one of the outdoor cafes in the Plaza a delightful experience. He had a winning smile and the ability to relax his customers and make them feel like family. Since Midge and I spoke very little Spanish, we just had to sit back and watch as he bantered with Carrie, the teacher who chaperoned the Hartford Union High group we were a part of. She would relay some of the things he would say, so we could all enjoy the cultural exchange.

When Tonio brought the bill the second night, Carrie started laughing when she looked and saw 1,200 Euros for the total. It was a joke, and after watching her reaction, he presented her the real bill, which was a lot less..

On our final visit, Tonio posed for a picture with our group ... the job description probably includes obliging tourists with smiles, and he asked that we send him a copy, which we intend to do.

Large umbrellas dot the Plaza during the daytime when the sun beats down on the brick flooring, but when

nighttime comes, the umbrellas are taken down in favor of white torch lights that certainly add to the decor. Then comes the music, luring those who have finished work to sit down and enjoy a beverage and some of

the delightful Spanish food.

I decided to sample a little of everything while I was in Spain and everything included squid, mussels and even an appetizer with octopus. Some were better than others, but at least I can say I gave them a try.

With Madrid serving as home to nearly 4 million people and several million visitors each year, restaurants are plentiful, so plentiful you are confused about which one to pick.

Our little group of five must have looked confused as we surveyed the streets for our initial dining experience. Enter, a sweet little woman walking slowly down the cobblestone street with a cane to steady herself. She approached us and said to try the Rodriguez a couple blocks away.

We took her advice and were not disappointed. The squash soup and Gazpacho were delightful, along with the fish, and oh yes, the desserts.

Luncheons turn into quite an experience in Spain. For eight Euros (the equivalent of about nine American dollars), you receive a choice from the salad/soup line of offerings and then there are from six to 25 entree selections.

A beverage and dessert are also included but oddly enough coffee is not always offered, nor is ice automatically provided with cola or the bottled water. We quickly got in the habit of asking for ice. Warm soda does nothing to quench one's thirst, especially after we had been walking through a museum or church for several hours.

At Rodriguez, Miguel was very helpful in explaining their specials of the day, and again Carrie was able to carry on a light conversation with him. We certainly missed her on our second trip there. When she and Samantha, one of the Hartford students, went shopping, Midge, Mike (tall Miguel), the other Hartford student, and I were left to fend on our own.

Miguel saw us come in and quickly found us a table, but then he asked why we were just tres (three) and not cinco (five) that day. He remembered ... another charming quality that didn't go unno-

We had another excellent lunch there ... if I were a restaurant critic (and at one establishment, we joked about telling the owners I work for a large metropolitan newspaper), it certainly would have received four

The airplane food, on the other hand, was just a two, but the return trip became a lot more enjoyable after I struck up a conversation with the woman next to me. She teaches 20th century Spanish literature and poetry at LSU.

When she asked how we enjoyed our trip, I remarked how impressed we were with how the Spanish people enjoy life. A native of Spain who has only lived in the U.S. for several years, she offered her own personal observation of people in the two countries. "Americans," she said, "live to work," while the Spanish "work to live."

It was a true and charming description.

Looking over this column, it appears I never reached the topics of (en)chantment, churches and churros, so it looks like another one is in order for next week, and hopefully with pictures, so you too can see the beauty we experienced in Spain.



'Keeping the Promise' Aid Reimburses Special Education Costs in 136 Districts

MADISON - State Superintendent Elizabeth Burmaster announced the payment of \$2 million in federal funds to support 136 school districts in educating students with disabilities who have extraordinary needs.

The Kewaskum School District received this grant in the amount of \$2,598.

"In our democratic society, we believe that all children are entitled to a quality education. However, some of our students have severe or multiple disabilities that require very specialized equipment and instruction that can cost three or more times the average expenses of educating a student," Burmaster explained. "The allocation of this discretionary federal money is a first step to help school districts that lack sufficient state or federal special education funding to serve their students. As a state and nation, we must keep our promise and provide funding to educate our children with disabilities."

Federal law requires a free appropriate education for every child and includes an authorized funding level to pay 40% of per pupil expenditures. To date, Congress has contributed as little as 6% in some years and never more

than 18% of special education costs, falling far short of its promise to children with disabilities.

Last September, Burmaster announced the "Keeping the Promise" initiative, which allocates federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) discretionary funding to reimburse school districts as well as three cooperative educational service agencies (CESAs) and three county children with disabiliboard education (CCDEBs), providing services to students from 27 other school districts. This new aid program is serving students from 136 school districts statewide. "Keeping the Promise" high-cost special education aid is outside state revenue caps.

"Children cannot wait for state and federal policymakers to solve funding issues related to special education," Burmaster said. "This initiative represents a reprioritization of federal discretionary funds to address a critical need. It extends immediate help to support all children by providing special financial assistance for students with disabilities who need extra services to achieve to their highest potential."
