Highway 144 crash sends two to hospital

Schlegel said, he tried swerving but collided with the mini van driven by Biever. Both victims were taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend by Kewaskum Rescue Squad.

School board spends over \$302,000 on technology

Before serving at what will be their last meeting outgoing school board members Mary Meisser and Steve Schmitt were honored by fellow board members for their service. Meisser was the eldest board member serving for a total of 10 years. Schmitt served one, three-year term. Each were given a desk clock and a certificate commemorating their service.

The board quickly got through the traditional agenda items before approving spending \$302,440 on technology education equipment upgrades. Back in January of 2005 the tech ed teachers were given the nod to go ahead and start pricing technology upgrades to their current equipment. The teachers noted that some of the equipment was more than 60 years old. In March, the group came to members of the finance, transportation, building and grounds committee and presented their list of items.

Several options for financing the purchases were discussed. Ultimately it was decided that \$106,955 set aside in the maintenance budget for the replacement of boilers at the high school would be transferred and the district would get a 10-20 year loan for the boiler project.

The board voted unanimously to approve the budget transfer. They then looked at making the actual purchase.

On a unanimous recommendation, the board approved the

purchase. The remaining monies needed for the purchase would come from a fund balance. The equipment would be in place for the 2005-06 school year.

Business Manager Paul Reichert got the board's feet wet in regards to the upcoming budget. He presented a balanced, working budget to the board.

In that budget he noted that the district would see a slight decrease in state aid. Reichert stated that he sees an estimated 2% increase in the tax rate. The combined estimated rate is \$9.01. That rate however did not include anything from the recently passed referendum.

The final tax rate will be released in October. The rate could decrease if property values increase more than two percent.

The preliminary budget shows a 3.8% increase in total compensation for teaching staff and administrators. If a contract is settled at more than 3.8%, the difference will need to come from the fund balance.

Open enrollment again plagues the district as 172 Kewaskum students have opted out of attending Kewaskum Schools. Last year's open enrollment requests were 141 students. This is anticipated to cost taxpayers \$986,922.

More information will be brought at the May meeting. The budget needs to be adopted by the board by June 30.

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Fire destroys shed in Town of Wayne

The Kohlsville Fire Department has been more than busy the last few weeks. Their latest call to duty was a shed fire at 6950 Mohawk Road, the property is owned by Gordon and Julie Darmody.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department received the call at 4:13 p.m. on Saturday, April 9. The shed was completely destroyed, as was the contents inside it. Two pieces of farm equipment, a chopper box and spreader were also destroyed.

A report from the Sheriff's Department stated that 16' x 24' wooden structure being used to store fire wood for a near by exterior mounted, wood burning, home heating system.

Hot coals from the wood heating system were suspect in causing the fire. There were no injuries received while combating the fire.

Kewaskum and Theresa Fire Departments assisted with water at the scene. Damage to the equipment is estimated at \$1,300. Fire personnel were on the scene for about one hour.

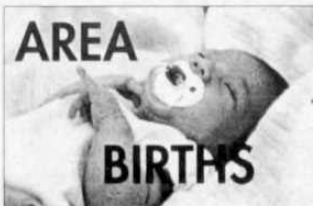

New Kewaskum Town Board members ready to serve

The Town of Kewaskum has some new leadership complimented by some veteran officials. One of those veterans, Sandy Stern kept her post as Town Clerk. This was the second time Stern faced opposition for the clerkship.

Stern took over for long serving town clerk, Barb Wenzlaff who was on the job almost 30 years. Two years ago, while facing her first election, she came out on top just as she did in this election.

This year Stern faced Yvonne Boettcher. She beat Boettcher almost two to one. Final tallies had Stern at 208 and Boettcher behind at 138.

"I'm glad it's decided so

I can go forward (for the town). It's a busy time of year for the clerk," Stern said.

Political newcomers Ellis Kahn and Ellen Dettwiler are excited to begin their respective positions. Kahn will be Town Chairman and Dettwiler will be supervisor with William Butzlaff. Kahn, who ran unopposed, received 261 votes. Butzlaff and Dettwiler received 230 and 205 votes respectively.

Treasurer, Daniel Stoffel, who has run unopposed for the last 25 years, garnered 306 votes.

According to Stern, it was a "good" turnout. She said 367 voters turned out for the race. The town has around 900 registered voters.

Elizabeth Burmaster narrowly escaped defeat in

the town. She won by 15 votes over Gregg Underheim. The end result was 181 to 166.

Town voters put their trust in John Kenworthy, as he was the top vote getter in the Kewaskum Board of Education race. He received 178 votes. Sally Cochran fell right behind him with 177. Stalwart Jean Goeden followed with 174. Bob Loehr received 163 and Stephen Jensen received 125. Town residents put one of their own at the bottom of the list, as Bette Poulos received 71.

Dettwiler's first order of business will be a meeting at the Wilmer Schmidt property today (Thursday). She will join fellow supervisor Butzlaff as the two point out, in clear detail, what needs to be cleaned up on the property.

The candidates will be sworn in at the next town meeting to be held on Monday, April 18.

The Kewaskum School Board approved the resignation of Assistant Kewaskum High School Principal John Wolfenberg. After spending the last nine years in the district, the School Board is revamping Wolfenberg's job.

"My contract was reduced from 12 months to 10 months and the school board said they were going to reevaluate the position," said Wolfenberg who wasn't keen about an apparent move down the ladder from administration to a job as

dean of students. The school district said they cut the Vice Principal's job for budgetary reasons.

Wolfenberg said he is actually excited. "It's been my privilege to work in the Kewaskum School District and right now I feel exhilarated to be looking at something else."

Superintendent of Schools, Wayne Graczyk stated he had no information regarding the format or structure of the dean of students position.

He said, the Dean of Students role isn't confirmed since the evaluation will be done by both the

H.S. and Asst. H.S. principals and a Dean of Students traditionally isn't an administrator so s/he can not evaluate.

In closed session Monday, at their monthly meeting the school board discussed what their plans are for the vice principal's position.

Four accidents result in fatalities

A graveside service was held Tuesday for 18-year-old Jacob Sand from Hubertus who was killed in a two-car accident in the Town of Erin. He was the first victim in a fatal accident this year in Washington County.

A dual funeral will be held Thursday in Thiensville for the two couples killed in the train-van accident in Dodge County over the weekend. Gerald and Carla Niedzgiecki of Hartford and Sidney and Betty Elm of Mequon died when their vehicle was hit by a train in the Town of Elba.

A traffic engineer looked at signs and barricades off Highway 60 and 16 following the fatal train accident. The crossing is closed for construction, however neighbors stated vehicles can still get through. Officials said the van passed through at least three barricades and "Road Closed" signs. Reports also confirm the train crew properly sounded their horn to warn that the train was approaching.

Authorities have also released the name of the man killed in an accident last Friday outside the Circle B on Highway 60. Authorities stated 78-year-old Bruno Arndt of Menomonee Falls died after being hit by a pickup. It was Ozaukee County's second fatal accident of the year.

There was another fatal accident Sunday in Dodge County. A woman from Neosho was killed when the vehicle she was riding in crashed off Hochheim Road in Theresa. The driver, from

Theresa, was ejected from the vehicle.

Man involved in chase charged

A Fond du Lac man who led Washington County authorities and Kewaskum Police Officer Mark Steiner on a chase last month, has been charged with attempting to elude an officer. The 19-year-old remained in jail on a \$2,000 bond. If convicted, he faces nine months in jail and a \$10,000 fine. The chase on March 29, began in Campbellsport and continued into Washington County. The man, Juan Carbajal, was eventually stopped when authorities threw down spikes off Mohawk Road in the Town of Wayne.

Recount in Mid-Moraine Judges race

There will be a recount in the Mid-Moraine Municipal judges race. John Grundahl has been declared the winner, however, official totals have him beating Janet Heins by 45 votes. Heins stated on Tuesday she will file papers requesting a recount. She says she knows statistically it is not likely there will be a change in the final results, but she says she owes it to the voters to make sure the numbers are accurate. Because there is only a half percent difference in the final tally, the recount will be conducted at no charge by the county. Right now, John Grundahl has been tabbed to take the seat previously held by Judge Darryl Laatsch.

Feingolds to divorce

Wisconsin Senator Russ Feingold's chances of being-elected president may have gone down the tubes. Feingold and his wife have announced they are getting divorced. Analysts say a "twice divorced single man" stands very little chance of being elected president. Feingold and his wife had been married for 14 years. The only divorced man to win the White House was Ronald Reagan.

First quarter home sales flat in county

First quarter home sales were rather flat in Washington County. According to the Greater Milwaukee Association of Realtors, the average sale price in Washington County was \$278,600. The average price was up a mere \$428 compared to a jump of \$6,422 in Waukesha. Officials say it's

too soon to know why there is such a difference. Nearly two-thirds of homes sold in the Milwaukee County area in the first quarter were in Milwaukee.

Tornado Awareness Week April 18-22

Governor Jim Doyle has proclaimed April 18-22, 2005 as Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin. The campaign is to remind people of the dangers associated with tornadoes, thunderstorms, flooding and hail and to encourage citizens to take protective safety measures.

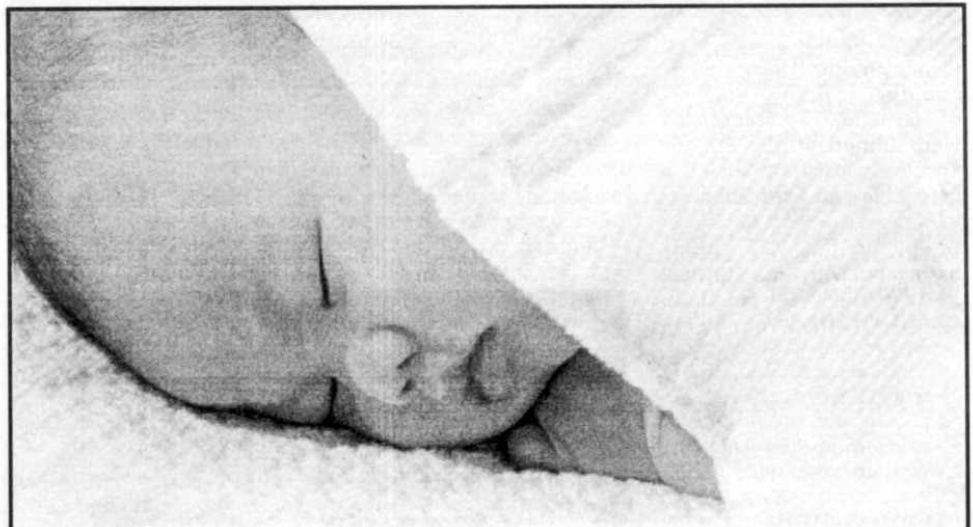
"We hope all citizens take time to learn about the threat of severe weather and know what to do and where to go when severe weather strikes,"

Last year, the National Weather Service confirmed 36 tornadoes in Wisconsin, including 17 which hit on June 23, 2004. One person was killed when an F3 tornado hit his home in Green Lake County. The June 23 tornado outbreak is ranked fourth all time highest number of tornado to hit the state in one day in Wisconsin.

To encourage citizens to be prepared for severe weather, Wisconsin Emergency Management and the National Weather Service are once again promoting Wisconsin's Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week. The statewide tornado drill will be held on Thursday, April 21, 2005.

Many schools and businesses participate in the annual daytime drill. Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and Wisconsin Emergency Management have distributed tornado and severe weather information to schools.

Willie and Jean Goedeon of Kewaskum may not be in the picture but were closely associated with Alan Kulwicki as he drove for the couple in the short track circuit in

Kaukana in 1983. "Willie was already in competition for the championship in the modified division and we asked Alan to drive our car," said Jean Goedens.

Kulwicki mastered the ASA circuit and then mobbed up to NASCAR. Jean Goedens remembered Kulwicki was pretty intense about his racing. "He would have my sons working out in the rain at a pit stop in order to get it down pat as to how many seconds we would be in the pit," she said. "When there were races I would be on the timing clock telling him how

many seconds he would be behind the leader, how many seconds he had to the next position and how many seconds it was per lap," said Goedens comparing Kulwicki to another Wisconsin champion, Matt Kenseth.

Kulwicki raced for the Goedens through 1984. Willie said Kulwicki was very down to earth, Jean said it was a learning experience for both parties. "Alan was on a crash cycle when he raced with us," she laughed.

"We would no sooner get the car put together and he would crash it. But, that was racing and that gave us a true feeling of family life, and what it was like to be together for the good times and the bad times."

The Goedens of Kewaskum met Alan Kulwicki through his dad, who built engines for Goedens' race cars. Jean said they kept in touch with the Kulwicki's as Alan's success increased and it was then heartbreaking news when his plane crashed. "Somebody called us about the news and of course, with it being April 1st and April fools day, it was hard to believe," she said.

The Alan Kulwicki movie relates the racecar driver's setbacks and his triumphs. The movie opened over the weekend at theatres in Hartford and Saukville.

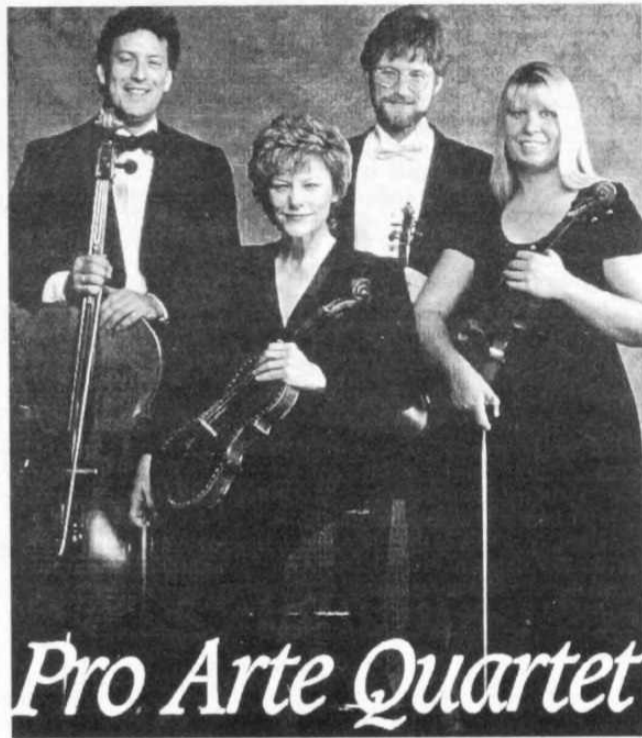

Local governments receive share of fuel tax, registration fees

As part of his ongoing "Grow Wisconsin" initiative to support economic development and encourage job growth, Governor Jim Doyle has announced that quarterly checks totaling \$96.8 million for General Transportation Aids, Connecting Highway Aids, and Expressway Policing Aids have been mailed or electronically transferred to Wisconsin units of local government.

The Governor said that the April payments from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) included \$93.3 million in General Transportation Aids to 1,923 units of government; \$3.2 million to 123 municipalities for Connecting Highway Aids; and \$260,200 to Milwaukee County for Expressway Policing Aids.

Local communities receiving aid include: Village of Kewaskum, \$28,667.38; Town of Ashford, \$28,401.56; Town of Auburn, \$19,860.56; Village of Campbellsport, \$19,545.15; Village of Eden, \$5,557.86; Town of Addison, \$28,862.37; Town of Barton,

\$20,453.68; Town of Farmington, \$29,222.81; Town of Kewaskum, \$17,926.06 and Town of Wayne, \$24,318.12.

This year, local governments will share an estimated \$387.2 million from the state transportation fund to build and maintain local roads and bridges, and in Expressway Policing Aids that support the Milwaukee County Sheriff Department's patrol of Milwaukee expressways. Quarterly payments are sent the first Monday in January, April, July, and October.

"A quality transportation system serves as the foundation that keeps Wisconsin's economy moving forward," Governor Doyle said. "These quarterly aid payments reflect the state's commitment to help municipalities maintain our local transportation network."

General Transportation Aids help defray the costs of constructing, maintaining, and operating roads and streets under local jurisdiction. Connecting Highway Aids reimburse municipalities for maintenance and traffic

control of certain state highways within municipalities.

Communities also receive state transportation fund revenues for public transit, elderly and disabled transportation, and airport and harbor development from WisDOT. State and federal funds will also be allocated for specific highway and bridge construction projects.

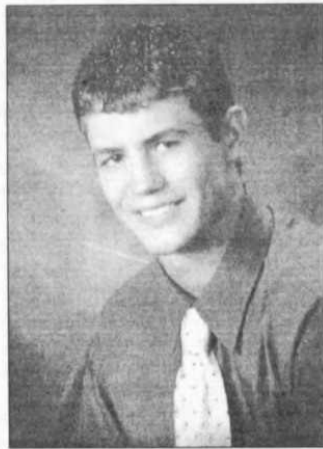

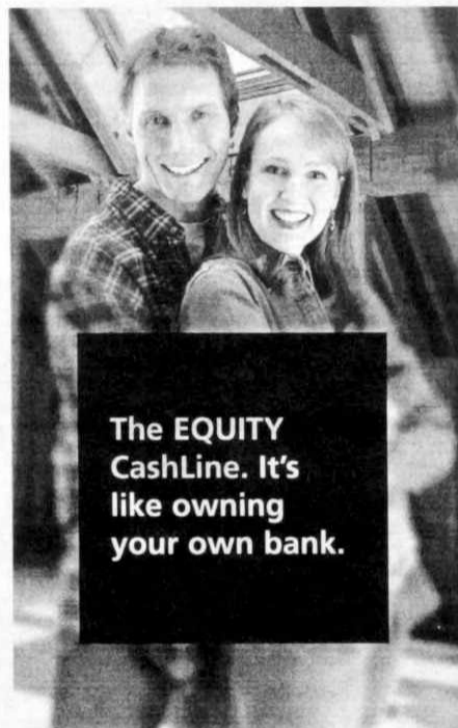

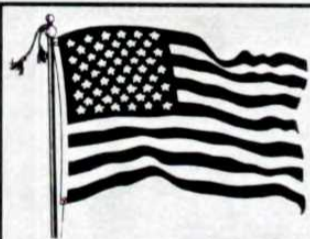

Shrimp, Corn and Sweet Potato Soup
1 red onion, chopped
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 tsp. minced garlic
1 green bell pepper, seeded and chopped
2 cups diced, peeled sweet potato (yam)
1 (16-ounce) bag frozen corn
1 (15-ounce) can cream-style corn
1 (10-ounce) can chopped tomatoes and green chilies
1 (6-ounce) can tomato paste
4 cups fat-free canned chicken broth
1 1/2 pounds peeled, medium shrimp
Salt and pepper to taste
Sliced green onions (scallions), optional
Coat a large pot with nonstick cooking spray and sauté the onion, celery, garlic and green pepper until tender. Add the sweet potato, frozen corn, cream-style corn, tomatoes and green chilies, tomato paste and broth; bring the mixture to a boil. WHEREAS, the Borrower has represented that the project would consist of the construction of an approximately 53,000 square foot addition to a manufacturing facility located at 8565 Hwy. 45, Kewaskum, Wisconsin, the purchase and installation of equipment therefor (the "Project"), and payment of certain issuance costs; and

WHEREAS, the Borrower is responsible for construction of the Project and will be the owner of the Project upon the completion of construction; and

WHEREAS, section (11)(b)1 of the Act contains provisions requiring competitive bidding for certain construction contracts; and

WHEREAS, section (11)(b)2 of the Act empowers the governing body of a municipality to waive the requirements of section (11)(b)1 with respect to a particular project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. For the following reasons, the provisions of section 66.1103(1)(b)1 of the Act are hereby waived with respect to the Project.

(a) Construction of the Project is the responsibility of the Borrower and the Municipality will not control the costs, construction or operation of the Project.

(b) No public funds will be extended for the construction or operation of the Project.

(c) The public purpose of requiring competitive bidding for public works is not applicable to the Project in that no general funds or tax revenues of the Municipality will be used.

(d) The public purpose of the Act is better served by allowing the Borrower to have complete control over contracts for construction of the Project.

2. The Clerk shall cause the foregoing resolution to be published as a class 1 notice under Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 985 in the official newspaper of the Village of Kewaskum.

No new taxes... Unless you smoke!

Remember when politicians used to say "NO NEW TAXES"? I bet if I asked any "baby boomer" they could even tell me of a time when politicians promised they would "lower taxes." Did you notice this summer, when politicians were in full swing; they said they "would hold the line on taxes!"? I think even a few said they would curb new spending.

Well, once again we believed those low-tax preachers. It only took six months for them to forget about telling us they would "hold the line on taxes." In fact, I'm starting to think there's something in the air in Madison, or maybe it's in the water. Well, whatever the case, it has apparently affected the memory of a few state lawmakers who think that just because they may not raise our property taxes too high they can go hog wild with a few other things.

In last week's Statesman, Judy Steffes reported on a proposal by lawmakers to raise the cigarette tax by a \$1. Now, I don't smoke, in fact, I find the habit to be a little on the disgusting side. But hey, maybe a smoker would find my coffee drinking habit disgusting!

And, you know, we aren't talking a few dimes and nickels here either folks. Last Wednesday, April 6 an email went out to all our legislators in Madison from Representatives Jake Hines (R-Oxford), Curt Gielow (R-Mequon), Sheldon Wasserman (D-Milwaukee) and Senators Carol Roessler (R-Oshkosh) and Bob Jauch (D-Poplar) asking for \$1 per pack and 57 percent of the manufacturer's list price for chewing tobacco.

These fine legislators have our best interest at heart, of course. The email sent to the legislators say they plan on having some of the money generated put into the medical assistance fund. The grants are used to fund the QuitLine, research, local coalition education efforts, youth education, evaluation and monitoring of programs and assisting pregnant women to quit.

It's funny; I thought these Republicans had the idea that less government is a good idea.

Exactly why do we, as a state, need to spend \$10 million annually on these programs? While we're at it, why is it we have to have a Quitline? (The Quitline is a phone line dedicated to helping people quit smoking) Isn't that something that could be handled through a hospital or medical organization? Why must I, a Wisconsin taxpayer, spend money on a phone line when Sally Smoker can go down to her local pharmacy and buy some Nicorette?

Senator Grothman stated, "their faces dropped." He concluded, "This is just a proposal for legislators who can't say no."

Freshman legislator, Rep. Pat Strachota (R-West Bend) stated that she has had a number of people calling her urging her to support the proposal. She says she is open to looking at the bill, but only as a last resort. She concluded by saying, "My first priority is cutting spending."

I must point out, at the end of the day, you have to give credit where credit is due. The legislators who are proposing this tax have our most prized possession at heart. The children, and we all know when it's for "the children" it must be good legislation. The writers of this proposal stated that according to Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids we could save 24,500 children from pre-mature death by enacting this tax hike.

Indians taking steps toward earning 1st win

Like the saying that refers to a toddler learning to walk, first come the small steps and then, with time, comes running.

That is about the approach coach Jeff Gosse has to take with his 2005 edition of the Kewaskum High girls fast-pitch softball team. Before the Indians get to the running part, Gosse has to be satisfied with making small steps, one game at a time.

Last Thursday, in their Eastern Wisconsin Conference opener against Plymouth at Kiwanis Park, the Indians were more secure in their steps but still had to settle for scoring four runs and getting five hits in a 10-4 loss.

"We're improving," Gosse said. "This was a good pitcher (Lindsey Grahn, who won first-team all-EWC honors last spring), and we hit her pretty good tonight."

Kewaskum's big inning came in the fourth when it scored four runs on four hits.

Becky Weber got the rally going when she drew a walk, then April Lettow was hit by a pitch and Theresa Trott and Courtney Uttech followed with RBI singles.

Pitcher Rachel Breese was up next and helped her own cause with a single that scored

two more runs.

The Indians' offense sputtered after that, however, as Grahn did not give up a hit or run or walk the rest of the way.

Kewaskum's other hits came right away in the first. With two outs, catcher Amy Holm hit a sharp double to left-center, but Grahn got sophomore Becky Heberer to hit a little dribbler to third for the final out.

Breese gave up nine hits, including three by Jena Jaeckels, who had two RBIs, and leadoff batter Stacy Volbrecht, who had two hits and two RBIs. Breese also walked six and struck out five Panthers.

Still, Gosse is convinced his starter is pitching well. "That's three games in a row she's pitched well, and we let her down," he said, referring to the team's seven errors, including three errors and four passed balls. "They count as errors ... Errors killed us."

Gosse was happy his team, 0-1 in the EWC and 0-3 overall, had a week to rest his pitcher and work on defensive play before entertaining New Holstein this afternoon (Thursday).

"We've got to give Rachel a long breather. She's pitched 19 innings in less than a week," Gosse said. "You can tell her arm is hurting."

East, the Lady Indians spotted the host Suns a big early lead, then settled down and played better ball the rest of the way in a 10-3, non-conference loss.

After falling behind, "I brought Rachel in for the third inning. She gave up one hit the rest of the way. She shut them down."

Track teams not quite ready for prime time

The first outdoor track meet of the season gave Kewaskum High track coach Jerry Gosa some clear messages on his two teams.

Gosa learned Thursday he has a few topnotch athletes who should have great seasons. He also has some athletes with a lot of promise, but there are also a lot of Indians who fall in the inexperienced category, and they will have to step up for the teams to do well.

"It definitely was not a great meet for Kewaskum," Gosa said Friday, reporting the girls finished second behind Plymouth 66-62 in the triangular meet held at Plymouth. Kiel wound up third with 50, but Gosa said the Raider coach held out a lot of her stars for Saturday's WFFF (Wisconsin Track and Field Federation) state indoor meet in Madison.

On the boys side of the ledger, it was Plymouth solidly in front with 91 points, while Kiel was second with 54, and the Indians, now hampered by several athletic code violations, last with 38.

The girls nearly won the competition. A disqualification in the 4x100 meter relay kept the Indians from earn-

ing the points needed to finish first.

"They were winning it ... on the fourth leg, Lindsay Keller went to hand it off to Kelly Uelman, and Kelly just took off too soon," Gosa said, indicating those things happen early in the season and are correctable.

"Kelly won the 100, and that's a highlight," Gosa went on about Uelman's solid dash in the 100 meters in a time of 13 and 62 hundredths (13.62) seconds. Jessie Butler wound up third in 14.25, so that helped the Indians score seven points in the event.

Another good event was the 200 where Uelman and Keller placed second and third with respective times of 29.10 and 29.54.

Senior Amanda Donath came up big in the 400, winning in a time of 1:01.59. Donath, who was on last week's state honor roll with the fastest indoor time of any Division 2 athlete (1:00.85), also helped the 4x200 relay to a first place in 1:57.26. Other members of the victorious quartet were Katie Patterson, Keller and Butler.

"Amanda ran real well again," Gosa said about Donath, who also placed second in the long jump with a leap of 14 feet, 7 inches (14-7).

The Lady Indians also won the 4x400 relay in 4:30.80.

Making up this foursome were Butler, Patterson, Keller and Uelman.

Other firsts by KHS athletes were: Patterson in the pole vault, (8-6); freshman Elizabeth Potter in the 300 hurdles (51.85); and Sam Drose, high jump (4-8).

A key second place came from Erika Brock in the shot put (32-3.25), and Claire Spang added a third in the discus (82-10).

"That was her best," Gosa said of Brock's throw. "It's the first time since 'CoCo' Herman that we've had anyone go over 30 feet."

Senior Eric Nass had kind of an up-and-down day for the boys. He easily won the 400 with his clocking of 54.75, which was a full two seconds ahead of Ross Bender from Kiel and 2.02 seconds ahead of teammate Zach VanWormer (56.77).

Nass never got over to the triple jump in time to measure his steps, however, and ended up not placing in that event at all.

Gosa was understandably disappointed this happened because Nass holds the school record in the triple jump and wants to improve in the event this year.

The KHS coach was pleased with Bob Gibson, who finished second in the 1,600 in 4:47.10.

"For Bob, this was his personal best in the mile," Gosa said. "He had a nice run."

Another big effort came in the high jump where Luke Herriges cleared 6-0 to win. "This is the second time this year he has cleared 6 feet ... the first time outdoors," Gosa said. "It's something to build on."

The foursome of Garrett Donath, Chad Hackbarth, Jake Sabel and Nass won the 4x200 relay in 1:31.75.

Donath also did well in the pole vault, winning with a height of 11-6, despite being slowed by illness.

"I had some sick kids ... Garrett was sick," Gosa said, and, "Too many kids didn't have their heads on straight."

Hackbarth also placed third in the 100, sprinting the distance in 12.25.

Gosa had learned early in the day three consistent place winners had turned themselves in for code violations. That left holes in the weight events, the 800 and the pole vault. Two of these athletes will be suspended for two meets, and the other is out for half the season, Gosa said.

Kewaskum teams are at Kiel for a triangular this afternoon (Thursday).

Their work kept the pressure off goalie Josie Abfall. "We kept the ball off her tonight,"

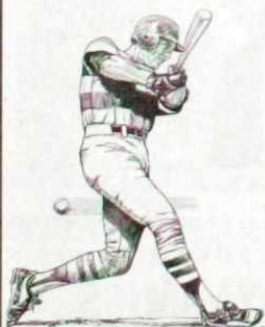
Gutbrod said after Thursday's win.
