Former T. Wayne clerk passes on

A faithful community servant to the Town of Wayne was called home to his Lord on Monday, April 25. Orville Kern, 81, who tirelessly served the township in the capacity of Town Clerk was laid to rest on Wednesday, April 27.

According to his wife, Ruth, Orville served the town for 28

years. He retired three years ago this April. Family members say since his retirement, Orville enjoyed playing cards. Through his card playing he was able to continue being with people, one of his great passions while serving as town clerk. Since retiring he also expanded on another one of his favorite interests, spending time with his wife of 56 years and their children and grandchildren.

One of the several town chairmen he worked under was Carl Hohlweck, who served as town chairman for 18 years. "He (Orville) was the greatest friend to work with, he never argued, he was an excellent clerk."

Hohlweck stated he knew Kern for over 50 years. He was very

saddened when he learned of Kern's death Monday morning. During his tenure as clerk Orville oversaw the building of a

During his tenure as clerk Orville oversaw the building of a new town hall in 1986 and was a strong advocate for the interests of long-time residents of the township.

In addition to his duties as the town clerk, Orville was instrumental in assisting with the planning of the Town of Wayne's 150 year anniversary in 1998.

Village changes emergency siren's daily test pattern

While many Village of Kewaskum residents are thankful for the emergency sirens heard during the occasional inclement weather during the summer, one resident is questioning the validity of testing that siren daily.

For many village residents who have lived in the village their entire life, that noon "whistle" is part of their day. Those who have one of those "whistles" in their back yard aren't so happy around noon. One of those residents, Ryan Hill, spoke out against the testing at the April 18th Village Board meeting.

In an email sent to village officials and this newspaper Hill stated, "The siren affects me because it's on my lot line and seven days a week we have to make sure we are inside to shelter our ears from the over powering siren. Our only saving grace is that it turns, so our house is not shaking throughout the whole siren time."

At their meeting, village trustees agreed that the running of the siren daily might do more harm then good. It was decided that the transmitting system would be tested daily. The siren will sound only on Saturdays at noon.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel stated, "After checking with other municipalities it was found that most only check the siren once a week." Knoebel stated that this change is expected to take place this Saturday, April 30.

Costly phone calls for Kewaskum PD

Kewaskum Police are refusing to take phone calls from the Milwaukee County Jail after receiving a shocker on their phone bill last month. Chief Dick Knoebel says they fieldedseveral collect calls from Lara Strack. She's the woman from Random Lake who is facing charges of killing a man in a car accident, following a police chase last December. Knoebel says Strack is trying to get the department to drop a warrant for her arrest. The warrant is related to an outstanding traffic ticket.

Strack's collect phone calls cost the Kewaskum PD \$38. Knoebel says they don't need to waste taxpayer money on that sort of thing and they're not dropping the warrant.

Strack is being held on \$100,000 bail. She faces up to 28 years in prison if convicted on the felony charges.

Flashing signals by Pick N' Save now covered

Black hoods are now in place on the traffic signals at Hwy. 33 near the West Wood Mall. The city of West Bend had been having problems with the lights. Earlier this month the engineering department said the traffic flow on Hwy. 33 was actually working better with the flashing signals in place. They said they would hold off on

making costly repairs to the conduit and experiment with leaving the signals on blink. Along with the hoods over the lights, the city has put up stop signs at the exit of Pick N' Save North.

Home burglaries in county

West Bend Police say a home owner in the 800 block of Eastern Avenue reported a large amount of cash stolen. Police are still investigating.

Germantown Police say a man was assaulted and cash stolen from his home on Bridle Path. The incident happened around 12:30 Tuesday morning. The home was ransacked and the victim was treated for minor injuries. Police have no one in custody.

Also Police in Menomonee Falls are working on an armed robbery at a gas station that occurred last Monday night.

Two reliever routes selected for Hwy. 60

Two primary reliever routes have been selected to help ease congestion on Hwy. 60 through Hartford. The Northern route shoots up Highway K near Kettle Moraine Drive. The Southern route includes Pioneer Road and Waterford Roads. A public hearing will be held this summer.

Washington County Supervisor John Kohl asked that the Hwy. study stop because he believed it was unfair to landowners to cut a road across their property. Kohl says the County wouldn't be able to pay the farmers - as all they have right now is an assumption that Federal and State funds would be available. Kohl was alone on his idea.

The City of Hartford has already agreed to contribute \$1 million to a Northern Route. Supervisor Mark McCune abstained from voting on the Southern route proposals, because he is a property owner. McCune says now that they're down to just two options, he'll vote on the remaining plan.

Lomira man in court

The latest on Kyle Gornjak, the Lomira man facing charges for a series of home invasions in Fond du Lac and Dodge counties. The 21 year-old will be in Fond du Lac County court this week. 

Trip to Alaska highlighted successful hockey season for Roeske

When he was four years old, Alex Roeske was pictured in an area newspaper, on his inline skates, hitting a hockey

puck down Brooklane Drive. Roeske's blooming hockey career had just begun.

Now 12, Roeske, who is a seventh grader at Kewaskum Middle School, is still practicing his hockey ... but at a lot higher level. His skates are real. He practices on the Pettit Ice Center three times a week, in addition to playing two or three games a week. The opponents are a lot bigger and faster, but he accepts the challenge and loves the game.

Several weeks ago, Roeske and his Wisconsin AAA team traveled to Fairbanks, Alaska to play in the USA National Hockey Championships for 12-year olds. They earned the right to play in Alaska after winning the state championship at the Blue Line Ice Arena in Fond du Lac, then winning the regional tournament which was held in Madison.

In the final game at state, Roeske was the man-of-the hour, scoring the goal that sent the game into overtime, which the AAAs eventually won 2-1. It came against Madison Capitols, rivals," according to Roeske, who has the nickname "Draper."

In the regionals, the AAAs defeated highly regarded hicago Mission 3 to St. Louis Amateur Blue 0-2, but came back to defeat the Blue 3-2 in triple overtime to take the title.

Roeske's team wound up going 2-2 in the tournament in Alaska, besting the host Fairbanks Arctic Lines 4-1, then disposing of the Alaska All Stars 4-1 before losing a heartbreaking 3-2 decision in overtime to the Pittsburgh Hornets and bowing out with a 2-0 defeat at the hands of the Syracuse Stars.

We got there (Fairbanks) at four in the morning. We had to play later that day," Roeske said, recalling the plane trip from Chicago to Anchorage to Fairbanks.

Going up against the host team was no easy draw, but Roeske, who moved up to play with the AAA's first line during the state competition, played like he had been rested for a week.

"I had two assists," he said, and his mom, Michelle Oertel, proudly reported an article in the Fairbanks newspaper, the Fairbanks Daily News Miner, described her son as being "a slick-skating spark plug."

Game 2 turned out about the same for Roeske, except he had a goal to go with his two assists in this one.

The loss to the Hornets was tough to take, according to Roeske, who said it determined "what seed we would

The AAA team was pegged as the second seed, but unfortunately came up with a rather lackluster effort against Syracuse.

"We didn't wake up. We started to wake up in the sec-ond period," Roeske said, indicating the team was already down 2-0, not a good position against a team with an outstanding goalkeeper,

"The shots we had were quality ... They could have gone in, but with the goalie they had. He wouldn't let them go in. He was awem

The losses didn't keep the Wisconsin representatives from having a good time, however. Just the contrary was true, according to Roeske, who said during their week's stay, "We went to a big ice sculpture place ... I went to the hot springs, and we went dog sledding. That was fun. They

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

To The Residents of the Kewaskum School District,

As many of you know, at our School Board meeting held on April 11, 2005, the Board took action to improve our Tech Ed Department. While a number of residents feel that this was long overdue, there are some that are asking where the money came from. There are some who think, since the recent referendum passed, the money for this project is coming from there. This is NOT the

In October of last year, we had money left over from several sources such as utilities, salaries and leases that the Board allocated to other funds. There was \$133,455 that had been transferred to the maintenance fund. There was \$26,500 which was used to help pay for an engineer to draw up the specifications for the new boilers for the High School this year. That left us with a balance of \$106,955.

When it was learned the dire straights our Tech Ed Dept. was in, the committee that I chair, Finance-Transportation-Building & Grounds (FTB&G) asked our Tech Ed Dept. to present to us a proposal that would enhance that department and replace the much needed and outdated equipment, some of which is over 60 years old and that we can no longer get parts for.

They were asked to bring us back hard numbers, which they did. The total cost came to \$302,440.56. After exploring ways to finance this, the FTB&G committee decided to recommend to the full Board that we transfer the \$106,955 from the maintenance fund and add money from Fund Equity in the amount of \$195,485.56 for a total of \$302,440.56 to fund this project. This then was approved by the entire Board at our April meeting.

In using money from Fund Equity, I would like to point out that by Board Policy, we have to maintain at least 10% of our operating budget in Fund Equity, which we have done. It should be further noted that a year or so ago, there was a referendum put before the residents which included money for the Tech Ed Dept. in the amount of over \$402,000. That referendum failed. This money that the Board just authorized, represents money that YOU the taxpayers, have already paid and the district was able to save over time. It makes no sense to wait and see if this would come up on a future referendum.

By doing what we have done goes a long way in keeping with our motto, "where children come first." It will give our students the tools they will need to succeed.



Dead Run by P.J. Tracy



.Here's something fun to do on a Saturday afternoon this summer: go exploring on a few of those tiny, meandering roads that go nowhere. You know... those roads that criss-cross Wisconsin like a bunch of loose threads on an old quilt. You might get lost while you're just idly running around, but this is Wisconsin, for cryin' out loud. You can ask any local how to get back home and you know you'll get a straight answer.

Or will you? What if all the locals were gone and the town was empty? Pretty eerie, huh? Find out where they went in the new novel "Dead Run" by P.J. Tracy (c.2005, Putnam).

It's a beautiful day in Four Corners, a little burg in way northern Wisconsin, and Tommy Wittig is on his way to visit his Grandpa Dale down at the shop. Four Corners is the name of this little stop on the road, but it's kind of a misnomer. There are only two corners in Four Corners, Hazel's Diner and Dale's gas station, but it's otherwise a typical little flyspeck on the map. Everybody knows everybody else, and most folks around there are farmers, so nobody thinks twice when a dairy truck barrels down the road, takes a sharp turn, and rolls over.

Back in Minneapolis, FBI Officer Sharon Mueller has asked the Monkeewrench team to help her with some unsolved crimes in Green Bay. School Board Member Monkeewrench - Grace Mc-Chair FTB&G Bride, Annie Belinsky, Harley

Davidson, and Roadrunner - don't usually take on cases like that, but they're doing these as a favor to Sharon. The murders may be the work of a serial killer, and Sharon knows that if these long-cold cases can be solved, Monkeewrench will solve them.

On their way to Green Bay, Grace's SUV has engine problems, and the three women set out on foot to look for help. Taking an old logging road, they think they find civilization and telephones. Instead, they stumble upon a silent town devoid of people. No animals. No vehicles. No sounds. Exploring this very-recentlyabandoned town, the women are amazed to find absolutely nothing. Nothing but a bunch of men in uniform, clutching M-16s and talking about the "mission" and the thousands of people who are going to die in a few short hours.

I normally don't like a story that has so many characters. but while this one could be a little confusing- I forgot who was who a few times - I liked this book. Author P.J. Tracy is actually authors, plural; a mother and daughter team whose writing will make you laugh one minute and make you gulp the next minute. At least twice, I was so caught up in the story that I had to stop and remind myself to breathe. If you love a good mystery thriller, then this is the book for you. "Dead Run" is the perfect book to take with you on a Saturday afternoon, when you're just running around.

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
