

### School board open meeting violation investigated

The Statesman has uncovered a possible Open Meetings law violation with a Kewaskum School Board member. The violation comes in the form of a Friday, May 6 email sent to the school district's attorney and then sent to all the school board members.

This writer filed an open records request on Friday, May 27 with the Kewaskum School District after being tipped off that a Kewaskum School Board member may have been conducting business through email correspondence.

The Statesman first learned of this at a meeting held May 9 when the School Board reorganized after the spring election. At that meeting freshman board member John Kenworthy announced his candidacy for school board president. Incensed, Kenworthy alluded to the email saying that school board officers were chosen in advance of the meeting.

That email was sent by former board president, Jean Goeden to the school district's attorney, Paul Hemmer. She later copied the rest of the school board members on it. The email, by Goeden states, "And by the way. Neal (Weare) and I have discussed the officers' elections. We are giving Gordie the Presidency, Tammy the VP, Me as clerk... And Beth as Treasurer...I told them all we have to show unity... to the leadership team and the public. We will be

### Graczyk focuses on positive, retires as superintendent

This was the best place to work, the best kids, staff and community," said Wayne Graczyk, Kewaskum's outgoing Superintendent of Schools, in an exclusive interview early Wednesday morning. But he adds, "It was a good time to leave the district."

Wayne Graczyk, has submitted his letter of resignation to the Kewaskum School Board. He has been on leave for the last week and a half.

He stated the district is in good fiscal condition and test scores are up. This leaves a smooth transition for an interim superintendent and makes Kewaskum an attractive place for a permanent one. Graczyk stated he thought 'Kieth (Kriewaldt) would be a great interim superintendent."

In his letter, Graczyk states his resignation becomes official as of June 30, 2005. He further added he tenders the resignation for the purpose of retiring. He came to Kewaskum in 1999 from the Hustisford School District.

The Statesman contacted the School District Tuesday morning and officials stated that an announcement will be made at the June 13th School Board Meeting. At that meeting board members will discuss attaining an interim superintendent. Watch this newspaper for more details.

Graczyk stated even though he is retiring, he is not ruling out working in a parochial or post secondary school setting. In closing, Graczyk stated, "Nothing about this is negative."



working out more over the weekend, but as of now... that's how it stands.

In defense, Goeden said, "The sole purpose of the email was to identify the board members willing to accept the board officers. Nothing was predetermined in advance.

Wisconsin's open meeting law requires that all governmental meetings be preceded by a public notice, be held in places reasonably accessible to the public, and be open to all citizens unless certain exceptions apply allowing the meeting to be closed. Notice of an official meeting must be provided to the public, members of the news media who have filed a written request for such notice and the official newspaper. The notice must be given at least 24 hours in advance unless good cause is given but no less than two hours.

The open meetings law also applies to any committees, board and commis-

sions created by a governmental body. A meeting is defined as the convening of members of a governmental body for the purpose of exercising the responsibilities of that body. If one-half or more of the members of a governmental body are present, the meeting is rebuttably presumed to be for the purpose of exercising the responsibilities or duties of the body. Wisconsin Courts have interpreted the law to apply even when there is less than onehalf of the body present if the gathering is for the purpose of engaging in governmental business and the number of members present is sufficient to determine the parent body's course of action on the subject being discussed. Engaging in governmental business includes taking in information as well as making decisions.

According to The Statesman's legal

counsel, the email in question clearly violates Wisconsin's open meetings

In an interview, Kenworthy stated, "What happened to spur my strong reaction that night (at the meeting) was that earlier on that day I had received an email, which Mrs. Goeden had forwarded to all Board Members. That message contained within a series of messages that she had sent back and forth to the School District's legal counsel about another matter. However, as part of one of her emails to the attorney, she felt compelled to further tell him (without his solicitation) of the juicy political gossip."

Kenworthy went on to say, "I always thought that the Board VOTED on the officers, but now we discover that she has decided they are hers to GIVE and furthermore that autocratic act on her part will somehow show unity. My gosh, if this is unity, who the heck wants it? I

believe that respectful dissent and the intelligent dialectic will better shape the direction of this district than homogeneity and a facade of unity. We have serious issues here; it does no one any good to gloss over them with surface and false niceties."

This is not the first time the Kewaskum School Board has had problems following open meeting laws. In 1996 then board member Ruth Schmitt requested charges against board member Neal Weare. Schmitt charged that proper notification was not given for a special meeting held to award a contract for an interim superintendent. According to the Washington County Clerk of Courts, that charge was dismissed with a few stipulations.

Editorial Comment: We do not normally condone making a big issue of negative publicity but we were reminded the integrity of the school district's official newspaper also comes into play. We therefore felt compelled to report this news to our readers.



# Village begins smoke testing Kohn's Citgo gets



Per a DNR directive, the Village of Kewaskum, has retained the consulting engineering firm of Ruekert/Mielke, to conduct leakage tests of the sanitary sewer system. Those test began on June 7th.

The purpose is to help locate places where clear water could possibly be entering the Village's sanitary sewers. A door hanger explaining this testing will be delivered to

each property prior to testing.

The testing consists of forcing a special, non-toxic smoke into the sewer.

The smoke is manufac-tured for this purpose and leaves no residuals or stains

Direct contact with the smoke may cause minor respiratory irritation in some people.

If people in your building have asthma, emphysema, or some other respiratory conditions and are planning to stay in the building during the test-ing, contact Steve Zaleski from Ruekert/Mielke on his cell phone at 262-965-1090 or Arlyn Kurth at Ruekert/Mielke's office at 262-542-5733, so that we can discuss your case in further detail.

To avoid smoke from unnecessarily entering your structure, it is advised for

residents to run water into all of the drains for one minute. especially those used infrequently

Smoke should not enter your structure unless:

Vents connected to your building's sewer pipe are inadequate, defective, or improperly installed; or

Traps under sinks, tubs, basins, showers and other drains are dry, defective, improperly installed or missing;

connections and seals of the wastewater drain system in and under your building are damaged, defective, has plugs missing, or are

improperly installed.

If you do see or smell smoke in your structure, immediately report it to the testing crew or contact Steve Zaleski from Ruekert/Mielke on his cell phone at 262-953-1090 Arlyn Kurth at Ruekert/ Mielke's office at 262-542-

Do not be concerned if you see testing smoke coming from your rooftop sewer vents; this is normal.

A 23 year-old West Bend man was charged June 1 with armed robbery after he allegedly threatened a man with a gun. Police say the incident, which happened May 27, was reported May 31. Allegedly the 23 year-old man put a gun to the throat of an 18 year-old and de-manded his necklace. The conflict reportedly stemmed from "bad debt." The 23 year-old was taken into custody. He is facing charges of armed robbery, carrying a concealed weapon and recklessly endangering safety. Nobody was injured during the incident.

# Hearing held for teen accused of throwing baby in lake

A preliminary hearing was held last week in neighboring Sheboygan county for a woman from Plymouth who is accused of putting her newborn in Lake Michigan. Sarah Duenk, 18, appeared in court on felony charges of concealing the death of a child and misdemeanor charges of failing to report a death and obstructing an officer. A liaison officer at Plymouth High School was the one who reported the case. Duenk initially told police the baby girl was stillborn. Authorities say she changed her story several times and then confessed she put the child into Lake Michigan. So far, the body of the child has not been found. If Duenk is convicted she faces up to 31 months in prison.

#### Sheriff's Dept. to sue biker group

The Washington County Sheriff's Department is suing the organizers of last summer's National Bikers Roundup. The event was held at the Washington County Fair Park last August and drew about 15,000 bikers. The Sheriff's Department says they're suing the group because they still owe about \$30,000 for nearly 1,000 hours of security. The hours included more than 200 hours when shots were fired and a portion of the park had to be shut down.

This is going to be a tough claim for lawyers to solve as the organizer of the event who signed contracts with the Sheriff's Department died of a heart attack last September.

Last week the Statesman reported that hundreds of people turned out Tuesday in West Bend hoping to win a dream home. The drawing was held as part of a fundraiser for the Kathy Hospice.

Tom and Patty Krebs now have two weeks to decide if they want the \$332,000 home or \$150,000 in cash. There were a bunch of other winners as the raffle included over 100 cash prizes. Harriet Cain from West Bend went home with \$1,000. Other \$1,000 prize winners included Erin Rodman from West Bend, Dorothy Atchison from West Bend, Raymond Boesel from Glenbeluah, Ruby Bever from West Bend, Richard Wick from Jackson and Patrick Griffith from Glendale, Arizona.

Winners of \$1,000 included Kathleen Hurst from Mukwonago, Harriet Cain from West Bend, Tom Baker from West Allis and Matthew Spreeman from West Bend.

Chris Constantine from Oak Creek won the \$10,000 second prize. The \$5,000 prizes went to Daniel Case from West Bend and Jeffrey Porter from Saukville.

#### Mid-Moraine Municipal court looks at buying more space

The Administrative Committee for the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court says they want to buy space rather than continue with their lease in Jackson. The court currently leases a spot at the Tillie Lake Business Center. The idea to buy is receiving support from city leaders around Washington County however officials in Cedarburg are against the plan.

Mid-Moraine Municipal court handles citations for 13 communities in Washington and Ozaukee counties. Currently, the court pays approximately \$34,000 in rent. The county's building committee has been instructed to draft a proposal to explore building purchase options.

# Woman pops football and lands in jail

Fond du Lac County has been dealing with some interesting cases. A man and a woman are facing charges after they allegedly stole a ferret from Bubby's Pet Store.

In another case, a 25 yearold woman was arrested after she popped a small inflatable football being played with by some kids in her neighborhood. Police say the woman was wanted on warrants and that's why she was taken to jail.

Also a man claiming to be from the United Kingdom was busted for apparently trying to run a scam on the Country Inn and Suites. Police say the man sent an email last month looking for 35 rooms for 20 days. The man issued a cashiers check for nearly \$63,000 that turned out to be counterfeit.

#### County endorses Samaritan Health Care program

Washington County supervisors are deciding whether to approve \$2 million in borrowing to build an apartment building adjacent to the Samaritan. The 24 unit facility would specifically be assisted living for elderly residents in the county. Ed Somers said the facility would "Hopefully generate sufficient

revenue to fully repay borrowed funds plus interest within 20 years." He also said the project would be completed at no cost to taxpayers. The county's finance committee has already given the plan an OK. They'll meet to officially vote on June 14th.

# Mayville woman facing charges of identity theft

Debbie Spittel, 42, of Mayville, is facing charges of identity theft in Dodge County court. Spittel is accused of buying \$370 worth of items using another woman's debit card. Spittel allegedly went shopping on ebay. If convicted she faces up to six years in prison and \$10,000 in fines. Her next court appearance is July 14th.

# WB July 4th parade back on

The Statesman announced June 1 that this year's 4th of July parade in West Bend has been saved. Parade Chairman and Seventh District Alderman Terry Vrana said a bunch of Veterans were talking after the Memorial Day parade and they thought it was a shame the 4th of July parade had been cancelled. "It got us thinking and we decided to wing it and take out a permit," said Vrana, who is hoping the rest of the community will step forward as well. "Basically we are asking people to just show up that day," he said. "We don't have time to do a lineup, so if people would show up behind Badger Middle School at 9 a.m. we'll organize things as we go."

Vrana is organizing the parade with a handful of Veteran's groups including the Barton and West Bend VFW Posts, The







I've done all the above, although the gift wrapping bit has gone by the wayside. Picking tape off fur is no fun.

Yes. I might be a little nuts about my dogs, but I'm not alone. In "No Dogs in Heaven?" by Robert T. Sharp, D.V.M. (c.2005, Carroll & Graf), you'll read about a veterinarian, his patients, and the people who love them.

A little while after finishing graduate school, veterinarian Bob Sharp decided it was time to settle down and be an owner of a business instead of an employee. When he heard of an established veterinarian practice that was for sale in Hillsboro, Ohio, he decided to check it out.

On his "tour" of the business - which was actually a half-day of farm calls and a tour of the county - Sharp noted that almost every farm on every road had a story connected to it. That man is afraid of snakes, and somebody pulled a practical joke on him This family had a cow with milk fever. Down that gravel driveway, a woman lives with dozens of dogs, all of them named "Brownie". Over there, someone's cow fell down a

Sharp quickly realized that if he bought this business, a whole community full of unique (and possibly eccentric) animal owners came along with it.

Sharp bought the business, and now he has stories of his own to tell.

For over twenty-five years, Dr. Sharp has cared for critters and their people in southern Ohio, and this book is full of what I'm sure is only a mere fraction of the stories he could tell. Down there is a trailer that sticks out over a creek. Inside, Sharp once saw a sick calf that lay on a sofa while it was being treated. Over there, a woman took in dogs that no one else wanted, until the county shut her down. Back here, a little girl insisted that Sharp take a look at her hedgehog that had a sore foot. Down there, Sharp met the Beast that turned out to be a beauty.

And speaking of beauty... what a beautifully-written little book!

Author Robert Sharp is orn story-teller, and "No a born story-teller, and Dogs in Heaven?" is a delight. Some of the tales Sharp tells will make you laugh, some will make tears come to your eyes, and some will make you shake your head. I loved every bit of this book, though. Reading it was kind of like eating popcorn: I just couldn't stop.

# UW falters in NCAA races, but Gosa has great rowing memories

If anyone thinks there is sacrifice in participating in high school athletics, they should talk with Colleen Gosa, who just wrapped up four years on the University of Wisconsin women's rowing team. There is ten times the commitment required at the collegiate level.

Gosa was home this week for the first time since January. With early morning and afternoon practices, competitions, travel, and carrying a load heavy in the sciences, there isn't much, if any, free time.

Anyone who has ever seen a rowing race knows the competitors are absolutely spent after a race. The athletes have to be at peak aerobic condition to participate, and hours of training go into the six- or sevenminute races.

Still, Gosa, who lettered in the sport the past two years, would not trade the experiences she was able to enjoy as an intercollegiate athlete ... even considering she and the other seniors on the rowing team missed their college gradua-

"We had 10 seniors on the team. We all decided to compete," Gosa said, explaining the graduation date fell on the same day as the Central Regional that was held in Tennessee.

The decision panned out well for Gosa and her teammates, because they did so well in Tennessee, they received an invitation to the NCAA finals in Rancho Cordova, California. The Badgers did not fare well in California, however, finishing 12th out of 12 teams in the race for the team title, after placing 11th a year ago.

California ended up asthe team champion with 67 points, four ahead of Virginia. Ohio State had the best finish of the Big Ten schools, placing fourth with 42, and the Badgers picked up 13 points, eight of which came from the varsity four team, which had a successful outing at the CSUS Aquatic Center on Lake Natoma, placing a program-best fifth.

In the first race of the competition (on May 26th) for Gosa's varsity eight boat, "We were kind of caught by sur-

It was really close. They were down going into the last 500 and just put on a great charge. They needed one more stroke to overtake Michigan State. It was a fabulous race from the top three boats...

# Donath sparkles in state meet, Under latest proposal, only finishes 2nd with record time

The stars from Kewaskum High came out in the daylight Friday and Saturday in the Division 2 portion of the annual

State Track and Meet Field held in Crosse.

Shining the brightest among the Indian qualifiers were seniors Amanda Donath and Eric Nass, along with one of the boys' re-

lays, the girls 4x200 relay and pole vaulter Garett Donath.

Amanda Donath

The Kewaskum girls team, behind Donath's stellar second in the 400-meter race, and the seventh by the 4x200 relay, scored 10 points to finish 27th in the Division 2 standings, while the boys came up with 6.5 points, which put them in 43rd overall.

KHS coach Jerry Gosa said he was proud of all the efforts of his athletes, especially Donath, who worked extremely hard this winter and spring.

Gosa had remarked last week he figured Donath would be following Caitlin Dodge of Dominican and hoped everyone else in the finals of the 400 would be chasing Donath. That's exactly how the race unfolded.

Dodge won with a sparkling time of 56 and 76 hundredths seconds (56.76) - she was even faster in the qualifying Friday with a 56.41 - then came Donath giving it everything she had for a 58.08.

The day before, when it was a lot less windy, she set a KHS record of 57.75 to earn a spot in the finals.

"Amanda ran very well ... a 57.7. That's a very good time," Gosa beamed, reporting Donath's time at state last year was 59.5, so she dropped nearly two seconds this year.

When asked if Donath planned to run in college, Gosa said, "Yeah, she's going to run for UW-Oshkosh.

Nass made it to the victory podium and earned three points for the boys with his sixth place in the 400. It came on a fine time of 50.84, which included a .10 drop from Friday's preliminaries

'I still don't think he's come close to hitting his potential," Gosa

said of Nass, adding he came a long way in the last two years.

All season long, the goal of the boys 4x400 relay was to make the top six and they were successful, finishing sixth in 3:27.52, a little bit slower than Friday's time of 3:26.17, which was fourth best in the

preliminaries. Making up this quartet

# Waupun would join EWC

More people were happy after last week's athletic conference realignment meeting than they were coming into the session, which was another step to determine the future of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and a couple of its members.

The meeting was run by Deb Hauser of the WIAA,

According to information provided by Kewaskum Athletic Director Jason Piittmann, Kewaskum is pleased with the latest proposal, which has Two Rivers remaining with the EWC, Waupun taking the place of Roncalli and Chilton staying in the Olympian League.

Because of the wide gap in enrollment between itself and at least four of the current members, Roncalli officials want to leave the EWC and probably will get its wish if the latest plan goes through. This plan has Roncalli going to the Packerland, rather than the Olympian which had fewer sports offered to its participating schools and not as many freshmen teams as Roncalli was used to.

Roncalli has about an 85percent participation rate in athletics from its students and wants to make sure the students will be able to continue this trend in sports the school currently offers.

The two schools unhappy about the second proposal were Chilton and Two Rivers. At the May 26th session attended by principals and ADs of the current eight EWC schools, plus those from Chilton and Waupun, they both voiced disapproval with what was discussed on May 10.

Chilton will remain in the Olympian Conference," Piittmann said. "This was their desire all along and they have received strong support from their fellow conference members to be retained in the OC,"

Two Rivers was "adamant about not leaving," Piittmann went on. "They have absolutely no desire to move to Conference X and preferred having three long trips to Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Waupun" rather than move to a different conference.

Piittmann said Waupun had been looking for a conference "that is a good fit and where they feel welcomed." About the biggest concern having Waupun come into the league is the 90-mile trip from Two Rivers to Waupun, but Piittmann said once the 151 bypass is done in Fond du Lac, the trip should be smooth as it should be all freeway driv-

Piittmann can see a lot of positives having Waupun come into the EWC. "Waupun fits in with our league in terms of enrollment," which is projected at hitting 779 for next year, Piittmann said, indicating this will be the second largest in the league, with projections of decline in the next couple of years, as is the case with several other EWC

"Their program offerings match very well with the EWC schools," Piittmann said.

Unfortunately, this proposal is part of a large package for schools in northeastern Wisconsin, and if there is strong objection by any one, the entire proposal is out.

"Exactly ... which seems to stink," Piittmann said of the all-or-nothing format.

While the EWC schools would be happy to see Waupun come in, Piittmann said, Conference X will be the big bugaboo ... nobody wants to go there.

The proposal will be voted on in September by partici-pating schools. "The Board of Controls gets it in October, then there is a 40-day window of appeal," Piittmann said.

If this proposal is approved by the WIAA, the change would go into effect with the 2007 school year.


