Kewaskum's population expected to nearly double by 2007

KEWASKUM- The Kewaskum Village Board approved the annexation of 190 acres at their meeting Monday night, January 23. The land is located in the southwest corner of the village. Board members also heard they can expect the village's population to nearly double by 2007.

During a public hearing on the annexation, town resident, Steven Spoerl indicated he was being forced into the annexation and because of this would have appreciated more communication on the issue from the village. He also thought that the developers should be responsible for the costs he will face by being forced into the village.

Village president, Mathew Heiser agreed that communication could

have been better. He stated he would address that in future annexations.

Both developers were in attendance at the public hearing and each stated their intentions for the property. Gary Schneider stated the Prost property will include up to 80 single family homes, 80 duplex units and 20 five-family multi-family units.

Gary Gavin who is developing land adjacent to Old Glory Heights subdivision stated his plans call for planned unit development.

Village Administrator Schmidt presented the board with a complete report of housing and lot statisics for 2005. In that report Schmidt highlighted each subdivision currently under development and how it affects Kewaskum's population numbers.

Currently, the village's official population is 3,689. Schmidt estimat-

ed by the time the newly annexed land is developed, Kewaskum's population could be 6,063.

He did not include figures for two large farm properties that are in the process of being annxed, namely the Reindl farm across from the newly annexed Prost farm and the Backhaus property behind the Amerahn Ballroom on the northern end of the vil-

"In general, I think growth is a good thing, it deepens the tax base and brings in more potencial customers to local businesses," stated Heiser after the meeting.


Schmidt also reported that in 2005 44 building permits were issued for single family homes, the highest in the village's history. Permits for duplex units were 18 and garages were eight.

Arraignment set in alleged child abuse case



KEWASKUM- A 32-yearold Kewaskum man accused of breaking his two-monthold son's legs and arm has been charged with physical abuse of a child. Jason Bozich made his second appearance in Washington County Court on Monday, January 23 and waived his right to a preliminary hearing.

Doctors at Children's Hospital in Milwaukee discovered the abuse on January 14.

Kewaskum man is accused of breaking son's legs and arm

Kewaskum Police were alerted to the situation after Bozich, his girlfriend and her mother took the child to a Hartford hospital, and were later were referred to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee because of the extent of the injuries of the infant. Bozich told a social worker at Children's Hospital that while burping his son, holding him with one hand, the infant slipped from Bozich's hand and landed onto a bed or mattress on the floor of the apartment. He estimated the fall to

child suffered two fractures in his legs and one fracture in his arm. The doctor further stated that the fractures were from

that the

severe torsion (twisting) combined with traction (pulling) such as a grab and twist to the extremity.


The criminal complaint showed that the examining doctor asserted, "Such a fall lacks the force or the bio- mechanics to cause any of the documented fractures which the child suffered. The fall as described by the father (Bozich) could not have caused the right femur (arm) fracture which would have required significant forces and

rotational forces."

The doctor also stated that two of the fractures appeared to have occurred seven to 10 days prior to the initial examination. The third fracture was pinpointed to have occurred the same day the infant was brought to the hospital.

Bozich was arrested by Kewaskum Police on January 15 and is currently being held in the Washington County Jail. He is scheduled to appear in Washington County Court again on February 13 at 1:15

Stradtman memorial will touch many lives at library





T. KEWASKUM- Supervisors in the town of Kewaskum met Friday, January 20 to determine how to fill the vacant position left abruptly by former Clerk Sandra Stern. Stern resigned January 15 after a term and a half in office.

The town has decided that they will accept letters of intent for the position that pays \$1,500. The individual would finish Stern's term that expires April of 2007 and if that individual chooses, they could run for a full term.

Letters of intent for the clerk's position must be mailed or delivered to the town hall by February 9, 2006. At a special town board meeting on February 6, the super-



From dangerous to deadly, Town of Farmington intersection safety will be addressed in 2009

T. FARMINGTON- Any local will tell you, look twice at the Highway 144 and H intersection. The intersection recently went from dangerous to deadly after a West Bend woman lost her life there in Washington County's first traffic fatality.

Local and state officials are doing what they can to warn drivers to use caution at the intersection. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) says work will be done to improve the intersection in 2009.

On Tuesday, January 10, 2006 at 8:35 pm, Jodine Waldhart, 47, of West Bend, was tragically killed as a result of injuries she received from a driver failing to stop at that intersection. That driver collided with the vehicle she was riding in that was driven by her husband. She became Washington County's first fatality of 2006. Mrs. Waldhart left behind her husband and two sons.

A long list of crashes and injuries

"We are aware of the accidents that have occurred at the intersection of CTH H with STH 144 and have reviewed conditions at the intersection several times," said Ken Pesch, Washington County's Highway Commis-

sioner.

According to Chris Quesnell, a Regional Traffic Safety Engineer for the DOT, two intersection related crashes were found through October 2005. One in April and the other in October. "Both crashes were right angle related, however, only the crash in October involved a vehicle failing to stop at the than stopping too far out into STH 144. 2009. stop sign," he said. He went on to say that according to the October crash report there was heavy fog at the time of the crash.

Five intersection crashes occurred in 2004. Four of those crashes were right angle related and one was rear end related. None of the right angle crashes were due to a vehicle failing to stop at the STOP sign. They were related to vehicles failing to yield to traffic on Highway 144 after stopping at the stop sign. The one rear end crash was due to snow on the road. According to Quesnell.

Going back further, a crash analysis found one crash in 2001 and one in 2003 that were related to 'failure to stop". Otherwise they were all related to 'failure to yield'. In addition, about 90% of those 'failure to yield' crashes occurred in the direction that the intersection skew forces the driver to turn their head more than 90 degrees. Accordingly, these crashes are more related to the skew.

Moving forward, improvements slated for 2009

Pesch said he thought a person missing the stop sign was not the problem. "The problem that I perceived when I last reviewed the accident history about a year ago is a little different What I gathered from accident data was that most of the severe crashes were caused by drivers who stopped and then simply proceeded across STH 144 in front of either southbound or northbound vehicles," he said. He also stated that several of the drivers involved in accidents over the last decade or so were fairly young or inexperienced drivers. Those drivers misjudging the speed of motorists on STH 144 because of the angle of the intersection could also be to blame, Pesch thought.

Pesch stated that he is working with the State of Wisconsin DOT and that two years ago he applied for funds under a safety enhancement program to realign CTH H so that it intersected STH 144 at a right angle. Unfortunately, that proposed project was not funded.

Tom Heydel, in traffic operations for the DOT, and member of the Washington County Traffic Safety Commission stated money has been budgeted for the reconstruction of STH 144 from

West Bend northerly to the Sheboygan County line. The major thrust of that project is to replace the deteriorating pavement. However, the current plans do include work on CTH H so that the two roads will intersect at an 80-degree angle when that project is completed. The project is currently scheduled for

At the request of Washington County Supervisor, Brian W. Bausch, from district 11 which encompasses the Town of Farmington, the County's Highway Committee discussed the level of safety at the intersection at its meeting Tuesday, January 17. As a result of that meeting, Pesch said he would be putting together a list of recommended improvements for the committee to consider at their next meeting on February 7. Those improvements could include installation of rumble strips on CTH H for either west bound and/or east bound traffic on CTH H approaching STH 144 or adding a second stop ahead sign.





The Bookworm Sez

Hershey

By Michael D'Antonio Sim & Schuster \$25.00 305 pages



If you're smart, you'll start looking now.

Don't wait until February 13th, your wallet in your hand and panic in your eyes, dashing all over town, looking for roses or daisies or anything to appease the person who's expecting a token of love on the Day for Lovers.

This year, why not enjoy a little chocolate for yourself on Valentine's Day. Read "Hershey" by Michael D'Antonio.

People who've never been to Hershey, Pennsylvania, are said to be startled when they get out of their cars or off the bus. The air is perfumed by the smell of cocoa. The street names, even the streetlights keep the theme of the main business in town.

Snavely Hershey was born on September 13, 1857. His father, Henry, was a dreamer, always thinking about the next big thing that would make him rich. Milton's mother, Fanny, was the daughter of self-sufficient Mennonites, and was, in later years, so deeply disappointed in Henry that she declared him dead even though he decidedly was

As a young man, Milton was apprenticed to a candy shop. There, he learned enough about the trade to open his own shop in New York City. Milton's aunt Mattie, who supported his ideas and businesses for most of her life, helped him find a shop that was fortuitously near the Centennial Exposition of 1876.

Despite that the business was prosperous for a time, it eventually failed, as did the next few ventures that Milton Hershey undertook.

Within a few years, however, and before he was 35 years old, Milton Hershey was a wealthy man, having successfully started a caramel company. Although others were making caramels, Hershey had discovered a method for making buttery candies that were irresistible, and he was selling them overseas. But Hershey, like his father, had an eye for the next big thing. He realized that caramels would fade but chocolate would become a treat that people would prefer.

His visions would serve him in business, but Hershey's personal life was a sadder story. His beloved wife Kitty was ill with an incurable disease that might have had scandalous roots. Perhaps because of that, Hershey never had children.

Or did he? D'Antonio uncov-Hershey's founder, Milton ered some interesting rumors that might hint otherwise. Did Milton Hershey take secrets with him when he died in 1945? I put a lot of stock in the power of persuasion after reading this book, because it's hard to hold it in your hand without wanting a chilled, crisp chocolate bar at your elbow. "Hershey" is part biography and part history, but what I found most interesting is author Michael D'Antonio's narrative on American culture in the earlier part of the nineteenth century. While the latter third of this book lapses into heavy biographical information and politics, small cultural details make the first parts a joy to






Today, there is an increasing demand for wood products harvested from forests that have received a sustaindemand for these products is being driven by every day consumers who want to do

Indians take Waupun title

The Kewaskum High wrestling team brought home two pieces of hardware in the past week.

After wrapping up the Wisconsin Confer-Eastern ence title with their win over Campbellsport — yes, they still must beat Roncalli but should do that easily - the Indians claimed another team title in the annual Waupun Invitation-

Behind first-place finishes by Greg Ogi, Scott Rhoads, Jon Olla and Jake Turowski at 140, 152, 171 and 189 pounds, Kewaskum piled up 188 points, five ahead of runner-up Laconia. The host Warriors placed third with 175, followed by Mayville, which earned 144 points.

"Overall, everyone did a nice job," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle beamed, indicating this is the second year in a row his team has come home with the first place trophy at Wau-

Rhoads improved to a glossy 27-1 with his three victories, including a pin in 4:49 over Matt Wagner of Mayville in the finals.

He received a bye in the first round and then pinned Brett Steffan of New Holstein in 2:52 to advance to the finals.

Rhoads is chomping at the bit to get going in the state se-

ries to see if he can become the first KHS athlete to win back-toback Division 2 state championships.

"He moved up to wrestle either the kid from Waupun (Justin Kitzman), who is ranked in state or the Mayville kid, who is OK too," Aupperle said. "Scott looked very focused."

Turowski is another of the Indian athletes with his sights on a trip to Madison for the state meet. After earning a berth in the Division 2 tournament two years ago, he missed a return trip by one victory in 2005 and does not want that to happen again this February.

In the finals Saturday, Turowski decisioned James Mc-Cormick (no school given) by a score of 7-2 Earlier he had a 17-3 major decision, followed by a 3-0 decision over Craig Sheskey of Laconia.

With his three wins at Waupun, Turowski is 23-5, and Aupperle said he bounced back nicely from the loss at Campbellsport.

Ogi is starting to peak for the EWC Tournament and the tournament series. He had three pins on Saturday, including the one over Bill Wulff of Waupun in the finals, and with those three wins he is 21-4 on the year.

No one lasted into the third period against Ogi. He needed just 2:39 to end the match against Wulff, prompting Aupperle to say, "He looks good

... wrestled a solid tournament."

Aupperle was very pleased to see Olla reach the top rung of the victory stand. He needs to continue to do well so the Indians can win the EWC Tournament and the regional, so they could qualify for the team sectionals.

In the finals Saturday, Olla downed Jeff Ladwig of Laconia 8-7 in overtime. Before that, he pinned Keerin Pinch of Waupun in a brief 29 seconds, then picked up an injury default in the semis. He is currently 19-9.

"He (Olla) looked good all around," Aupperle said, indicating it was a big turnaround from Thursday when he was a little "flat."

There were lots of points contributed by four other Indians who took thirds, including Andrew Haugen at 103, Jon Hawig at 130, Dan Shileny, the hero of the meet against Campbellsport, at 160, and P.J. Krueger at 215. Haugen and Krueger are both freshmen, so taking thirds were good accomplishments for them.

"Andrew did a nice job at 103," Aupperle said. Haugen had to wrestle four times to get the third. His last match was a 15-3 major decision over Mayville's Nathan Stephenson.

"He's starting to come around," the coach said, reporting Haugen is now 13-8.

Krueger had three pins on the day, including a quickie over Matt Moore of Waupun in 2:44 to pick up his third place and improve his record to 21-8.

Krueger's lone loss was a 8-5 decision to Kyle Rozek of Laconia, and Aupperle said, "He had him (Rozek) on his back for a bit but ran out of time."

Shileny (20-8) also had to wrestle a fourth match, winding up the day with a 4-0 win. "Dan wrestled a good tournament. The kid from Columbus (Coughlin, who he was pinned by in 3:11) is a solid kid. He bounced back from that loss and finished strong," Aupperle said.

Hawig went 3-1 to take a third. His final match was against Jason Doe (no school given), and he won 7-6.

"He is better than his record (12-15)," Aupperle said about the senior Hawig, who had two pins on the day.

Stephan Kattar picked up a fourth placed at 112, while Mason Smith was fifth at 135.

Aupperle held Jake Sabel out of action in order to give his injury more time to heal.

After wrestling Roncalli on Tuesday, Jan. 24, the Indians are off until Feb. 4th when they host the EWC Tournament. That day the first matches will get underway at 10 a.m.



Kewaskum High girls basketball team. The Lady Indians were defeated by Roncalli Friday night

Roncalli was led by Jessie Tomaszewski and Kristi Knoblauch. They both contributed 10 points.



paper, Campbellsport-Kewaskum boys basketball might have looked like a mismatch, but the Cougars, currently No. 2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference standings, had all they could handle from the Indians last Tuesday night.

By scoring the final three points in a four-minute overtime, Campbellsport escaped Indians, who are just 1-6 in the EWC and 1-9 overall, both deceptive records considering how many close games they have lost and how much better they have played in recent weeks.

"It was one of those momentum games when everything went our way, then everything went their way," KHS Coach Glenn Eichstedt Bald afterward, obviously disappointed his Indians didn't come away with the "W" after the good effort they put in.

Campbellsport had plenty of momentum in the first half when it built up a 34-26 lead and stretched the margin to 40-26 early in the third quarter after Darnell Willlams, the Cougars' 6-foot-4 center, connected on a short jumper from the baseline.

At this point Eichstedt had seen enough, watching

the Cougars reel off the first six points of the second half. He called a time out to try to settle his players down a bit and to challenge them to reduce the number of errors they were making.

And oh how the Indians responded. Paul Gaynor started the rally when he worked his way inside for an easy hoop, and after the Cougars were whistled for traveling, the Kewaskum players flew down the court, eventually getting the ball to Austin with a 66-63 victory over the Flanders, who banked in a 3pointer, making the score 40-

That started a run dominated by the Indians, who climbed to within two points, 42-40, on a steal and then an easy lay up by Matt Parent

with:58 left in the period.

Campbellsport came back with a bucket by Nick Whitty and a 3-point play by Mitch Tarras (45-40), but the Indians answered with a clutch jumper behind the arc by Zach Wollner with:05 left, putting the score at 45-43 in Campbellsport's favor. There were eight minutes left in regulation, but it turned into 12 electrifying minutes of action.

Kewaskum tied the score at 45-45 when Flanders was fouled trying a 3-pointer and made two of his four free throws (one of the Cougars entered the lane too early, giving Flanders an extra try on the first miss.)

Along came sharpshooter Whitty again, canning a trey

with 4:45 to go, and the Cougars managed to stay out front from three to five points until the last two minutes of regulation.

With just under two minutes to go, Casey Scheel drew of a double bonus, making the score 55-52, then Wollner hit his third 3-pointer of the game to knot the score at 55-55 with 1:27 left.

Kewaskum fans were going crazy, and the cheers mounted after Tarras lost the ball, and it was picked up by Scheel. Wollner wound up with the ball and found Parrent open underneath the basket for an easy two points, and the Indians were in the lead.

Nowitwas Campbellsport with the jitters, but a time-out by coach Dominic Weisse, set up some strategy for the last 44 seconds. Whitty was fouled with: 32 to play, and he made both ends of a bonus to tie the game again.

The Cougars played some solid defense in the closing seconds. As a result, Kewaskum was unable to get a good look at the basket. Parrent got off a desperation three at the buzzer. It bounced high off the rim and fell harmlessly to the floor.

Overtime ... here's where the Campbellsport team had just enough composure to secure the win. Whitty, who had a game-high 28, hit two free throws and a pair of baskets, scoring six of Campbellsport's nine points in the extra period.

The third basket came when Tony Simpson rebounded a miss by a teammate and canned a 10-footer. He was the unsung hero

for the Cougars with his 11 points, including nine in the second half.

"He (Simpson) had probably scored four points all season, and he had 11 tonight," Eichstedt said, then a foul and swished both ends checked Simpson's average and found out it was one point per game.

"We were sagging off him and trying to pinch on Whitty," the coach went on, "We didn't want him (Whitty) to take threes" and he wound up with only two, but, "He's still pretty good putting up and taking the 10-footers."

Parrent had a very strong game, scoring 26 points, 17 after the break and four of Kewaskum's six points in the extra period.

Eichstedt wanted him to get the final shot but the screen was set up a little early and about four feet too deep and by the time Parrent got the ball from Scheel on the left wing, he had no chance to set up and the shot was off the mark.

"If this is the second best team in the conference, we shouldnt be shying away from anybody," Eichstedt said. "We're getting better."



Shileny's decision stages Kewaskum's comeback victory

Sharing was OK, but winning solo Eastern Wisconsin Conference title is priceless

This is turning out to be quite a successful sports year at Kewaskum High School.

Already Indian teams had captured the Eastern Wisconsin Conference football and volleyball titles, and last Thursday the KHS wrestling team locked up the dual wrestling meet wrestling title with a dramatic 29-28 victory over arch rival Campbellsport.

Dan Shileny's 9-2 win over Todd Rosenthal at 160 pounds erased a 28-26 deficit and turned it into the history-making team victory. Kewaskum has fielded a wrestling team since 1965, and not once in the 40 previous years has it won a conference title outright.

Kewaskum is currently 6-0 in EWC action, with only Manitowoc Roncalli, the smallest school in the league, standing in its way of adding another championship banner to the wall in the school's gym.

Last year, the Indians wound up in a tie with Plymouth and Campbellsport, and again, the race went right down to the wire with Kewaskum defeating Campbellsport on a decision in the final bout.

The new hero, Shileny, took a quick lead and never looked back against Rosenthal.

"Dan knew what he had to do and went out there and got it done. He was in control the whole time," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said. "All the work he has put in with Scott (Rhoads) and Nick (Bartley)

... those three running to Advance (Camp in Madison) all summer and fall really shows."

Looking past the obvious, there were a couple other unsung heroes, namely Nathan Seitz at 119 and Bryan Theisen at 275. Both lost but refused to be pinned, thus saving valuable points for the Indians, who won seven matches, the same number as the Cougars.

"Yes, the Theisen and Seitz matches were very big," Aupperle said. "They both did a nice job. We talked with everyone about the importance of giving up three (points) instead of six in the matches that we lost. They both did what they had to do."

Seitz, a freshman, lost a 5-0 decision to Derek Sippel, while Theisen, who was giving up at least 60 pounds to CHS' Chad Maske, lost 6-0.

After the draw, the meet started at 171 pounds where Louie Braatz took care of Jon Olla 6-1 to take a 3-0 lead.

Then the Cougars got a big win from Bill Mayer over Jake Turowski, which Aupperle figured would be a key bout. Mayer escaped with a 5-4 decision.

"Jacob was in on some nice shots in the first period, but they were all at the edge and they went off the mat," Aupperle said. "Then I think he got a little frustrated and lost his focus a little. He can beat that kid. He just needs to wrestle a full six minutes with him. He will need to beat him. They are going to meet a lot throughout the rest of the

year."

P.J. Krueger got Kewaskum on the scoreboard with his 6-4 win, but after Theisen was defeated, the score was 9-3 in the Cougars' favor.

The point difference was wiped out thanks to a technical fall by Andrew Haugen at 103 and a forfeit win by Stephan Kattar at 112, making the score 14-9.

"Andrew Haugen did a great job at 103," his coach said.


Campbellsport regained the lead with Sippel's win and the forfeit by KHS at 125 (14-18) and surged farther ahead when Spenser Rodenkirch pinned Jon Hawig (14-24) in 4:47 after Hawig had been nursing a 2-0 lead over the Cougar who has previous state experience.

Campbellsport also won the match at 135, taking a 28-14 advantage.

Kewaskum still had its power wrestlers coming up, and they did not disappoint the home crowd. Eric Ogi outpointed Derek Hafermann 6-2 to cut the margin to 11 points, then Scott Rhoads needed just a little over three minutes to pin Sam Immel, and Jake Sabel was convincing in his 7-2 decision over Kenton Stevens, putting the score at 26-28 and setting the stage for Shileny to be the man of the hour.

"I thought the guys wrestled well," Aupperle said. "We should be in the driver's seat (to win the outright title)."

While there was a lot of excitement Thursday, there was also disappointment as

Aupperle also has learned Bartley, a two-time Division 2 state place winner, has been ruled out for the season. His knee did not respond adequately to therapy. Sabel, who is having a solid season, will finish out the season as the starter at 152.
