
## Kewaskum fire likely murder-suicide





## KES first grader victim of murder-suicide, arson fire in Kewaskum Monday

**KEWASKUM-** The Kewaskum Police Department suspects a possible murder-suicide at a home in the 200 block of Bonnie Lane in the village. Police and Fire personnel were alerted to the situation after neighbors discovered a portion of the home fully engulfed with flames shortly before 5 am on Monday, June 5.

On Wednesday afternoon, Kewaskum Chief of Police Dick Knoebel confirmed the identities of the remains of two people, one adult and one child, that were discovered inside the home after the fire was extinguished. Knoebel stated through dental records, William Koser was confirmed as the adult body found inside the home. Knoebel went on to say they identified Koser's seven-year-old daughter, Elizabeth, through medical records, as the second victim.

Police found two gas cans at the scene. Knoebel says he believes arson is to blame as the cause of the fire at 211 Bonnie Lane. He added his department is not looking for any suspects in the arson investigation.

Assisting the Kewaskum Police Department process evidence at the scene were


Kewaskum Fire Department, Washington County Sheriff's Department, the Wisconsin Fire Marshall and the Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF).

Police called in the Milwaukee Bomb Squad to investigate a cooler found in a suspicious location outside the front of the residence. Upon opening the cooler, a member of the bomb squad found numerous personal effects inside.

The Kewaskum Fire Department and EMS were at the scene the entire day. After extinguishing the fire, volunteers from the fire department assisted law enforcement and other agencies at the scene. "When I got home and reflected on what happened, I thank God no one got hurt because of the potential that was there (for injury). There was an extremely dangerous situation in that house," stated Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel Monday evening.

"I'd like to thank everyone who helped. This investigation could have taken several days, but we completed it that day," stated Knoebel.

Elizabeth Koser was a first grader at Kewaskum Elementary School. Interim Superintendent of Kewaskum Schools, Scott Peterson stated counselors were available for students

and staff at Kewaskum Elementary School Tuesday and Wednesday, June 6 and 7.

This is the second fatal tragedy for Elizabeth Koser's family. Matthew Sheridan, Elizabeth's brother, died June 19, 2004 after he was arrested by a Mequon police officer for possessing drug paraphernalia. The arresting officer mistakenly placed a vinyl biohazard bag over Sheridan's head, thinking it was a spit mask, a hood that is used to protect law enforcement from spitting and biting suspects.

Construction on CTH H from US 45 easterly to STH 144 in the towns of Kewaskum and Farmington began Tuesday, June 6. The project should be completed by Friday, June 23 if weather conditions are favorable.

Traffic will be maintained on CTH H during construction. Motorists should expect delays of up to 10 minutes when traveling through the construction area. Motorists are asked to use extra care when driving in the construction area and

obey all flagmen and construction signs. Alternate routes should be selected if possible.

The project will consist of pulverizing the existing pavement, resurfacing and shouldering. Stark Asphalt will do the work under contract with the Washington County Highway Department. County forces will then construct new shoulders, paint pavement markings, and do other finish work.





years.









## Ice cream making is sweet learning







## Grilled Turkey

Prep Time: 15 min  
Total Time: 3 hr 5 min  
Makes: 24 servings

- 1 frozen turkey (12 lb.), thawed
- 3 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 2 Tbsp. fresh or 2 tsp. dried herbs, such as thyme, sage or rosemary
- 3 cups water

PREHEAT grill to medium-high heat. Remove neck and giblets from turkey. Rinse outside of turkey as well as inside the cavity; pat dry with paper

towels. Tuck the wings under the back. Place turkey, breast side up, on roasting rack in large disposable aluminum foil pan. RUB outside of turkey with oil. Season with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with herbs. Place pan on grate of grill. Add water to pan, then close the lid of the grill.

GRILL turkey 2 to 2-1/2 hours or until meat thermometer registers 180°F when inserted in the thickest part of the thigh and 170°F when inserted in the thickest part of the breast, adding additional water to the pan as needed to prevent the drippings from burning and to have enough liquid remaining

in the pan after turkey is cooked for use in making gravy. Remove turkey from grill; let stand 15 to 20 minutes before carving. Meanwhile, use pan drippings to make gravy, if desired.






## The Bookworm Sez

# RIDING WITH STRANGERS



A HITCHHIKER'S JOURNEY



ELIJAH WALD



It's summertime, and you've got the travelin' bug.

You're not taking a plane to a faraway destination. Your car shall remain garaged. No bus for you, no train, and no RV.

So how else can you get to where you're going?

Have thumb, will travel. In his new book "Riding with Strangers: A Hitchhiker's Journey" by Elijah Wald, you'll read about mankind's oldest and cheapest form of travel.

When he was sixteen years old, Elijah Wald hitchhiked cross-country for the first time. Since the day he stuck out his thumb and pulled in a ride, Wald has hitchhiked in several countries and across the U.S. more than a dozen times.

In this book, Wald writes about a Boston-to-Vancouver trip that he took not long ago. The trip started on a rainy Boston exit ramp. While he didn't get a ride quickly, Wald was optimistic. Rainy weather usually brings out compassion in drivers.

Many states, Wald says, outlaw hitchhiking. There are laws that prohibit catching rides on the interstate, although many states look the other way. Still, Wald says, he often meets police officers who strictly enforce the law and scold him for doing what many people find dangerous.

And how much danger is there? Wald says that, despite what most people think, hitchhiking is surprisingly safe. In all the years that he's hitched out his thumb, he's been robbed once. Sure, he's seen his share of weirdoes, but he offers advice for dealing with them in this

book.

So what happens if a hitchhiker doesn't catch a ride? Wald says he walks. And if it gets late and he's tired, he says he just lays out a tarp and sleeps under the stars.

My first thought, as I read this book, was "What a romantic life," immediately followed by "What is he thinking?" Over and over, author Elijah Wald talks about how "safe" hitchhiking is both for driver and hitchhiker, and how it's a vanishing way of life. Yet, he also writes about some of the strangest strangers he's met on the road, and he indicates that there is a sort of protocol that hitchhikers should follow so that they don't anger or annoy the driver who picked them up. Paragraphs like that keep my skepticism about safety intact.

There was still something about Wald's thumbing that I couldn't put my finger on. Then it hit me: while this is supposed to be a narrative about a Boston-to-Vancouver trip, there are an awful lot of stories that didn't fit. Illinois-to-Indiana-to-Cleveland, for instance, is moving east, not west - and not as the initial premise of this book indicated. It took me a long time to realize that Wald was reminiscing; a bit of an introduction to his digressions would have been helpful.

This could've been a really fun book. I didn't think it was. If you can handle the rambling and you remember your hitchin' youth, you might enjoy it. Whatever you do, though, don't give it to an impressionable teenager or a runaway wannabe.

# United Way Program Funding Decisions are Based on Results

Community volunteers make sure United Way funds are used to measurably improve the quality of life of Washington County residents by closely looking at program results. This year during May and June, 28 volunteers will review 44 program funding request applications from over 20 non-profit agencies.

"Our fund distribution process is what sets the United Way apart from many other charities. Our community volunteers live in Washington County, and they know the needs of our County residents. With our outcome based funding model, donors can rest assured money is going where it is needed, and where it is making a difference," explained Tim Wiedmeyer, West Bend Mutual Insurance Vice President and United Way Community Impact Committee Chair.

In April, United Way volunteers attended an orientation to learn how to base funding de-

cision on program outcomes. "Outcome measures answers the "so what" question," stated Karin Westerlund, United Way Community Impact Coordinator. "So what if parents attend a parenting class? So what if people receive emergency shelter? So what if children attend tutoring sessions? What difference does it make in our community?"

Westerlund continued, "Outcome results show how program activities and services measurably improve the quality of lives of the people being served. To receive United Way funding, programs must provide measurable results that answer that "so what" question by demonstrating how their activities and services make a difference in people's lives."

Each program is assigned to one of four impact areas: Meeting Basic Needs, Supporting and Strengthening Families, Serving Children and Youth, and Building Strong and Healthy Com-

munities.

Volunteers are assigned to review programs within one of the impact areas. During May, panel volunteers visit programs in order to get a firsthand look at each program's results. After reviewing funding request applications, the volunteers recommend what level of funding should be awarded to each program. These funding recommendations are then forwarded to the United Way Board of Directors for their final deliberation, with agency funding approval given in July.

"The community volunteers are taking the responsibility of fund distribution very seriously. I am extremely confident in the distribution process and agencies will earn whatever is allocated," explained Jim Strachota, CCSA Director and United Way Board President.

Award decisions will be announced in early August.



The Kewaskum Water Utility routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The following tables show the results of our monitoring for 2005.

#### Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. #### Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems.

Number of Contaminants Required to be Tested
