Administrator will become village employee Thursday

Kewaskum Village Administrator candidate offered contract

KEWASKUM- The Village of Kewaskum has offered an employment agreement for its open village administrator position. Village officials will make details of the agreement public on Thursday, June 29 at a special 5 p.m. village board meeting.

On Saturday, June 24, the village board, joined by community members and village staff, met with three candidates chosen by Public Administrators Associates (P.A.A). The three were given tours of the village and answered questions by staff and the village board. By the end of the day a clear favorite was chosen in a special closed session meeting.

The Village Board hired P.A.A. to seek out candidates for the job. The cost for their service was \$5,000.

Village President Mathew Heiser stated P.A.A. was attractive to the village because they offered a clause in the agreement that gives a one-year guarantee that the candidate they produce will be a great fit or P.A.A. will assist in another search free of charge.

Heiser stated that the Village Board chose the three from more than a dozen applicants. There were no inhouse applicants that applied.

The new village administrator will be required to become a village resident, according to Heiser. "I am very excited about it, and eager to meet with this person," stated Heiser.

Obviously because of their printing schedule, The Village's official newspaper, The Statesman, will not be able to make the announcement in print until the July 6 edition. Readers are invited to check the newspaper's website following the announcement Thursday evening.



Heises cut the cheese with Food Network

BEECHWOOD- Kris and Mark Heise cut the cheese with two of the Food Network's newest up and coming stars this past weekend. And they didn't even blush! The stars of the network's newest feature, "Road Tasted" came to Beechwood Sunday, June 25, and got a lesson in good old-fashioned Wisconsin cheese making.

Their producer called us four months ago," recalled Kris Heise, the plant's assistant manager. While looking for a unique cheese factory to visit, Heise says the producer felt Beechwood Cheese stood out because of Chicken Soup Cheese created by Heise.

According to Heise, Chicken Soup Cheese has been a favorite of cheese connoisseurs since it was created four years ago. Of all the unique artisan cheese recipes that come from her and the staff at Beechwood Cheese, this seems to be the one that gets the most attention she says.

In the next four months Heise stayed in contact with Road Tasted producer Danielle Wilkinsen and found out more about Road Tasted. The stars of the program are Bobby and Jamie Deen, sons of Food Network's Southern Belle chef, Paula Deen

In the mean time, Beechwood Cheese owner Mark Rolison, and store manager Tom Raasch, got busy with painting and sprucing up the factory as well as moving equipment to get the interior ready for shooting.

Heise states that while it was "very intriguing," it was also a lot of hard work by evervone at Beechwood Cheese. She explains that it took seven hours of shooting for the seven-minute segment of the show that will spotlight Beechwood Cheese. Still she says, "It was the experience of a lifetime for her and husband

The show will highlight the cheese making process Beechwood Cheese uses, as well as the Deens joining Kris and Mark sitting down to eat some of Kris's homemade cheese dishes.

The Heises sold Beech-wood Cheese to Mark Rolison on October 31, 2005, after a 30year career in the cheese making business. Mark's father, Norbert, purchased the factory in 1956 after it was lost in

foreclosure to a bank. Through hard work and dedication to their craft, the Heise family built up the factory to be one of the best artisan cheese factories in the state. Mark and Kris Heise purchased the factory in 1979 and continue to be active in daily operations.

Beechwood Cheese is

available at various farmer's markets in West Bend, Fond du Lac, Green Bay and Brookfield as well as at Sendik's Grocery Stores on Downer Avenue in Milwaukee and in Elm Grove, Cheese Shoppe of Green Bay and at Sausage Plus in West Bend


The factory is one of only five remaining cheese factories in Sheboygan County,

which has a history of 210 facilities. It is a very small, hands-on operation. It produces approximately 4,200 pounds of cheese daily, from 42,000 pounds of private and surplus milk. By-products, cream and whey, are sold to local companies, utilizing every factor of the milk.





Verbanac waives trial; charged with hiring hit-man

A 51-year-old Campbellsport man charged with hiring a man he met in prison to kill his ex-wife, waived his rights to a court trial Monday, June 26.

Steven G. Verbanac Sr., pleaded no contest to one count of solicitation of first-degree intentional homicide during a plea hearing on Monday afternoon in Fond du Lac County Circuit Court.

On Dec. 4, 2004, Verbanac allegedly offered Gary M. Kluwe of Antigo, money to kill his ex-wife, who resided in the village of Cascade in Sheboygan County.

Kluwe contacted the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department and filed a criminal complaint against Verbanac.

During the plea hearing Monday, one count of first-degree intentional homicide conspiracy, was dismissed. The state agreed to drop the conspiracy charge if Verbanac waived his right to a trial.

Verbanac's bail was revoked during the plea hearing. Bail was formerly set for \$25,000.

A sentencing hearing has been set for Oct. 18, 2006, at 2 p.m. If convicted, Verbanac faces up to 12 years and six months in prison.



C-Sport Police joins Kewaskum in vehicle registration service

CAMPBELLSPORT- The Campbellsport Police Department announced their appointment as an electronic agent of the Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles.

This appointment allows the department to process most of the motor vehicle title and registration and registration renewal transactions that are available at DMV offices, including replacement titles, the issuance of license plates, transferring of registrations and registration renewals.

The department has available for immediate issue regular automobile plates, light truck plates and motorcycle plates. The service they offer will also speed the issuance of special plates including Farm, Dual Purpose Farm, University of Wisconsin, Ducks Unlimited, Endangered Resource, Celebrate Children and Dual Purpose Vehicle plates.

Titles will continue to be printed by the DMV in Madison. The new electronic service will greatly accelerate the delivery of titles to customers. The typical turn around time for customers to receive a title with the new service will be seven to ten days.

Customers will be charged a service fee that pays for the software as well as department personnel time. The new electronic service is provided via a program supplied by Computerized Vehicle Registration (CVR). CVR is the major supplier of this service in Wisconsin, serving over six hundred auto dealers, credit unions, banks and municipal agents in the state

Wisconsin Fair Board passes sale of Pettit

WEST ALLIS- The Wisconsin State Fair Park Board approved the sale of the Olympic ice training center to the Pettit National Ice Center, Inc., the nonprofit organization that has leased and operated the center since it was built in 1992. If approved by the Wisconsin Building Commission, the transfer will be completed by December 31, 2006.

The estimated price of approximately \$5.6 million will eliminate all future liability for State Fair Park. Restrictions


included as part of the sale will ensure operations continue as now and if a change were ever considered, the State Fair Park Board could repurchase the center for the original price paid by the Pettit National Ice Center, Inc. To facilitate a sale, the Board also agreed to waive \$1 million of past-due rent.

Wisconsin State Fair Park Board Chairman Marty Greenberg stated, "Time is of the essence! I strongly urge the community to get behind the Pettit National Ice Center to raise funds. The Olympics rings are extremely valuable for the Milwaukee community as well as the state of Wisconsin."





Saxonia House played intregal part in Fillmore's history


EDITOR'S NOTE: As Fillmore approaches it's Sesquicentennial celebration The Statesman is publishing historical accounts of the early life in Fillmore. Please plan on attending the Sesquicentennial celebration July 15-16.

Ernst Klessig emigrated to America in 1845, settling in Fillmore. Three years later he married a fellow émigré, Christine Liberta Poetzsch. The Klessigs built the Saxonia House Inn between 1854-55. The 17-room 72' by 35' building was constructed in the old world German half-timber (fachwerk) style, but completely covered in stucco.

The nogging is red brick, probably not obtained locally. The Inn, built only a few yards from the old Port Washington Road, also served as a general store, post office and incubator of several local organizations, including St. Martin's Church and the Turn Verein society.

The Farmington Brewery was in production from 1860 to at least 1881, with a double-vaulted brick lagering "cave" constructed on the grounds. A two-story 18' by 30' brick brewery building located near the barn came down in 1994.

The property passed out of Klessig family ownership in 1911. An ell was removed about that time. It changed hands again in 1947 and 1986. A red brick summer kitch-



en was destroyed in a 2004 storm.

Klessig family descendants had a reunion in Fillmore in 1997. The Saxonia House and property was for sale at that time and interested family members formed the non-profit Friends of the Saxonia House, Inc. They were able to purchase the buildings and 7 acres.

Their goal has been to restore the property to an approximately 1870-era working farm and brewery to allow visitors to experience the German immigrant lifestyle.

In 2004 Isthmus Architecture, Inc., a Madison-based firm specializing in historic restoration, provided a detailed condition report.

Carol Cartwright prepared a nomination to the State Register and National Register of Historic Places. In 2005, the property was placed on the State Register of Historic Places, as well as the list of Ten Most Endangered Properties in Wisconsin. In April of 2006 the property was accepted to the National Register of Historic Places.

Immediate preservation measures of interior braces supporting areas where retaining walls were removed in the lower level and exterior stucco repair are ongoing. Airing the house, short-term repairs of window covering and cleaning, keeping animals and severe weather out are

The reports will allow the Friends to cultivate support in the form of grants and funding necessary to restore the Saxonia House to its considerable historical significance.


June 23, 1906

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Smiles, memories, tears all evident at Dr. Sison's retirement party

KEWASKUM- Over 300 friends, patients and colleages of Doctor Cesar V. Sison came to a retirement party given to the beloved physcian on Tuesday, June 27 in Kewaskum.

Dr. Sison and his wife Aurora began a family medical practice in Kewaskum on July 6, 1971. The pair worked alongside each other in a warehouse owned by Edward "Pat" Miller, then owner/operator of Miller Furniture and Funeral Home. That building is now home to Tuttle Creek Learning Center.

Miller remodeled the building and it became The Kewaskum Clinic. Oddly enough Sison began his medical career in that Kewaskum Clinic and ended it in another building perhaps a block away in a new building called The Kewaskum Clinic.

The July 2, 1971 Kewaskum Statesman reported that Dr. Sison's first clinic in Kewaskum had a private consultation room, two examination rooms and an ambulance entrance. Dr. Sison also practiced with his brother Francisco in Campbellsport for a period of time until the retirement of Dr. Richard G. Edwards was eminent. At that time Sison began practicing full-time in the village. Dr. Edwards served the community for over 25 years.

Dr. Sison was born in the Philippines. He received his medical education at the Far Eastern University School of Medicine in Manila. He obtained his certificate from the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates in

He took his internship and four years of general surgical training at Illinois Masonic Medical Center in Chicago, an affiliate of the University of Illinois. Before beginning his work in Kewaskum, Dr. Sison practiced at Doctor's Hospital in Milwaukee.

On February 28, 1978, Dr. Sison and his wife built and opened The Sison Professional Building at 1040 Fond du Lac Avenue which is now home to the Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic. Dr. Florizel Castro then joined the couple in family medical practice.

The new clinic boosted eight exam rooms, a nurses room, office space and a large reception area. An x-ray room and pharmacy were also inside the medical building.

The Sison Medical Clinic closed in October of 1996 when Sison joined what is now SynergyHealth (West Bend Clinic) at their new facility located at 1701 Fond du Lac Avenue.

While a physician Dr. Sison focused on surgery, fam-

ily care and childbirth. Bringing new life into the world was a particulary delightful part of Dr. Sison's career.

"Over the years, I have delivered too many babies to count. I watched many of them grow up and as they started families of their own, I actually delivered many of their babies as well. The opportunity to have cared for generations of families has been a highlight of my career," remarked Sison.

Dr. and Mrs. Sison have two sons and one grandson. Now, the physician this community has fondly embraced is referred to as "Grandpa Doc."

Dr. Sison says he looks forward to spending time with his wife and family and having more time for hunting and fishing. He says they will continue to reside in Kewaskum.

An article in July 2 Kewaskum Statesman stated "July 6 will be the beginning of what Kewaskum and surrounding area residents hope will be a long and successful life in this community for the doctors" Little did that writer know at that time how true those words would be.

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


The Bookworm Sez

The World Almanac for Kids 2007

The kids have been out of school for – what now? – two, three weeks? And how long did it take before you heard the first chorus of "Mom, I'm Bored"?

You want your kids to have a good summer, but most teachers would probably tell you that kids do better in school next year if they keep reading over the summer months. So how do you take the chore out of summertime reading and make it more like summertime fun?

Pick up a copy of "The World Almanac for Kids 2007" by the World Almanac folks.

Once your kids pick a page to peruse, they'll be packing this book in their beach bags, camp sack, or suitcase to Grandma's. So what subject holds interest for your child? Do you have a budding scientist on your "The World Almanac for Kids 2007" offers different chapters on science, including computers, medicine, space, and the environment. Is geography the favored fascination? There's a huge section devoted to the U.S., with each state represented individually; pages devoted to maps, stats and flags; and another segment with fun-to-know facts about other nations and the kids that

If entertainment holds more interest for your kids, "The World Almanac for Kids 2007" has them covered. They can compare birthdays with famous people (I share one with Neal Simon). They can learn about movies and movie stars, music and dance, books, art, fashion, and TV. Maybe your kids can find a new pastime, with chapters on toys and games, contests and prizes, language and prestidigitation.

Ah, but you say your kid isn't interested in anything but sports. Baseball, football, auto racing, basketball, soccer, they're all in this book. Learn about sports that boys like best, and ones that girls prefer. Read about strange sports (underwater hockey, joggling), sporting scandals, and X-Games.

Maybe you've got a kid who pretends that he's not interested in anything. It doesn't matter. "The World Almanac for Kids 2007" will convince him otherwise. With colorful illustrations and pictures, an easy-to-use indexing format, I-know-something-you-don't-know trivia, and topics that interest kids, there's something for almost everyone.

So you, as a parent or grandparent, are thinking that adult almanacs seem to be the same year after year. Why buy this years' kids book?

I asked the same thing. It turns out that "The World Almanac for Kids 2007" is kid-co-written, 60% new (geography, maps, statistics, superlatives and such rarely change) and updated to reflect the topics and people that kids are talking about now. The jokes, quizzes, and puzzles are all new. And if this isn't enough, there are websites scattered in the pages of this book so your kids can go in search of more information to feed their brains.

While this book is mostly aimed at 10-to-16-year-olds, I think a savvy 8-year-old could handle it-and grown-ups will find something fun, too. If you want to keep your kids reading this summer, pick up "The World Almanac for Kids 2007". They'll love you for it, and so will their teachers.

Indians take care of business, clinch tie for EWC title

With one swing of the bat Monday night, Ross Stockhausen ended a 14-year drought for the Kewaskum High baseball team

Stockhausen's three-run blast in the first inning propelled the Indians to a very convincing 14-2 decision over host Kiel. In the process, the Indians clinched at least a tie for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference crown. The last year Kewaskum won a baseball championship was back in 1992.

"That clinches at least a tie with seven games to go," KHS coach Dave Donath said Tuesday morning, indicating he did not feel much different after getting EWC win No. 14 without a single loss but admitting it will probably sink in soon.

"Hopefully we still stay focused," Donath said about gaining the tie for the title and reaching one of the team's so early. (The Indians had a home game against Two Rivers on Tuesday night, which will clinch the outright title.)

Stockhausen's homer wasn't the only one in the game but it certainly set an early tone. "That one went to left-center," Donath said, reporting Dan Shea had a solo shot and Garett Donath thrilled the Indian fans with a grand slam in the sixth in-

When asked about Shea's blast, Donath said it carried to "deep left field ... that's six for the year (for him)"

Proud papa also commented his son's round tripper was hits first as a varsity player, and it hit off the scoreboard in left field.

Shea was 2x3 for the night, while Casey Scheel also went 2x3 with a pair of RBIs. Logan Staege also had a good night at the plate, going 2x3 with two RBIs, and freshman Nick Olla had a pair of hits and a pair of runs batted in.

The Indians wound up with 14 hits off starter and loser Marcus Rumpff and his reliever, Tony Tollefson, who gave up six runs in the top of the sixth. The game ended after the sixth via the 10-run "mercy rule."

John Holt got the win for Kewaskum, his sixth this season without a loss. He struck out four and walked four and had a no-hitter going through three innings. Ben Gries led off the fourth with the double and that was the first of only two hits off Holt. The other was a single in the fifth inning.

"We left him (Gries) stranded," Donath said, reporting Holt had a little trouble with his curve ball on Monday night but was good enough to hold the second-place Raiders (9-7) at bay.

"He's effective," Donath said of Holt, one of the two pitchers (the other being Jon Roskopf) who have carried the Indians to their 18-1 record. The lone loss came to Kettle Moraine Lutheran in the first round of the Germantown Tournament held in late May. Since then, the Indians have run off a string of 16 straight victories and hope to push that number higher in the weeks to come.

Sparks not up to par in USATF meet

Former Kewaskum High standout Charlie Sparks missed making the top 15 in the men's open division of the discus in Sunday's finals at the USA Track and Field Championships held in Indianapolis, IN.

The open division of this meet, which is sponsored annually, is held for Olympic athletes, all collegians and those out of college and competing on an unattached basis.

Following the NCAA I finals, Sparks said he had the 13th best throw in the nation and was pretty certain he had qualified for the event.

Each discus athlete had three throws in the preliminaries. Sparks started off with a toss of 52.90 meters (173 feet and 7 inches), then he scratched on his second attempt and ended up with an effort that sailed 52.58 meters. He finished 17th overall. Only the top eight received two more throws to de-

termine the final places.

The winner of the men's open discus was Ian Waltz, representing Nike. His best throw traveled 64.52 meters, which is 211 feet, 8 inches. He won the event by over seven feet.

The runner-up was Cary Malone, another Nike representative. His best toss reached 204-02.

Four of the top five discus throwers represented Nike in the competition.

Sparks attended Indiana State University for four years after spending his freshman year at UW-Stout. He graduated in May with a degree in construction management.

Sparks won the WIAA Division 2 state championship in the discus his junior year and finished second his senior season. He also qualified for the NCAA I championships the past two years and set a new ISU and Missouri Valley Conference record of 198-5 in the Illinois Invitational.

Indians are closing in on EWC title

First goal within reach

Talk about two contrasting games.

Last week, the Kewaskum High baseball team pounded out 16 hits in a home game against Plymouth on Thursday night and got just three hosting arch rival Campbellsport two nights before.

Both games had happy ending for the Indians, who blasted the Panthers 16-3 after nipping the Cougars 4-3. The two wins boosted Kewaskum's Eastern Wisconsin Conference record to a glossy 13-0 ... and the Indians' win streak was stretched to 15 games.

While coach Dave Donath is very aware of his team's record, he did not know wins on June 26 (at Kiel) and 27 (home vs. Two Rivers) can clinch the EWC title, according to a spokesperson for the conference who sent out current standings.

"That I didn't know about," coach Dave Donath said about his team having the opportunity to win the title, with eight games still left on the schedule. "Other teams have been falling back ... there might have been some doubleheaders on Friday (that put the Indians in that position.)"

Kiel is currently in second place at 9-6, while the Cougars are third with a 9-7 record.

The title will be the Indians' first since 1992. "Tom Bartelt was coaching," Donath said, explaining the Indians had a good season the first year he coached. "My first season, we were 18-3, but Campbellsport was 19-2," the sixth-year veteran coach said, continuing his theme of taking one game at a time but admitting, "I know if we keep doing the job, we'll be all right."

Back to the two latest wins, Kewaskum benefitted from five Campbellsport errors Tuesday, and that is very uncharacteristic for a Jerry Raether-coached team.

What is especially satisfying about this victory is the fact the Indians are now 2-0 vs. the Cougars this season.

"We've never beaten them twice in the conference season," Donath said, recalling one year where the Indians beat the Cougars once during the regular and then in the tournament series.

Kewaskum is also 2-0 vs. Nick Whitty, one of the top pitchers in the EWC.

The Indians have some pretty impressive pitchers of their own this year, including John Holt (5-0) and Jon Roskopf, who are sure bets to get some attending in the EWC all-conference balloting, which normally takes place in July after the state series is completed.

Roskopf got the win Tuesday, pitching five innings and improving to 6-1 on the season. He gave up eight hits, struck out four and walked two.

The Indians were down 3-1 early, then picked up three runs in their half of the third and held Campbellsport scoreless the rest of the way.

Ross Stockhausen, Jon Olla and Logan Staege had hits for the Indians. "We did some bunting," Donath said. In the third, after Casey Scheel walked and Olla got a hit, Dan Shea bunted them to second and third. "Then I believe Ross had a base hit" to score the first run, according to Donath, who added, "Matt Parrent suicided (bunted) to score Olla."

Donath said he signaled for the next batter, Garett Donath, to also suicide squeeze. The Cougars called for a pitchout, however, and Stockhausen was caught in a rundown, but, "They dropped the ball at the plate and Ross came in."

Staege contributed an RBI single in the second.

Against Plymouth, Kewaskum got to Cody Comerford very early, scoring four runs in the first inning.
