Three from Kewaskum charged with burglary and theft

## **Kiwanis park concession** stand burglarized



According to a criminal complaint filed with the Washington County District Attorney's Office, three Kewaskum individuals are facing burglary and misdemeanor theft charges in connection with breaking into the Kiwanis Park concession stand shortly after midnight Monday morning, August 14.

Three individuals from Kewaskum have been charged each with a felony count of being party to burglary and party to misdemeanor theft after they are alleged to have entered the Kewaskum Kiwanis Park concession stand and removed beer and candy shortly after midnight on Monday, August 14. Kewaskum police caught the individuals as they were removing items from the stand.

Joseph W. Klahn, 20, and Zachary J. Kraus, 18, and Troy Chandler 17, all of Kewaskum were charged Tuesday, August 15 in Washington County Court. They will be back in court on Wednesday, September 13 at 1:15 p.m.

A criminal complaint alleges that the trio with the help of one juvenile broke into the concession stand by gaining access to the stand through a second story window. Through statements from the three, police learned that the juvenile individual pryed open a second story window and then let the others into the building.

Upon gaining entry the three hauled cases of beer out of the building and stashed it on the nature trails to the rear of the stand. They then met up and loaded beer into the vehicle of Klahn just as a Washington County Sheriff's Deputy pulled up to the vehicle.

Police were alerted to the break in after a building alarm went off. Upon the officer's arrival he observed a male subject on the south side of the stand running north. The officer then pursued the subject into the wooded area behind the stand. On his pursuit he came across a pile of full beer cans.

He then came across one of the individuals lying on the ground and when ordered to stay laying, that individual took off towards Braatz Drive.

Once back at the concession stand, the officer noticed that the door leading into the stand looked like someone attempted to pry it open. He also noticed damage was done to a garage door handle on the exterior of the building. He then observed the window where the suspects gained entry.

Klahn later stated in his statement that the three and others were "going after beer". Klahn also told police that they initially attempted to gain access to the building through the door and garage door, but when they were unsuccessful, two of them then climbed on the roof and gained entry through the window.

The three have all been released on signature bonds from the Washington County Jail.

On a check of Wisconsin Circuit Court records Klahn has a number of incidents for disorderly conduct, traffic and criminal damage to property. Kraus and Chandler did not have any records.

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

## Officials and industry leaders prepare for pandemic influenza

An estimated 200 state officials, local government leaders, heads of private industry and other stakeholders from southeastern Wisconsin gathered at the Medical College of Wisconsin for the Southeastern Wisconsin Pandemic Influenza Preparedness Regional Forum on Tuesday, August 1. The goal of the forum was to focus attention on the need for Southeastern Wisconsin leaders to plan, prepare and respond in the event of an influenza pandemic.

Linda Walter, Washington County Health Officer said, "Pandemic planning needs to address how schools, businesses, public agencies, faithbased organizations and others participate in the event of a world-wide outbreak." Others attending from Washington County were Tom Sackett, County Board Chair; Gary Moschea, Human Resources Director; Rob Schmid, Emergency Management Coordinator; Sandra Hoefert, Deputy Director Social Services; Paula Mugan, Public Health Nurse; Linda Nutten, Public Health Nurse; Patricia Pearson, Synergy Health/St. Joseph's Hospital; Jeff Puetz, West Bend Mutual Insurance Company and Dr. Michael Mango, emergency medicine.

Unlike fire or earthquake, a pandemic would likely affect most American cities all at once and would have a massive impact on the American workforce and those who rely on it. Plenary presenter Geoffrey R. Swain, MD, MPH, Associate Professor, University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health, and Associate Medical Director, City of Milwaukee Health Department stressed that a flu pandemic was a real possibil-

The forum emphasized the need for regional collaboration between local governments, businesses, and community stakeholders to form partnerships that would effectively support regional pandemic preparedness efforts.

Forum participants discussed strategies for ensuring essential services keep operating without interruption during a possible pandemic, such as communications, transportation and utilities. Small group discussions on planning and preparedness were held throughout the day with representatives from the jurisdictions attending.

The August 23rd meeting of the Washington County Health Care Partners will feature a guest speaker, Mary Beth Emmerichs, CEO of UW Manitowoc, who will discuss the 1918 Influenza Pandemic from a local perspective using historical accounts of what happened in Sheboygan County. The presentation is open to the public and will be held at the county PAC building in room 1113A across from the Health Department from 8:15 to 9:30 a.m.

### Train fire closes highway for over three hours

ALLENTON- Five fire departments helped extinguish a fire that started in the cargo car of a Canadian National train on Friday, August 11, after several citizens alerted the Washington County Sheriff's Department around 2:22 p.m. That same fire started a secondary grass fire adjacent to the tracks the train was traveling on, causing County Highway DW to be closed for about three and a half hours.

The reports were received while the train was just south of Allenton. The Sheriff's Department was able to notify Canadian National at which time the rail car was stopped at County Highway DW. The secondary grass fire started on the eastside of the tracks approximately a half of a mile

north of State Highway 33.

Allenton Fire responded to the scene and was assisted by Kohlsville, St. Lawrence and Slinger Fire Departments. Fire officials were able to contain the fire enough so that the train was able to continue north of Theresa. Several fire units then responded to Theresa to assist Theresa Fire Department once the train reached Theresa. The train was moved to Theresa at approximately 5:45 PM.

Authorities say the fire was isolated to one rail car containing two cargo containers stacked on top of each other. The fire appeared to have

started in the top container, which contained wood products. The fire damaged the bottom container, containing heating and air conditioning products. There were no hazardous materials aboard the rail car.

At this time it is unknown what started the fire however it doesn't appear to be suspicious in nature. There is no dollar estimate of damage at this time.

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

In July, close to 50 young Ikes from across the country met in Springfield, Missouri, for the Izaak Walton League of America Youth Convention held during the League's annual national convention.

It was three days of education and conservation, starting with two workshops that dealt with people's effects on the economy and the environment. They saw firsthand how their everyday actions affect water quality and wildlife habitat. Later, they had the opportunity to do wildlife surveying in Missouri's famous caves

The highlight of the Youth Convention was when the kids teamed with the City of Springfield, James River Basin Partnership, and the Watershed Committee for the Ozarks for a two-day community service project that consisted of a stream cleanup at South Creek and

In the new novel "Happiness Sold Separately" by Lolly Winston, you'll see that the ingredients for a perfect marriage do not come prepackaged with easy directions

Elinor Mackey was standing in her laundry room when she learned that her husband, Ted, was having an affair. Lately, it seemed as if everything Elinor did, she did in the laundry room. It was dark in there, and she never had to think about her problems

Infertility could be ignored in the laundry room. Wacky hormones could be swept away. IVF was just a weird configuration of letters there. And now Ted's infidelity could be overlooked.

It's easy to see why Ted would turn to another woman. All those tests Elinor endured, all the shots, all the up-anddown emotions she's feeling couldn't have made Ted happy. But having an affair... with an ex-hippie from the gym?

No. Elinor can't overlook that. She confronts the lovers and leaves Ted.

Ted wonders when everything went wrong. He never meant to sleep with Gina. He wanted to have children with Elinor. Two little girls, maybe three. 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

## New Indians are ready to take over

By the time the 2005 prep football season completed, pretty much everyone in southeastern Wisconsin was aware of what a good team Kewaskum High School had.

Donath, Stockhausen, Jeff Thull, Bryan Daggett, Zach Wollner, Jon Olla ... they had the talent, desire, and leadership to carry the Indians far, first to a perfect 7-0 season in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, and then well into the WIAA playoff series.

Even though Kewaskum didn't make it to state, it was a memorable 12-1 season, which ended in a loss to Wisconsin Lutheran, the eventual Division 3 state champion.

The page is now turned to 2006. How are the new seniors approaching the season? Can Kewaskum make another championship run? Who will take over for last year's stars?

It may take time to answer some of those questions, but coach Jason Piittmann is already certain he has some topnotch players among the 34 seniors and juniors on the team, and they are ready to continue the tradition.

Piittmann said earlier this week the new seniors take satisfaction in what they accomplished last year, "but they want to make their own mark." The coach even went so far as to say, "They have a little bit of a chip on their shoulder because no one is talking about us right now."

Instead, according to one early poll, Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls, are being picked as the top contenders, Falls because of the experience and talent of senior quarterback Jacob Juedes, who led his team to second place in a passing tournament this summer, and Plymouth because of its size and number of returnees.

They're going to be big, very big," Piittmann said, indicating they could have a line with players going from 240 all the way up to 300 pounds.

The cupboard isn't bare at KHS, either in the size department and at the skilled posi-

Game-breaker Eric Ogi (5-foot-9, 163 pounds) is back at wingback or possibly even getting some carries from the tailback spot.

"He's a talented kid. We

are looking for ways to get the ball in his hands," Piittmann said of Ogi, who made at least a half dozen catches of 50 yards or more last fall.

Matt Parrent (6-4, 205) will be back at tight end or maybe even split end once he gets the cast off his hand after breaking his thumb during the baseball sectionals.

'We're going to try to do more things with Matt Parrent because of his height and his athletic ability," Pittmann

As far as the backs to replace Donath, the EWC's Player of the Year, and Stockhausen, Piittmann is looking to Dan Shea (6-1, 175) and Logan Staege (6-2, 175), both talented players. and Mike Pfotenhauer (5-10, 170) will probably see action at fullback.

With Donath being as quick as he was and Stockhausen a crushing lead blocker, the Indians had good success to the outside. The blocking schemes might change a bit for the new personnel, according to Piittmann, "so we can open some creases" for Shea, Ogi and others.

At quarterback, Casey Scheel (6-1, 165) is ready to take over after watching Chad Piwoni perform and lead the last two years.

"Chad was a better quarterback for us, but Casey is a better passer" and learned a lot from watching from the sideline," Piittmann said. "He really picks up things fast."

Junior John Holt (6-3, 180) will be a great backup, according to Piittmann, who said, "With Casey and John, We're looking good ... the sophomore Nic Olla isn't bad ei-

In the "O" line, Piittmann set on Jake Turowski (6-0, 190) and Tony Lewko (6-0, 190) at guards but the others spots might be up in the air. Turowski "is the anchor of the line," Piittmann said, adding, Lewko "came in for (Jeff) Thull (knee injury) and did a great job in the playoffs.

At center, Tyler Swanson (6-1, 215, junior) and Zach Groeschel (6-3, 200, senior) are battling to become the starter, and, "We've got some other kids, Bryan Theisen (5-11, 210 senior ) and the Thull twins (Tom, 6-2, 255, junior) and Tim 6-2, 240, junior) vying for the tackle spots.

Piittmann also has a jumbo tackle in J.J. Logan, who tips the scale at 340. "He wants to play both ways, but we'll see where he will benefit the team the most," the coach said.

At split end, Piittmann likes what he sees from Jack Breese (6-1, 195), who worked really hard in the offseason and added 10 pounds. Dany Dymond (6-3, 185) and Ben Butler (6-0, 145) are two other possibilities.

When asked about the returnees on defense, Pittmann said, "Not many." two good linebackers, starting with Pfotenhauer, who is a big hitter, and Staege, who has moved from his end position..

"In the secondary we have Ogi," Piittmann went on, indicating while there aren't more starters back, plenty of kids got experience because "We played a lot of guys on de-

Breese and a transfer from Iowa are two other top candidates at linebacker, and in the backfield, Holt and Matt Donath (6-4, 192, junior) ) have looked good, and Nick Ebert (6-0, 185 junior) and Corey Watzig (6-1, 248 junior) "have impressed me" at linebacker and defensive end.

Turowski will be at one end, and a variety of others will be looked at during the scrimmage Saturday at Random Lake.

The five-team event will begin at 9 a.m., with Kewaskum facing Brown Deer in the first round. At 10:30, the Indians take on Winnebago Lutheran Academy, and at 11:15, the Indians face Random Lake.

Piittmann said he doesn't like to make predictions as far as wins and losses but is confident, ""We should be contending up near the top."

The season opens Friday, Aug. 24 when the Indians host West Bend East. Kewaskum has right around 100 players this fall, which is up 20 from last season, according to Piittmann.



The Oshkosh team didn't get much off A's starter Ziegler, who gave up just a single run in eight full innings on the mound. When Olson came in, he gave up a leadoff walk, then the runner took second on a wild pitch and came home on a single.

The loss gives the A's a 4-8 mark against Rock River opponents, with two games remaining, including one on Aug. 10 vs. Slinger at Brownsville. The A's will close their regulars season on Saturday, Aug. 19, with a makeup game against Hartford. This game will be played at Kiwanis Park in Kewaskum, starting at 1:30 p.m.

Bryan Daggett was a bruiser at offensive tackle and was recognized as one of the top linemen in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

He didn't go unnoticed in his home town either, and for his efforts, Daggett is this year's recipient of the annual football coaches'

The announcement was made recently by Joe Back-haus, one of the Gridiron's board members and Daggett's sixth grade coach.

"That will help out a lot," Daggett said last week about winning the \$1,000 award. He will be attending UW-Oshkosh this year and left for the Titans' football camp on Saturday.

"That was an awesome time ... a very memorable season," Daggett said, and Backhaus said his high school coaches had a lot to say about him too, concerning his good work ethics, attitude and a willingness to improve on his techniques.
