Village trustees approve 2007 budget

KEWASKUM- The Kewaskum Village Board quickly approved a balanced \$2,521,062 budget. Only one taxpayer was present at a public hearing held before the board's meeting, Monday, November 27. The public hearing quickly closed within 10 minutes of opening the meeting.

Taxpayers can expect to receive their tax bill around December 9. Over all, the tax levy (amount of money collected from taxes) increased by

As mentioned in a previous edi-

tion, the tax rate decreased by a dime. It is believed that the increase in value helped lower the tax rate.

Village of Kewaskum taxpayers will pay a total of \$20.28 per \$1,000 of equalized value. The village's cut of the tax rate is \$6.51 and the school district will receive \$8.40. The remaining \$5.37 will be dispersed to the state, Washington County and Moraine Park Technical College. Taxpayers do receive a bit of relief through the Wisconsin Lottery, which will provide an \$87.73 credit to the taxpayer's primary resident's tax bill.

Village residents have two options for paying their property taxes. They

can pay the entire bill or half before January 31, 2007. This must be paid to the village by mail or in person. If a receipt is desired, and your payment is mailed, you must enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

The second installment, if that option is chosen, must be paid by July 31, 2007 to the Washington County

Taxpayers will also see a 10 percent increase in their sewer bills in 2007. Village Administrator Jay Shambeau stated that increases in the operating costs of the utility is the reason for the increase.

Library is first Wi-Fi hotspot here

KEWASKUM- The Kewaskum Public Library has some exciting things planned for the upcoming New Year. The first, which has already taken place, has the library as the village's first wireless internet hotspot. After the New Year, the library is set to enter into a new consortium that will increase the borrowing power for pa-

Library Director Steve Baker was pleased to announce that the library now offers wireless high-speed Internet service (also known as Wi-Fi) to users of laptop computers. Users can bring in their laptop and connect to the high-speed service anywhere in the library.

"I've been trying to get this for two years. Because our T-1 line is provided through the library consortium we are a part of, we had to get permission from them. After I noticed West Bend had the service, I contacted them and got the ball rolling for Kewaskum, stated Baker.

Users have been slim, but only because word has not spread. To date, they have not encountered any prob-

The second big announcement coming out of the library, will see the partnership of 47 libraries from Dodge, Washington, Jefferson, Racine and Walworth Counties joining together to provide items for patrons. Currently the Kewaskum Library shares items with the five libraries in Washington County. Baker says he's



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
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Wayne cemetery project complete



A summer project that saw a town of Wayne cemetery receive a facelift has been completed. Town chairman Leander Herriges, along with other town officials, worked in the cemetery, removing brush, repairing grave stones, leveling the ground of sunken graves and then re-seeding. Herriges says that Skyline Drive cemetery had not received work since the 1950's. The entire project took about two and one half days worth of labor. During the clean-up process, a neighbor called the Washington County Sheriff's Department complaining that the clean-up was against the law. Washington County Sheriff Brian Rahn, cleared the township of any wrong-doing and stated that according to state law, it is a township's right and duty to maintain abandoned cemeteries. The project cost taxpayers \$2,200. Herriges said the town would now do regular maintainance on the cemetery. "I've had several good comments about the way it looks," stated Herriges proudly.



Scott manure problem solved, fire departments present contracts

TOWN OF SCOTT- Town supervisors received good news after being plagued with complaints about the obnoxious smell caused by spreading chicken manure in this farming community. Supervisors also received their first glimpse at the proposed new three-year fire depart-ment agreements with Batavia and Beechwood.

At their November meeting, Supervisor Cheryl Scholz shared a letter received from Partnership, located in neighboring Town of Farmington. The company is the operator of a commercial chicken farm there. The letter stated they would discontinue spreading manure.

Supervisors also learned that R&J Partnership would initiate a new process that converts the manure into compost. While this will not eliminate the entire odor problem, it's hoped to make it more bearable for neighboring residents.

Further discussion on creating regulations on manure spreading was not fa-vored by Supervisor Randy Narbatovics. Further action has been placed on hold for

the time being.
Diamond F Corporation, a sludge transport firm from Richfield, who maintains an agreement with the township to spread sludge notified the township that they no longer hold a permit from the state to haul in the township.

Discussion regarding whether or not a fee owed by Diamond F should still be paid as well as a fine de-scribed in the town's ordinance ensued. A motion to force Diamond F to pay the fee and fine was introduced by supervisor Bruce Birenbaum and seconded by Narbatovics. The motion passed by a four to one vote with Scholz voting no.

New three-year contracts were presented from the Beechwood and Batavia Fire Departments. Each request ed the township put \$20,000 in an equipment outlay account. Town chairman Steve Jung stated that last year the town was only able to put in \$15,000.

Both also requested continuing the three percent annual increase that was given in the last three-year contract. Supervisors are believed to sign contracts with both departments at the December meeting after review of their proposals by the town attor-

County PDR program given CPR, April referendum vote proposed

WEST BEND- It looks like Washington County's Property Development Rights (PDR) program has been given CPR. The Washington County Board's Executive Committee met and decided to put through a plan to bring the failed program to a county-wide referendum vote in April.

On Tuesday, November 28, the Executive Committee approved sending the proposed binding referendum proposal to the County Board in January. Only one member of the committee voted against the idea.

Dan Stoffel, County Board Supervisor representing all of Kewaskum, has been a proponent of the idea since it was brought before the county board for a vote in June of 2006. That vote failed and at the time, Stoffel stated that the group advocating the idea would re-group and re-think

National influenza vaccination week

MADISON- The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has proclaimed the week of November 27 to December 3 as National Influenza Vaccination Week. This week-long event is designed to raise awareness that people can still get their flu shots into December and January.

The typical flu season for Wisconsin generally runs from November to March. Since the season usually peaks in late January or early February, it's not too late to be vaccinated in December and even January.

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), influenza vaccine will continue to be shipped to Wisconsin throughout the flu season. If your health care provider or local health department doesn't have vaccine in stock right now, they should receive a supply soon.

Influenza is a contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus. "Flu" illness ranges from very mild to severe cases, and in some instances, can cause life-threatening complications. Influenza symptoms can come on quickly and include: Fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, nasal congestion and body aches and/ or tiredness

Some ways to stay healthy and to protect yourself and their proposal.

PDR is a voluntary program of buying easements from rural property owners that prevent residential or commercial development in the future. PDR is used in 27 other states to encourage investment in the agricultural industry, minimize land use conflicts and preserve open space and water recharge areas.

locate at least \$800,000 per year for at least 10 years to a land preservation fund for the purpose of preserving prime farmland and natural areas in Washington County through PDR or other forms of land acquisition. The funding source would be left to the county board, but a previously passed ordinance reserved about 10% of annual county sales tax revenues for this type

In March, 2006 the County Board, by a 17-11 margin, passed a resolution endorsing the concept of a PDR program starting in 2007. However, after the April elections brought in nine new County Board Supervisors, that action was reversed by a 15-14 vote.

State disaster fund aids Hartford

HARTFORD - The City of Hartford has received a check totaling \$61,420.10 from the State of Wisconsin Disaster Fund (WDF). The money is designed to reimburse 70% of costs incurred by the city, other assisting units of government, mutual aid emergency response agencies and public works departments that responded to the June 18th, 2006 tornado.

The City of Hartford, through the Washington County Office of Emergency Management, applied for the funds to reimburse the City for uninsurable costs incurred for emergency protective measures and debris clean up.

Costs incurred by five City of Hartford departments, the Hartford Joint School District, three other Washington County municipalities, three private clean-up contractors and 14 responding law enforcement, fire and EMS agencies from Washington and Dodge Counties were covered. The city will be issuing checks to the assisting entities as soon as possible.

The Wisconsin Disaster Fund was created by Wisconsin Act 269 and was signed into law in April 2006. Wisconsin Emergency Management is the administering agency and the fund is for county, local and tribal units of government that have been impacted by natural disaster. The fund was created by the

state to address events that cause substantial damage but do not reach the level of a presidential declared disaster. All requests for the WDF must go through the county Emergency Management Office. Assistance is only available for three eligible costs: emergency protective measures, debris removal and damage to roads/bridges/water control facilities.

On June 18, 2006 an F1 tornado stuck the City of Hartford at 2:26 PM. The tornado was on the ground for approximately 5.8 miles and caused roughly \$4.5 million in damages. The Father's Day storm damaged 160 structures with 10-15 suffering major damage. Lincoln Elementary was particularly hard hit.





Local Catholic parishes begin Advent with 5-day Mission

St. Alphonsus died over two centuries ago, but his legacy lives on.

Not only is his Redemptorist order still actively in existence, the Redemptorist priests are dedicated to continuing his practice of holding missions in an effort to draw Christians closer to Christ.

Parishioners at Holy Trinity and St. Michaels parishes have the opportunity to participate in such a mission next week when "In Christ With One Voice" will be held nightly at the two parishes.

"St. Alphonsus founded the order (Redemptorists) to fire up the faith and make the people enthusiastic about the things of Jesus," Fr. Ed Kornath, the pastor of the two parishes said, indicating missions "have been part of the charism of their order."

The mission is "a way to bring Holy Trinity and St. Michaels closer ... and to bring all of us closer to the Lord," Fr. Kornath said

The leaders of the mission will be Fr. John Kuehner, CSSR and Fr. Matthew Bonk, CSSR. and both are quite young, according to Fr. Kornath, who said he met Fr. Kuehner in October when the two met to plan the event.

"The Redemptorist priests will be preaching at all next weekend's Masses," Fr. Kornath said, then the mission will begin Sunday evening at 6:30 p.m.

"Every evening has its own theme," Fr. Kornath said, explaining one night will focus on the crucifixion, one on the word of God, another on the power of the Eucharist.

The mission will be held Sunday and Thursday (with a closing Mass and mission) at Holy Trinity, and Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings at St. Michaels.

Who is invited to the mission? Everyone, according to Fr. Kornath, who said it is for "children, teenagers and adults." As a matter of fact, the children's choir will be singing one of the evenings."

All the evening events be-

gin at 6:30 p.m. and will last approximately an hour and a quarter.

In addition, "The priests will be celebrating Mass at Holy Trinity on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at the usual 7:45 a.m. time. And there will be fellowship in the church hall after the morning Masses and the evening missions.

People may come every evening, or they may come to two evenings or whatever fits into their time schedule, according to Fr. Kornath.

When asked if he is excited about having a mission come to his collaborated parishes, Fr. Kornath answered with an emphatic, "Yes, I think mission helps people learn more about their faith, and it encourages some to come back to the Church"

What a mission teaches is that "God truly loves us" and takes care of us, Fr. Kornath said. "If God made us, then certainly God should be number one in our lives."

It's been several years since Holy Trinity or St. Michaels hosted its last mission. "I think





Ocean exploration Marine Corps flag presentation at KES day held at FES

Tuesday, November 21, was no ordinary day at Farmington Elementary School (FES). It was a day of exciting ocean exploration.

The FES PTO sponsored The Australia Great White Shark Expedition assembly for students and staff. The shark assembly is one of eight shows offered through - The Ocean Adventure: Real Life Science Adventures.

The program began with an introduction to sharks in general and then went on to teach students about great white sharks in particular. Models were used to help demonstrate how sharks are different from bony fish and how sharks find their food using their seven senses.

Part of the demonstration included gigantic jaws from a 20-foot great white shark Student helpers also assisted in showing how big sharks are, from the smallest to the largest, and a few in between.

Undersea explorers, Wayne and Karen Brown, then took students on their thrilling adventure in search of great white sharks in South Australia via a slide presentation.

The highlight of the presentation was a dive with a 15-foot, 3,000 lb. female great white shark.

At the end of the presentation, students literally came face-to-face with a great white shark when they met "Sheila", the 15-foot inflatable female great white shark.

"As the show started, one of the 4K students came up to me and said he was afraid of sharks," said Karen Brown. "By the end of the show, he

came back up, gave me a hug and said he wasn't afraid of sharks anymore. That's what makes these assemblies wonderful and important. We are sharing our adventures helping young people understand and learn more about the ocean and all the creatures that live in it."

Wayne Brown is a professional underwater photographer, scuba diving instructor, author, lecturer, and marine biologist. Over 30 years of diving experiences have taken him around the world studying and documenting the earth's marine environments and the creatures that inhabit them. He has been privileged to work with many respected institutions and individuals, including the Russian Academy of Sciences, Scripps Institute of Oceanography and the late Phillipe Cousteau.

In 1987, Wayne started The Ocean Adventure, bringing the marine environment into the classroom to help students develop positive attitudes about science and nature while promoting an appreciation and respect for all marine organisms and their place in the environment.

In addition to his skills as a popular lecturer for children and adults, Wayne is an award-winning photographer and a member of the American Society of Media Photographers. His work appears in many national and international adult and children's books, textbooks, and maga-

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



Kewaskum Kommuters and visitors have a new choice to fuel up. J-Stop Citgo and Convenience Store opened for business on Thursday, November 16, and owner Jim Thull says he's happy to be the newest member of the Kewaskum business community.

Thull, who resides with his wife Judy in the town of Farmington, says he has always been an advocate for secondary education and that is how he began his career in the gas gig. After seeing the economic slide downward in manufacturing, which he worked in for about 30 years in a management capacity, he began realizing that he better put into practice, what he had been preaching.

"I always told the kids, how impor-

tant higher education was," he says Thull headed back to school in 1997 at age 43. While attending night classes at Cardinal Stritch University a classmate told him about her father who owned a gas station and how he enjoyed it.

Kewaskum's J-Stop has 10 fueling positions for customers, two of which are diesel pumps. Thull says he is proud of the fact that the diesel pumps dispense ultra low sulfur fuel. All 10 pumps are open 24-hours for credit card customers.

The convenience store is 2,600 square feet filled with everything a traveler on the go could want along with items for commuters to pick up on their way home. Some items that can be found inside are fresh Berres

Brothers coffee; Kemps milk products, grocery products, Wisconsin Lottery tickets and a full-line of tobacco products. The store plans to carry beer in the near future.

Adjacent to the store is a full service McDonalds restaurant owned and managed by Kilian Management Services of West Bend, Owner Steve Kilian closed his McDonalds Express restaurant that was located in the BP of Kewaskum station farther north on Fond du Lac Avenue. Kilian Management operated that store from October 1997 until Oct 31, 2007

The new McDonalds restaurant has an upscale look that fits with the new McDonalds business model according to Sharon Ruplinger, of Kilian Management. She stated the store now employs 45 full and part-time people.

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

Beck bags 13-pointer during final weekend; deer season is a success

Hunters in and around Washington County were pretty successful during the 2006 gun deer season. At least the numbers of deer registered at Al's Taxidermy in Kewaskum indicate a good year.

"Four hundred and ninety one total," Kathy Broecker said after adding in the deer registered on Sunday and Monday morning, and as this reporter was leaving the station, another hunter pulled up with a nice-sized doe on his vehicle, so that boosts the total to 492.

And more may be brought in today, according to Broecker, who said, "They have until 5 p.m. (to register)"

Broecker said the breakdown showed the total of bucks shot was 193, while the number of antlerless deer hit 299.

"It's real close," Broecker said, looking at the 60-40 split

On the final weekend, Adam Beck of St. Michaels registered a 13-pointer, according to Broecker, who said her husband, Al, remarked it was a very nice deer. "I also see some nines (pointers) and eights," she said.

Broecker wasn't sure exactly how many deer were registered at the Kewaskum station a year ago but did say with relative certainty, "I think last year we had a lot more does than this year."

does than this year."

The total number may have increased slightly because there were fewer stations in Washington County, although West Bend Elevator registered deer for the first time but was not open on the two Sundays.

"We were very busy this year," she went on, indicating some hunters may have come to Kewaskum specifically to have their deer checked by the Department of Natural Re-

sources (DNR). "If the hunter allowed, she (Angie Rusch) took heads to be tested. They try to do that (in different counties) every three or four years. This was our year."

When asked how long it will take to determine if any of the deer were infected with CWD, which stands for Chronic Wasting Disease, Broecker said, "They won't know for eight to ten weeks. We're all hoping they don't find anything. She (Rusch) did say our deer looked very healthy."

Doug Bilgo, the conservation warden for Fond du Lac County, said Monday, "We've never had any CWD around bere"

Bilgo was also happy to report the '06 season was a very safe one. No accidents were reported in the area, according to Bilgo, who said he understood there was just one fatality in the state, that coming in northern Wisconsin.

Muzzleloader deer hunting continues statewide until Dec. 6

MADISON - People venturing out into Wisconsin woods and fields over the next few weeks should note that while the traditional nineday deer hunting season in Wisconsin closes on Sunday, Nov. 26, a statewide muzzleloader season runs from Nov. 27 through Dec. 6, deer hunting in the chronic wasting disease (CWD) management zones continues through Dec. 10, and a statewide antlerless only hunt will be held Dec. 7-10.

The muzzleloader season is open statewide. A muzzle-loader is a firearm that can only be loaded from the muzzle, or the barrel end of the firearm, and uses black powder or black powder substitute. The muzzleloader season is held statewide except in some state parks units.

Keith Warnke, deer ecologist for the Department of Natural Resources, says a steady growth in the number of deer registered during muzzleloader seasons is an indication of the growing popularity of muzzleloader hunting.

In 2005 muzzleloader hunters registered 8,553 deer, Warnke says, compared to, 7,074 deer in 2004 and under 6,100 in 2003, and 3,900 in 2002. By comparison, in 1991, the first year a special muzzleloader season was held, just over 200 deer were taken.

Hunters who plan on participating in the muzzleloader deer hunting season should check the 2006 Wisconsin Deer Hunting Regulation Pamphlet for muzzleloader restrictions and deer tagging options.

Tim Lawhern, DNR hunter safety administrator, says muzzleloader hunters need to be aware of the possibility of misfires, in which powder does not ignite, or "hangfires," in which there is a delay in the discharge.

"It is very important that muzzleloader hunters keep their powder dry. Misfires or hangfires can and do happen. When this does happen they should point the muzzle in a safe direction for at least 30 seconds. By doing so, should the muzzleloader go off, it will not harm anyone."

CWD zone hunt

The firearm deer hunting season in the CWD Herd Reduction and Disease Eradication zones that began on Nov. 18 continues through Dec. 10. During this time deer hunters in these zones can shoot deer of either-sex. Hunters can obtain 2006-2007 CWD Deer Carcass Tags, free of charge, a rate of four per hunter per day.

Antlerless deer hunt Dec. 7-10

Also this year there will be an antlerless only firearm hunt from Dec. 7 through 10 held in all deer management units statewide (except in the CWD

zones where either-sex hunting regulations apply on these days). During this hunt, hunters in Earn-a-Buck and Herd Control units can tag with antlerless deer carcass tags valid in Herd Control and Earn-a-Buck units. Additional Herd Control EAB carcass tags may be purchased at any license vendor through the hunting seasons for \$2 each. In "Regular" units hunters can only tag antlerless deer with antlerless deer carcass tags valid for the specific unit in which they are hunting. There are still unitspecific antlerless deer carcass tags available in some regular units. The tags cost \$12 each for residents and \$20 each for non-residents.

While any gun deer season is open, except for waterfowl hunters, all hunters are required to wear at least 50 percent blaze orange clothing, including a hat if worn.

New coach is confident there will be improvement

Early games will test Indian boys squad

When Kewaskum High boys basketball coach Bobby Bannasch looked at the 2006-'07 schedule, he must have swallowed hard, then swallowed hard again.

The first two teams on the schedule are defending champion Manitowoc Roncalli and Plymouth, the preseason picks to win the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title.

That's right. The Indians, with a new coach, coming off a 4-17 season and missing one day of practice because of the extension of the football season, somehow go right into the EWC schedule without any non-conference games.

"We start right out with Roncalli. Roncalli has been down to state the last two or three years," Bannasch said. "Obviously it's going to be a good measuring stick for us ... to see where we are and what we have to improve on."

Kewaskum does have four senior letter winners returning, led by Matt Parrent, who was a first-team all-EWC pick as a sophomore and a second-team selection last season when he finished eighth in scoring in the league with 267 points, good for a 14.5 ppg (points per game) average.

Parrent, a 6-foot-4 post player, will also be called upon to carry a big part of the rebounding load, as he hauled down just under 10 boards per game a year ago.

Bannasch will also have his point guard, Casey Scheel back. Scheel, a 6-2 guard, received honorable mention in the EWC balloting after scoring 146 points (a 9.12 ppg. average) a year ago when he missed several games at the end of the season because of an injury

The other two lettermen are 6-1 guard/forward Jack Breese, who scored 36 points as a junior and 6-0 Dan Schea, who appeared in 19 games and only scored 18 points but helped out defensively in several games.

When it comes to team strengths, Bannasch said it will be "the senior leadership. It's important the senior leadership comes through. It's important in order to limit our turnovers."

Parrent and Scheel, two returning starters, give the team another strength. "They have the ability to score," Bannasch said.

The other senior on the team is Jon Wicklund, a 6-1 guard/forward, who played mainly on the junior varsity team a year ago but has plenty of athletic ability as he showed on the gridiron this fall. In fact, all five seniors should come into the season brimming with confidence after being integral parts of the KHS team that shared the EWC title with Plymouth and advanced to the Division 3 semifinals before losing to Greendale.

The four juniors on the team are Jon Holt, a 6-2 forward, Dan Parker, a 6-1 guard, T.J. Corey, a 6-1 guard, and James Wiedmeyer, a 6-1 guard/forward.

"That's the group that's out," Bannasch said of his nine players, indicating his junior varsity coach is Mike Drewniak, and the freshmen, numbering 13 or 14, will be coached by Mike Hendricks and Luke Piwoni.

Bannasch also has a couple of volunteers, Jason Meinen, a teacher in the district, and Eric Cain helping out. Cain, who was on the team last year and is currently a student at UW-Washington County, "is volunteering. He's helping with the practices," Bannasch said.

Bannasch said the players made a good transition

from football to basketball. "They're excited about the basketball season. They started working hard right away."

One concern the new coach has as the season starts is rebounding. "We're going to be a little undersized compared with some of our opponents, but we have guys who are pretty scrappy ... Wicklund, Breese and Holt," Bannasch said, indicating they will have to "do their job and box out." Bannasch expects all three to be definite contributors.

The new coach indicates Roncalli "is going to be everyone's choice" to win the title, especially considering Greg Schrimpf, who averaged 21 points per game in the 2005-06 season, is back to lead the Jets.

"I would say Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls are going to be right up there again this year," Bannasch said.

The Indians finished 3-11 in the EWC a year ago and Bannasch expects the number in the win column to improve a bit. "I would say we're hoping to be right in the middle," he said, adding three factors will figure into a successful finish. They include staying away from injuries, taking good care of the basketball and playing strong defense.

"We're going to try to be a half court team and play intense defense," Bannasch said.

Kewaskum is at Roncalli Friday night, then entertains Plymouth for the home opener on Friday, December 8.

* Erika Koffke, outside hitter, great passer and digger in the back row, very aggressive and a leader on the court, a Most Valuable Hitter.


* Erica Rammer, setter and outside hitter, was running plays and setting specialty sets by the end of the season, good passer, very reliable server, great encourager of her teammates.


* Theresa Ratzel, setter and outside hitter, was willing to try anything new, very powerful serve, great attitude, showed a lot of team spirit.

Freshmen and sophomores vs. talented and experienced basketball players from the other schools in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

It wouldn't take a genius to figure the Kewaskum High girls basketball team would struggle a year ago, and struggle it did, going the entire conference schedule (0-14) without a victory ... and the entire season (0-21) with no "W."

So what does the picture look like this year as Jeff Gosse returns to try to resurrect the program?

Don't look for any conference title. With the veterans they have returning, Campbellsport and Two Rivers are in line to contend for the 2006-'07 crown, according to Gosse, who said at this point his goal is to teach the fundamentals of the game and slowly start climbing back to respectability.

Gosse has just one senior, Sam Droese, to call on for leadership. Droese is one of four returning letter winners.

That's it," Gosse answered when asked about the senior he can look to. "She (Droese) is a quick player. She's a good leaper, so she'll have to get in there and do some rebounding," Gosse said about the 5foot-6 veteran who will play "probably point guard and Number 2 guard."

Not only will Droese have to score, pass and rebound, Gosse said, "She'll be called on to break opponents' presses because the others (on his team) are so, so, so inexperi-

And is Droese a good shooter? 'Yes," was Gosse's answer, and Droese returns as the team's leading scorer after contributing six to eight points per game last year.

Alyssa Jung had a couple good games last winter and showed improvement as the season wore on. Gosse said the 5-8 junior letter winner will be playing center or strong forward.

Gosse sees sophomore Jenny Wicklund, another of his letter winners, as a player with potential. "She's going to be playing small forward or big guard," he said, adding, "She's an average shooter. We've got to work on her shooting ... improve on a few technique

The other returnee is sophomore Kelsey Goetsch, who at 5-10 will be the tallest girl on the squad.

'She'll be playing strong forward," Gosse said, and he looks for her to handle the major load of the rebounding.

Last year, then coach Dave Kraft said his girls didn't lack in the effort department but, because they were young, were not physically strong enough to compete with the other teams they played.

To combat against that happening again this year, Gosse has started a weight program. "That's one of my biggest concerns," Gosse said regarding the lack of physical players on his roster.

Filling out the varsity squad will be three juniors and the entire sophomore class of basketball players. After not playing basketball last year, The Rinzel twins, Megan and Stephanie, have come back," Gosse said, reporting the two 5-6 juniors, who just came off a successful volleyball campaign, will both play at the guard spot, and, "They're in good shape."

Catherine Stoffel had also decided to join the program to provide some depth.

6 Lauren Hughes, 5-4 Jessie Liniewski, 5-6 Amanda Schneider, 5-9 Nicole Kison, 5-10 Heather Schaller, 5-9 Nicole Hallstead, 5-6 Sara Lehnerz and 5-4 Lacy Taylor, together.

'The JVs are all freshmen," Gosse said, announcing the school will not field a freshman team this season. Terriann Gundrum will be the JV coach, and Lois Volesky, who was supposed to coach the freshmen, will help out at both the other levels.

'We're doing this all together," the coach said, indicating the offenses, defenses, inbound plays will all be the same

"We can only go up ... baby steps," Gosse said. "We've first got to take care of some attitude problems, then work on skills and work on more skills,"

Concerning how the practices are going, Gosse said, "We've had some good moments and then we get a little lazy ... the girls have got to learn to work a lot harder on defense."

In summing up the situation as he sees it," Gosse said, "We've got a plan. It's a twoyear plan. If it works, the girls who are freshmen and sophomores will have a very strong team ... but it's going to take a lot of work."

The Indians' shooting was also way off. They got off 37 shots but only made five for a woeful 13.7 percent.


