Kriewaldt to leave district

KEWASKUM- The school district's Director of Elementary Education has accepted a contract to fulfill a superintendent's position in the Erin School District in Hartford. Dr. Kieth Kriewaldt says he will ask the Board of Education to end his contract at the June meeting.

Kriewaldt started in the Kewaskum School District on November 20, 1995, when he became principal of Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools after leaving the Plymouth School District. On July 1, 1996 he became the District's first ever Director of Elementary Education and also replaced long-time Kewaskum Elementary School (KES) principal Richard Zarling who retired.

Board of Education member Jean Goeden was on the team that hired Dr. Kriewaldt and stated she was very excited to have him join the Kewaskum

trict. "We hired Mr. Kriewaldt knowing that Mr Zarling retiring soon. felt Mr. Kriewaldt could continue with leadthe ership instilled at

Goeden revealed that she was also excited about Kriewaldt's work in the gifted and talented program at Plymouth's School District. She was certain that he would implement those practices into the classroom, and she was right.

bomb threat

KEWASKUM- A threat was made to blow up Kewaskum High School (KHS) on Wednesday, May 30. However, only a handful of folks knew about the threat found by a teacher in the morning, and quick thinking averted panic.

According to a Kewaskum Police Department report, KHS principal, Christine Horbas notified Superintendent of Schools Mike Krumm who called police after a bomb threat was found at the school inside a men's bathroom stall. The message stated "There's a bomb in school and will blow up on 5-30.

The report states that Horbas told police she didn't feel the threat was legitimate for several reasons. First, being that day was noted as senior skip day, she told police that members of the junior class were also planning a

School officials and law enforcement were unable to substantiate the threat. Horbas and assistant principal Tom Fischer ordered janitors to check the entire school for anything suspicious in nature.

Horbas stated in an interview that with students and teachers inside the building and already beginning their day, school administrators went classroom-to-classroom asking teachers if anything was "amiss" in their rooms. There was no mention to students or teachers of the threat found. "We did not want to alarm teachers; we did not want to alarm students if it was unnecessary," Horbas stated.

Ultimately, nothing was found amiss nor was any type of explosive





Two injured in Friday crash



Two people were injured in a two-vehicle crash on Townline Road at Highway H at the town of Kewaskum/town of Wayne town limits. "It (Kewaskum) has been a wonderful place to work. I have made so many friends," Dr. Kriewaldt stated. He referred to his departure as not a door closing, but another door opening, because he would like to one-day return to the District.

Dr. Kriewaldt stated the position in the Erin District presented an opportunity to further his career in education administration. He earned his doctorate of education degree from Cardinal Stritch University on May 20.

In his 11 years working in the district, Dr. Kriewaldt stated he is most proud of revamping the elementary schools' buildings, primarily the construction of KES and remodeling at Wayne and Farmington. He is also proud of the many opportunities he has had working with families and seeing those students

achieve their goals.

"I see this district really going forward. We have the right speed and direction. It's difficult to walk away from that," Dr. Kriewaldt concludIn his resignation to the Board of Education, Dr. Kriewaldt offered to assist his replacement at no charge to the district. Superintendent of Schools Mike Krumm did not respond to an inquiry as to

how Kriewaldt's position will

be filled. The Erin School District describes itself as a rural 4K

through eighth grade district with small class sizes. The total student population is 375. Students are funneled to Hartford Union High School after

attending Erin Middle School. Kriewaldt will replace Dr. Sally

Jo Nelson on July 1.







Mauthe Lake campground and Horserider's camp receive modern improvements

MAUTHE LAKE- A new bathroom facility awaits those camping at the recreation area. The facility has toilets and showers, both needed after a day on the new bike trail reported on last week. The New Prospect Horserider's camp is also undergoing a remodeling project so to speak.

The improvements come from funds through the state's Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund according to forest superintendent, Jerry Leiterman. The Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund was established in 1989, to preserve Wisconsin's most significant natural resources for future generations,

as well as to provide the land base and recreational facilities needed for quality outdoor experiences. The program was reauthorized in 2000 and is authorized through 2010.

Campers in the 300 group sites at Mauthe Lake Recreation Area will enjoy new bathroom and shower facilities while camping this year. Leiterman explained the new facility is state of the art for state parks throughout the country.

In addition to the shower and bathroom, which have been separated into two separate areas, a multi-need room is also available for families or those with mobility handicaps. According to Leiterman the toilets and sinks were designed separate of the shower area to eliminate humidity.

Horse riders will be ecstatic to see the construction at the New Prospect Horse Riders Camp on Highway SS. Leiterman declared that brush clearing is now underway. After the clearing takes place, the entire camp will be redesigned and an acre larger.

redesigned and an acre larger.
The camp will increase eight family (six person) sites, from 12 to 20. The three current group sites (for 20 campers) are being moved away from the family sites but will remain available. A toilet building and an open-air shelter box stalls will also be added to the group sites.

Leiterman stated that the redesign is to accommodate those with horse trailers and to add more sites, due to the increased use of the camp. The new campsites will ac-

commodate those with large trailers, as they will be able to drive through their site instead of having to back their trailers into the site. However, a limited number of back-in sites will be available for those with smaller trailers.

Never professionally designed when it was built in the 1950's from an old farmstead, Leiterman said he and his staff realized that they were not meeting the needs of the current users. He also noted that at the time, it was never built to become a camping area.

Construction is expected to start in August and run into fall. If construction goes without a hitch the redesigned camp should be open in May 2008.

The horse riders' camp will cost around \$300,000 and is funded through Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund. Leiterman added that local horse associations such as Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association and the Plymouth Trail Riders will donate time and materials as well as funds and final enhancements.

"I am looking forward to personal contact with my customers. I want The Scrap Nook to be the type of store where we take time helping our customers," Schickert explained. Building relationships with her customers, she says, will be key to The Scrap Nook's success.

Fiona Sweeney has wanderlust. All her life, she's been unhappy, unsettled, wanting to make a difference. In the new book "The Camel Bookmobile" by Masha Hamilton, Fi chooses to make a difference to others and to herself.

All her life, Fi was a restless one but now the itch was worse. There were so many opportunities not taken in her life, too many missed chances. Everyone knew Fi was unsettled, but they were concerned when she signed on to work with the Camel Bookmobile. Was literacy so important that she had to travel to Africa to see it achieved?

So you want to go on an exotic vacation this year, but you don't have the money? Spend a few dollars and pick up "The Camel Bookmobile" instead. Author Masha Hamilton's writing is so vivid that you'll feel the Kenyan heat emanating from the pages, you'll feel dust on your arms, and you'll want some water to quench your thirst. I liked how this novel unfolds from the viewpoint of several characters, each with hopes and dreams they dare to imagine. This is one of those books that you want to pass on to your friends immediately after you close the back cover.

If you or your reading group is looking for something get your vacation jump-started, this is a story to find. For your first summer book, "The Camel Bookmobile" should get you over the reading hump quite easily.







ORDINANCE NO. 2007-01 ORDINANCE TO CREATE SECTION 6-73 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE (CESSATION OF OPERATION)

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WIS-CONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOL-LOWS:

Section 1. That Section 6-73 of Chapter 6 of the Municipal code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to licensing be and hereby is created as follows:

Sec. 6-73. Cessation of operation.

Any licensee issued a license to sell alcohol beverages in the Village for which a quota exists limiting the number of such licenses that may be issued by the Village that fails to sell, serve, or provide alcohol beverages as permitted by such license for any period of ninety (90) consecutive days during the licensing year, may have such license revoked by the Village Board for that reason, and the Village Board may decline to renew any such license for that reason.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.

Chalk up a couple more feature wins for Goeden

The No. 11 car piloted by Kewaskum's Donny Goeden continues to find victory lane this year. For the past three weeks, Goeden has won feature races in IRA (Interstate Racing Association) competitions.

Last Saturday night, June 2, Goeden was definitely the fastest in the field racing at the Charter Raceway Park in Beaver Dam, the facility that suffered major damage a week ago when a fire destroyed the concession stand, VIP seating area and scoring tower.

Charter offered a double feature Saturday as the Badger Midgets raced in addition to the IRA cars, and the owners had to do some fast work just to be ready for the race.

"They had a catering system come in, and they put up a temporary building (for scoring)," Goeden said Sunday evening. "They really did a nice job."

And so did Goeden, except for timing where he had to settle for a time of 12 and .4 seconds (12.4) on the quartermile dirt oval.

Goeden listed Mike Reinke of Sheboygan Falls, Travis Whitney of Minnesota and a local boy, Scott Neitzel, as his main competitions in the

"I passed Whitney on about the eighth lap. I passed Neitzel on about the 11th," Goeden went on. "There were a couple cautions ... we were able to stay up front. We had a bunch of cars lapped."

On Friday, May 25th, Goeden and his crew made a long trip to Superior for a race there. Starting seventh, Goeden dueled Scott Biertzer from West Bend for the lead and finally got by him on lap 12 (out of 25) and stayed out front until he found the checkered flag.

Biertzer powered his No. 4B car to second place. "It was a good finish for him. That's his highest finish," Goeden said, adding, "We actually won up there last year, too."

When asked about his string, Goeden reported he has won three weekends in a row not three races in a row because he crashed Saturday night, May 26th at Brainard, Minn. The car owner went to work quickly to get the Maxim Chassis back together for the race at Beaver Dam.

"Bob and Lance Walldan did a good job putting the car back together," Goeden said, making it possible for him to win feature race No. 3 for the '07 season. "We're having a good season. We have a good car, and a good crew."

Concerning how Kewaskum's Mike Kertscher did Saturday night at Beaver Dam, Goeden said his friend and competitor ran into some bad luck. "He broke in hot lapping." The two Kewaskum racers had battled each other for the top spot at Wilmot three weeks ago, with Goeden surviving Kertscher's challenge.

The IRA circuit will be in Oshkosh for a show Friday night, June 8 and on Saturday, June 9 they return to the Wilmot oval.

Concerning the points standings in the IRA, Goeden said he figures he is about ninth right now.
