Village awards contract for wastewater treatment plant

KEWASKUM- The Kewaskum Village Board took another step forward in fixing problems at their aging wastewater treatment facility. The board met with four firms Tuesday evening, June 19, who expressed interest in rehabilitating the facility. Their choice- the least expensive firm who says they can do it in 1,800 less hours and \$127,000 less than the other firms.

Why can they do it so quickly? Thomas Vik of Neenah based McMahon Associates, confidently stated "We are much more efficient than any other firm." Vik also assured the board that they plan to stick by their price. If they go over budget- "We eat that," Vik stated.

The village has budgeted \$3.44 million for the project. McMahon will be paid \$392,600 for labor.

McMahon Associates also offered to save the village some cash by having

the village handle most of the equipment procurement to avoid contractor mark-up. This would mean the Department of Public Works would be required to play a significant role in the project.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles and water department interim lead operator Jim Noren (who has taken the reigns from Bob Manthei who is retiring) stated while this could be a time consuming role, they would be willing to look into the idea more closely. Both men have worked with McMahon before, when they constructed the plant's Ultra Violet Disinfectant System in the late 90's.

McMahon Associates also provided a number of options the board could choose either as cost savers or to improve efficiency. One of the significant ideas was to install a Salsnes Filter to provide better screening in the pre-aeration stage of the plant.

McMahon offered the idea of converting the pre-aeration tank into a receiving tank for holding tank waste. (This is waste brought in by compa-

nies who service holding tanks. These companies pay the village for this service.) The Salsnes Filter would be placed in the head works and would be utilized for primary treatment.

be utilized for primary treatment.

The Salsnes Filter is made in Sweden, and being widely used in Europe. McMahon is currently testing the product in Northern Illinois.

After sitting through four hours of dog-and-pony shows from the four engineering firms, technology was the issue for many of the board members as they grappled with whom to choose. "There's always going to be something that comes up," stated Trustee Derek Peterson, who also serves as the chairman of the Public Works Committee.

Peterson was responsible for a lot of the legwork done to get the board to this point. "I spent a number of hours at each firm, had more conversations with each, nothing surprised me. It's a clear-cut decision to make. When I look at McMahon and see the lowest



Kiwanis members, guests celebrate 60 years as a club

KEWASKUM-Kewaskum Kiwanis Club had a birthday this month and members of the club, past and present celebrated in grand style Monday evening, June 11. A number of honored guests were also in attendance to commemorate 60 years as a club.

The Kewaskum group got their start from The West Bend Noon Kiwanis Club who sponsored the Kewaskum Kiwani-wannabes. Charter member Ray Schaeffer recalled the club began with about 40-45 members" many of which were local businessmen.

The first order of business for the club was the sponsorship of the Kewaskum Boy Scout Troop. The club continues to provide funds for the group.

While the club has sponsored over 800 projects in its history, the club is probably best known for their Turkey Shoot that has been held annually for 52 years. Larry Ammel the club's secretary, says that the event has raised over \$365,000 for the community.

Proceeds from the Turkey Shoot have benefited residents Kewaskum many, many, ways. The largest undertaking of the group was in 1972, when they donated \$75,000 to the village of Kewaskum for a community pool. That pool now is part of what is known as Kiwanis Park in the village.

The Kiwanis have awarded annual college scholarships since 1954 assisting over 150 Kewaskum High School students. In addition to the scholarships, the club also provides funding for many other educational purposes in the community.



Underage tobacco use

Village finalizes job offer for building inspector

Kewaskum's village administrator Jay Shambeau says that the village has offered a building inspector position to an individual from Kewaskum.

Shambeau stated the village board will take official action on the hire at their meeting on Monday, June 25. The hiring will end a long term contract with Gordon Hoffmann who has contracted service to the village for many years.

The next hire the village will make is for a full-time clerk. That position will be advertised in the coming weeks.

bid, and that they are excited about working with us, they clearly stand out as my number one," he stated before making a motion to accept the proposal from McMahon Associates.

The board's penny pincher, Kevin Schuenemann agreed, and gave Peterson's motion a second. The rest of the board followed suit, giving approval for the McMahon Associates proposal.

More on McMahon

During their presentation Kari Dennis explained that while headquarters are located in Neenah they have offices in Illinois and Indiana. They have a full service staff with over 160. Their wastewater team includes 12 full-time engineers in the design department, eight professional engineers, two board certified environmental engineers and five full-time construction services professionals.

Dennis touted that they have worked on over 100 wastewater treatment plants throughout the Midwest. They continue to provide on-going services to Lomira, Fredonia, Cedarburg and Belgium, among others in Wisconsin.

Moving forward with McMahon

In their presentation, Dennis described the timeline they would follow. The preliminary design would begin in July and be presented to the village in the middle of August. The final design would then be presented for the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) approval by the end of this year. After receiving DNR approval they would advertise for bids in April of 2008 and award a contract in June of that year. Final completion would be in July of 2009.

Village Administrator Jay Shambeau stated that the village would engage in contract negotiations with McMahon. The next time the village board hears from them, it would be when they present their preliminary plan. From this point on McMahon will work with village staff, primarily Gilles and Noren.




Lions announce pin design winner

Annual fish planting has some problems here

The annual fish planting for Jakes Fishing Day is sponsored by the Gate Way Gobblers of the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF). The fish planting, that is coordinated by the Kettle Moraine Chapter of Wings Over Wisconsin (WOW) and the Gateway Gobblers, ran into a few snags this year but it all worked out in the end.

Richard Knoebel, President of the Kettle Moraine WOW, said that with all of the problems the DNR is having with new fish viruses the planting was almost cancelled. The bluegills that are planted come from the Northstar Fish Hatchery in Montour, IA.

Knoebel said this is the only place they have found to get the large blue gills, 7 to 10 inches, at an affordable cost. He went on to say that they have been getting the fish from North Star for the last 12 years and have never received a dead or sick fish.

When they applied for the annual fish-planting permit from the DNR it came right away. The problem arose when they applied for their import permit from the Department of Agriculture.

It was found out that there were new forms that had to be filled out and a \$50.00 import permit fee. Knoebel also said he does not know, why when fish are planted in a public body of water for everyone to utilize the fee should be charged.

Knoebel said it all worked out in the end with them receiving the permit on the Thursday before the event with the fish being planted on Saturday morning. Knoebel said Dr. David E. Starling, DVM; a fish veterinarian from Ames, IA was instrumental in working out the problems with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture.

Knoebel went on to say that without his help we would have had a lot of sad kids on Jakes Fishing Day.







The Bookworm Sez

A Woman in Charge

By Carl Bernstein Knopf, \$27.95 628 pages



Remember the '90s?

Sure you do. The "Rachel" haircut, Furbys, the Macarena, Beanie mania, and Depeche Mode? How about Pogs, Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, Zubaz, Animaniacs, and Crystal Pepsi?

How about the Clinton administration? Remember that?

Pulitzer Prize winner Carl Bernstein does. In his new book, "A Woman in Charge", he writes about Hillary Clinton, her life, her strengths, and the controversies that follow her.

Almost from the day she was born, Hillary Diane Rodham was encouraged to be different than others in her Chicago suburb. Despite that little girls were urged to be demure, Dorothy Rodham, Hillary's mother, taught her daughter to stand up for herself, fight back, be steadfast and open in her opinions, and to follow her own interests. Hugh Rodham, Hillary's father, was abusive to his wife and stingy with affection and approval for his children, but his dinnertime Republican debates may have formed Hillary's early eye on politics. Long-time friends from grade school through college remember Hillary as a good student, a "teacher's pet" and someone who, they believed, would someday seek higher of-

Because of that, many were dismayed when she "hitched her star" to up-and-coming Arkan-sas politician and "hayseed", Bill Clinton. But there was no denying it: Hillary was in love. Still, she stepped cautiously as she and Bill worked together at Yale, courted, and eventually married. Friends say that, while Bill and Hillary's personalities and strengths complimented one another and while they seemed particularly suited as a couple,

there were problems from the start. Hillary knew all along about Bill's "other women" (and there were many) but she hoped that political office might dampen his womanizing.

History has obviously proven otherwise.

So were the Clintons targeted by political enemies bent on bringing their Washington tenure down, or were the problems during the Clinton administration those of their own – or, specifically, Hillary's – making? More importantly, what did Hillary Clinton learn from the past administration's mistakes that might allow her to move back into the White House in 2009?

"A Woman in Charge" is a little daunting at first. At over 550 pages of narrative and more than seventy pages of notes, it's not thin. It's not light, either in tone or heft. What it is, though, is a highly-detailed, thoughtful, well-researched biography on a complex woman with lifelong ambitions that could well make history.

Former Watergate reporter and author Carl Bernstein doesn't dish dirt, nor does he gush with shameless praise. Typical of Bernstein's journalism background, he lays out the facts in a way that's not dry or stuffy but that's easy to follow, albeit occasionally rambling. Truth is, though, I'd rather read Bernstein's ramblings any day, than to have to suffer through another page of Bill Clinton's "My Life".

"A Woman in Charge" is not airplane reading and it's probably more than most people will want on vacation, but – considering that a very important election is coming up – it's a mustread for all voters. Like this book, this woman in charge may be here to stay.







ORDINANCE NO. 2007-02 ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2-91 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE (STANDING COMMITTEES)

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 2-91. Standing committees.

(a) Appointment. The following committees shall be appointed by the village president, subject to the approval of a majority of the members of the village board, at the first regular meeting in May of each year:

 Administrative. Functions include finance, personnel, building permits, ordinances, insurance, bonds, licenses, permits, concessions, land purchases, easements and rightsof-way.

(2) Protection and public safety. Functions include police department, fire department, health, weeds, welfare, recreation and nuisance control.

(3) Public works and services. Functions include garbage collection, recycling collection, signs, streetlights streets, bridges, equipment, snow removal, sewer, water, storm sewer, sidewalks, building maintenance, new construction, parks and management of village property and special services to local groups.


(4) Parks and recreation. Functions include maintenance, management and recreation programs for River Hill Park and Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park.

(b) Composition of committees. Each committee shall consist of three members. The chairmen of the committees shall be designated by the village president. Each member shall serve as appointed unless excused by a majority of the members of the hoard.

(Code 1983, § 2.10) Secs. 2-92--2-125. Reserved. Passed and adopted by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, this 11th day of June, 2007.



KEWASKUM- Kewaskum's 15-year-old Josh Mueller made his father very proud on Fathers Day, June 17. He joined his dad, Lloyd Mueller Jr., 95 other riders, and approximately 1,900 spectators at the 24th annual Kettle Moraine Sport Riders Motorcycle hill climb.

Mueller started the day with fastest time in the 600 Pro Class on his first run. He took his Kawasaki bike up the 300 feet of hill in 8.66 seconds. His second attempt stopped him short at the 180-foot mark.

The riders are scored on their best time or distance on their two runs. His first run was fast enough to win the Advanced Land Speed-600 Pro Class.

Mueller also competed in the West Bend Harley Davidson Open Pro Class. Here the young rider rode a custom Harley Davidson from West Bend Harley Davidson for the first time. His two runs of 8.90 and 8.86 seconds were good enough for fifth place. Perhaps dad was concentrating on the wrong bike today as he finished sixth with a time of 9.11 seconds being his best.

Mueller had one more try at the \$2,700 purse and contingency money the pro riders are vying for. The ten fastest riders of the day get one more run up the hill for the opportunity to be crowned "King of The Hill."

His time on this run was 9.20 seconds, good enough for third and another cut of the money. There was a trophy for him as well. The rider under 16, who goes the fastest over the hill, or farthest up it, is also awarded the Justin Bobholtz memorial trophy.

Matthew McGrath of Horicon rode one of his Hondas to a win in the Mike's Motorsports 0-400 stock class with a time of 9.88 seconds. Mischler's Hwy 33 Power Center of Beaver Dam also put a trophy in his hand for the Open Stock Class. McGrath won with a time of 10.24 seconds on his first run. His time in the 0-400 class was fast enough to make him the only amateur rider to qualify for the "King of The Hill" competition. His last run of the day clocked in at 13.41, good enough for seventh in this elite class.

A golfer from Kewaskum nearly earning a spot in the U.S. Senior Open and playing against the likes of Tom Kite, Hale Irwin, Fred Funk and Tom Watson at Whistling Straights in early July? It nearly happened two weeks ago when Clark Eichstedt was among 56 players battling for two spots in an 18-hole qualifying tournament held at Pine Hills Country Club in Sheboy-

Eichstedt led at the turn with a 34, but a couple of bad holes coming in cost him dearly. "There was a five-way playoff for two spots at 75," Eichstedt said, reporting he carded a 77, and, "I tied for seventh."

Foes have trouble scoring on Kewaskum

Chalk up another two wins for the Kewaskum High School's baseball team, and back-to-back shutouts at that!

On Tuesday evening, June 12, John Holt's one-hitter propelled the Indians to a 3-0 win over Plymouth in an Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) game played at home in Kiwanis Park.

Cedar Grove didn't prove to be much of a formidable foe for Kewaskum, which used 14 walks and five hit batsmen to a 20-0 victory.

Coach Dave Donath said Holt did an excellent job, adding, "He should have had a nohitter" because the left fielder should have made a better effort on a fly hit out there in the third inning. It dropped in for the lone hit off Holt, who is having an excellent season.

"We only had five hits," Donath went on, reporting his team scored a single run in the bottom of the fifth and two more in the sixth.

The game was scoreless in the fifth, then, with one out, Nick Ebert drew a walk, there was a pop out to short, then Ben Butler singled and Casey Scheel came through with an RBI single.

The sixth inning rally got going when Matt Parrent slapped a one-out single, stole second, and scored when pinch hitter Garrett Barlow's grounder was booted by the Plymouth shortstop. Later Barlow scored when the shortstop committed his second error of the inning.

"It wasn't much of a game," Donath said about the non-conference tilt against Cedar Grove.

Nick Olla got the call to pitch and picked up the win. He went four innings, and then Austin Petrin threw the final inning before the game ended via the 10-run "mercy rule."

In addition to all their free passes for first base, the Indians banged out nine hits. Dan Shea went 2x3 and is currently batting right around .400 (19x40) according to Donath, who said his senior infielder was robbed of a home run in the game.

Outdoor Tips & Tricks

There are times when selective trout will take nothing but tiny fly patterns that require very fine leader material if they are to work effectively. Unfortunately, even with the improved strength of modern 7x and 8x leader material, it is often difficult to strike and play a fish without having such fine tippets break. This is particularly true with faster action fly rods. One tip to help avoid this is to tie a small dental rubber band, the kind used on orthodontic braces, into the middle of your leader to act as a shock absorber. If you strike a bit too hard, the rubber band will absorb some of the energy and help cushion the strain on the tippet. Similarly, when fish jerk or slap the tippet, the rubber band will help avoid break offs.

Where lead shot is concerned, the choice of shot size is almost always a trade off between pattern density and pellet lethality. The larger the shot size, the more energy it retains at distance and the greater its penetration and killing power. However, the larger the shot size, the fewer pellets can be fit into a load – leaving holes in the pattern and reducing the chances of the three pellets hitting the bird that are

considered the minimum for a clean kill. Moreover, at shorter distances larger shot can ruin a lot of meat, rendering the bird inedible. I tend to favor size 7 1/2 shot for smaller birds such as quail and grouse, size 6 shot for larger birds such as Chukar and Hungarian Partridge, and size 5 shot for larger birds such as Pheasant and Sage Grouse.

A dog's feet are the part most vulnerable to injury over, the course of a hunting season. I suspect that more dogs are laid up each season because of torn pads, or broken nails, than any other cause. You can help prevent these injuries in the off season by keeping nails trimmed properly, and by exercising your dog regularly on gravel, rock, or other hard surfaces that will help toughen their pads. For dogs with particularly tender pads, such as those with pink pads, you might consider acclimating your dog to working with boots, or try pad toughening products.






