

Village begins search for clerk

KEWASKUM- The village has officially begun their search for a clerk. Trustees approved a job description for the position at their meeting Monday, June 25.

The village began thinking about hiring a clerk after a strategic planning meeting in March. Village Administrator Jay Shambeau informed the board of deficiencies taking place at the village hall.

At that same meeting Shambeau announced that he would like to create a position for a zoning administrator/building inspector, with that being the most critical position needed. It was created first and Chad Cook was hired at the meeting on June 25.

Since the hire of Cook, Shambeau has started on the search for a clerk. He currently serves in the capacity of Administrator/Clerk. He hopes to have the position filled by early September.

Shambeau said at the strategic planning meeting that once he was relieved of his clerk title he would be able to focus more of his time and energy on the village's engineering and planning needs. He hoped to work closely with the village's outsourced engineering firm and attempt to have some of that work done in-house.

The title of Deputy Treasurer is being tagged on to the position as well. Shambeau stated that treasurer, Janet Knops, is "feeling overwhelmed with payroll, and other financial aspects."

"She's sort of been the sole keeper of knowledge for some time. This position will provide some stress relief for her," he concluded. Village President Matt Heiser followed Shambeau's logic and stated he didn't like knowing there really was only one person knowing the complete financial data for the village.

The clerk would receive an annual salary between \$36,003 and \$41,383. The position would require flex-hours, not have union representation,

and overtime in the form of comp pay. Shambeau informed the trustees that the position would not be a strictly 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. position, because the clerk would be responsible for attending board and committee meetings.

Money for the position will come from the 2007 general budget that saw the addition of a position called Engineer Liaison at \$51,767. This amount will be used for both Cook's position and the new Clerk/Deputy Treasurer.

The clerk would also direct and coordinate the activities of a number of functions including maintenance of public records, elections, committee and board meeting procedures, and official minute taking duties. The clerk would also be responsible for performing the functions of the Village Treasurer in the Treasurer's absence

Rumble strips will stay on Highway H

WEST BEND- The Washington County Highway Committee decided to leave a highway safety precaution alone. One nearby resident asked to have a set of rumble strips removed from Highway H.

Washington County Supervisor Richard Bertram appeared before the Highway Committee asking the committee to remove rumble strips on the highway adjacent to a home at the corner of Highways H and HH.

Bertram inquired if the rumble strips were really necessary because the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) has plans for realignment of the intersection. Highway Commissioner Ken Pesch stated that the DOT was scheduled to give the intersection an 80 degree angle sometime between 2010 and 2011.

A little over a year ago, at the urging of Washington County Board Supervisor Brian Bausch and the Boltonville Fire Department, the committee authorized the installation of the rumble strips. Since that time, the intersection has been injury/accident free according to firefighter Dennis Fechter who also spoke.

A unanimous vote from the committee left the rumble strips in place.

Bertram was the lone proponent of removing the strips. Also attending on behalf of keeping the strips was Farmington Township Chairman



Ellis is back on the job after over two month suspension

KEWASKUM- Kewaskum Police Officer Troy Ellis is back on the job after receiving a five-day unpaid suspension. A disciplinary hearing before the village's Police and Fire Commission (PFC) concluded on Thursday, June 28, when Chief of Police Richard Knoebel presented a settlement reached with Ellis.

Chief Knoebel suspended Officer Ellis on April 28, 2007 with pay. On May 1, Knoebel requested a gamut of charges to be investigated by the PFC. Those charges ranged from officer misconduct to use of al-cohol against the 18-year veteran of the department.

The charges stem from an incident where Officer Ellis was found intoxicated, mistakenly trying to get inside his neighbor's home during the early morning hours of March 18, 2007. He was off-duty and had to be removed from the scene by a fellow village police officer and taken to his home.

Testimony in the hearing

began on Tuesday, June 26. Denise Kenworthy, the ho-meowner was the hearing's first witness. She gave a playby-play of the events as they unfolded shortly after she

heard the family's dog barking around 1 a.m. on March 18. She indicated that her husband, John Kenworthy went to

the back door of their home to find a man standing there. She then called 9-1-1. "I was very, very scared, afraid of who this intruder was trying to get into our home," she stated.

The commissioners heard a 9-1-1 recording which Denise Kenworthy made the night she believed an intruder was trying to get into her family's home. When asked, she stated that she would not like to see Officer Ellis fired over the situation.

John Kenworthy was the next person to testify before the commission. He echoed the thoughts of his wife when asked if he thought Officer Ellis should be fired. "We're all neighbors, his kid and my kid walk home from school to-gether. We want things to get back to normal. As horrible as the night was, we didn't want to press charges. I guess I stick by that, we still feel that way. We have a community here We have to take care of each other as much as we can," he added.

Kenworthy continued by saying he was disappointed that after the whole ordeal, Officer Ellis neglected to apologize for making a "mistake." "Troy you could have called me, come over, I wish you would have said, 'I screwed up last night.' No apology, that is hard for me. I am more disappointed in that," he concluded.

Officer Al Ratzel was the third to testify. He explained his response to the evening. He stated that in his opinion, Officer Ellis was intoxicated. "He had to be pretty high, he didn't recognize me," Officer Ratzel revealed.

Officer Ratzel stated that he swayed from normal department policy when handling the situation with Officer Ellis. He admitted that he did not arrest him because he was a fellow officer. A normal response would have seen Officer Ellis arrested for disorderly conduct, battery to a police officer and criminal trespassing.

trespassing.

Officer Ratzel also stated that he never handcuffed or performed a pat down of Officer Ellis. He also neglected to perform a Breathalyzer test that would have documented Officer Ellis's degree of intoxication. He just gave him a ride to his home, less than an eighth of a mile from the Kenwerthy residence.

worthy residence.

Officer Ratzel alerted the commissioners and those in the audience that a new policy has been put in place in the department, stating that if a police officer comes across criminal activity by an officer, the officer must be arrested and turned over to the Sheriff's Department.

A break was requested by the court reporter. The fiveminute break turned into an over hour-long discussion between Ellis and Knoebel's attorneys. When the hearing resumed, both sides requested a continuance. Both announced a possible settlement in the matter.

Because of the continuance, testimony from Captain Steven Gonwa of The Washington County Sheriff's Department was not heard. Captain Gonwa conducted an independent investigation of the matter. Chief Knoebel was also scheduled to take the witness stand.

Ellis received a total 15day unpaid suspension. However, the settlement states that after the immediate five days, 10 days will be held for 18 months. If Ellis does not receive any disciplinary action in 12 months five days will be erased. If he continues for another 12 months without disciplinary action, the remaining five will be dropped.

Should Ellis go 18 months without disciplinary action, the 15-day total suspension will be removed permanently from his employment record with the village. It will however reflect that he served a five-day suspension without pay.

Ellis is also required to undergo an alcohol assessment and attend any counseling recommended as a result of the assessment.

Commissioner Jeff Roher made the motion and he received a second from Tom McElhatton, to withdraw the charges, they earlier accepted from Chief Knoebel. Commissioner Ed Miller opposed the measure and stated, "we are responsible for the outcome, we haven't had a damn thing to say yet."

Attorney for the PFC Paul Alexy explained that since Officer Ellis withdrew his appeal and Knoebel withdrew the charges there was nothing for the commission to act on.

In a return phone call, Officer Ellis stated he did not want to comment on the settlement offer.

Chief Knoebel stated that he changed his mind after negotiations and hoped that the remedial solution would take care of the problem and prevent any future problems.



PSC approves natural gas line projects

MADISON- The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) has approved construction of natural gas line projects for Wisconsin Gas, We Energies and Wisconsin Public Service Corporation (WPSC). "The PSC, Department of Natural Resources and parties to

the case started working together on these applications early in the process. Their hard work has helped provide the Commission with a clear and comprehensive record – allowing us to make a fair and sound decision," said Chairperson Dan Ebert.

In a verbal decision, the Commission approved the applications from the three utilities to build approximately 85 miles of natural gas distribution lines to connect to a proposed interstate pipeline expansion project. Those built by Wisconsin Gas, We Energies will run through Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Calumet, Brown, Outagamie, Dodge and Washington counties.
"These projects will increase reliability, add needed natural

gas capacity and will help foster competition in the natural gas market," said Commissioner Mark Meyer. Additional documents associated with the natural gas dis-


German hired as Washington County's **Human Resources Director**

Barton family homeless after seven alarm fire destroys home

TOWN of BARTON - A family with oung children escaped injury after a fire broke out in their new home on Tuesday, July 2, 2007 at 2 p.m. The fire took the efforts of seven fire departments to get it extinguished.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department was notified of the fire 7587 County Highway D. A caller informed the Sheriff's Office that the home that was occupied at the time had visible flames protruding through the roof. When the fire started, five children, ranging in ages from three to

15, were inside the log home

Deputies, along with the Kohlsville Fire Department, responded. Upon arrival deputies discovered that everyone had been safely evacuated from the home. The upper level of the twostory log home was actively on fire.

Kewaskum, West Bend, Allenton, Boltonville, St. Lawrence and Fillmore Fire Departments assisted Kohlsville firefighters. These departments were able to successfully extinguish the blaze, but not before the home suffered extensive burn damage to the upper level and roof. The rest of the home and its contents suffered smoke and water damage. A dollar estimate of the loss was not available.

Lieutenant Bob Martin with the Sheriff's Department reported the residence was in the process of being rented and the new tenants were moving in when

curred.

The origin of the fire was unknown at press time. Fire investigators from the fire department

and sheriff's department are currently looking into the cause

There were no injuries reported by those battling the fire. The Red Cross is assisting the family.





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

Remember being fourteen? Remember the uncertainty

of being on the very edge of adulthood, not quite a kid but not quite a grown-up? Remember the zits, the hormones, trying to fit in, trying to be accepted? Remember trying to figure out the opposite sex?

Well, okay, so that last one happened last week. But really.... do you remember the angst of being fourteen?

Fondly, Josh Wolk remembers those days. Wanting to recapture them one last time, he spent eight weeks as a camp counselor at an all-boys camp in New England. In his new book "Cabin Pressure", he writes about his summer as a thirty-four-year-old teenage boy.

The spring before his impending wedding, Josh Wolk got a little scared. Not cold-feet, stand-her-up-at-the-altar scared, but nervous about what came with marriage. When someone gets married, doesn't that mean they have to settle down, raise a family, become responsible and stop being foolish? Doesn't that mean they have to have a – gasp! – mortgage?

And then Wolk began having thoughts about the best years of his life. When he was a teenager, he spent summers at Eastwind, an all-boy camp on the edge of a lake in Maine. Every summer was filled with friendship, fun rituals, swimming, and male bonding. Was it possible to recapture those days? Since former campers and counselors were always welcome to return, Wolk applied for a job. A handful of weeks before his wedding, he packed a trunk with clothes and towels and headed for the woods

Assigned to the Bears' cabin, Wolk tried to settle in with a band of fourteen-year-old boys, but he felt out of place. He wasn't sure how to connect with them. His jokes were met with eye-rolls. His teases fell flat.

But if being an "old man" in a camp filled with teenagers wasn't easy for Wolk, neither was being the nearly-oldest staff member. Wolk felt self-conscious and struggled to fit in with the other counselors.

Was summer camp always like this?

Do you sometimes wish you could kayak back to the halcyon days of teenagerdom? Reading "Cabin Pressure" is the first place to start. Author Josh Wolk perfectly captures teenage angst - the desperate wanting to belong; the rejection by peers; the goofy, coltish path to maturity - and he proves that those feelings never really go away, no matter how old you get. But Wolk sparkles like a campfire in his hilarious descriptions of the kids in his cabin and the closeness he begins to enjoy after a couple afternoons of backgammon and a goofy nickname session. Just by the moniker he's hung on these kids, you know exactly what each boy is like. I also laughed til I almost cried at some of Wolk's fellow counsel-

If the smell of wood smoke, the feel of a cold, wet swimsuit, or another round of "Kumbaya" fills you with nostalgia, then pick up a copy of "Cabin Pressure" and remember those days again. I'm sure, when you close the back cover, you're going to want s'more.

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
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

Nut-Crusted Catfish With Crisp Vegetable Slaw

- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 to 1/4 teaspoon ground red pepper
- 1 cup coarsely chopped pecans, almonds or peanuts
- 4 U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish fillets (about 6 ounces each)

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Coat a large baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray. In a small bowl, combine butter, salt and red pepper. Coat both sides of each fillet with seasoned butter. On the prepared baking sheet, place fillets flat side down. Sprinkle tops with nuts. Bake until golden brown and opaque in the center, 10 to 12 minutes. Serve with Crisp Vegetable Slaw.

YIELD: 4 portions.

Crisp Vegetable Slaw: Combine 1 cup thinly sliced red bell pepper, 2/3 cup thinly sliced snow peas, 1/4 cup each sliced pitted olives and thinly sliced green onions (scallions), 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 to 2 teaspoons minced jalapeño and 2 tablespoons rice or white vinegar.







Be on on the lookout for deer ticks

As warmer weather increases and people spend more time outdoors, state health officials remind people to be on the lookout for ticks that can cause Lyme disease and to take steps to protect themselves.

"Most people who develop Lyme disease in Wisconsin are exposed to infected ticks between May and August," said Dr. Jim Kazmierczak, State Public Health Veterinarian at the Department of Health and Family Services. "Lyme disease can be treated with antibiotics, and is treated more easily when detected early."

One early symptom of Lyme disease is a characteristic "bullseye" rash; consisting of a reddened area, often with a clear area in the middle, at the original site of the tick bite. The rash typically expands to cover a large area (usually greater than two inches), or may even appear in several places on other parts of the body. However, not everyone develops the rash.

"If someone lives in or has spent time in areas where deer ticks are common and develops symptoms such as fever, headache, chills, pain in the muscles or joints, enlarged lymph nodes, or facial paralysis, they should immediately consult their health care provider," added Kazmierczak.

Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria carried by small ticks called deer ticks, which are found in many parts of the US, including Wisconsin. The disease can cause debilitating arthritis as well as serious heart and nervous system problems. The greatest risk of developing the illness is during June and July.

In 2006, there were 1,456 cases of Lyme disease in Wisconsin residents - most cases occurred in the western and north-central parts of the states. In 2005, there were 1,441 cases

The follwing are preventative measures people can take to avoid tick bites, thereby reducing their chance of getting Lyme disease:

· Avoid wooded and busy areas with high grass and lots of leaf litter since ticks prefer these areas. If you do go into areas like this, try to stay in the center of a cleared trail to avoid brushing up against tall grass and shrubs.

· Use effective tick repellants and apply according to the label instructions. The US Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that adults use repellants with 20-30% DEET on exposed skin and clothing to prevent tick bites. Repellants that contain permethrin can also be applied to clothing.

· Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants to help shield you from ticks. Tuck your shirt into your pants and tuck pant cuffs into the top of your socks or boots to create a "tick barrier." Light colored clothing makes ticks easier to spot.

· Frequently check for ticks - and remove them properly. Ticks actually have to bite you and remain attached for at least 24 hours to transmit Lyme disease. Deer ticks are small and may be difficult to find, so tick checks must be done on all parts of the body carefully and thoroughly.

· Remove attached ticks slowly and gently, using a thinbladed pair of tweezers. Avoid cursing the body of the tick by grasping them at the point of skin attachment. Avoid folk remedies like petroleum jelly, nail polish remover or burning matches - they are not safe or effective ways to remove ticks.

· Protect your pets from tick bites by checking your dog or cat for ticks before bringing them inside. While there is a vaccine available for pets to prevent Lyme disease, it will not stop the animal from bringing ticks into the home. Speak to your veterinarian about topical tick repellant available for your pets.


June 22, 1907

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Indians double their pleasure

Over the years, a good rivalry has developed between Kewaskum and Plymouth, so the Indians certainly enjoyed cleaning house on the Panthers last Monday, June 25.

With respective 10-5 and 8-4 wins at Plymouth, Kewaskum gained a sweep for the season over the Panthers. More important, however, was the fact the victories keep Kewaskum (12-4) in the race for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) title.

There was no question this was a big night for senior infielder Casey Scheel, who was a perfect 4x4 in the first game, with three RBIs. "I think he was 10x10 (getting on base) for the day," KHS Coach Dave Donath said.

Scheel, an excellent leadoff man all season, started the game off by getting hit by a pitch, and that was the beginning of what turned into a 7run barrage. After a sacrifice bunt by Nick Olla and a fly out by Dan Shea, Matt Parent drew a walk, Logan Staege singled in one run, another came home on back-to-back walks to John Holt and Austin Petrin. Then Nick Ebert's single was good for two RBIs, Ben Butler singled in another, and, in his second at-bat, Scheel doubled home the final two.

Holt was the winning pitcher for the Indians. He went the distance, giving up six hits, striking out five and walking five. Four of the five Panther runs were earned, according to Donath, who said, "He still struggled with his control, but he got the job done."

In Game 2, Ebert (5-1) took over the mound duties and only allowed four hits. The junior right-hander struck out four and walked five.

Scheel didn't get any hits in this game but still got on base five times, drawing three walks and getting hit three times. Ebert certainly helped his own cause, blasting a solo home run in the fourth inning. It was one of three hits he had on the day, going a perfect 3x3, with three RBIs.

"No one else had multiple hits," Donath said, adding Jordan Petrin did come up with a clutch single in the top of the seventh, scoring the seventh and eighth runs of the game.

While the KHS coach wants his team to focus on one game at a time, he was looking ahead just a little, wondering how the seeding meeting will come out Friday, to determine the pairings for the regional and sectional in the WIAA Summer Baseball Tournament.

The meeting for the seeding will take place in West Bend. Donath said the following teams are in the sectional with Kewaskum: West Bend West, West Bend East, Cedar Grove/Belgium, Random Lake, Port Washington, Campbellsport, Ozaukee, Slinger and Oostburg.

With the win, Kewaskum improved to 13-4 against EWC opponents and is 17-6 on the year.



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
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
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
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
