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

# Lightning strikes Coffee Corner, ignites rafters of downtown landmark

Two families displaced by fire, help needed

KEWASKUM- A month after a remodeling project, The Coffee Corner Bistro was closed on Tuesday, July 3 due to a fire, caused by a lightning strike shortly after noon. The fire displaced two families in two apartments in the building. Jessica and Tony Trunkel who own the building and the popular coffeehouse say they plan to re-open within three or four months.

Ann Enright of Boltonville was having lunch across the street at Woody's Steakhouse. She recalled seeing lightning strike a TV antenna on the roof of the Coffee Corner. "It sparked, some people came outside from the apartment, and then went back inside. The lights were on inside the Coffee Corner so we didn't think it was that bad," she stated.

A minute later her and another diner, Linda Gavin saw smoke come out of the roof. Enright said she called 9-1-1 while Gavin rushed across the street and told people at the Coffee Corner that smoke was coming from their roof. Patrons were immediately evacuated from the building without any injuries. The tenants were also evacuated.

The Bistro was full of patrons according to Patti Langlois of Racine, who was dining inside with her husband. She recalled hearing and feeling the crack of the lightning.

The Kewaskum Police and Fire Department responded to 102 Main Street in the village, at around 12:15 p.m. to find smoke billowing out of the rooftop of the two-story 1860's structure. Full mutual aide was received from the Boltonville Fire Department around 12:20 p.m.

Severe weather with lightning and heavy downpours of rain did not help efforts to contain the blaze. Over two inches of rain was reported during the four-hour storm.

The entire downtown area was shut down as deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Department and members of the village's Department of Public Works handled traffic. Traffic was re-routed for over three hours.

In took firefighters about two hours to extinguish the flames. Two apartments in the structure were the hardest hit in terms of the lightning strike

One of the units, located above the coffeehouse, received the most damage according to Jessica Trunkel. An adjacent upper/lower unit received mostly smoke and water damage. The coffeehouse received the least amount of smoke and water damage. The entire building will need remodeling due to the damage.

According to Trunkel, the fire was mostly contained to the rafters of the building and the apartment directly above the coffeehouse.

She along with her husband, Tony, and Coffee Corner manager Connie Schulist, are mostly concerned with the apartment tenants who lost everything in the fire. The three say they plan to do some fundraising to help get them back on their feet. "We're hoping we can place coffee cans at area businesses so patrons can do-

### Kewaskum man killed in bike crash

TOWN of AUBURN- A village of Kewaskum man was killed on Sunday, July 8, after a motorcycle crash. The 39-year-old father of four also had ties to the Beechwood area.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department responded around 9:39 p.m. to a sharp curve on Highway G, a half mile north of Youth Camp Road. Kewaskum Fire Department and EMS and troopers from The Wisconsin State Patrol also responded. Forest Rangers assisted with traffic.

Sergeant Ryan Waldschmidt of the Sheriff's Office stated that Michael Buchel, the operator of a motorcycle, had died as a result of injuries sustained in the crash.

Sergeant Waldschmidt reported that evidence at the scene indicated Buchel was traveling south on Highway G and failed to negotiate a curve in the road. He traveled off the west shoulder of the road and struck several trees before coming to rest in a wooded area.

Buchel was not wearing a helmet. Sergeant Waldschmidt announced alcohol appears to have been a factor in the crash that remains under investigation by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office.

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

### New water utility truck placed into service

### Bathrooms, parking added to west side of Riverhill Park

KEWASKUM- The renovation of a former sewage lift station at the south end of Parkview Drive into bathrooms, is complete in Riverhill Park. Parking stalls near the bathrooms have also been installed and already are gaining in popularity among park users.

bathrooms inside the former lift station are all handicap accessible. A water fountain is also located next to the women's bathroom.

Parking for eight vehicles was added. One of the eight is reserved for those with handicap parking privileges. They have come in very handy for those fishing near the dam of the Milwaukee River and those looking to use the adjacent Eisenbahn Trail.

Village administrator Jay Shambeau stated that access to the trail is also compliant New lift station clears the way for park bathrooms

with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), allowing those with physical handicaps access to the trail from near the new lift station next to the fire station. Markings at the Parkview Drive parking area show how to access the trail.

Access from the area immediately adjacent to the parking area is reserved for emergency use by members of the fire department who park and cross over instead of driving through the village when responding to emergencies. This is why trail access is restricted to "emergency use only" at the entrance.

The new lift station just west of the former station (now the bathrooms) is fully operational and instead of destroying the former structure built in 1955 last year officials approved the remodeling

project. Costs associated with the project were not available at press time.

"I am pleased that so far it seems that parking is getting a lot of use. Everytime I go past, there is one or more cars using the parking," stated Jerry Gilles, Director of the village's public works department.

Shambeau has also announced the village would hold an open house at the new lift station in the not too distant future. He stated that because the lift station will be a big piece of the village's infrastructure for the next 50 years, he thought it was appropriate to show residents of the village the improvements made through the construction of the new facility. The date for that open house will be made public in a future edition of The Statesman.

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

### **Humane Society** temporarily suspends cat adoptions, surrenders

JACKSON- The Washington County Humane Society is temporarily suspending all cat adoptions and cat surrenders due to a virus in the shelter. Standard cat vaccines usually protect against calici virus but a mutant strain has cropped up in different areas around the country since 1998.

A positive diagnosis from a necropsy was obtained at WCHS on July 9th, and all cats at the shelter have had their initial vaccination for this mutant strain. Follow-up inoculations will be done in three weeks to ensure protection. In the meantime, all adoptions and surrenders will be suspended in order to protect the cats of the general public. Stray cats coming into WCHS being inoculated and housed in a separate area of

the shelter.

People needing to surrender their cats will be advised to call Ozaukee Humane Society, Wisconsin Humane Society, Elmbrook Humane Society or Fond du Lac Humane Society.

Marnie Brown, WCHS Executive Director, states, "We are doing everything humanly possible to protect the cats in our shelter from this mutated virus and those of the general public. Although it is putting a tremendous strain on our resources, we are committed to seeing it through, and we so appreciate the support we're receiving from surrounding shelters.

# Researchers testing 'purple traps' as additional tool for early detection of Emerald Ash Borer

MADISON- If you happen to see a small, purple contraption hanging in a tree in one of 11 state parks or near any of a handful or so of rest stops, county parks, or communities in southern Wisconsin this summer, don't worry that some heartbroken child is missing a kite. The purple, triangular objects hanging in those trees are the latest tools to help researchers determine if the emerald ash borer has shown up in the state.

The purple objects are actually emerald ash borer traps. They are roughly two feet long, made from corrugated plastic, and coated with an adhesive that will capture the emerald ash borer (EAB) beetles if they land on it. Researchers will visit them every other week through the end of August to see if any beetles have been

caught. Approximately 130 traps will be deployed this summer in Wisconsin.

"We're very excited about using this new tool to increase our chances of finding the emerald ash borer," said Jane Cummings Carlson, forest health coordinator for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "Detecting an infestation before it reaches a high population level can give us more options for management."

Research will continue to compare the effectiveness of the purple traps to the girdled detection trees that have been used in Wisconsin since 2004. Girdled trees are an effective way to locate infestations, but at the expense of the tree. If these traps eventually prove to be effective, girdled trees may become a smaller component

of an early detection program

"Girdled trees still offer the most reliable way to search for EAB in an area where there has yet to appear any physical signs of the insect," said Adrian Barta, EAB program coordinator with the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. "But these traps do offer us a chance to do some survey work in areas where it hasn't been practical to girdle a tree."

DNR traps have been set up at 11 state parks. They are: Interstate, Peninsula, Thompson, High Cliff, North and South Units of the Kettle Moraine, Governor Dodge, Devils Lake, Mirror Lake, Rocky Arbor, and Richard Bong Recreation Area. DATCP has set up traps at five Dane County parks with campgrounds, the Pleasant Prairie landfill in Kenosha

County, the woods at the state agriculture department building in Madison, and at eight rest areas on state highways near Dubuque, Beloit, Genoa City, Kenosha, Lake Mills, Johnson Creek, Portage, and Elkhorn.

"For some reason, EAB adults are attracted to the color purple," said Cummings-Carlson. "Federal researchers learned this while looking for new ways to survey for beetles."

Emerald ash borer is a small, green beetle that was first identified in 2002 near Detroit, Mich. Scientists believe it actually arrived in the United States in the early 1990s. Since then, it's responsible for the demise of nearly 25 million ash trees in the US and Canada. The EAB larvae feed just under the bark of ash

trees, preventing the flow of water and nutrients in the tree. Unlike other native wood boring beetles, EAB attacks perfectly healthy ash trees, not just stressed trees.

A federal quarantine on hardwood firewood and a variety of ash products has been in place in Illinois, Ohio, Indiana and Lower Michigan since last December.

Wisconsin has approximately 725 million ash trees in forest settings. It's also estimated that ash species comprise about 20 percent of all street trees in the state.

# DAYS GONE BY

#### 25 Years Ago

July 2, 1982

The Plan Commission reviewed Kewaskum's funding prospects along with its projected plans for Kewaskum's five year Tax Incremental Funding program dur-ing Tuesday night's meeting. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the commission that money was available to proceed with the hiring of engineering consultants to work out plans and provide more specific costs for six projects which could be started in 1983 if the village commits itself definitely to a TIF district plan and borrowing of funds. The number one project, which is considered to be the most important, is the construction of Well No. 3, including well, pumphouse and tower, at the south end of the village. The second highest priority item is the water loop to Roseland Drive. This area has been plagued with line breakage and other problems for some time. Moved up on the 1983 priority list is the construction of walkways along the east and west sides of south Fond du Lac Avenue and County High-"H". This construction would result in tax savings to the entire school district since installation of sidewalks in these areas would be a safe route for students to walk to school thus eliminating the need for busing. The commission unanimously voted to recommend the Village Board approve acquisition of land for the construction of the new well and the hiring of a firm to begin engineering work on the six top priority TIF projects.

At Monday night's meeting, the Kewaskum School Board unanimously approved the appointment of Business Manager Robert Borch as interim school superintendent at a cost of \$700 per month over Borch's present salary. Borch will serve the district both as superintendent and business manager until a replacement can be found to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Floyd Brenholt which became effective June 30.



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
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#### The Bookworm Sez

To what lengths would you go to keep your word?

Even if it was illegal, dangerous, or immoral, would you do everything you could to keep a promise? Or would you retreat when the going gets rough?

Shareef Crawford made a lot of promises to a lot of people, and in the new novel "The Last Street Novel" by Omar Tyree, Shareef has also broken a lot of those promises. Now will he live long enough to keep one?

Everywhere Shareef Crawford looks, he sees his own face staring back at him from the back of his latest novel, which seems to be in the hands of every woman around. Shareef is a mega-bestselling romance author, and even though he has a wife and kids back in Florida, he's used to female fans throwing themselves at him.

So used to it, in fact, that when a beautiful woman flirts with him at a booksigning, Shareef takes her back to his hotel. In the morning, she has a challenge for him: former Harlem drug dealer Michael Springfield wants to meet with Shareef "up north" at the prison in which Springfield is serving life. Springfield wants his life in and out of the pen immortalized by the author's pen.

Word quickly hits the streets that Shareef's in Harlem to research his next book and that he talked to Springfield, but Springfield has enemies "on the outside" and they don't want to see his story in print. Shareef's friends warn him to leave Harlem. For him, the streets are no longer safe.

But everybody knows Sha-

reef Crawford is hardheaded and nobody's ever accused him of being weak. He made a promise to himself to write a "real" story, and he's going to do it. Besides, he's intrigued by Baby G, a flashy young street general who says he wants to protect Shareef for a piece of fame in return. Can Baby G be trusted, when everyone else seems to want Shareef dead?

Author Omar Tyree never ceases to amaze me. Seriously, the guy is a literary chameleon. "The Last Street Novel" is almost nothing like Tyree's last two novels. The good news is, it's better.

From the first slam-youin-your-chair chapter to the last few can't-turn-them-fastenough pages, "The Last Street Novel" is gritty, sweaty, and hard-hitting. Tyree populates this thriller with an abundance of figures, any one of which could be the one who's stalking his lead character. The plot twists are tight - although everso-slightly predictable - and the subplots give you a nice window into Shareef's character and what drives him to do what he does. This is one of those books you will have to force yourself to stick a bookmark in, because you won't want to stop reading til you get to an ending that practically begs for a sequel.

If you've promised yourself that you're going to read one book this summer, don't look any further. Just go to your bookstore or library. "The Last Street Novel" should be the first book you grab when you get there.


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### Holt is sharp in leading **Indians past New Holstein**

Was this the game coach Dave Donath was looking for from his Kewaskum Indian baseball team? One where the Indians would put good pitching, timely hitting and solid defense together.

While he didn't say so directly, all the three ingredients could definitely be found in the July 2nd, 5-0 shutout win over visiting New Holstein.

"We pitched well, and we came up with some runs when we needed them," Donath said. And as far as the defense, there was just one error, so that should qualify.

The win gives the Indians 20 wins on the season (20-6) and a 16-4 record in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. More importantly, it kept Kewaskum's hopes of sharing the EWC title alive, although slimly.

New Holstein came in with a 14-game winning streak on the line and left without a single run to its credit, a first during the 2007 campaign.

For the Indians, this was their sixth shutout of the year, and junior pitcher John Holt (7-3) did the honors, scattering six hits, while striking out seven and walking only one, that coming in the top of the seventh in-

He wanted the ball tonight, so I said it's his," Donath said afterward, sporting his usual boy-

Holt, a senior, got in a few

early jams, giving up four hits, three of the infield variety, in the first few innings. When Holt got a few runs from his teammates, however, he was almost untouchable

In the fifth and sixth frames. the Huskies went down in order, and Holt recorded three strikeouts in those innings.

Except for the leadoff walk, there were no worries for the Indians in the seventh, as Holt got catcher Tim Schrage (the only player to have two hits in the game) to hit into a 4-to-3 ground out, Matt Stephanie on a fly out to right field and Nate Jenkins on a strikeout, extended a couple minutes by Jenkins who fouled off at least five pitches before the final swing and miss.

Even with the loss, New Holstein has a record of 17-2 in the EWC with games scheduled against Roncalli (home) and Plymouth (at Appleton's Fox Valley Stadium) last Tuesday and Thursday.

Kewaskum's finale was scheduled to be played at Campbellsport on Friday

As far as Kewaskum's hopes go, Donath said, "They'd have to lose two games, and we have to win ours ... that would take a bit, but the victory tonight gives us 20," a feat he is proud of and hopefully will land the Indians the second seed in the sectional of the WIAA Summer Baseball Tournament.

And Donath is hoping the Indians take their clutch hitting into the tournament. Like Monday when Austin Petrin came up with a bases-loaded single, driving in runs No. 3 an 4, and then pinch hitter Garrett Barlow hit the first pitch he saw off Lucas Petrie (4-2) and sent it sharply past third for another hit and an insurance run.

'We've got some guys who can swing the bat, but they don't have a position," Donath said, referring to guys like Barlow and Justin Krueger, who must often "wait until the end of the game when that one atbat is going to be key."

Donath likes the power his team has and credits the football weight program as a big help. "You can tell in their (the players') swings, they're stronger," Donath said.

Kewaskum's first two runs came in the bottom of the fourth when Matt Parrent singled and Logan Staege walked, then the two moved up a base on Petrie's balk and scored on a ground out.
