# Village receives over 50 applications for clerk's job

Village Board will approve DPW position at August 6 meeting

KEWASKUM- Village officials did not have a shortage of applicants to choose from when it comes to choosing who will fill the job of village clerk/deputy treasurer. Officials have already narrowed the field down to 12 and will conduct interviews Friday,

Village Administrator Jay Shambeau, who currently fulfills the role of village clerk, reported that 51 people applied for the position. Kewaskum residents applying for the job totaled 13, nine of them village residents. A residency requirement is not being enforced for the position.

According to the job description released by the village, the clerk position, under the supervision of the Village Administrator, is responsible for a variety of routine and complex supervisory, clerical, and administrative work of the Village. This position directs and coordinates the activities

of a number of functions including maintenance of public records, elections, Committee and Board meeting procedures, and official minute taking duties. The position is also responsible for performing the functions of the Village Treasurer in the Treasurer's absence.

Shambeau noted that the position of Deputy Treasurer was added shortly before posting the position so that current village treasurer Janet Knops, who has served for over 20 years in the capacity, would have assistance due to the growth of the daily tasks performed by herself. The hire is also made so that the village would not be without someone knowing the village's financial status in the event of Knops' absence.

Shambeau stated that depending on how interviews go on August 3, potential candidates could enter a testing phase in mid-August. From that point the top two could be brought before the village board and a decision would be made. He hoped to offer

the position to one of the candidates by the beginning of September so that person could begin mid-month.

"I was very pleased with the amount of qualifications and level of experience the candidates brought to the table," stated Shambeau, who also said he believed the position would generate a fair amount of interest in the community.

The clerk would receive an annual salary between \$36,003 and \$41,383. The non-union position will come from \$51,767 in funds appropriated in the 2007 general budget for an "Engineer Liaison." This amount is being used for the clerk's position and newly hired building inspector/zoning administrator Chad Cook.

Shambeau was originally hired to carry out the role of clerk however, he will be taking a more active role in administrative duties, village planning and engineering.



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# Anyone for kickball? New fall league starts in mid-August

Remember days on the elementary school playground when a dozen or so kids would enjoy a good game of kickball?

Well, kickball isn't just for kids anymore, and coed teams are forming in various communities in southeastern Wisconsin, including Kewaskum.

Thanks to the efforts of Pat Bohn and Tom Cannestra, a new adult intermediate kickball league is coming to Kiwanis Park, with the opening day of action set for Tuesday, Aug.

"We've still got some availability," Bohn said last week, reporting he is hoping to have a full contingent of eight teams and currently has five.

"There are 15 players on a team. You must have a minimum of at least four men and four women," Cannestra said, indicating all players must be at least 18 years of age.

Up to eleven players can be on the field at one time, and there must be a minimum of at least seven, according to Cannestra, who said a catcher is not necessary.

The kickball games are played on a regulation softball diamond, and in Kewaskum's case will be played on the lighted softball diamond in Kiwanis Park so games can run from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. this fall.

An eight and a half inch ball is used for the game, and no spikes are allowed, according to the rules which have been

drawn up, and like softball, the game is nine innings or the time limit of 55 minutes.

'This is more about fun and fairness," Bohn said, indicating the competition should not be at a high level.

The kickball is rolled across the plate and must take at least three bounces to be legal. "You can't bounce it that high, and it can't be that fast, Bohn, a sales rep for Miller Brewing, said.

Cannestra said each team must pay an entry fee of \$250, which includes a personalized t-shirt for each player, and the two men stressed the league is nonprofit with the extra moneys and concession profits going to a year-end party

"We will also have a tournament on a Saturday," Bohn said, not certain what date it will be on. The tournament will give awards to the top teams and the team with the most spirit and

Currently Bohn and Cannestra have teams entered, along with CC's in Wayne, and Erica Hughes.

"There's already a league in Jackson and a lot of leagues in Milwaukee," Cannestra said. "Pat has played before."

"At the park, they have a lot of baseball leagues for kids and they do a good job with those," Bohn said. "All they offer for adults is men's softball," Bohn said, so the new kickball leagues will give young people something to do in the fall.

"After the softball season ends, there's not a whole lot going on," Cannestra said, eager to see what fun the kickball league will generate.



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

### Wisconsin: Stay tuned to the state budget

chancellor for two statewide UW institutions, I would be remiss if I did not point out some effects the proposed state budget cuts to UW System's operating budget would have on this entire state. Consider the following:

State funding for Wisconsin Public Television and Radio programs would cease, affecting thousands of residents who tune in daily to our educational programs and unbi-ased news. Wisconsin Public TV and Radio cost Wisconsin taxpayers about \$1/year. You won't find cable TV at that price

Students would have a harder time gaining access and earning a degree at a time when a knowledge-based economy requires one. Right now, returning adults comprise 30 percent of students at the 13 UW Colleges campuses, the most accessible and affordable UW campuses. Placebound students attend classes in person or take our online courses from remote corners of the state to become better educated and enhance their employability.

Reduced resources for UW-Extension's Cooperative Extension would limit our ability to extend UW resources and research statewide. Current state funding allows us to hire campus and county colleagues who provide critical information that keeps our industries competitive, our communities vibrant, and our

natural resources protected. In addition, federal grants and other revenue match \$2 for every \$1 Wisconsin taxpayers provide.

Proposed cuts would eliminate the UW School for Workers, the oldest university-based labor program in the U.S., and one of UW-Extension's most effective statewide education efforts.

As chancellor of the UW

Colleges and UW-Extension, I have personally seen the challenges and opportunities that exist in Wisconsin's urban regions, rural areas, and the state's tribal nations. In countless conversations, state residents have told me what their communities need and what they value. They have told me how the University of Wisconsin has made a difference in their lives, the lives of their children, and in their commu-

The UW Colleges and UW-Extension contribute positively to Wisconsin com-munities- through our county Extension offices, through public broadcasting, through students attending our cam-puses, through online courses, and much more.









Summer School - Kid's classroom stays outside



Emma takes a perch. With patience and pure talent, fouryear-old Emma Klick battled this bruiser into submission on her Barbie rod.

Lindsey Calvi lay on her belly on a rickety pier in northern Wisconsin. The hand to her forehead shaded the glare of a dropping western sun on water stirred by a slight breeze. A line fell from her hand and twitched with the winds before disappearing into the water.

"I'm 21 years old," Lindsey said in my shadow. "And I still think that catching crabs like this is just as good now as it was when I was a kid."

Linz, I thought, crabs, and bullfrogs and turtles have made kids again of men and women far older than you. Forget Grecian Formula. A popping bobber over a perch field will take decades off of any Baby Boomer with two poles to worm and three hours to burn.

Lindsey was catching more than the Wisconsin crayfish with a piece of bacon on a string. She was catching smallmouth and perch and rockbass. And with younger siblings and other kids from four-to-the-teens, she was catching the simple woniers and new surprises that lew things can deliver like a Wisconsin outdoor classroom. She was catching it all.

Sometime, you have to walk away from the "hows" and 'wheres" necessary to catch the biggest fish or tag the biggest buck. On occasion, it's time to watch the bobbers twitch, entice crabs from the mason blocks, stalk frogs, and see what other kinds of studies Mother

Nature has on the books each

The pupils last week included Lindsey, Carley and Dominic Calvi, Emily Kerr, Emma Klick, and Taylor Ellis. Their instructors, with not much more to offer beyond things like worm hooking 101, introduction to casting, and the double barehanded frog pounce for beginners, included this writer, Larry Calvi, and Jim Ellis

Two boats overflowing with kids began our three days under hot and flawless skies headed toward various parts of the Manitowish Chain loaded with Canadian Crawlers and high expectations. While the "Bobber Watch" would result in nice perch and rock bass for four year old Emma-on-up, Jim would cheat by actually teaching whole crawler, splits hot and Gulp techniques for smallmouth on the rocks. That would result in smallies to 17 inches and memories of a biggest fish ever for Lindsey.

Our daily fishing journeys were interrupted by treasure hunts along the beaches for lures and things; we found that intended booty in the form of rusted baits and long-lost Mr. Twisters but one such walk led to a reinforcement of the idea that Mother Nature's demands do not always lead to Disney endings. A very large snapping turtle had died, trying to obey her obligation to sustain the

The turtle trapping season running from mid-July through late November, protects females during the egg-laying season. Only snappers with shell length between the slot length of 12 and 16 inches are legal game. Turtles that make it above that 16 inch mark are the most prolific breeders, and have earned safe refuge from harvest.

The sand beaches wear the pocketed complexion marking the spots snappers had successfully dropped their eggs, only to have them excavated and eaten by raccoon or mink. . This snapper had lived well beyond the 16 inch mark that previously had placed her in danger of landing in a trapper's pot; only to die, apparently when an outboard prop caught her in the shallows as she moved to lay her eggs. It was another lesson that the individual loss means little if the species lives on.

A Nursery Web or Fishing Spider with hairy body, leg span at three inches and eight eyes is enough in appearance alone to raise the hackles on even the most grizzled outdoorsman. Referred to as "Bongo-monsters" by this group and most often found on the pier or in other dark and damp spots, one such giant couldn't intimidate Emily Kerr. The 13-year old caught the spider with her patented cup and lid technique and introduced it personally to the group.

Fishing spiders can run over the surface of water but also dive and stay submerged for up to 30 minutes, using air bubbles to breathe. Amazingly, they hunt day and night for aquatic insects and even minnows according to several websites (Google: Nursery Web

After intense debate last week over whether our newest spider friend would live or be sentenced to death by bootsquish, Emily released her in the forest; large egg sac and all promising more hairy visitors for years to come.

A large and boisterous community of bullfrogs whose nocturnal chorus carried over the water each night as the midnight hour approached sent us to the regulation books where we discovered that only firearms are illegal in that hunt. Because our palates fondly recalled a one and only Wisconsin frog leg dinner years before, we went as far as making gigging spears in preparation of a late night hunt. Alas, we never stayed awake long enough to taste the fruits of those labors.

When it was time to head south, it had been a weekend of exploring and campfires, wieners and marshmallows, and of catching things. It had been a northern Wisconsin weekend for kids. And some of us haven't even turned 50 yet.

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# Donath shifts gears, heads for UW-Madison

Calling it "one of the hardest decisions I have ever had to make," Kewaskum track standout Amanda Donath will transfer from UW-Oshkosh to the University of Wisconsin in Madison this fall.

Donath, who won the 400meter dash in the National NCAA 3 Track and Field Meet in May, an event hosted by UW-Oshkosh, will have two years of eligibility at UW.

"Oshkosh has been very good to me, and the coaches were very good to me," Donath said last Thursday evening, indicating the move was made in an effort to seek more difficult competition and to push herself as an athlete.

"I want to keep growing as an athlete," Donath said, and she feels Madison will be the place for her to do that.

The University of Wisconsin officials did send her an inquiry letter when she was a senior at Kewaskum High School, but, "I didn't follow up on it. I didn't think I was a Division One athlete."

After two seniors of collegiate running in one of the top programs in NCAA Division 3, she feels she is ready for that step.

As far as the ethics of the move, Donath said the NCAA prohibits a coach from talking to an athlete from another school after that athlete has put in a year in the current program she is in.

Donath said it was her mother, Debbie, who contact-ed Mark Guthrie, former UW-La Crosse head men's coach who is in his second year working for UW-Madison as the coach of the 400 and 200 runners.

"He coached Mitch Potter and Andrew Rock," Donath said, noting Potter is a whole class middle distance runner, and Rock was a member of the USA gold medal 4x400 Olym-

Donath, who is spending her summer working out and doing office work for WE Energy in Waukesha, said when wheels started to turn there was a possibility she could go to Madison, she received releases from UW-Oshkosh coach Deb Vercauteren and the athletic director at Os-

Donath said the head women's coach at UW, Jim Stintzi, has indicated she will continue to run the open 400. Beyond that, she does not know what his plans are.

"I think this will push me," Donath said. "I know it will be a challenge.

In addition to running in the Big Ten and in Division 1 circles, Donath said UW will offer her an excellent education and the chance to study dietetics, a field she has been interested in but is not offered at Oshkosh.

"I sat on this for a long time," Donath said, noting she 'had some loyalties there (Os-

Donath, who won NCAA 3 All-American honors in both indoor and outdoor track, will receive tuition and books from the University of Wisconsin. She will be eligible immediately and said the fall workout season begins in September.

Donath will now be a teammate of Dominican's Katelyn Dodge, who defeated her in the 2005 Division 2 state track and field meet her senior

year.
"I think it's the right thing (for me)," she said.

Writer's note: It has been over 25 years since Wisconsin has had a woman win the Big Ten championship in the 400. Pam Moore dominated the event from 1978 through 1981, setting new Big Ten records during the first three years of her reign, and her time of 53.01 (April 25, 1981) still stands as the fastest 400 ever run by a Lady Badger.

Those marks will probably be on Donath's mind when she starts her second track career. Her fastest time in the event was the 54.68 she turned in to win the NCAA III title in Oshkosh in late May.

# **Five Indians earn EWC baseball honors**

Five Kewaskum High baseball players, led by Matt Parrent and Casey Scheel, were honored in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference voting that took place recently.

EWC coaches selected center fielders Parrent and Scheel, the team's first baseman, to the 2007 first team, and picked third baseman Dan Shea and pitchers Nick Ebert and John Holt for the second team.

Parrent, Scheel and Shea are all seniors, while the two pitchers are juniors and will definitely give the Indians an edge for the 2008 campaign.

For Parrent and Scheel, this was the culmination of two fine athletic careers at KHS. Scheel was the EWC Player of the Year in football and also made first team in golf, which is determined by strokes averages for the season. Parrent became the school's all-time leading scorer in basketball, was a first team all-conference end and a second team pick in basketball.

Parrent also made the all-region team, according to coach Dave Donath, who said he is still awaiting word on the all-state picks.

In the 21 EWC games, Parrent hit a crisp .370, going 20x54, with four doubles and five home runs. "Five home runs led the conference," Donath said, reporting Parrent had 17 runs batted in (RBI) and had a slugging percentage of .722, which is calculated using at-bats and the number of bases earned on each hit a player has.

As far as his work in the outfield, Donath said, "He runs the field very well.

Parrent had just one error all season.

Scheel was a perfect leadoff man for the Indians. He wound up with 19 hits in 62 trips to the plate for a .306 average, and his on-base percentage was .554, according to Donath, who said, "He was hit nine times and he walked 10 times."

Scheel had three doubles and one home run and was also 13x14 in stolen base attempts for the year.

The first baseman had two errors in EWC play.

Ebert was not just a good pitcher but he also hit well, and his versatility helped him make the team. While he was on the mound, Ebert was 5-1, throwing 35 innings, with 14 runs given up, just seven earned runs for a sparkling 1.4 ERA.

At the plate, as the team's designated hitter and playing a little in the outfield, Ebert went 17x49 for a .347 clip with one double, two home runs and 12 runs batted in.

Holt went 7-3 in his stints on the mound. In 56 innings, the big right-hander gave up 19 runs, of which 13 were earned for a 1.63 ERA average. He struck out 72 and walked 20.

"That was a good ratio," Donath said about the strikeouts and walks, adding Holt has "a good fastball, curve and changeup."



Campbellsport's Austin Backhaus was selected as one of the first-team pitchers, and Austin Sarauer made the first team as a shortstop. The Cougars were also represented by catcher Ryan Zommers, who made the second team.
