

# **Kewaskum man faces fifth** drunken driving charge

WEST BEND- An area man faces up to 13 years in prison and up to \$22,500 in fines after receiving his fifth drunken driving charge.

A criminal complaint filed in Washington County Circuit Court on August 16, revealed that Jesse A. Weisenberger, 32, of rural Kewaskum, was stopped by a West Bend Police Officer on July 29 near Beech Street and 7th Avenue in the City.

Weisenberger was unable to perform field sobriety tests and was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend where blood was drawn to determine his level of intoxication. Those tests revealed that he had a blood alcohol level of .244

Weisenberger also was charged with his second offense of operating a motor vehicle with a revoked drivers license.

Because he is a repeat offender, Weisenberger receives an alcohol fine enchancer. The enchancer comes after a defendant has two or more prior drunken driving convictions and has an alcohol concentration between .20 and .249, the minimum and maximum fines are tripled.

Weisenberger's last conviction for drunken driving occurred just over a year ago on August 27, 2006. Previously convictions also occurred on July 9, 1991 for an offense occurring March 7, 1991; on December 17, 1997 for an offense occurring August 19, 1997; on June 24, 2002 for an offense occurring October 4, 2001; and on September 13, 2006 for an offense occurring June 12, 2006.

# T. Kewaskum changes speed limits, signs

TOWN of KEWASKUM- Take note the next time you're on the road. Officials have changed the speed limits on a number of roads in the township after spending around \$6,032 to start replacing a number of stop signs and speed limit signs.

The sign replacement plan will span over four years and the township will apply for a state grant this fall to help alleviate the cost of future sign replacements. The project started in the northeast section of the township because the number of signs in that part of the township were greater than any other section.

Town Chairman Ellis Kahn has reported that so far the town replaced a total of 17 stop and stop ahead signs. He says the old signs that have been removed are on their way to the Wisconsin Prison System and will be refurbished so that all stop signs in the town will meet new Department of Transportation regulations. That will cost \$404.64. This saved taxpayers about \$700.

The signs have also received new wood posts at a cost of \$4,459. The county highway department drilled new holes for the signs at a cost of \$1,168.73.

The township also purchased new speed limit signs to correspond with the new speed limits of 45 MPH on a number of roads whose limits were changed as of August 1.

Resident David Dorn asked the town board to reconsider the speed limit on Highland Drive. Currently it is 50 MPH, Dorn would like to see it at 45. Chairman Kahn stated he would look into the matter and report back.


# Coffee Corner brews re-opening plans

rebuilding The Coffee Corner Bistro on Thursday, August 30. First on the agenda was the removal of the roof of the structure and the immediate replacement of the roof.

Jessica and Tony Trunkel who own the building explained that the over 120 year-old building was built using a balloon framing method. Because of this method, the trusses needed to be replaced immediately to maintain the integrity of the structure.

Balloon framing has been outlawed by building codes in many areas because of the fire danger that it poses. Kewas-kum's Building Inspector Chad Cook reported although uncommon in new construction balloon framing is allowed in the village's building code.

Tony Trunkel reported that the apartments located in the structure are being remodeled to create two-high-end living spaces. The actual space used by the coffeehouse will remain





What began as only an idea has led to the discovery of a calling. Since August 2003 I have been living at Esperanza Viva Youth Home in Puebla, Mexico, caring for girls between the ages of 6 and 12. It was their unshakable joy, beautiful smiles, and tender hearts despite shattered pasts that initially drew me to consider serving there when I first visited in June 2000.

Even before all of this, the thought of doing mission work interested me. While studying Spanish in high school, I had a desire to put into practice all that I was learning and since the age of 12, I knew that I wanted to work with children when I was older. Plans moved forward when I was informed, by my best friend, of a four-month school of ministry affiliated with the

Youth Home. I saw this as the perfect opportunity to spend time with the children and decide in which areas I could be involved in. We both moved down a month and a half later. Shortly after the school ended, I was placed in the dorms to help with the children.

Esperanza Viva provides a home for more than 85 abandoned or abused children, boys and girls ages 0-18 years. I live with the youngest girls as their full-time "mom", helping them get ready for school, serving them meals, doing their hair, and checking their homework, as well as simply being someone they can talk to and trust The majority of the girls have been with me since 2004, and we have become very close. They love to sit on my bed with me and giggle for hours over anything; they also enjoy dancing, playing dress up and baking cookies. Apart from caring for the girls, I also help coordinate

sorship program and participate on the worship team at the church.

Itzel, one of the youngest in the dorm, has an incredible story. When she arrived in October 2005, she was hungry and dirty, and her head was covered with lice. She had been living on the streets with her mother and two brothers. It was my responsibility to give her a bath, comb out her hair, and pick out new shoes and clothes for her. During her first months here, Itzel would withdraw herself from the other children and rarely spoke. Being able to witness progress like hers is one of the many reasons I am there. This summer Itzel learned how to read. She is a funny and outgoing little girl, and loves to dance and sing. This experience has been both amazing and challenging, and I am convinced that there is nothing better for me at this moment in my life.



Shattered Dreams: My Life as a Polygamist's Wife

By Irene Spencer Center Street, \$24.99 385 pages

In a time when some fifty percent of marriages end in divorce and a surprising number of people remarry, it's not at all rare to be introduced to someone's "second wife" or "first husband".

But what if you were the second wife and your spouse was still very married to the first one?.

And to the third. And the fourth.

And number seven was waiting in the future.

In the new book "Shattered Dreams: My Life as a Polygamist's Wife" by Irene Spencer, you'll read about one woman's years as the second of ten wives and the agony she endured in a plural marriage, both physically and mentally.

As the thirteenth of thirtyone children born to a fundamentalist Mormon family,
Irene Kunz knew the heartbreak that came with being
one of many wives. Her own
mother, a second wife, left
Irene's father and chose monogamy when Irene was not
quite a teenager. Irene knew

the poverty that often resulted when a man tried to support many households and dozens of children. She knew all about the secrecy that was necessary because of the illegality of plural marriage. She was fully aware of the jealousy and anger harbored by some wives in polygamist unions.

So why then did sixteenyear-old Irene eschew a man she loved in favor of life in a dirt house in Mexico, second wife of a man she barely knew? She had been taught and believed that it was the only way to celestial glory. By supporting her husband, her sister-wives, and their many children, she would become a goddess.


But for a lively woman who loved music, being another of what would eventually be ten wives was a crushing existence. Work at the Mexican compound was onerous and never-ending. Irene's husband was gone often. When he was home, his time was divided between his many families. He ignored Irene's needs

and made a lot of promises he couldn't or wouldn't keep. Irene was pregnant nearly constantly, eventually giving birth to thirteen children.


But leaving her husband, Verlan, wasn't much of an option. According to Church edicts, he could keep their kids and belongings. Irene could leave with only the clothes on her back.

Broken, saddened, and feeling alone, she sought help. Could anything repair her crushed spirit?

Filled with despair, anger, love, and triumph, author Irene Spencer says that many books about polygamy don't "acknowledge how terrible it was for everyone to live it". She does so - loud and clear in this brave, incredible, blunt and engrossing true story. laughed ("Imagine, not having a decent thing to wear to my own husband's wedding!"), I gasped as Spencer calmly tells of the murderous intentions of a rival fundamentalist, and I loved reading about where her family is now,



I've heard that the reason to read a memoir is to learn about a life you didn't choose. If that's the case, then this is a memoir to choose. "Shattered Dreams" is a smashing book, and should be first on your fall reading list.

Peter Schiltz of New Fane was badly injured last week Friday by falling from his wagon.

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

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

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# Spartans are no match for Indians' ground game

When a high school football team gains 242 yards rushing, it is pretty obvious the linemen deserve A's for their blocking

Especially successful when he has a chance to carry the ball was junior Jordan Petrin, who rushed for 66 yards in 16 carries and scored three touchdowns, on runs of 4, 1 and 1 yards.

The Indians opened the scoring with a pass play, however, and it came just 56 seconds into the contest. Junior quarterback Nick Olla teamed up with senior split end John Holt for a bomb, covering 74 vards. Holt scored the only TD in Kewaskum's 6-0 opening victory over West Bend East.

Brian Backhaus was perfect on the PAT (point after touchdown) and the Indians were on their way to win No. 2 of the 2007 season.

Kewaskum scored once more in the first quarter on Petrin's 4-yard run, and the powerful halfback added two more before the half ended, giving the Indians a 28-0 lead that was never challenged.

Reserve Nathan Westerman scored the lone TD of the second half on a 5-yard run, which capped a very successful drive by the Indians to open the third quarter.

Backhaus booted his fifth straight PAT, and the fourth quarter was scoreless.



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

"The girls did a good job in this tournament, but we are looking forward to the Hartford Tournament," Altendorf said.


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
