WEST BEND- SynergyHealth Board of Directors has announced they have unanimously agreed to pursue an affiliation with another health system. Aurora Health Care, Froedtert & Community Health, and Wheaton Franciscan are in the running for the partnership. SynergyHealth Board of Directors will make the final selection of an affiliation partner by the end of January 2008.

"The SynergyHealth board has determined that an affiliation with a larger health system will enable us to better serve the health care needs of the greater Washington County community," said SynergyHealth CEO Gregory Banaszynski. "This is an important step in our strategic evaluation process." A press release from Synergy-Health, who maintains clinics in Kewaskum, West Bend, Jackson and Hartford and St. Joseph's Hospital stated over the course of the last year, they have been considering a variety of strategic alternatives for the future of the health system, including an affiliation. This fall, the system held meetings with the CEOs and board leadership of a number of systems. Each of the systems provided written proposals on December 10 to address how their health system and Synergy-Health might establish a relationship. SynergyHealth has now begun the process of reviewing additional information necessary to fully evaluate each of the three potential partners based on several objectives, including the ability of the partnership to:

Gavin reports interest in TIF District lands, village denies claim from Super Excavators

KEWASKUM- Village trustees received a bit of an early Christmas present at their monthly meeting held December 10. Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) district developer Gary Gavin, announced that two parties were interested in building in the district. Gavin also has paid his \$368,492 share of the infrastructure costs to the district and provided two letters of credit required in the developer's agreement. Gavin indicated the interested parties were moved by his incentive of two complimentary acres for the first buyer in the TIF district. "We are in the planning stage, there is some action out there," he stated. He did not report what type of building would take place. With Gavin's payment being received, the village will now move forward on further improvements to the district. Those improvements include street lighting that will be installed

mid-January or early February. Village engineers Ruekert Mielke have been authorized to start drawing plans for the improvements on Highway 45 that are required by the state's Department of Transportation near the district.

are unpleased with the quality of the work and claim it was not done properly. Super Excavators claim the soil compaction and seeding work they performed in the TIF District was in accordance with standards set by Ruekert Mielke in their contract. They further claim, subsequent to the compaction, the Village failed to test the compacted soils in a timely fashion, and have relied on inconclusive testing to assert that the soils may not have been compacted properly. Attorney Shannon M. Whitworth stated in her letter that "It has become obvious that the performance for the seeding were incorrectly established by Ruekert & Mielke and the implementation flawed because of incorrect information provided by Ruekert & Mielke to the contractors." Shambeau reported that Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer, advised the village to deny the claim. Trustees took that advice with Trustees Kevin Scheunemann and Derek Peterson taking action to deny and contest the claim.

The letters of credit provided by Gavin were in the amounts of \$40,000 and \$144,000. They are financial guarantees for the residential development within the district.

Village administrator Jay Shambeau reported the next meeting between the village and Gavin will take place on January 15.

At that same meeting, Shambeau announced that the village has received a claim for public improvement lien from Mawicke and Goisman of Milwaukee, attorneys representing Super Excavators for work in the TIF District. The claim amounts to \$114,436.51 according to a letter from the attorneys.

The village has refused to make payment to Super Excavators for the work they performed because they



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



PSC reduces rate request for WE Energies

MADISON- The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) approved an increase in We Energies' electric and natural gas rates. The approved amount was less then that requested by the utility and will help cover costs associated with meeting energy demands, renewable energy requirements outlined in 2005 Wisconsin Act 141, emissions control equipment and other environmental improvements. In a verbal decision, the Commission set overall 2008 and 2009 electric rates for We Energies to increase by 3.4 percent for each year. This would increase the average residential homeowner's electric bill by about \$3.75 per month each year. In addition, the Commission approved a 2.1 percent increase for Wisconsin Gas Company natural gas customers and a 0.7 percent increase for Wisconsin Electric Gas Company customers. This would increase

the average residential monthly natural gas bill by about \$1.87 for Wisconsin Gas Company and \$0.34 for Wisconsin Electric

Company. The Commission also approved a 10.75 percent return on equity for We Energies.

German Scholar to speak at MWA on Origins of Wisconsin Art: The Munich Academy

WEST BEND --- German scholar Leon Krempel, phD, of Germany will speak on the Origins of Wisconsin Art: The Munich Academy at the Museum of Wisconsin Art (MWA) on Saturday, January 26, at 4:00 p.m. Dr. Krempel is the Curator of Munich's Haus de Kunst (as the Academy is now known) and will lecture on the connections and influence between Wisconsin and the Munich Academy. In the 19th century many of Wisconsin's artists traveled to Germany to study, motivated by ethnic heritage and better, more prestigious art schools. The Academy of Fine Arts Munich was a favorite destination for many, including Carl von Marr, Frank Enders, Alexander Mueller and Gustave Moeller among others. Upon their return they brought their German expe-Priences with them and this

greatly influenced the course of Wisconsin art in the early 20th century through teaching and exhibitions.

Dr. Krempel is currently curating a major international exhibition about the Munich Academy and it will include several Wisconsin artists including Carl von Marr. This lecture will mark Dr. Krempel's first visit to the MWA as part of a global curatorial search for paintings to be included this landmark exhibition; it is likely that he will borrow from their collection. His talk will reveal the legacy of the Haus der Kunst and how it connects Milwaukee to Munich. The Haus der Kunst (literally "House of Art") in Munich is the city's premier art exhibition venue with its origins in the early 19th century. Dr. Krempel studied history of art, classical archaeology and philosophy in Mainz, Munster

and Bonn from 1988 onwards. In 1998 he received his doctorate with a thesis on Nicholas Maes, a pupil of Rembrandt. A highly experienced curator, he has worked on exhibitions such as the 2000 Museumsinsel by Ryuji Miyamoto at the State Museums for Prussian Cultural Collections in Berlin; Camera Elinga. Peter Janssens meets Jeff Wall at the State Art Institute in Frankfurt and The Gods of Ancient Greece at the Glyptothek in Munich. The Museum of Wisconsin Art (formerly the West Bend Art Museum) is located in downtown West Bend at 300 South 6th Avenue. Public hours are Wednesday - Saturday 10:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and Sunday 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. For more information, call (262) 334-9638 or visit their website at www.wisconsinart.org.

Sometimes - particularly this time of year, after the craziness of the holidays - it's good to kick back with an old friend over a cup of cocoa in front of the fire. It's good to talk about nothing and everything, and to tell stories. That's what it's like when you listen to "Mosaic" by Amy Grant. Grant reads her own words, and hearing them is like spending time with a beloved friend you haven't seen in awhile. If you're a country-western music fan or if you loved hearing Amy Grant's gospel music, you know how her lyrics can touch all sorts of emotions in you. In this very personal audio biography, Grant goes further than just song lyrics as she talks about this and that, traveling and performing, family and motherhood, happiness and loss.

and how Grant and Gill made a short drive to meet the woman to fulfill her wish. In doing so,

She talks of family: the sisters who mean so much to her, and parents who raised her and gave her a good foundation, memorable family vacations, and unquestioned support as her career was beginning. She confesses to the kind of heartbreak that goes with divorce and loss, and she's open about forgiveness and moving forward. She talks about falling in love, marriage, friends who are like family, and the blessings that children bestow on a parent. Grant talks candidly about her husband, country singer Vince Gill, and how important his fans are to him. She tells the story about an elderly woman who wanted nothing more than to meet her idol on her birthday,

the birthday girl gave Grant and Gill a gift: the gift of wisdom that comes with age and living life.

Grant remembers recording sessions and performances with other singers, and she recalls her friendship with legend Minnie Pearl (after whom one of Grant's daughters is named). She shares funny stories of her children growing up; she shares heartbreak, faith, fellowship, and stories that are wonderfully very un-celebrity-like.


I was pleased to hear author Amy Grant reading her own material on this audio CD. Hearing her words in her own voice makes it that much more personal because, like a piece of art, "Mosaic" is made up of bits and pieces of memory and story. Those tidbits just seem to sound so much better with the author's own inflections.

My only complaint with this audio is that Grant includes the lyrics to many of her songs, but she spoke the poetry and lyrics on this CD, rather than sang them. Repeated refrains sound strange when recited, and although Grant's rendition of those passages are true to the paper-book version of "Mosaic", they lose much in translation, particularly if you're a fan who knows the tune to the poem. Still, if you love Amy Grant's works, or if you're just looking to spend some gentle time with a gracious hostess who welcomes you into her life, this is an audiobook to find. "Mosaic" is truly a work of biographical

art.

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


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
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

cody, Steve Henske's golden retriever, rests with the lone prize of the day on December 15 after deep snow and ice made hunting conditions extremely difficult.

From an elevated deer stand in Rock County, the telephoto lens is focused on the long, slow push of Steve Henske and his golden reriever Cody as they work the heavy grass cover in search of one last rooster and a two-bird bag. A hard snow periodically tries to erase man and dog and all but wipes out the large farm looming in the distance. Veteran bird hunters know that quiet is a mandatory "tool" for a successful late season hunt. Any roosters left in the field this December 15th afternoon after months of hunting are the true survivors. They're not alive this day without an instinct to either hold to cover and run, or to flush early. Some may have "discovered" that instinct after smelling the hot breath of a good dog over its hiding place on a lazy October morning just before a load of #04 shot is sent to tickle a tail feather of two. And sent too as a reminder in the days ahead that these things with the hot breath and the "bang" sticks are no less dangerous than the coyotes and the birds of prey. But on this cold winter afternoon, quiet for the hunter is impossible. Two layers of ice separated by three layers of snow make for a deep, white crunch cake. Each step of Henske's trek up the sloping hill of conservation reserve program (CRP) habitat is recorded by the crack of ice before the boot sinks to the shin in snow. To the hunter, the noise is no less painful than fingernails on a blackboard. Even if he holds flush a rooster within range of the scattergun, it doesn't hap-

pen. These are the "flushers". They flush early. Or these are the runners. They run, and then run some more in habitat that has been established just for these wild birds.

Establishing proper habitat that allows the birds nestof establishing habitat. The number of birds we're seeing right now near Monroe is extraordinary. But if you build it, they will come. That is, oh, so true."

were light enough to move easily atop the ice and snow, Blue rested in the truck with a bloody foot for Henske's final push after slipping into the jagged ice edges of one of my boot tracks. Henske was soaking wet in sweat after several hours working the deep snow. And my own shirt was already freezing to my body after just a few minutes of rest in my "camera tower."

The view, which I would never have seen from the ground cover, was fascinating, and enlightening. As Henske pushed on in the driving snow behind the veteran work of Cody, street-wise and gunshy birds took flight far ahead. Two other roosters could be seen hanging to cover and running perpendicular and then back from the hunter's path. Four pheasants were

seen leaving the cover of a treeline to enter a food plot. They stopped short when they sensed danger 100 yards distant, and watched closely until Henske and Cody had continued on.

At last, a rooster that had held tight to cover erupted in a shower of snow ahead of Henske. The shot only took out the long rudder of a wild Wisconsin pheasant.

"The snow banks were frozen over and the birds weren't able to burrow in," an exhausted Henske said later. "The snow wasn't holding the scent real well, but we did see eight roosters and at least three times that many hens. That's good. But it's also a lot of work to end up shooting behind the bird."

ing cover and protection from predation remains the essential key to success. State wildlife experts like Brian Buenzow believes that habitat, in fact, is more important than planting wild pheasants.

In 1988 Buenzow helped direct Wisconsin's first attempt at establishing wild birds in Rock County and subsequent efforts in Green and Lafayette Counties. In particular near Monroe, the program is a classic success story.

In Rock County, chosen because of the potential for vast tracts of CRP habitat, only eight to 10 percent of the terrain was ultimately converted to desirable grasslands. With an extraordinary number of Monroe landowners near buying into the idea of estab-. lishing wild pheasants, more than one-third of the acreage is currently grassland. The number of birds correlates with the amount of habitat established. "The more I know, the more I think the wild bird releases are secondary to success," Buenzow said in a recent interview. "Almost without exception, if you put the habitat in, the birds are going to get there. Take the habitat out, they're gone. It may take a number of years, depending on the resident population. In Rock and Green Counties we had very good numbers of pheasants within two years
