Scott Township will purchase truck look for inspector

TOWN of SCOTT- New was the key word at the monthly meeting held Monday, August 11. Town supervisors approved the purchase of a new truck and requesting proposals for a new building inspector.

Before making any decisions town resident Marie Edler spoke during public presentation and stated she wanted to see a stop to the "hateful nonsense" going on between the town and resident Jean Linton. The comments came after an opinion piece published in this newspaper by Linton.

Town supervisors and residents agreed there were many falsehoods in the published piece and felt that Linton had remaining concerns over other town issues and has since been taking things out on

Clerk B.J. Richter.

During a discussion about hiring a new building inspector, Chairman Steve Jung asked if the board wanted bids out for the replacement. Supervisor Dan Morin stated he thought it was important because the current inspector does not carry liability insurance and has no interest in getting any.

Supervisors Janz and Morin stated they thought asking for bids was the right approach for the town. The current inspector is Frank Mayer. Richter stated that because laws have changed the town is now forced to contact or hire an inspector not just appoint one like it was previously done with Mayer.

In the past the building inspector has been appointed in December to become effective in the new year. For 2009 the town will review proposals and hire an inspector.

On a motion from Morin and second from Supervisor Randy Narbatovics approval was given to have Clerk Richter advertise the position in newspapers and the towns association. It was not determined how much this individual would be paid.

The town will replace a 1995 truck. Bids for a new town truck were received from Lochen Ford, Ernie von Schledorn, Bob Fish, Gordie Bocher and Brantmeyer Ford.

On a motion from Narbatovics and Supervisor Dennis Janz the board accepted a bid from Ernie von Schledorn for a one-ton diesel Chevrolet with a dump for \$32,802. The truck will be used in the roads department.

Money for the truck will be taken from a contingency fund.

POLICE REPORTS

Banking scam

On July 12, a Kewaskum police officer met with a complainant who stated someone had electronically removed money from her bank account through West Bend Savings Bank.

She showed a bank statement indicating unknown actor(s) did an ATM withdrawal on July 9, 2008, including the ATM fee and another withdrawal on July 10, for a total loss of \$581.46.

The complainant further stated she had been out of town July 8 and 9, but on the 9th, she received a text message on her phone indicating it was West Bend Savings and advised her there was some problems with her bank account. It is believed this is part of the on-going scam taking place in the area.

The complainant tried calling the bank and there was no answer so she decided to call the 800 number given in her text message. She then received an automated message and punched in her debit account number, the pin number and expiration date. She did not realize it was a scam.

She went to West Bend Savings and their Customer Service Department is trying to help the complainant recover her lost

funds.

According to the bank, the money was debited to someone in a community named Valencia, outside of the United States.

Vandalism

On July 13, a Kewaskum police officer was dispatched to a residence for a vandalism complaint. The owner and her son witnessed a rock, the size of a hardball, coming through the window screen and three pane glass window.

The officer observed the shards of glass consistent with an object being thrown in the residence from outside.

The son stated he thought he knew who had because these same people had been harassing him all day as well as in the past. These two had rode by his house earlier in the day and words were exchanged between the three of them.

A neighbor living across the street also stated she had seen two boys in the yard before the rock had been thrown. She later added she could not make out their identities and did not see them throw anything at the house. She only observed them in front of the house.

Her son stated he had not

seen them, but when he went outside after the rock was thrown, there were two individuals heading south on their bicycles.

The officer then proceeded to go and speak to the two alleged suspects and their parents. Both boys denied having anything to do with throwing the rock however, they admitted to the exchange of words during the day.

On July 14, another Kewaskum police officer was dispatched to the residence where the rock throwing incident occurred and met with the owner who stated a neighbor girl overheard two boys talking about the damage to the window. The officer spoke with the girl who said she was walking by a gas station where several boys were outside and she heard two of them talking about how they "rocked" a window and broke it. The two boys were the aforementioned alleged suspects. The girl filled out a written statement to this effect.

On July 20, an officer reviewed the statement from the neighbor girl and proceeded

to go and speak with the girl's mother. The officer asked the mother to speak to her daughter to see if she could determine if the daughter was being truthful.

The mother of the neighbor girl later stopped at the police department and advised that she had spoken with her daughter and it appeared the girl was being truthful in her statement.

Driver cited for inattentive driving after crash

On August 4, at approximately 11:57 p.m., a Kewaskum police officer stopped a southbound vehicle on Highway 45 near Sandy Ridge Road. Upon checking the registration on the vehicle, the officer noted it had expired.

While doing a record check on both subjects, the driver was found to have no warrants for his arrest, but the passenger came back as not on file. The passenger was asked numerous times if his information was correct.

A sheriff's deputy was requested at the stop and the pas-

senger later admitted to giving false information to avoid the officer finding a warrant out for his arrest.

The passenger turned over his driver license and was correctly identified, placed in hand cuffs and placed under arrest for obstructing an officer. It was also confirmed there were two active warrants for him.

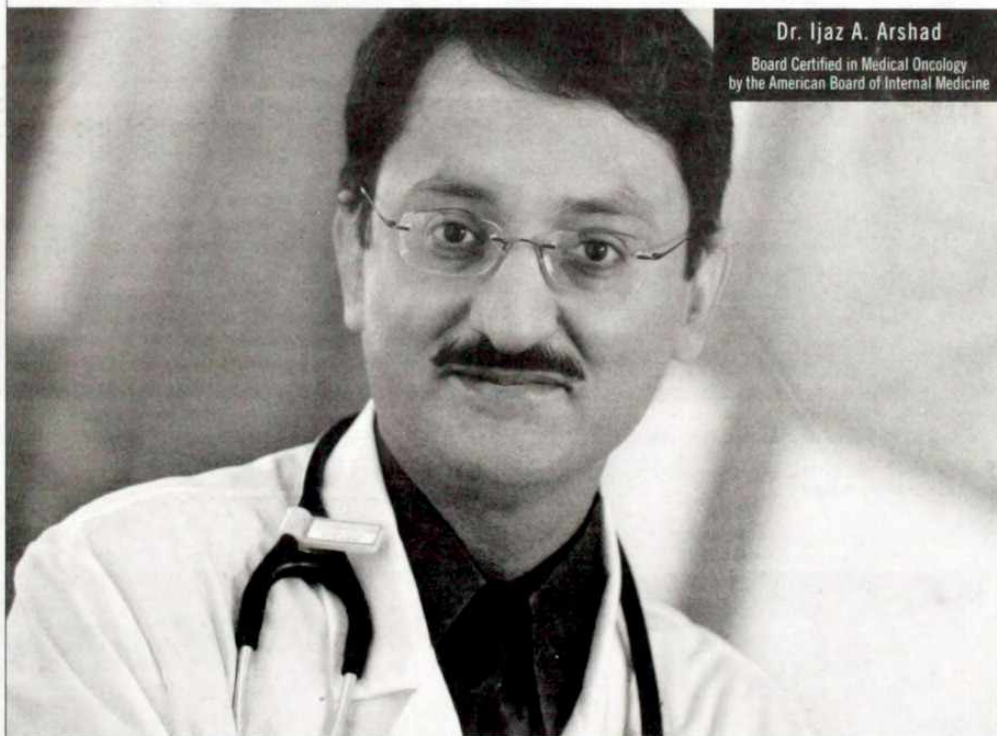

Safeguard your mail. If you receive junk mail, don't be so quick to throw it out without opening it first. It might contain personally identifiable information or it might be a pre-approved credit card offer that someone else can fill out to obtain a credit card in your name. Dispose of all mail securely.

Stop pre-approved credit card offers by calling toll-free to 888-5OPTOUT (888-567-8688) or by visiting the Opt Out website at www.optoutprescreen.com. Reduce junk mail by writing to Mail Preference Service,

Direct Marketing Association, P.O. Box 643, Carmel, NY 10512. The service is good for five years and is also available online at a cost of \$5 at www.dmaconsumers.org/cgi/offmailinglist.

Pay attention to internet security. Make certain you have firewall, virus, spam, and spyware protection on your computer. Check your browser se-

curity settings to make certain that they aren't too low.

Check your bills and bank statements. Look at your statements as soon as you get them to see if there are any unauthorized charges or withdrawals. When banking online review transactions periodically to make certain an identity thief is not using your accounts.

- 1/4 cup Alfredo sauce
- 2 teaspoons roasted red peppers, diced
- 1 teaspoon Kalamata olives, pitted and diced
- 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese, shredded
- 1 tablespoon Romano cheese, shredded
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh oregano, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup greens, chopped
- Olive oil

1. Bake chicken according to package directions.
2. Lightly coat the crust (flatbread, tortilla or lavosh) with olive oil.
3. Bake at 375°F for 3 to 4 minutes, crisping crust slightly.
4. Remove crust from oven.
5. Top crust with Alfredo sauce, peppers, olives and cheese.
6. Cut chicken into thin strips.
7. Place slices on top of cheese.
8. Garnish with chopped oregano.
9. Bake at 375°F for 6 to 8 minutes or until the cheese is nicely melted.
10. Remove the pizza from the oven and top with chopped greens.

Pecan Chicken Salad

- 4 No Name Pecan Crusted Chicken Breasts
- 4 cups field greens, chopped
- 2 cups corn, fresh or frozen
- 1/4 cup Gorgonzola cheese, crumbled
- 12 to 16 Kalamata olives
- 1/2 cup roasted red pepper
- 4 teaspoons cilantro, chopped
- 8 lime wedges
- 1/2 cup light or regular ranch dressing

1. Bake chicken according to package directions.
2. Place chopped salad greens on plate. Lightly coat greens with 1/2 of the dressing.
3. Arrange cooked chicken, corn, cheese, olives and peppers on top of greens.
4. Sprinkle chopped cilantro over greens.
5. Top with remainder of dressing. Place lime wedges on either side of the salad.
6. Squeeze fresh lime juice over the salad as desired.

Tortilla Chicken Pasta Sauté

- 4 No Name Tortilla Crusted Chicken Breasts with Pepper Cheese Filling
- 12 to 16 ounces raw pasta, such as farfalle
- 8 to 10 cherry tomatoes, cut in half
- 12 to 16 Kalamata olives
- 6 to 8 green onions, sliced
- 2 cups frozen corn
- 4 cups Alfredo sauce
- 2 cups salsa
- 4 tablespoons fresh cilantro, finely chopped
- Olive oil

1. Cook chicken according to package instructions.
2. Let chicken cool slightly, then cut into bite size pieces.
3. Cook pasta according to package instructions. Drain pasta and hold for further use.
4. Prepare rest of ingredients.
5. Put a small amount of olive oil in large sauté pan.
6. Heat pan. Add vegetables and cook for 1 to 2 minutes.
7. Add pasta to pan and sauté until heated through.
8. Add Alfredo sauce and salsa. Cook for an additional 1 to 2 minutes until all ingredients are nicely coated and hot.
9. Top with chicken and garnish with cilantro.

Chicken Parmesan With Fettuccine

- 4 No Name Parmesan Crusted Chicken Breasts
- 3 cups tomato basil pasta sauce
- 4 tablespoons sundried tomatoes, chopped
- 4 teaspoons basil pesto
- 6 tablespoons red wine (optional)
- 12 ounces fettuccini
- 2 cups shredded mozzarella

1. Bake chicken breasts according to package directions.
2. Cook pasta in boiling water. Drain pasta.
3. Mix pasta sauce, sundried tomatoes, pesto and wine together.
4. Cook mixture until heated through. Put hot pasta in baking dish.
5. Place chicken on top of pasta. Top chicken and pasta with sauce.
6. Sprinkle mozzarella over the top of chicken.
7. Bake for 4 to 5 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Tortilla Chicken Salad Bowl

- 2 No Name Tortilla Crusted Chicken Breasts with Pepper Cheese Filling
- 1 can refrigerated biscuit dough
- 4 cups chopped lettuce
- 16 slices zucchini, halved
- 16 slices cucumber, halved
- 6 to 8 Kalamata olives
- 8 grape tomatoes
- 4 tablespoons shredded cheddar and Monterey Jack cheese
- 2 tablespoons sour cream
- 1 cup ranch dressing
- 8 tablespoons salsa

1. Heat oven to 350°F.
2. Place biscuit dough pieces on a floured cutting board.
3. Roll out each piece of biscuit dough to a flat circle, approximately 6 inches in diameter.

4. Place 8 to 5 inch pot pie tins upside down on baking pan. Spray tins lightly with non-stick cooking spray (while they are upside down).
5. Place one piece of dough over each tin.
6. Bake for approximately 12 minutes.
7. Remove from oven and turn tins right side up. You now have a bread bowl. Remove bread bowls from tins and let them cool.
8. Cook chicken according to package directions. Let chicken cool slightly, then cut into slices.
9. Fill salad bowl with chopped lettuce.
10. Top each salad with 1/2 of a chicken breast and remaining ingredients.
11. Mix ranch dressing and salsa together for salad dressing and serve.

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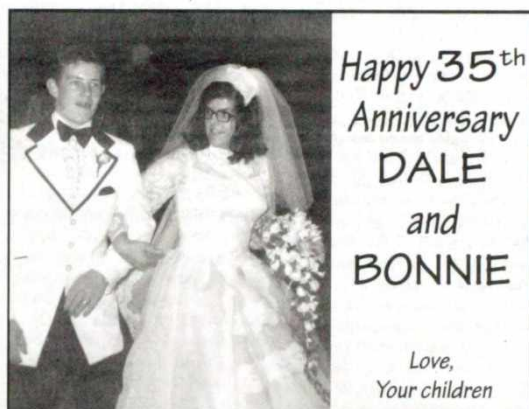
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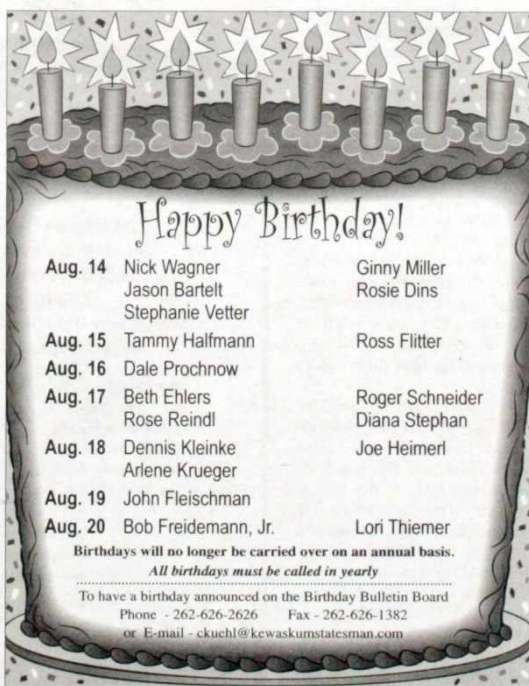

Saxophonist Eric Marienthal, with 10 solo albums and playing credits on hundreds of other records and film scores, will replace Tom Scott as the saxophonist with the East Bay Soul package performing at the Kettle Moraine Jazz Festival on Saturday, September 6 at 3:45 p.m. The 11th annual Kettle Moraine Jazz Festival (KMJF), produced by the West Bend Sunrise Rotary Foundation, Inc., will be held Friday, Sept. 5 and Saturday, Sept. 6 along the banks of the upper Milwaukee River at Riverside Park in West Bend, Wis.

At the Berklee College of Music, he studied under Joe Viola and achieved the school's highest proficiency rating. Playing at a nightclub in North

Amateurs was the first play written by the highly acclaimed Griffin. His best known work is *The Boys Next Door*. *Amateurs* takes place following the opening night of the Timberly Troopers' musical, "The Undertaker's Melody" at the cast party hosted by Dorothy and her daft husband Charlie. The play will be staged in Lang Auditorium at Campbellsport High School in November. It will be directed by John Brandl, who has been directing plays and musicals for almost 30 years.

Hollywood, Marienthal got the biggest break of his career when jazz legend Chick Corea, walked in. The next day, he was asked to join Corea's Elektric Band, which went on to record six albums and win two Grammy Awards.

Marienthal's first solo record, *Voices of the Heart*, was recorded with GRP Records and produced by Corea. He produced his next two albums, *Round Trip* and *Crossroads*, with bass-playing giant John Patitucci. During this time, Marienthal became one of the most recorded sax players in contemporary jazz, playing on over 50 GRP albums alone, including records by Lee Ritenour, Dave Grusin, David Benoit, and The Rippingtons.

In 1991, Marienthal called upon Jeff Lorber and Russell Ferrante of the Yellowjackets to write with and produce his *Oasis* CD. The collaboration was one of Marienthal's most successful records, making it into the top five on the Billboard Contemporary Jazz Charts, with two of the tunes in the top 10 of the National Contemporary Jazz Radio Charts. He recorded two more albums for GRP: *One Touch* and *Street Dance*, both produced by Lorber.

In 1997, Marienthal was signed by legendary jazz guitarist Lee Ritenour to record for his new label, i.e. Music. Ritenour produced Marienthal's *Easy Street* CD. The title track, which features Rick Braun on trumpet, made it to No. 2 on the National Contemporary Jazz Radio Charts. That same year, Marienthal was voted to be among the top three alto sax players in the *Jazziz* Magazine Reader's Poll along with Phil Woods and David Sanborn. His second record for i.e. Music was *Walk Tall*, produced by Harvey Mason. The single "Here In My Heart" stayed at No. 1 on the National

Contemporary Jazz Charts for three weeks and the Cannonball classic "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy" made it to No. 5.

Currently, Marienthal is signed to the Peak Records label, owned by Rippingtons founder Russ Freeman. Marienthal's first two recordings on Peak were *Turn Up The Heat* and *Sweet Talk*, the latter of which featured the title track that was co-written by his 14-year-old son, Robert. Marienthal's newest CD is his third for Peak entitled *Got You Covered*, an album with a mostly acoustic sound.

In addition to the music, there will be an arts marketplace featuring 17 local and regional artisans displaying and selling their handmade work, with tempting international cuisine and interactive sponsor exhibits.

The festival, which will once again feature internationally recognized jazz musicians and vocalists, is expected to draw more than 5,000 jazz lovers from all over the Midwest, particularly from Southeast Wisconsin and Northeast Illinois. The festival's entertainment line up is as follows:

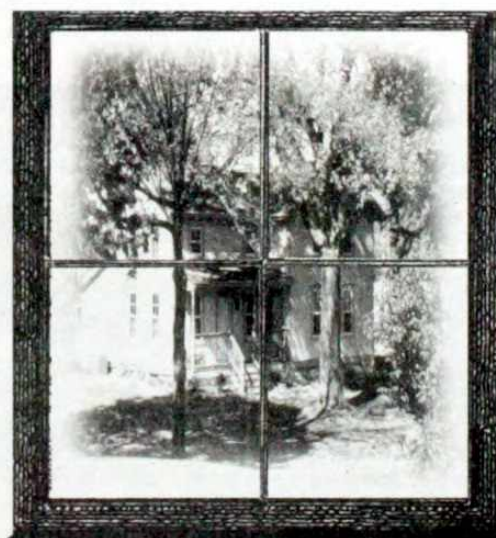

Two students, a young lady from Germany and a young man from Hungary will experience Kewaskum culture with the help of two willing families. Carrie Schulz of Nacel Open Door says she is pleased to have a welcome family for 16-year-old Lisa from Germany.

However Schulz must now find permanent placement for Lisa, 16, and Andras, 15 of Hungary. The welcome family will host Lisa a few weeks and get her acquainted with Kewaskum, however she will require permanent placement for the school year. There has not been a welcome family or permanent family for Andras. Both will be here shortly.

Lisa hails from Aalen, Germany. She will be an 11th grader at KHS. Her stay will conclude after 10 months. Lisa's interests include computers, photography, travel, basketball, bicycling, soccer/rugby, swimming, volleyball, ballroom dancing, art, modern music among other things.

Lisa currently lives with her father who is a physician; her mother who is a nurse; three brothers and a sister. She is somewhat comfortable with living with children.

Marcali, Hungary will be coming in the next few weeks for a 10-month stay as well. He has four and a half years of English which will prohibit any sort of language barrier for his host family.

According to Schultz, Andras enjoys automobiles, camping, chess, computers, fishing, modern music, movies, pets/animals, theater, video games, badminton, basketball, bicycling, hiking, skiing, soccer/rugby, swimming, table tennis, volleyball, community affairs, current events, pop concerts, playing indoor games/cards, social activities, sporting events, television/video, darts, skateboarding.

Andras currently lives with his father and mother and an older brother and sister.

In regards to a host family he is not willing to live with a single person. He is willing to live in a double placement or in a home with small children. He is somewhat accustomed to being around animals after having dogs at his

home in Hungary.

In regards to faith, Andras is Catholic. He participates occasionally and would not feel comfortable participating in a different religion.

Upon arriving in Kewaskum Andras is participating in the program because he hopes to gain language skills, personality, and new friends. "I would like to use my computer skills and be an engineer," he stated about his future career goals.

Schultz says the process of finding students is more than just putting a young man or woman on a plane. The student is first interviewed in his or her country, and must pass a lot of scrutiny. Then, the student's papers are sent to the USA and coordinators choose the students they feel would work best in the various schools they organize for.

Interested families are encouraged to contact Schulz. The prospective family is first interviewed, then the fam-

ily must complete an application, and members must subject themselves to criminal background checks and have references, which are checked. Schulz visits with the family and takes photos of the home, family and bedroom. The only cost for a host family is food. However, students pay for their own school lunches.

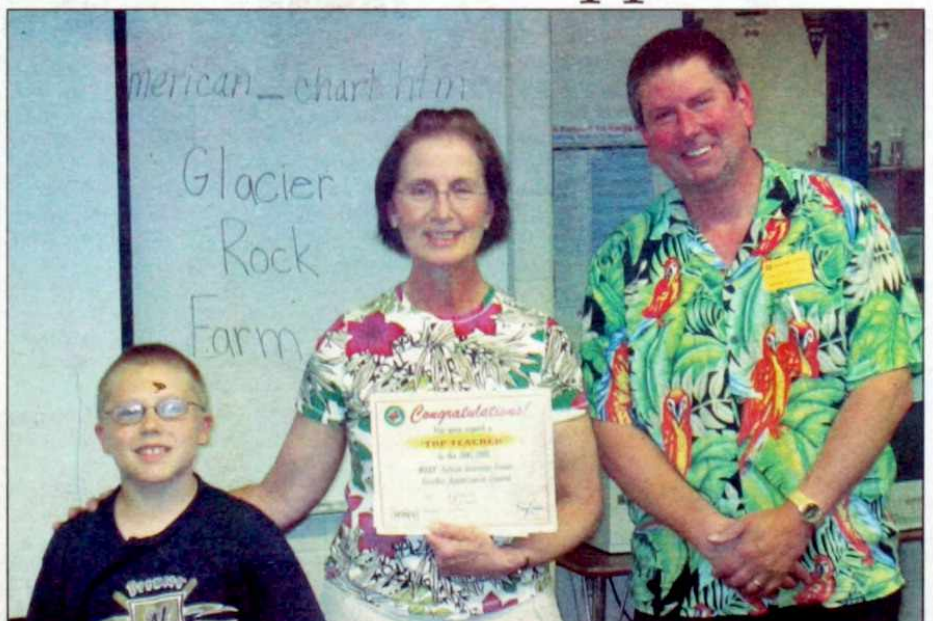
The night is planned for students and parents to come and get ready for the upcoming year. The night will follow a schedule, so it is necessary for families to attend the entire evening start to finish.

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When you go on vacation, you want to see the countryside, maybe travel a little. You want to sleep in, wear sloppy clothes, do things you don't normally do, and have thoughts that don't tax your brain, right?

Which means you never want to do anything that remotely resembles work.

Vacation: good.

Work: don't even think about it.

But when Dave Robicheaux of the Iberia Parish Sheriff's Department gets away from it all, work - and trouble - seems to follow him there. In the new novel "Swan Peak" by James Lee Burke, there's no rest on this vacation.

When Detective Robicheaux booked his get-away in the Idaho-Montana wilderness near Swan Peak, he meant to spend time with his best buddy, Clete, and some fly-fishing. They had the use of a couple cabins, Molly was going to tag along, and it was going to be relaxing.

Until Clete got into a little trouble with the locals. The Wellstone family - Ridley, with his aluminum crutches; Leslie, with his half-melted face; and beautiful Jamie Sue - owned most of the area and half the people in it.

The truth was, Clete had no business being in Montana anyhow. Years ago, he had "assisted" an accident in which a major organized-crime figure had been killed. The Feds were still a little angry at Clete for that one.

But no matter. The fish were biting, the water was deep, and summer stretched out for miles...

And then the bodies

showed up.

The girl was young, and what her killer had done gave hardened agents nightmares. The boy was made to kneel and was shot several times in the face. A few days later, two more corpses were discovered near a rest stop.

Down in Texas, in a privatized prison, Jimmy Dale Greenwood was sweating. Gunbull Troyce Nix wanted some help at his cabin, but Nix was a cruel man and other inmates whispered about the horrible things he did. When Jimmy Dale learns that the rumors are true, he shanks Nix and runs north.

Temporarily deputized, Dave Robicheaux tries to make sense of everything. Why were those kids killed yards from where he and Molly slept? Who is the drifter that showed up at Swan Peak? And what do the Wellstones have against Clete? I'm really glad I got to read this book. I always forget how much I truly like author James Lee Burke's work.

"Swan Peak" is one of those novels with so much going on that your brain swirls, compelling you to keep reading. The clues are teased out so slowly and there are so many red herrings that it dawns on you who-done-what at about the time Detective Robicheaux figures it out.

But you won't mind. You'll be turning pages so fast that you'll have to be extra-careful not to rip them.

Pick up a copy of "Swan Peak". Take it to the hammock. Take it to the beach. Take it to the park, to lunch, or anywhere on vacation.

But don't take it to bed. You won't get any sleep.

Several raids were made Monday night by deputy sheriffs of roadhouses and taverns which were open after the closing hour. It is claimed that most of the women employed in the roadhouses and taverns are strangers and are connected with a "ring" which furnishes women entertainers, with headquarters at Chicago and Milwaukee. The complaints filed with the sheriff claim that in a number of places in the county as high as four women were on duty nightly. In many roadhouses, the "hostesses" were well dressed and could not be distinguished from the women patrons. Owners of the roadhouses claim that women increased their business and the oftener they employed different women the better their business was. The women were sent from one place to another and after completing the circuit of the county, they were sent to another county and another group sent to Fond du Lac County.

Last week Saturday was one of the busiest days at the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Company for a number of years. This was due to numerous farmers bringing barley and several breweries in the neighborhood sending trucks to get a supply of malt.

Athletics find a way to top Brownsville
