

Obama makes history as first Indians African-American President continue

Republicans lead locally, Sensenbrenner, Grothman retain seats as expected

History was made as the Country elected their first African-American to lead the nation for the next four years. As expected however, the numbers in The Statesman's Republican stronghold coverage area revealed quite a different view with Arizona Senator John McCain and running mate Sarah Palin taking 64% of Washington County. Presidentelect Barack Obama and Vice President-elect Joe Biden received 34.5%.

U.S. Congressman F. James Sensenbrenner (R) again soundly defeated his opponent, Robert R. Raymond (I), 270,191 to 67,655. This will be Sensenbrenner's 15th term in

office. State Senator Glenn Grothmann will receive his third term in Madison, he defeated his Independent opponent, Clyde Winter, 68,595 to 16,721.

President-elect Obama will be inaugurated on Tuesday, January 20,

2009.

Local men injured in two vehicle crash in Auburn



Two area men were inured as a result of a two-vehicle crash on Monday, November 3. The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department stated that the crash occurred at 6:04 p.m. after Donald Rasbornik, 75, of Campbellsport was traveling westbound on Auburn-Ashford Drive and failed to yield the right of way to a vehicle driven by Jay Shambeau, 38, of Kewaskum. Shambeau was traveling southbound on U.S. Highway 45 and struck Rasbornik's vehicle. Both vehicles came to rest in the southwest ditch of U.S. Highway 45. Rasbornik was trapped and required extrication by Kewaskum Fire Department's Jaws of Life. He was later transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend. Shambeau was treated at the scene by Kewaskum EMS. Rasbornik received a citation for failure to vield. Neither men were drinking. Shambeau is Kewaskum's former Village Administrator.



Billie-the-Brownie is coming to town



Join Wisconsin author Rochelle Pennington at the West Bend Community Library on Saturday, November 8 at 10:00 a.m. for a program and book signing on her new title, An Old-Fashioned Christmas: Tinsel, Gingerbread Men and Billie-the-Brownie.

Ninety images are included in the hardcover, coffee table book which features Norman Rockwell paintings, vintage toy ads from decades past (Mr. Potato Head, Lionel Trains, Schwinn Bikes, Barbie), products manufactured at the National Tinsel Manufacturing Company in Manitowoc (tinsel and angel hair), and authentic black-and-white photographs taken during this period of time - many from Wisconsin! Image examples may be viewed at www.OFCBook.com prior to the program.

Pennington worked with the Sheboygan Falls Research Center and the Milwaukee County Historical Society to obtain photographs, as well as with numerous museums and libraries outside of Wisconsin. In addition, she commissioned Wisconsin watercolor artist Cathy Stern to paint eleven original images for the book. Stern's paintings are featured at the beginning of each chapter.

The pages of An Old-Fashioned Christmas beckon a remembrance of Christmas past and capture the spirit of bygone holidays from 1930 through 1960. The book's nostalgic text highlights a period when Christmas dinner was prepared from canning jars lining pantry shelves. It was a time when Christmas shopping meant paging through a Sears & Roebuck catalog, or heading downtown to Main Street. Christmas meant the arrival of Norman Rockwell paintings of Santa Claus on the cover of the Saturday Evening Post, and handwritten letters addressed to the North Pole filled with wishes for record players and Raggedy Ann dolls. An entire chapter detailing the Christmases of World War II during 1941, 1942, 1943 and 1944 is also included in the book, as well as an entire chapter devoted to Billie-the-Brownie.

Billie was a character dreamed up by advertising executives in the late 1920s at Schuster's Department Store in Milwaukee, Wisconsin for a promotional campaign. (The store later merged with Gimbels.) The little elf burst into fame so quickly that by 1931 he had his own radio program, airing daily at 5:00 p.m. between Thanksgiving and Christmas for over twenty-five years! Billie became as much loved as Santa Claus to children growing up in Wisconsin during this time as he brought stories of the North

Pole to life. Wide-eyed children listened breathlessly, plopped down on their tummies in front of radios.

An Old-Fashioned Christmas includes a CD of an original Billie-the-Brownie radio broadcast which was archived by the Milwaukee County Historical Society.

Attendees of Pennington's program will be able to see an original Billie-the-Brownie mannequin from the Schuster's toy store window, as well as several vintage Billie-the-Brownie buttons and an ornament.

In addition to a slide show presentation, Pennington will also be bringing along items from her antique toy collection (Tinker Toys, Legos, Lincoln Logs, Raggedy Ann, Howdy Doody...) as well as other antiques pertaining to getting ready for Christmas. A few of the additional items include an original Bing Crosby album cover, cookie cutters, aprons, vintage cook books, hat boxes, ladies dress gloves, hankies, along with Christmas cards, tinsel, angel hair, ornaments, bubble lights...all in their original boxes! Come and re-live the memories that guide our hearts homeward to the much-loved traditions of yesteryear.



DAYS GONE BY

50 Years Ago



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



With Port Washington beating West De Pere, Piittmann thinks the team will do a better job on focusing on this game.


"They are aware of how good Port is," Piittmann said. 'You just look at (Port's) conference. They have to play Homestead. That's a tough league to play in."

In the 4x200 relay, it was Rachel Raskiewicz, Kim Elbe, Hunter Holz and Erica Chesak combining for a time of 2:06.6, while in the 4x400, Kries, Brianna Jacak, Ariel Sanders and Stahl carried the baton for a time of 4:55.0.

The third places were as follows: shot put Lauren Treptow, 25-0.5; discus April Stern, 73-0; long jump Kreis, 12-7.5; 1,600 Jenny Reicher, 6.15; and 200 Miller, 30.45.

The KMS foursome of Lindsay Treptow, Kelsey Heberer, Reicher and Lauren Treptow placed fourth in the 4x100 relay (1:02.3), and there were four other fourths, including, Hunter Holz in the 100 (14.7), April Stern in the 1,600 (6:23) and the 800 (2:57.6) and Raskiewicz in the 200 (30.8).

All in all, the meet was very successful, and Gosa is expecting these girls to do very well next year when they are freshmen at Kewaskum High School.

GREEN BAY - Hard-hitting defense and two long sustaining drives for the Indians dropped Green Bay Notre Dame for the division three playoff race Saturday.

Senior defensive captain Joe Paulus said about the defensive game plan after the 14-0 victory: "Hit them hard, same thing we do every week. Hit them hard."

And hit them hard they did. Triton star running back Steven Denis, who ran for 1,412 this season, had only 45 yards off of 14 carries. Denis was knocked out of the game after taking a big hit in the third quarter.

The Indians opened their offense with a 15-play, 89-yard drive to put the Indians ahead 7-0. Even two motion penalties could not stop the Indians. Fullback Eric Turowski punched the ball in from four yards out on an option give for the touchdown.

The defense did more than just play physical football. Ke-waskum's defense intercepted Notre Dame quarterback Peter Smith four times. Cody Seibel picked off the first one on the Tritons second possession.

Ray Wollner got the second interception. In the middle of the third quarter, the Tritons started to drive the ball. They got to the Indians 26 yard line, before penalties forced them back to a third and 19. Smith dropped back and went for the end zone. Wollner stuck with his man the whole way and

made a nice leaping pick in front of the Triton receiver.

This pick turned into points for the Indians. They methodically moved the ball 97 yards in 14 plays for the second score of the day. It was strategic passing that moved the ball down the field.

"We felt that we could es-

tablish the running game. It's going to be hard, but watching on film if we were going to pass, we were going to pass when we wanted to pass, not when we had to pass," head coach Jason Piittmann said.

Brandon Zolp caught a 12yard slant to give the Indians some breathing room. Zach Amerling made the big play with a 23-yard wide receiver screen to put the Indians in Triton territory.

Once the Indians were in Triton territory quarterback Nick Olla carried the Indians to the goal line. Olla had 13- and 22-yard option runs to set up his one-yard sneak into the end

"Both drives, 89 and 97 yards, that's huge," Piittmann said. "Plus it eats a lot of clock. That's my kind of offense. You can burn over a half of a quarter and get a touchdown out of it, that's great."

Olla ran for 114 yards off of 21 carries and went 8-for-12 for 106 yards through the air.

The Tritons were in hurry up mode down to score in the fourth. Smith connected with Harrison Barton for 41 yards, but on the next play, Amerling intercepted the Smith pass.

The Indians put the Tritons


away with two sacks from Paulus and the game-clinching pick by Zolp.


