

## man killed in auto wreck

TOWN OF FARMINGTON-Washington County suffered its seventh traffic fatality of 2008 as a result of a two-car accident that occurred at 7:03 a.m. on County Road H at Orchard Valley Road.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department states Jason M. Jacobs, 34, of Lomira was traveling southbound on Orchard Valley Road in a full size SUV when he failed to stop for a stop sign located on Orchard Valley Road at County Road H. His vehicle entered the intersection and struck a passenger car being operated eastbound on County Road H by Timothy J. McKee, 25, of Kewaskum.

The impact forced both cars south of the intersection, with the passenger car coming to rest in a field at the southeast corner of the intersection. McKee was pronounced dead at the scene by the Washington County Medical Examiner.

Jacobs suffered minor injuries and declined medical transport. He was wearing a seatbelt. McKee was

The Fillmore First Responders and Fire Department responded to the scene and were assisted by Newburg Rescue and Fire Department.

The Sheriff's Department Accident Reconstruction Team also responded to the scene and is continuing its investigation.

Under Wisconsin law, a blood test may be requested from a driver involved in a fatal accident to determine the presence of any alcohol or drugs in his/her system at the time of the accident. Jacobs voluntarily provided a blood sample to deputies at St. Joseph's Hospital. The sample will be forwarded to the State Hygiene Lab for analysis.

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

#### Village tax rate up two cents, levy up six percent

KEWASKUM- More staff than residents showed up to hear about the village's upcoming budget Monday night. The village has a balanced budget for 2009, mostly due to pulling \$50,000 from the 2008 street maintenance budget.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser reported the 2009 levy would increase a little over six percent; the total budget is \$2,531,402. He did not hide the fact this is relatively large in comparison to other municipalities. This is due to the size of the village's debt and the Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) district, which will cost taxpayers \$75,084 this year. However, he pointed out the village's expenditures only increased one third of one percent, which is smaller than most communities.

The tax rate for village taxes will be \$6.62, an increase of two cents from the 2007 tax rate. The gross tax rate for the village will be \$21.39. This

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amount does not reflect the state tax credit that is expected at the end of the month. The village collects taxes for the state, county and school dis-

Washington County's portion of the tax rate is \$3.24, a decrease from last year. The state remained the same as 2007 at 20¢. Moraine Park Technical College will receive \$1.60, an increase of a penny from 2007.

Heiser also reminded those in the audience the state will only allow the village to increase their general budget levy two percent or by growth and the village, like many others across the state, did not

see the growth it did in 2007. A home valued at \$150,000 will see an increase of about \$3.00 per thousand.

"I would warn people, part of the cutting we did was from capital outlay which is our investment in the future, so certainly the equipment we are not budgeting to replace next year that's not going to get any better over time, at some point those investments will need to be made," Heiser warned.

#### WINTER PARKING

Reminder that the Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency arking Restrictions go into effect at mid-night (12:00 a.m.) on December 1, 2008 and is in effect until 12:00 am on April 1, 2009.

Municipal Code Section 90-96(c) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: No person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December I, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles, may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby. Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes,

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$20.00 if paid within five (5) days of the issuance of the

\$30.00 if paid between six (6) days and before twenty-eight (28) days

After 28 days, the amount is \$40.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he or she was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 90-96(d) Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles. This section covers the issuance of citations and to the possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 90-96 of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.

A thank you to the Kewaskum 4-H Club for assisting in placing the boughs and bows on the four bridges and welcome gazebo by the fire station this last weekend.



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

## Koth pens book on how joy can come from grief

Their working relationship goes back over a decade ago.

There was also a period when Rev. Jeffrey Koth counseled La Vonne Sanders Pautsch, and now the two have combined to tell her story of how the sorrow and grief of losing her 14-year old son, Steven, actually turned into

The book, The Other Side of Grief; A Personal Faith Journey from Grief to Gratitude, will officially be released in mid-December, but copies have already been made available to Koth, who grew up in Beechwood, moved to Kewaskum when he was 10 and was a Reigle Scholarship winner at Kewaskum High School in 1973.

'We just wanted to tell her story," Koth said earlier this week from his home in Lindenhurst, Ill., near Waukegan where he has been the pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran E.L.C.A. Church for the past 11 years.

"She (Sanders Pautsch) called me about four years ago. We had kept in touch," Koth said, indicating Sanders Pautsch worked as church secretary for three years while he was the pastor at United by Faith Lutheran Church in Evergreen, Park.

It was during that span, in 1984, that Steven Sanders Pautsch was struck by an automobile and lost his battle for life eight days later.

Koth remembers the call from Sanders Pautsch four years ago when she explained to him she was on an almost unexplainable emotional high. Koth said he respond-

ed, "'You've finally made it," meaning she had totally passed through the grief process. "She had great joy in her life, which came from the suffering," he said.

The two decided right then and there to document her journey and make the information available to others. especially to those who have experienced the loss of children. The decision required a solid commitment from both of them, according to Koth, who said, "Once a month we got together in Burlington' where Sanders Pautsch now lives with her husband, Lee.

"I would interview her," Koth said about the meetings, explaining he would go home and rewrite everything, then after several years and 10 drafts, the chapters were fairly well defined, and, "Then we

"What gives the book integrity, according to Koth, is Sanders Pautsch lived through the experience. "You get insight from experience," he said, adding, it is their hope that the book "will provide guidance for people in the midst of that journey."

This is Koth's first experience at writing a book, which was a dream when the two first started meeting. "We didn't know whether we would be able to get this published," Koth said, but he was certain the story could be helpful to

What Sanders Pautsch learned after experiencing one of life's greatest heartbreaks was the discovery of a new significance in her life. There was also an unexpected blessing from God that emerged after the suffering and sorrow that

came after Steven's death.

The couple has one other child, a daughter, and Koth said there is a chapter in the book on her and how the parents allowed her to live her life without trying to smother her with protection and fear. This attitude can also be helpful to parents who have lost a child.

The Other Side of Grief; A Personal Faith Journey From Grief to Gratitude is now available from PublishAmerica.

Already Koth has received many compliments on the book. "What they're saying is it speaks to them in a way no one else could understand."

Rev. Koth received his bachelor's degree from Valparaiso University and his masters in divinity from Christ Seminary-Seminex in St. Louis, Mo. Later he interned in Nuremberg, Germany from 1979-80 before receiving his first calling as a pastor. He has been married to his wife, Kristine, for 19 years and has four children, Lindsay, Brian, Alexis and Anna.

Koth's parents, Ralph and Shirley, still reside in Kewaskum.

Sanders Pautsch raised in Chicago and lived in Evergreen Park for 41 years and served as a facilitator for a bereavement program at a local hospital before retiring.

Writer's note: If someone were to try to define the consummate student-athlete, they could look to Rev. Jeff Koth as a perfect role model. An excellent student and a band member, Koth also worked hard at being a very good athlete, achieving all-conference honors in football and golf where he set a Scenic Moraine Conference record of 69 for 18 holes in the 1973 SMC Tournament. He also played basketball and



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As a graduate of the University of Wisconsin - Madison Medical School, Dr. Dozer completed his residency and internship at the University of Kentucky Medical Center and is fellowship trained in Gastroenterology from the University of Chicago Medical Center. He is board certified in Gastroenterology and a member of the American College of Gastroenterology, Wisconsin State Medical Society and the Association of Clinical Research Professionals (ACRP).



#### GRANDMA K's **PUMPKIN BARS**

Beat together: 2 cups sugar 2 cups pumpkin Add 4 eggs Beat in: 1 cup oil Sift together

2 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons cinnamon Add1 teaspoon vanilla

Pour into greased jelly roll pan and bake 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees.

FROSTING 3/4 stick butter at room temperature

3 ounces cream cheese at room temperature

2-1/2 cups powdered sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix together and spread over bars

When purchasing your holiday meal at the store, pick up your frozen turkey or ham last before checking out and driving home. As soon as you get home, refrigerate the meat on the lowest level of your cooler or immediately put it in the freezer.

\* To thaw, don't leave a frozen turkey on the counter, which leads to higher bacterial growth. Instead, place the covered turkey in a shallow pan on the lowest shelf of the refrigerator, or if time is limited, place the plastic-wrapped turkey in a pan of cold water. Change the water every 30 minutes until the bird thaws.

Never place the meat directly on the counter to avoid cross contamination. Clean and sanitize the counter, cutting boards and your hands while handling raw foods. Keep clean dishes and utensils on hand and do not reuse plates that were used for raw meats.

Use a separate thermometer to check the meat tem-

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perature, versus the pop-up thermometer included with the product. Thermometers are inexpensive and easy to use. When the temperature reaches a minimum of 165 F, the turkey should be done - or 145 F for beef veal and lamb, or 160 F for pork and ground meat. Make sure you sanitize and clean the end of the thermometer between uses.

\* Before serving, keep hot foods in the oven (set at 200 to 250 F) or cold foods in the refrigerator until serving time to keep them at a safe temperature for a longer period of time.

\* Refrigerate leftovers imfor bacteria to multiply.

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

He was born on June 22. 1923, in Leroy to the late Henry and Bernadette A. (Koch) Weinberger.



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

A Mercy by Toni Morrison Alfre A. Knopf \$23.95 176 pages



In the natural order of things, parents sacrifice for their children.

If there is hunger, a mother will feed her child and go hungry herself. If it's raining, a father will be drenched while the child stays sheltered. Parents work long hours to make sure the child has a good education and a sunny future.

And sometimes, a parent will do the unimaginable to save her child's life. In the new book "A Mercy" by Toni Morrison, a girl forever mourns her mother's decision while those around her nurse their own griefs.

It is 1690 and Rebekah Vaark is gravely ill. If Mistress dies, it won't be good for the farm, or for the three women servants who live there, too. If Mistress dies of the pox, Lina fears that she and Sorrow and Florens will be taken by the Anabaptists. They'll take the farm, too, and everything Mistress and Sir worked hard for.

A trader by profession, Jacob Vaark never wanted a farm, but he was pleasantly surprised when a distant uncle left him a plot of land. Suddenly wanting roots, Jacob paid for Rebekah's passage and married her, straight off the ship that brought her across the Soon, babies came but none of them survived except Patrician, the little girl who put light in Rebekah's eyes.

But Patrician was gone, as were the brothers who followed her in birth and to the grave. And so was Jacob, dead of the pox. He left his wife an almostfinished mansion, a tumbledown farm, and three slave women. Jacob never wanted slaves, but when he was offered first Lina, then Sorrow, then little Florens in exchange for debt, he knew he could give them a kind home.

As Mistress lay, delirious, Lina had no choice but to send Florens out to find the blacksmith who could save Mistress' life. The blacksmith was a freedman and Lina knew that he had coupled with Florens, which was bad. Still, she knew he could save Mistress, so she sent a love-struck girl to fetch him.

No matter where he was, Florens was sure she could find the blacksmith. Wearing Sir's boots and carrying a wax-sealed letter from Mistress, Florens set off to bring him to the farm. She had hopes that they would be together after he saved Mistress. The blacksmith would never send her away in the way that her own mother did.

It's been said about author Toni Morrison's work that you'll either love it or hate it.

I loved it.

"A Mercy" is tender and brutal, quiet and urgent, with a cast of characters that will make you forget you're reading a novel. I loved the contemplative Lina, and Rebekah, who seemed so resigned Morrison gives Florens the perfect touch of "teen-with-attitude", which made her heartbreaks all the more painful.

If you're looking for a short novel that will, at the end, make you want to turn around and experience it again, get "A Mercy" and sacrifice some time. You won't be sorry

The accident happened while they were enroute home from a shopping tour in West Bend, Within a mile of their home on Highway 33, the car in which they were riding crashed into a gravel truck which broke down and was parked at the side of the road.

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

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



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## Looking back 25 years: Indians state runner-up

It has been 25 years since the Kewaskum Indians made it to the state championship game at Camp Randall.

A lot has changed in high school football since 1983. Onlyconferencechamps made it to the playoffs. Training and weight lifting has made players bigger now. Back in 1983, the Indians had one player at 200 pounds.

The spirit in the town and the magic on the gridiron stayed the same. The team overcame high hurdles to play at Camp Randall.

Current assistant coaches Dennis Butz and Tim Rohlinger were on the 1983 state runner-up team.

Butz said the magical run started in the fourth game of the season, the first EWC game against Two Rivers. Two Rivers was the powerhouse back in that era. Two Rivers were the three time defending state champions.

The Indians went up to Two Rivers and beat them at their place 18-15.

"It might have been an 18-0 lead at the end of the first half," said Chris Harlow, who was a running back on the '83 team. "They slowly came back. It seemed like we stopped them four or five times in the last quarter. It was probably only three times they were inside our 30 and never scored."

Butz said John Swanson blocked a late field goal attempt to seal the victory. More blocked field goals were yet to come.

"They had been a powerhouse forever and to go up there and beat them, I think was probably what we needed to give us confidence to do what we did. They were good and we went up there and beat them," Swanson said.

The Indians pretty much handled the rest of the EWC teams. Kewaskum beat Sheboygan Falls 14-13, which was the closest conference game of the year.

The Indians rolled over Kewaunee 23-0 in the first playoff game. The Indians gained 366 of total offense and gave up 144 yards.

The Indians needed one more win to play at Camp Randall. Reedsburg was in the way of Kewaskum to go to state.

This game could not be decided in regulation. The teams were knotted at zero going into overtime. The Indians won the game 13-7 in double overtime by way of Jeff Squier running back, and Reedsburg's attempt for a game-winning field goal for a touchdown.

Fans stormed the field and jumped on Squier in the end zone after the victory.

"It was a big press up the middle and the kick got blocked and went forward off his hand," Butz said. "But if it doesn't go beyond the line of scrimmage it's a live ball. Just as it was Squier, he was the right end, I was the left end, he was just coming down the line because we block down. [He] looks up, sees it, grabs it and

runs into the end zone. All hell breaks loose."

"It was out of control. We score and we are in the corner and it's just a mob scene. There's people going from the stands. I mean there are a hundred people right down in the corner jumping and going nuts. I'm looking around for a flag. I look at the ref and he said touchdown."

Butz said he has a brother-in-law that lives in Reedsburg and he said they still complain about that play. He said they think the ball was beyond the line of scrimmage and "we got screwed in Kewaskum."

The Indians eventually lost to Lakeland 21-0 for the division three title. Key interceptions in the fourth quarter led to

the loss. A 95-yard interception return for a touchdown gave Lakeland their last score of the game.

Swanson said playing at Camp Randall was a little overwhelming and he was in awe of the size of the stadium. He said he could not imagine playing in front of a packed house there. And playing on the artificial turf was new for the entire team.

Rohlinger said this season's team and the '83 team are very similar. He said the offensive line and defense were the strong points of the team.

"Just a lot of the same type of characters were on the team," Rohlinger said, who was the backup quarterback as a sophomore in '83. "These guys are good athletes and good students and there were a lot of those guys on that team, too."

There are different opinions between Butz, Rohlinger, Swanson and Harlow on who would win if the '83 team and this year's team played each other.

The assistant coaches went with their '83 team. Butz said the '83 team wins in double overtime and Rohlinger said their team wins 24-23, "just cause." Harlow said this year's team would win in a close one, 28-21. Swanson didn't want to say. All he said is that it would be one heck of a game.

Kewaskum also "doubled" in the high jump, with Oelhafen tied for fourth in the high jump, going 3-10, and Hintz sixth at 3-6.



The Indians football team still can not catch their "white whale," by getting to the state championship game. This is the burth year in a row the Indians lost at level four of the division three play-

This season it was Waupaca beating Kewaskum in a lopsided 42-0 game that knocked the Indians out of the playoffs.

"Just in the respect that we know we are much better than what we showed on Saturday," head coach Jason Piittmann said when asked if this was more disappointing than level four games in years past.

"They were more physical. They were more intense and physical and they executed their game plan better," quarterback Nick Olla said after the game.

The Indians went into halftime only down 14 points, but gave up 14 points in the third and fourth quarter to blow the

The Comets started the game with the ball. After gaining a first down in two plays, a Matt Buker six-yard sack on second down put the Comets in a third-and-long situation they could not over come. However, the Indians could not move the ball either and went three-and-out.

The Indians defense got a heavy dose of Comet running back Mike Solberg on the next drive. He got six handoffs in a tow that moved the ball into the Indians red zone. Linebacker Joe Paulus made a nice diving deflection to force the Comets in another third-and-long situation. Quarterback Brock Jensen threw the ball up to Nate Nelson in the back of the end

zone. Nelson jumped over Zach Amerling for his first of three touchdowns of the game.

The Indians tried to establish the run, but Piittmann said they put eight in the box and schemed really well to stop the Indians dynamic running attack. The Indians rushed 22 times for 36 yards. That is 1.64 yards per carry.

"It's just frustrating. Our motto has been to control the line of scrimmage every game and when we do we win. And we didn't today and that's why we lost," Olla said. "Our line has played great, we just couldn't get it done today."

Kewaskum had a great opportunity to force the Comets into a three-and-out situation on their next scoring drive. The Indians gang tackled Solberg for a loss of three on first and an illegal shift penalty pushed the Comets back five more yards. On third-and-18, Waupaca called a draw to Solberg. Solberg ran for 20 yards for the first. Solberg finished off the 10-play drive by bouncing outside for the three-yard score.

"We get the ball first. We have an opportunity. They landed the first blows, we've got to get back on our toes and get back and fight back," Piittmann said to his team at halftime. "We got to push a little harder and answer the call."

The Indians came out in the second half in the shotgun wanting to pass. Comet pressure forced an incompletion and a five-yard sack.

Jensen, on the Comets first play, ran 63 yards down the sideline for a quick second half score.

Piittmann made the decision to go for it on fourth-and-four on their own 39-yard line. He said his team needed a boost and thought converting on fourth would wake the team up.

Olla was flushed from the pocket and fumbled the ball. The Comets scooped it up and were tackled at the 22.

The Indians could have held the Comets to three points, but a roughing the kicker penalty gave the Comets an automatic first down.

Three plays later Nelson caught a five-yard touchdown.

The Comets scored back-to-back in the fourth quarter. Nelson caught a 25yard touchdown on a fade. Three plays later on defense, Connor Kiesow intercepted an Olla pass and brought it 36 yards to the end zone.

"They were very well disciplined. They beat us fair and square. I mean there are no excuses," defensive end Josh Harbin said. "We left everything on the field as we could and that is what we wanted to do in the end either win or lose."

"It's so much work by the senior

class. I'm so proud of them, they all worked so hard in the off season," Olla said getting back to the level four game. "They knew what they wanted and they worked for it, we all did."

Both Harbin and Olla said they will miss the guys on the team and the camaraderie of playing football with this group of guys.

"I was very proud of them for what they've done all season. The way they worked.
