Lighting, Parade Sunday

You better watch out, you better not cry, Santa Claus is coming to town! The 19th annual Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce Christmas Parade and Village Tree Lighting Ceremony will take place on Sunday. The theme for this year is "Christmas Around the World.

The parade will start at 5 p.m. with Parade Marshall Cindy Shaske leading off the merriment.

Kevin "Hollywood" Stautz is once again overseeing the organization of the parade with Mike Geidel. Stautz explains the parade will again start at Kewaskum High School, travel up Third Street and Park View

A Kewaskum family suffered an early morning fire at their home in the Town of Kewaskum at 2504 East Moraine Drive. Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel says his department was dispatched to the residence for a structure fire at 1:05, a.m. He reported when his department arrived on scene they found fire breaking through the roof. "The fire appeared to have started in the area of the chimney, on the second floor of the structure, near the ceiling. The cause of the fire is still under investigation," he remarked. Tenants Herbert and Jamie Sagan, and their two dogs occupied the home at the time the fire broke out and were reported to be in bed at the time. They were awoken by smoke detectors sounding. "The tenants stated that earlier in the evening they had a fire going in the fireplace," Chief Groeschel concluded. Kewaskum Fire Department responded with 29 personnel. Boltonville Fire Department was requested for water tankers and responded with two, an engine and manpower. Firefighters remained on scene until shortly after 4 a.m. Also responding was Washington County Sheriff's Deputies. Sergeant Ryan Herman stated a preliminary damage estimate exceeds \$75,000. The residents of the home took shelter with the neighboring homeowners. The home is owned by Paul Reindl of Kewaskum.

2008 was a tough season for the deer hunters

No one is quite sure why, but the number of deer killed during the nine-day season which concluded Sunday were down, both statewide and in Washington County.

"We ended up with 132 bucks and 284 does," Al Broecker of Al's Taxidermy said Monday evening. "I was down from last year. I was down at least thirty to forty deer" even though "I was the one who had the most (registered) around here." Broecker went on, "We had a lot of tens (pointers) and twelves," explaining, "The one twelve (pointer) had three brow tine on the one side of the horn and two on the other. You don't see many like that." Broecker wasn't able to provide names of those who shot the larger deer because his registration sheets had already been collected by DNR (Department of Natural Resources) officials. When asked why the totals might have been lower this year, Broecker wondered if the preseason estimates of deer might have been a bit high, and he said, "We had a hard winter last year ... cold and a lot of snow, and that's hard on the deer and turkey." At the registration center at the West Bend Elevator, only 68 deer were registered, according to Mike Spors, an employee of the operation

there.

"Last year, we had well over 100 easily," Spors said Monday around 1 p.m. When asked if this is following the trend found throughout Wisconsin, Spors said, "Yes, it is. No doubt. It's way down. That's what I have been hear-

disappointing, it was a very safe season. "Overall, it was the third safest season on record," Doug Bilgo, a Conservation Warden for the state who works in Fond du Lac County, said Monday night, reporting these records were taken perhaps as early as the 1930s.

The winter season is upon us and it is time to provide a reminder to all Village property owners of their responsibility to keep the sidewalks clear of all ice and snow. The Village of Kewaskum Municipal Code requires snow and ice be removed within 24 hours after cessation of each storm. Sidewalks will be inspected throughout the village after each storm to reasonably enforce this Ordinance. Snow and ice must be removed from the entire sidewalk surface for the general safety and welfare of the community and pedestrians. Upon regular inspection, the Village will employ the services of a contractor or Village staff to clear snow and ice from any public sidewalk which has been determined to be inadequately maintained.

The cost of the clearing will be invoiced to the property owner with a 10% handling charge applied.

ing all around."

Just 25 bucks were registered at the Elevator. The other 43 were antlerless deer.

Concerning the largest ones registered, Spors said, "We had a couple tens (pointers) and some elevens."

Mike Jahnke bagged an 11-pointer, but Spors had no information on where he is from. Mark Sorenson came in with a nice 10-pointer, according to Spors who said some of the other larger racks included a 9-point deer shot by Jeff Averill and an eight-pointer by Keith Heberer of Kewaskum.

The Otten family registered three deer, but when contacted, Mike Otten said those three deer were the efforts of a large party, which sometime numbered up to 15 hunters, and went out nearly every day of the season.

"My son got a nice one," Mike Otten went on, reporting Tim Otten, who is 16 and a student in Kewaskum High School, shot a 10-point buck while hunting on the north end of Kewaskum.

"The total number of in-

juries was nine, and of that number only one was fatal," Bilgo said, noting, "That's 1.4 accidents per hundred thousand hunters."

The only accident in Washington County that Bilgo was aware of was the 13-year old hunter who shot himself in the foot.

Bilgo did say two Milwaukee hunters were very fortunate, surviving a cold night in the woods near the refuge at Mauthe Lake.

Bilgo said the father and son saw the snow starting to build up, but by the time they decided to come out of the woods, they could not find their way out. At this point, their cell phone couldn't get a signal, so they had to spend the night under some pine trees.

Early Monday, the cell phone got a signal, and they were able to tell alert officials of their approximate whereabouts. "We were able to get them out (of the woods) by blowing the sirens" on the DNR vehicles," Bilgo said. "They're lucky. I'll tell you that."



Sample a Taste of Washington **County tonight at Fair Park**

TOWN of POLK- The ninth annual Taste of Washington County is back tonight with all proceeds going to the Boys and Girls Club of Washington County.

Twenty-four local restaurants, along with nine wine vendors, and a beer and Coke vendor, have come together for people to enjoy what's offered in Washington County.

"It sells out each and every year, so we sell 1,000 tickets to the event. We hope to raise \$75,000-80,000 from this event," Executive Director Jay Fisher said.

Fisher said they like to have the same restaurants come back every year. This year there are four new restaurants, Buffalo Wild Wings, Panera Bread, Little Caesars and Jumbo's restaurant.

Fisher said the vendors are set up in three pods. People attending the Taste of Washington County will come in and be given a wine glass for wine tasting and a program of the vendors.

"You walk around with the wine glass and try different wines. And the food, there's plates at each different vendor. You can decide to try one or you can try them all,"

Fisher said. "Once you pay the \$40 for the ticket, that is all included."

> What is not included are the beverages sold. There will be a full service bar. The wines for tasting can also be purchased by the bottle.

> Food is not the only attraction to the Taste of Washington County. There are some live and silent auction prizes to bid on. The live auction preview starts at 5:30 p.m., with the auction itself starting at 8:30 p.m.

> Local mouth Mike Paul of Paul Auction Service will auction off 14 items. Some of the items on auction are 20 tickets for a Miller Park Suite, hands on training with the City of West Bend SWAT team, four court-side tickets at a Milwaukee Bucks game, a VIP reserved table for the 2009 Taste of Washington County and more

> "People will get a paddle with a number and they can raise it up when the auctioneer is talking about the items," Fisher said. "We go one by one with the 14 live auction items and they can bid on those and the auctioneer kind of controls each of the individual items."

Fisher said there are also 40 to 50 silent auction items. Green Bay Packer tickets, an autographed A.J. Hawk jersey, a trip to Door County and theater tickets.

"Usually the silent auction is \$1,000 or less and the live auction is \$1,000 or more," Fisher said.

The Boys and Girls Club has 1,600 members at their locations in West Bend, Kewaskum and Jackson.

"You get to try a lot of different restaurants. And you get to try a lot of different wines and beer," Fisher said. The best part? "Knowing that \$40 goes right back to the Boys and Girls Club."

"But also it kicks off the holiday season. There's a 1,000 people there, so a lot of people, friends know each other and enjoy the event as they kick of the holiday season.

St. Joseph's Hospital to provide County's aggregate Behavioral Health Services assessed value increases

The St. Joseph's Hospital Board of Directors has adopted a plan for a comprehensive behavioral health program to be offered in conjunction with Froedtert & Community Health. As a result, St. Joseph's Hospital will cease to admit behavioral health patients on Dec. 15th and will close its Behavioral Health unit on Dec. 20th. The hospital will expand referral and case management services in order to provide more efficient and effective care to Washington County patients through partnerships formed with mental health providers in the surrounding area.

Inpatient behavioral health services will be available to area residents through Community Memorial Hospital, Rogers Memorial Hospital, and others. Outpatient services will continue to be provided at area mental health clinics.

"In utilizing services provided by our new partners within Froedtert & Community Health as well as those provided by other behavioral health providers in the area, there is more opportunity for effective care and outcomes," said Michael Laird, president and CEO of St. Joseph's Hospital.

St. Joseph's Hospital is committed to serving the Washington County community and providing access to a variety of health care services. With the recent retirement of the Behavioral Health Unit's medical director, a steady decline in utilization of its Behavioral Health Unit, and inadequate reimbursement levels, hospital leadership began studying different approaches to providing these services. Access to more robust behavioral health services are available at Community Memorial Hospital and include a team of board certified psychiatrists, most of whom are on faculty at the Medical College of Wisconsin. The behavioral health team also includes recreational therapists, nurses, social workers, occupational therapists, psychologists and advance practice nurses.

"As members of Froedtert & Community Health, it makes sense for St. Joseph's Hospital and Community Memorial to collaborate on providing behavioral health services to residents of Washington County," said Laird.

"Partnering with Community Memorial will provide Washington County patients access to a more comprehensive behavioral health program that offers an array of specialty services with a dedicated team of physicians and staff," said Dr. G. Michael Mosley, chief of medical staff at St. Joseph's Hospital.

St. Joseph's will continue to provide appropriate care and referral services to individuals entering the emergency department with mental health needs.

"We believe that behavioral health patients in Washington County will be better served through an integrated approach that allows St. Joseph's Hospital to coordinate with other providers, allowing for more comprehensive care," said Bill Petasnick, president and CEO of Froedtert & Community Health. A work group consisting of health care professionals from St. Joseph's Hospital, Froedtert & Community Health, Rogers Memorial Hospital, and representatives of the Washington County Department of Human Services has been meeting for several months studying how to best serve the behavioral health needs of Washington County. The work group will continue to collaborate on the transition of services from St. Joseph's to other providers.

Community Memorial Hospital, Menomonee Falls, opened a state-of-the-art 16bed mental health unit in August 2007. The unit was designed for this special patient population based on their needs and safety. The Community Memorial Mental Health Center and Community Recovery Center were recently re-certified by the state of Wisconsin for another two years. The re-certification recognized the safety, positive patient healing and staff expertise found in the unit.

"We are committed to providing our local community with the highest quality health services, and in this case, our patients will be best served through this collaborative relationship with Froedtert & Community Health," Laird said.

Washington County's aggregate assessed value reached \$13.37 billion in 2008. an increase of 9.62% over last year's figures due to appreciation and construction. Property values were up for most communities in the county. The City of West Bend led the county with an aggregate value of \$2.35 billion, followed closely by the Village of Germantown at \$2.33 billion. In third place was the Village of Richfield, turning in a value of \$1.53 billion. The average assessed value of a residential property in Washington County for 2008 is \$235,379.

Residential class properties, the largest single class in Washington County, grew countywide by 8.81%. Commercial properties increased 14.94% in value over 2007. Manufacturing classed properties posted a similar gain of 14.29%. Agricultural and forest classes had more modest gains of 4.5 and 6.9% respectively.

The final component of Washington County's aggregate value, personal property, grew by 12.25%. In Wisconsin, personal property includes assessable property having a real or marketable value not included in real estate.


The trend of declining home prices seen elsewhere in the nation does not seem to be as pronounced in Washington County. The average sale price of a home in Washington County during the first three quarter of 2008 was \$251,244. This compares to \$252,030 during the same period in 2007.

Assessed values are used to compute the mil rate for each community in the country. As such, assessed values are used solely to appropriate the individual property tax burden for each parcel listed in the assessment roll. Property taxes are dependent on the spending decisions of the local governments, the county, school districts, and other districts.

Assessed values differ from the equalized values released by the Wisconsin Department of revenue earlier this year in that equalized values are used by the state to set the level of aid to local governments and school districts, not local values.

There is only one person on the sideline that hopes she will never step foot on the playing field. It is athletic trainer Emily's job to make sure the Indians student-athletes get the proper care to get them back on the playing field.

Mueller said there are many reasons she chose the career of athletic training with Aurora Health Care's Sports Medicine Department. First, when she was in high school at Kettle Moraine Lutheran, she suffered many injuries playing sports. Kyle Butters, from West Bend High School, and Mike Fritang, Kewaskum's former athletic trainer, then sparked the interest to make it a career.

"I really don't have typical days. Usually, I go to the clinic, I work at a clinic in West Bend doing physical therapy there and doing lifting assessments and working conditioning patients," Mueller said. "Then I come here and work from six o'clock at night until, 9:30 or 10 o'clock during football."

"It's not typical, that's the one thing I like about the job is it is something different everyday."

Rehabbing an athlete has different circumstances with the many different types of injuries. Mueller said she tries to do core strengthening with all of the athletes. Taping ankles is a major precaution she does to prevent injuries. She boasted that she can tape an ankle under a minute.

"A lot of the kids, their basic rehab comes in with basic pre-season conditioning that comes with speed camps that I run during the summers," Mueller explained. Mueller says she feels she has a good relationship with

who can or cannot play. "(Athletic Director Jason) Piittmann will text message me a lot and ask about the guys. Coach Bobby Bannasch



will come and talk to me. Anybody will come and talk to me and ask, 'Hey how is it going. Who can play and who can't play," Mueller remarked.

At the high school level, it is the parents decision to let their kid play, not the coaches or trainers. Emily said she has a good relationship with all of the parents. She gives her professional opinion and the parents usually agree with Emily's assessment.

The athletic training room has grown with the new fitness center now finished. It gives her easy access to the fitness center for rehab. It is the

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
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
space that she has to get used to.

"It is much, much better than what I had. I love it," Mueller said. "I'm still getting used to all the room. It's almost too much room for me."



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

The Ledgers are an independent team. Steffes said he schedules the teams he played last season and tries to get new teams to play each year. Last season, the Ledgers went 6-11-3.


"There's only three playfrom [Kewaskum High School], hopefully we can get a little bit more next year, Steffes said.




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




ABOVE: The Indians' Haley Rauch attempts to get past teammate Elissa Miller during warm ups of a non-conference match on Thursday, November 21.


