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Pesch squeaks out a win, no change to town board

By 12 votes according to unofficial results, the Village of Kewaskum kept its president Tuesday. Incumbents reigned in the Town of Kewaskum as newcomer Glenn Goodearle was defeated.

Andy Pesch beat out Trustee Kevin Scheunemann 306-294. Pesch was appointed president last year after Matt Heiser resigned the position to interview for the village administrator job.

Pesch had served for 12 years on the board before winning his first election as president.

"I didn't put out any campaigning at all. Kevin put out quite a bit,"

Pesch said the race does not

change how he works with Scheunemann on the board.

"Not for me. I don't know about Kevin, but not for me," he said.

Pesch is pleased residents had to choose their president this time.

"I was glad to see people had a choice. The last few years, I don't know how many, the village president always ran unopposed," he said.

Pesch said major issues facing the village include paying off the \$8 million tax incremental finance district and completing the village's new sewer plant.

One trustee seat changes as Derek Peterson did not seek re-election. Plan Commission member Jim Hovland joins the board as he received 408 votes. Incumbents Tom Piwoni (423 votes) and Norman Kufahl (406) retained their seats. There were 17 write-in votes.

"The board needs to work together looking at economic development, working with the town of Kewaskum on issues as well as looking what the citizens in the village like to see, too," Hovland said. "When you think economic development, you think of the TIF district and other areas, too, that need to be looked at."

Hovland said he ran for the board to help improve quality of life in the village. Hovland used to be a community resource development educator at the UW-Extension in Fond du Lac County before retiring two years ago.

Incumbent supervisors Allen Hron and Daniel Schmidt easily beat out challenger Goodearle for two



Roads, Library, Municipal Code Village woman charged water tower bath discussed by VB with child neglect

The Kewaskum Village Board took action on an array of items during their meeting, Monday, April 6. Trustees approved one road project instead of two, a new chapter in the municipal code, a bid for the library remodeling project and hiring a private company to clean a village water tower.

Once street project a go, the other one on hold

The Hillside water main project will be done this year, but Habeck Street's storm sewer work will have to wait.

The Village Board ap proved doing the \$201,441 worth of work on Hillside and voted to push back an estimated \$93,627.10 of work on Habeck Street until next year due to funding issues

To complete both projects, about \$40,000 would have to be pulled from the street budget's restricted fund, normally used for emergencies like during last snow season to cover additional plowing.

The board didn't want to do that this time.

The \$40,000 shortfall came from advice of the village's auditor, which said half the cost of the asphalt work should be paid for by the street department instead of the water department.

Public Works Director Jerry Gilles said the \$93,000 would drop to about \$81,000 thanks to engineering savings. He would have liked both projects to be done so engineering

work isn't wasted and because the village got a good price on asphalt at \$49 per ton, \$10 to \$20 less than expected.

The board unanimously agreed to do the Hillside work, citing its urgency given eight water main breaks since the mid-1990s, and voted 6-1 to push back the Habeck Street project. Derek Peterson voted against delaying the project.

Municipal code to get new chapter

The Village Board on Monday informally directed staff to add a new chapter to the municipal code to cover planned unit developments (PUDs).

The code does not address PUDs, an issue which arose during the "great garbage de-bate of 2008," said Village Administrator Mathew Heiser.

Staff has since examined how to address PUDs in the code, per board direction.

"It's a bit daunting," Heiser said of the task.

He said up to a dozen chapters of the code would need updating, a lengthy and costly process. The board agreed creating a new chapter to address PUDs would be easier to do and easier to comprehend.

Library Board gets OK to approve bid

The Village Board on Monday unanimously approved allowing the Library Board to authorize a bid for its remodeling project.

The library wants to remodel a portion of its 3,500 square foot interior to create more room for technology and a larger children's area. The project is slated to cost about \$75,000, said Library Director Steev Baker.

Most of the project will be paid for through a gift from the late Wayland Tessar. The village kicked in \$10,000, a required match to what the Library Board spends itself.

Last year, people checked out 68,770 materials from the library, an all-time record.

Private company to clean water tower

The Village Board on Monday approved the cleaning of the water tower's exterior be done by Lane Tank Co. Inc. for \$3,900.

The village had looked into the new fire truck doing the work after its arrival in June, but decided against it.

"For \$3,900, there's a tremendous amount of liability if anything went wrong," said Village Administrator Matt

He said two to three people would be 100 feet off the ground, the cleaning chemical going through the truck is not what the truck is designed for, and private property surrounds the tower.

Woman leaves 2, 1 year-olds to drink wine with friend

KEWASKUM- A 21-yearold woman from the village has been charged with child neglect after she left her children home alone so she could visit a friend's home. A neighbor heard the child crying late and called police who found the child alone.

Barbara J. Bingen was charged in Washington County Circuit Court with one count of child neglect after an incident on Tuesday, February 10, 2009 where a neighbor in the 600 block of Main Street heard Bingen's two-year-old child screaming for her mother.

A Kewaskum Police Officer was dispatched to the scene at 10:04 p.m. for a twoyear-old child reported at home alone. The neighbor told police he was home, watching television and could hear the girl downstairs screaming. After the screaming continued he went opened his door to check on the girl and found her in a stairwell. The girl became frightened of he and his wife. The wife then searched a laundry area and Bingen's apartment.

The wife's son told police he believed he saw Bingen leaving the downstairs apartment and five minutes later the girl was heard crying.

Another Kewaskum Police sman.com | Officer arrived to find another one-year-old child asleep in a crib at Bingen's apartment.

A Kewaskum Police Officer, still at the apartment called Bingen who told the officer she was at home. Yet another police officer observed Bingen driving near the intersection of Railroad and Main Streets. He stopped her and took her into custody.

The father of the children, James Bingen was believed to be incarcerated, so the children were then transferred to an area foster home.

During an interview with police, Bingen stated she left the apartment at 11 p.m. but later recanted and stated she left at 9:30 p.m. She explained to police she was in the village drinking wine at a friend's home. She stated she planned to return home that evening.

Bingen posted bail after her arrest. She was to make her initial appearance on Monday, April 6. She did not appear and a warrant was issued for her arrest.

Sterns request second CUP from town

Donald Stern has requested a revised Conditional Use Permit from Town of Kewaskum officials. The request was made as the town filed a lawsuit in Washington County Circuit Court to clean up the property on East Moraine

The town is asking a judge for a judgement to allow the town to come on to the Stern property and remove items they and town code considers a nuisance. According to court documents, the suit was filed on March 31 and gave the Sterns 20 days to respond to the court.

Stern indicates he wishes to operate an auto salvage yard at the address. Stern's last permit was denied by the town board.

Town Clerk Nancy Boden indicated the town received the Stern's application on March 4. However the permit fee remains unpaid, if it stays that way, the town will not place it on their April agenda.

An erosion and storm water management plan has also not been received. The Sterns did however pay for a site plan review.

an explosion was ruled out. The owner of the business was burning boxes outside the business in a burn barrel.


There were no injures and the fire was contained to the burn barrel.


Kewaskum 4-H learns about Going Green, Living Lightly

Washington Former County Sheriff Robert "Bob' Schulteis will be back into politics after receiving 301 votes for one of two open supervisor

seats. Michael Samann will return to the board after receiving 179 votes.

Samann was appointed to replace Klemme when he was appointed Chairman last year.

Art Filber received 111 votes while Nicholas Hesprich received 94, both unsuccessful.

Running unopposed for treasurer, Gerald "Poncho" Schulz received 382 votes.

Brockhaus family connected to St. John Church

NEW FANE- Karl Fredrich Edward Brockhaus was born in 1850 in Altenflies, Germany. He came to the United States in 1865 with his parents and eight siblings. On December 29, 1865, his father, Christian Fredrich Brockhause, bought the property across the street from the St. John Church in New Fane. They were very active in the church.

In November of 1870, a special meeting was held by the congregation to discuss the building of a new church. They had outgrown the log Karl Brockhaus was picked to build the church as he had been trained as a stone mason in Germany. All the members of the church helped with the hauling of the stones and the building. They church was completed and dedicated in 1871.

Karl also built a stone house for his parents and family, which by that time consisted of 11 children.

In November of 1879, Karl married Bertha Alberine Wilhamine Buegess and moved to Marion, Wisconsin, where they farmed and raised four children. One of their children became a Lutheran minister. His name was Paul.

Brockhaus, Frederich brother of Karl, bought the farm from his father in 1887 and on January 17, 1889, married Maria Fick. As time went on, Frederich expanded the house and added five more bedrooms and a great room to accommodate his growing family and have additional space for his father, sister, Yetta, and brother, Albert.

In 1902 a new minister arrived, Rev. H. Ohldag. his household furnishings were delayed so the Brockhaus famlly took them in. Their family consisted of adults and three children. They lived in the Brockhaus

home for two or three weeks. In 1907, this happened again with the arrival of Rev. Gudekunst and his family of

Frederich Brockhaus died of a stroke in September of 1904, leaving his pregnant wife and four daughters. His wife, Maria Fick Brockhaus, stayed very active in the church. Most prominently in the Ladies Aid. She died in

Wilbr Kleinke bought the farm from the estate and continued work with the church. mother was Amanda Brockhaus, one of the four daughters of Frederich and

One from Wisconsin: Tom Jones at MWA through April 26

Art is proud to announce a photography exhibition by Madison's Tom Jones which opened on April 1st and is on exhibit until April 26th. Photographer Tom Jones draws on history's representation of Native people in photographs and how Native culture is represented in advertising and pop culture.

By examining historical photographs, taken by people outside the Native culture, Tom hopes to shed new light on old assumptions and stereotypes about Native Americans.

Jones examines the nostalgic romanticizing of Native American culture and how actors portray themselves as Native American with "knowledge" gleaned from historic photos. By reversing the role and plac-

The Museum of Wisconsin ing a Ho-Chunk voice behind the camera and a non-native as the subject, Tom hopes "The presence of a Ho-Chunk photographing non Indians dressing as Native Americans, will take on a whole new meaning with in the history of Photography and Ethnography."

"I draw on these historic representations of Native Americans and the way that our material culture is represented in popular culture today," says Jones. "By turning the camera lens back on the Rendezvous sub-culture I am examining the nostalgic romanticizing of Native Americans through photographs. I do not come with preconceived judgments of these re-enactors, but I am interested in how they position and present themselves

dressed as Indians by way of these historical images. There has been a long history of these assumptions and perceptions of our culture and by reversing these roles I intend to put in an active Ho Chunk voice within this dialogue. The presence of a Ho-Chunk photographing non-Indians, dressing as Native Americans, will take on a new meaning within the history of Photography and Ethnography. I have chosen to concentrate on photographing this project only within the original homeland of my tribe, the Ho Chunk Nation, which encompasses Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota.

Jones received both his Masters in Photography and his Masters in Museum Studies from Columbia College, Chicago, IL in 2005. In addition Jones has received many awards - most recently a 2007 University of Wisconsin-Madison Graduate Research Grant. In 2009 he will be exhibiting at the Gertrude Herbert Institute of Art, Augusta, GA and at the Mashantucket Pequot in Connecticut. Tom currently is an Assistant Professor of Photography at UW-Madison.





The students felt it would have a positive impact on the community. It will give needy families clothes and show people that teens can promote good causes, and are able to help out during times of cri-





On Wisconsin Outdoors

A Helping Hand....Hunters sometimes the only path to youth outdoors

More than 20 years ago, my old truck rattled into a drive-way in Waukesha Wisconsin in the wee hours. I couldn't tell you the exact time, but I know that there wasn't a hint of morning orange on the October sky as a tall, skinny 15 year old with hair hanging past the shoulders made his way from the house to take a place in the front seat.

Matt didn't know me. I worked with his mother and she had asked if there was a chance that I could take her son with no male influence in his life hunting. I was 29 years old, no gray, 6-foot-one and dressed in camo clothes from head to foot in the black of night. A certain tenseness hung under the dome light as Matt tossed away any opportunity of escape by closing the door behind him.

"Hi Matt," I said offering my hand, my name and one little suggestion before we headed on to the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest.. "It's going to be cold out there this morning. Do you have any boots?"

Matt looked down at the floorboards and his holey, high-top tennis shoes. He looked back at me and shook his head. His baptism to the world of Wisconsin bowhunting for deer would have to be done with cold feet.

The truck traveled north toward Kewaskum, like so many beginnings to so many hunts, time spent in quiet conversation and planning. Because Matt wasn't ready to place an arrow to ensure a quick kill, and had never entered any woods in the predawn black, he would stick with me and we would take a ground stand until the cold intruded. Then we would catch breakfast, practice with his bow on the farmer's tractor road, and take a stand again in late afternoon.

Just off the deer trail moving inside the barbwire fence running with the wood edge, I showed Matt how to kick leaves away so that he wouldn't make noise while adjusting position. With a quiet word not to become discouraged if we didn't see deer, in fact that we probably wouldn't see deer during this first vigil, we settled in to watch our world lighten. It wasn't 15 minutes after legal shooting hours that the two fawns came.

And came and came. The small deer moved with the fence, motherless and clueless that danger stood on the ground ahead. Matt was on the inside, toward the fawns and I whispered not to move. They came on still, periodically alternating between a feeding posture and the instinctive snap-up of the head to "catch" any predator that might be lurking near. In minutes, the closest fawn stood literally three feet from Matt, closer than I have been to any wild deer before or since in 40 years in the field, stomping its front feet, twisting its head and "demanding" that this

thing before it move.

After an eternity, the two fawns bounded off just 15 yards, stopped, looked back, and slowly burned away with the morning fog into a lifelong memory. Matt turned to me. "I...I...can't stop shaking," he whispered.

Matt and I have traveled some roads since, good and bad. I helped him buy his first rifle, watched him gut his first buck and many more. We dragged out critters together. And Matt told a brother standing in front of a cabin stove that he "would wait until the deer was dead a little while longer" before partaking in eggs and tenderloin for breakfast.

With an inner toughness even as a kid that was inborn in Matt, he stuck with me on a day-long track of a deer that ended up as a banner story on the cover of Deer & Deer Hunting magazine. Lori and I moved in with him for one year when he needed someone at age 16, and we found out in a hurry that there is a reason that parents stay up worrying into the early hours and clash with their kids. And I wouldn't trade the memories for anything.

April 7th, I have a few hour ride to Mississippi River country and a date in Grant County. I will meet Miles, a 12 year old boy who has completed his hunter's safety course and wants to hunt but who has no male role model in his life. He's saving for his first shotgun, his mother said. It's evident that Pam is a good mother but can't do it all. She is looking forward to someone who knows the woods and this game we all love stepping in, if just for a while, now and then.

Miles and I have one of my shotguns to sight-in. We have landowners to say hello to. We're hoping for permission to hunt during the Statewide Youth Turkey Hunt April 11 and 12, and we'll have a gift of appreciation to leave when we find it. We have calls to try, birds to locate, and some professional hanging-out to do together. It will be a few hour introduction and hopefully, years of hunting and fishing when we can make it happen. But it has to start with one day.

The two-day spring youth turkey hunt, initiated in 2007, occurs each year during the weekend preceding the opening of the regular season. The Youth Hunt, according to DNR releases, "allows opportunity

for close one-on-one mentoring of future hunters in a relaxed atmosphere without competition for hunting spots from regular season hunters."


"Study after study has shown that it takes a hunter to make a hunter," said DNR Upland Wildlife Ecologist Scott Hull. "With all the activities available today, getting out with a son, a daughter, a niece, a nephew or a family friend can mean a lot. Spending time with a youth, passing on your skills and passion for your sport can be a big step toward nurturing a lifelong commitment to conservation of our wildlife resources."

May I add, your involvement can be a life-saver, period and if you're just lucky, that street some day will run both ways. Matt now, has been my friend for more than two decades. He is a vice-president of a Waukesha Bank. He is married with a toddler and a baby. And when I need financial advice, I land in a chair across the desk from Matt in a Waukesha office. Those peo-ple in the lobby have no idea what kind of memories are spilling out of the door, with my friend's laughter the exclamation point an affirmation that I did at least one thing very right in my life.

There are no special application procedures for the youth turkey hunt. Anyone interested can find additional details in the spring turkey hunting regulations, on the DNR website, or by calling Scott Hull at 608-267-7861 or Sharon Fandel at 608-261-8458.

Just a few more questions, please, just for you. What are you doing this weekend? What are you doing these upcoming hunting and fishing seasons? And what young boy or girl do you know, without an outdoor mentor anywhere in site? Oh, and one more.

What are you going to do about it?

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Clapper, jumpers have good outings at Oshkosh meet

OSHKOSH- Buoyed by the efforts of the high jumpers and pole vaulter Alissa Clapper, the Kewaskum High School girls track team placed 11th in the annual Titan Invitational held at the Kolf Field House on the UW-Oshkosh campus last Tuesday evening, March-31.

The Indians finished with 18.5 points in the highly competitive small school division. Perennial powerhouse Catholic Memorial of Waukesha captured the team title after amassing 56 points, a single point ahead of Seymour.

Two Rivers, like Kewaskum a member of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, finished third with 36.5 points, then came Omro and Freedom with 34 and 33 points, respectively, to round out the top five.

Clapper cleared 9 feet, 3 inches (9-3) to finish second in the vaulting event. This was her best effort of the season and came within three inches of her personal best 9-6, which is the current KHS record, also which coach Jerry Gosa is convinced she will eclipse by the end of the season.

"She was the two-time defending champion," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said. "She was hoping to make it three, but the girl from New Holstein (Alayna Muldoon) has really improved and really did well." Muldoon cleared 10-0 before missing.

In assessing his team's strengths in a preseason interview, Gosa emphatically stated the high jump would be a big point producer for the Indians, and it was in this meet, with senior Jessie Liniewski going 4-10 to take third place and junior Candace Beine making 4-8 to finish in a six-way tie for the fourth spot.

"That's her best of the season," Gosa said about Liniewski's effort, adding, Beine "has been struggling, but that's not unusual early in the season" and competing indoors.

Kewaskum got its other points in the 4x200-meter relay where Hailey Gregoriou, Liniewski, Nichole Kison and newcomer Anna Butler combined for a time of 1 minute, 56 and .97 (1:56.97) to place seventh.

A year ago, three of those young ladies helped to turn in a time of 1:59.65 to finish 12th at Oshkosh, then went on

to win the Wisconsin Division 2 title with a swift 1:45.25.

"The girls have high expectations," Gosa said about his relay runners, fully confident they will win many races this season when they go outdoors.

With Megan Thornton aggravating an injury in her foot in the open 400, Gosa had to go with a substitute in the 4x400 relay, and the KHS foursome was far back in the pack with a 4:46.61. The coach also expects that group to be good outdoors.

Beine had a pretty good day in the triple jump, winding up in the 11th spot with a day's-best 30-05.

"It's nice to see her in the triple jump," Gosa said, pleased when his athletes compete in more that one event.

Gosa received a call early last week that there was a spot left in a JV invitational at Sheboygan North, and he jumped at the chance to get his younger athletes in a meet.

"Some of the kids showed us some things," Gosa said, referring especially to the performances of freshman sprinter Eric Perkins. "He can run. He won the 55-meter dash (7.28) and he was second in the 200 (26.57).

Gosa also noted Perkins anchored the winning 4x160 relay, combining with Lucas Kopeschka, T.J. Schlice and Joey Wollner.

Schlice also cleared 9-6 in his first pole vaulting competition.

For the girls, Valerie Hedlund placed second in the 55 hurdles; Brittany Wagner was fourth in the 55-dash

and the foursome of Natalie Bandy, Tess Bandy, Whitney Bastian and Megan Ringwell won the 6-lap relay.

The points from the boys and girls were combined to determine teams places. Kewaskum scored 75 points to finish fifth of the eight teams, including Plymouth, Sheboygan and a Green Bay team.

The Indians are slated to compete in the WTF (Wisconsin Track Federation) State Indoor Meet at UW-Whitewater on Saturday. Only selected Indians will go to this competition, which typically draws the best track athletes in southeastern Wisconsin.

The end of the match saw the Indians with 10 shots; Bohn with five, Jess and Sam Smallish with two a piece and Elissa Miller with one.


