Second permit denied for Stern salvage yard, Schmidt property back in non-compliance

TOWN of KEWASKUM- The Plan Commission Monday night denied Donald and Sandy Stern's request for a conditional use permit to operate a salvage yard on their property.

The commission voted 6-1 to deny the request. Thomas Schoofs voted against the motion to deny.

During a public hearing on the permit request, a few town residents told the commission the issue has gone on long enough and it knows the right thing to do.

An April 10 memo from the Plan Commission and Town Board Chairman Ellis Kahn to the commission says the Stern property at 3350 E. Moraine Drive is still in non-compliance with town code.

The town also has not received payment for unpaid invoices. \$10,334.25 was put on the Sterns' property tax bill and \$2,992.70 is due

since then. \$1,288.95 is past due, the memo said.

The conditional use permit that was approved on Nov. 19, 2007, was revoked Dec. 15 2008, the memo said.

The Town Board on February 16, approved giving the Sterns until March 1 to get a signed contract from a state licensed recycler, give a copy to the town and clean up the property by May 1. If the town did not receive a copy of the contract, it would take court action.

The town did not receive a copy of the contract, and on March 6 the town building inspector examined the property from the roadway. The town sent a letter to the Sterns on March 18 saying they had 10 days to clean up the property. On March 30, the building inspector found the property was still not in compliance.

On March 31, court papers were filed. The Sterns have until May 3 to respond to the lawsuit.

The Town Board decided to send Wilmer Schmidt another letter asking him to clean up his property again.

The letter - the second of its kind recently - could serve as the final notice before the town goes in and cleans up the property itself, then charges Schmidt.

"The establishment is getting to look very junky to say the least," said Kahn.

"So it's back where it was," said Supervisor Allen Hron.

Kahn is particularly concerned that 55-gallon drums are being sold on the property, and the town doesn't know what they once contained. It could have been hazardous materials.

The property at 4350 Highway 28 has had cleanup issues before, one time resulting in Schmidt being arrested after not allowing authorities

Wayne approves fireworks permit, selling plow

Annual meeting discussions center around wi-fi, salt shed

TOWN of WAYNE- Wi-Fi technology, selling a truck, getting a bigger salt shed and improving its only park highlighted the town's annual meeting on April 14. The next night the Plan Commission met and held a Public Hearing before the town board and approved a Conditional Use Permit for David Beyer of Uncle Sam's Fireworks.

Wi-Fi is up and running in the town after testing took place last year, and it's quickly growing in popularity. Many people are waiting to sign up. Installation takes one month.

"I think it's going to be a big hit," said newly elected clerk Julie Kriewaldt.

She said she knows of several people waiting for their Internet service provider contracts to expire so they can sign up for Wi-Fi, a fast and reliable service.

The town discussed selling its 1992 plow truck. Residents support the sale, but are concerned with how the process will be completed, said Kriewaldt. The town took official action at their meeting on Wednesday. Chairman Carl Klemme indicated the truck is a 1992 International with a nine foot wing and 10 foot blade. It also has a V-box. The truck currently sits in storage so he is unaware of the current mileage.

Those with questions can contact the town hall or any supervisor. Bids will be accepted until June 2, they should be mailed to the town hall, 6030 Mohawk Road, Campbellsport, WI 53010. The town will have the right to reject any or all bids received.

The town is considering getting a bigger shed to hold road salt. Now, the town can't buy salt from the state

Three hours - three fires



Kewaskum Firefighters hadn't needed to quench any grass fires while neighboring departments were battling many over the last few weeks. That changed Saturday afternoon as they handled one per hour during a three-hour stretch in the Town of Kewaskum. Fire Chief Mark Groeschel stated firefighters received their first call at 2 p.m. for a fire at 4742 W. Moraine Drive, a property owned by Lance Buechel. "The property owner was burning a ditch line off when it took off and was heading for a stand of pine trees. Approximately two acres burned," Groeschel stated. Firefighters returned to the station at 3:36 p.m. At 4:16 p.m. the department found themselves dealing with a grass fire out of control on land owned by Wilmer Schmidt at 4350 Highway 28 west. "The property owner was burning a small area off when it got away from him and burned into his neighbor's property," Groeschel reported. Approximately 10 acres burned. Upon returning to the fire station at 5:37 p.m., they were paged to another out of control burn on property owned by Wade Roberts at 4698 Hillcrest Road. "The property owner was burning a small area off when it got away from him and burned into a swamp," Groeschel said. Kewaskum Fire personnel along with units from Kohlsville and Campbellsport extinguished the fire. Approximately 25 acres burned. Firefighters ended their day at 6:19 p.m. The photo above shows the fire on land owned by Roberts.

because it can't accept a big enough order. Salt through the state is as much as half the price of buying it on the open market.

The town would like more definite bids on a new shed before moving forward, Kriewaldt said. Klemme announced Wednesday, he would speak with other townships and present more information at a future meeting.

One resident asked about researching a town park. The town said it would consider improving its existing park in Kohlsville instead. A plan to buy park land was defeated last year during a special meeting.

No major road projects will be done this year in the town, but some signs were knocked over and need replacing, some residents said. The town board approved a four-year Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for David Beyer of Uncle Sam's Fireworks on the recommendation of the Plan Commission. This was Beyer's third renewal for the permit which allows him to operate a fireworks sales business at 7655 Commercial Lane.

Former town supervisor Carl Hohlweck, commended Beyer on how much he has given to the town in permit fees. Hohlweck said it has gone to the road repair fund. With each sale, a town per-

mit, to possess the fireworks is required.

Beyer also asked for two permits that would allow him to hold a fireworks demonstration show which he has done the last three years, without incident. That event will be held Friday, June 5 with a rain night June 6. The show is free to anyone who wishes to see the year's new fireworks displays. He guaranteed the Kohlsville Fire Department will be on the grounds during the show as a safety precaution.

The second show, Beyer's 26th annual customer appreciation show will take place

on July 31 or Aug 1 depending on the weather. Supervisors approved both shows.

Kriewaldt announced that former supervisor, Kieth Kriewaldt will serve as her Deputy Clerk. She requested that all residents contact her by May 6 to have items placed on the May agenda. In the future, residents should make their requests two weeks before. Meeting notices will also appear in The Statesman.

Auburn receives Federal Stimulus money for New Fane bridge project, new plow truck

TOWN of AUBURN- Funding for an already planned bridge replacement in New Fane will come from the federal government through stimulus money. Town officials made the announcement at their April meeting, Monday evening. Officials also proudly reported their new plow truck was in the garage and completely paid for.

Among other town business, three members were re-appointed to the Plan Commission. Merle Laatsch will serve from 2009-'11 as chairman, Bonnie Berg was appointed as secretary from 2009-'11 and Cory Oppermann from 2009-'12.

Three town residents were also re-appointed to serve on the Board of Appeals. Pete Fellenz will serve as Chairman from 2009-'12; Brian Enright will serve from 2009-'12; Roger Schleif will serve as first alternate from 2009-'11.

Town Chairman Merle Laatsch stated the town will need to decide which road projects they wish to pursue this summer. He indicated Old Bridge Road will likely need to be pulverized and resurfaced. There may also be work needed in the ditch which may result in having to install some new culverts. Haushalter Road is quite rutted and needs to be graded. He also noted a number of problems on Auburn-Ashford Road.

A town resident asked if the town would get money from the State for Haushalter Road as it is on state land. Laatsch indicated that is unlikely. Action will likely take place at the May meeting.

Laatsch announced the

Town of Kewaskum is seeking an agreement to repair and maintain County Line Road. Currently half of the road belongs to each town. He thought that it should be fixed and the cost split by the townships and then an agreement made. No action was taken.

The idea of constructing a salt shed for the town was discussed. The town currently has a shed where they store the salt and sand mix that is used on town roads.

Supervisor Joe Woodworth voiced that he believed the costs of various sized sheds versus the money saved by buying large quantities should be considered. Laatsch said it

wasn't so much a cost savings but the ability to have salt on hand when it was needed instead of having to first truck it in.

Laatsch explained the shed would be used only for salt storage, not sand or the mixed material.

Woodworth thought now was the time to proceed with the project as contractors are looking for work.

An initial bid for the project was received from Campbellsport Building Supply in the amount of \$30,000. The specifications revealed a 24'x40' and 16' tall walls. The cost did not include excavation, flooring and other miscellaneous items.

Regarding the New Fane Bridge project, Laatsch announced the town will receive 100% of the construction costs back from the federal government. They are expecting to receive just over \$92,000. The already spent engineering costs will not be reimbursed.

Work is expected to commence July 1 for a period of three months. Laatsch stated there will be adjustments to the bridge/road mostly making the intersection of Highway S a T intersection.

Clerk Bonnie Berg indicated Fond du Lac County assisted the town with applying for the money. She indicated

they looked at work that was going to be started and since the bridge project was set to start, it was picked.

Laatsch announced the town will be forced to follow a state mandate ordering the replacement of all road signs in the town by 2012. The topic will be discussed at future meetings.

No estimate as to the cost was revealed, however Laatsch noted the Town of Kewaskum's project was thought to cost \$90,000.

The new signs will be highly reflective and easier to read.

UW-EXT to hold well testing program in Farmington

TOWN of FARMINGTON- The Washington County UW-Extension Office has teamed up with the University of Wisconsin - Stevens Point to offer a drinking water testing program on Friday and Monday, April 24, and 27 for property owners who get their water from a private well.

While public and municipal wells are state regulated to ensure that water quality meets current drinking water standards, private well owners must assume the responsibility of testing and treating their water to ensure it is safe to drink.

For a nominal \$42 fee, private well owners who register in advance will be able to participate in the "Homeowners Package," which is the standard test for overall water quality. Included in this package are bacteria and nitrate-

nitrogen analysis, two of the most common health related water concerns. In addition, pH, hardness, alkalinity, conductivity, chloride, and corrosivity will also be measured.

Sample bottle pickup will be at the Farmington Town Hall on Friday, April 24 between 7:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Participants will be given instructions for properly sampling their drinking water over the weekend and will be required to return the sample bottle to the Town Hall on Monday, April 27 between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Due to the workload at the Stevens Point lab, only the first 150 Farmington residents who call prior to April 24 to reserve a bottle will be able to participate. Residents may register by calling 262-335-4480 and asking for Helen. Sometime in late May or

early June, water specialists will hold an educational program in Farmington to share information about local water quality issues and help people understand their water test results and possible solutions to any problems.

While most of the wells in Wisconsin produce safe drinking water, about 15% of all water samples test positive for coliform bacteria and another 10% contain levels of nitrate-nitrogen above the safe drinking water standard. While water may look clean and taste good, the only way to know that it is safe to drink is to have it tested. This is an extremely valuable opportunity for area residents, particularly those who have never had their water tested, to learn more about the quality of their drinking water and groundwater resources in general.

UW-Extension is a unique partnership of counties, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the University of Wisconsin working together to help people put knowledge to work. This partnership brings

education to people where they live, through Extension offices in all 72 of Wisconsin's counties. It supports educational programs for farmers, businesses, communities, families, and young people.

scheduled for more season, will be held Wednesdays, May 6, 13 and 20 and Saturdays May 16 and 23. The cost is \$55.

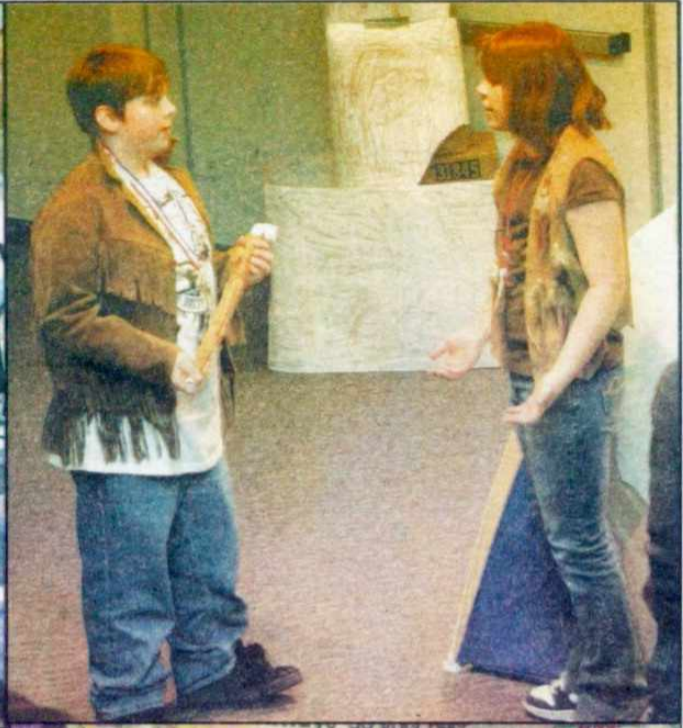

As the UW Colleges nominee, Prasad represents the 13 two-year campuses across the state. Prasad has been a member of the UW-WC faculty since 1984. She has a M.S. degree in Accounting from UW-Milwaukee and is certified as a CPA.

According to her nomination, Sarada made "numerous contributions to UW Colleges as a scholar, teacher and advisor to students and as an informal mentor to women students returning to continue their education." Through Prasad's own experience of working, while raising a family, the award recognized the "juggling act that non-traditional female students with families go through."

As a faculty member of the UW Colleges, Prasad has served on Status of Women Committee, UW Colleges and UW Extension Diversity and Equity Council and Campus Climate Committee and represented UW Colleges on the Advisory Committee of the UW System Institute for

Race and Ethnicity. As chairperson of the Department of Business and Economics, she participated in promoting the UW Colleges adult education initiative and identified programs and courses to meet the needs of returning students. She also served as the Chair of the Business and Economics department for four years. At UW-WC, she has served as the Chair of the Merit Committee, Steering Committee, and Scholarship Committee. She is presently the coordinator for the Engaging Students in the First Year (ESFY) program.

In addition to teaching a heavy credit load of 24 credits every academic year, Sarada was "instrumental in developing a course in International Business and enhancing existing courses by integrating various disciplines." She was recently awarded a grant by UW Colleges supporting her proposal "Preparing an Entrepreneurial Generation at UW Colleges". Sarada's students describe her as "an enthusiastic, passionate, helpful and knowledgeable teacher." In recognition of her teaching excellence at UW-WC, she was awarded the Rolfs Foundation Teaching Award in 2006.

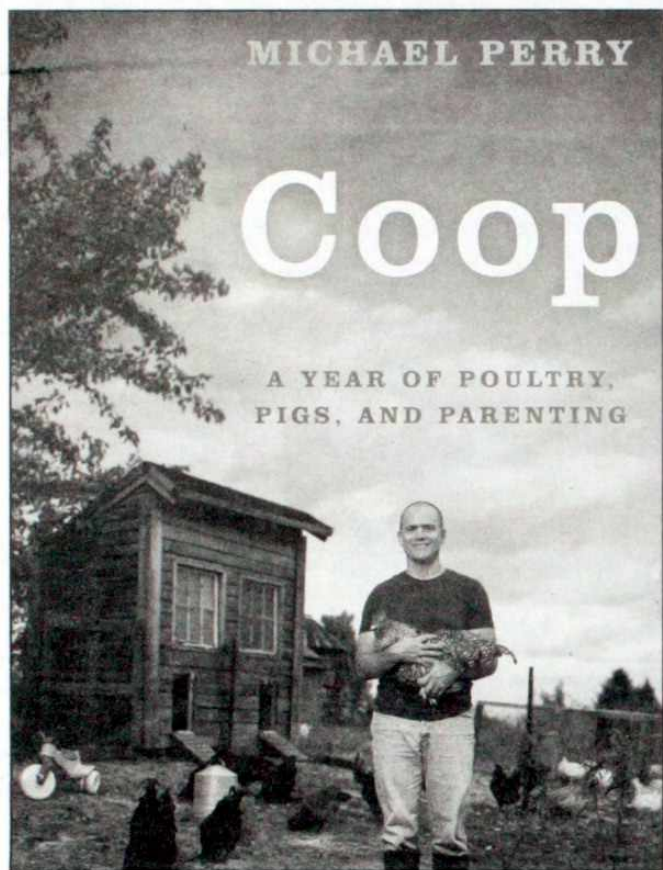
The Bookworm Sez

Coop

by Michael Perry

Throughout your life – and quite possibly throughout every day – you experience a series of milestones.

Your parents eagerly looked for many of your firsts: tooth, word, steps, and day of school. You remember your first date, your first car, your first love, and your first job. These days, you look for first signs of spring, first day of vacation, and other never-happened-before things that can happen.

As a new husband, author Michael Perry anticipated a whole slew of new experiences, and in "Coop," he writes about them: his farm and his family, fresh seasons, young livestock, and seeing his parents in a different light.

Michael Perry grew up on a farm in northern Wisconsin. During much of his childhood, his father milked cows to pay the bills and raised sheep to make up the difference when ends didn't meet. From his parents – both members of an "obscure fundamentalist Christian sect" – Perry learned self-sufficiency, the value of hard work, and the ability to stand for his beliefs. He also learned to cobble together what he needed from what he had on hand.

Those legacies helped when Perry, his new wife Anneliese, and his "given" daughter moved to his mother-in-law's former homestead.

Leaving behind his beloved New Auburn in favor of a smaller Wisconsin town wasn't without adjustment, but Perry had a few things to look forward to: he was planning a coop for a long-desired flock of chickens. A weed-infested corner of the property would, with salvaged fencing, become a pig pen.

There would be the beginnings of a garden beneath a hastily-made cold frame.

And Anneliese was pregnant with their first child.

During their first year on the farm, in between book tours, family obligations, and deadlines, Perry noticed the land, as is wont to do. He used a tailfeatherless pheasant and wood-stacking "punishment" as a lesson for his daughter. He reflects on waste-not, want-not philosophy when feeding his pigs with plants and game from the land. And his memories of growing up on a farm and in a warm, loving household tie into most of his observations.

On a farm, you embrace life. You know it's cyclical. And though you never get used to it, you know there is death.

And at the end of this book, you'll know that 368 pages of "Coop" is woefully inadequate. It's hard to let go of. You'll want more.

"Tell me a story from your childhood" is a plea author Michael Perry is used to hearing, and his readers are lucky he's a willing talespinner. This book is part paean to devoted parents, faithful community, and a good upbringing; part joyous love letter to a family and to friends-made-family; and part common-sense parenting with plenty of humor, Will Rogers-ish philosophy, and not just a little grief.

If you're looking for the perfect Mother's Day gift, something heartfelt for Father's Day, or if you just need a book to take to the hammock with you this summer, look for this one. "Coop" should be the first book you grab.

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Same old team at the top, Indians settle for second in EWC golf opener at Hon-E-Kor

KEWASKUM- Playing on its home Hon-E-Kor Country Club course, the Kewaskum High School golf team shot a respectable 172 total last Friday in the opening Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) mini-tour meet.

That score wasn't close to Plymouth's sizzling 155 on the Red Nine, but it was good enough for the second spot in the field and considering how the EWC standings are compiled, it's only one point away from the defending champion Panthers.

Sheboygan Falls was somewhat of a surprise, finishing third at 173, followed closely by Waupun, 174; Two Rivers, 176; Kiel, 178; New Holstein, 186; and Campbellsport last at 188.

"All I can say is during the week, when we were practicing, we're shooting in the thirties left and right, but we did not do that Friday," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said about his squad's play.

Capturing the medal was Tyler Feldman of Plymouth.

He carded a 2-over-par 37, one shot ahead of his teammate, Jon Criter.

KHS senior and defending EWC Player of the Year, Ethan Geidel, finished in a tie for sixth place with an even 40, and Eichstedt was pleasantly surprised when Michael Korth fired a 42.

"He was shooting darts at the greens but wasn't putting well," Eichstedt said about Geidel, who three-putted from 10 feet on one hole.

Rounding out the counters were senior Nick Gutbrod and Tony Gonring at 43 and 47, respectively.

Campbellsport was led by junior Hayden Serwe, who carded a 41.

At The Bull at Pinehurst Farms on Tuesday, April 14, the Indians finished third as a team in the 10-team Sheboygan Falls Invitational, with Geidel posting a solid 77, putting him in second place in the battle for the medal.

Nicolet's Mike Kerns won the medal with a 3-over-par 75.

The team winner was Nicolet, which turned in a score of 327 from its four lowest play-

ers. Next low was Cedarburg, the other Division 1 school in the field. The Bulldogs posted a 362, while the Indians posted a 376, then came Sheboygan Falls, 392; Port Washington, 397; Lomira, 398; Cedar Grove, 400; Waupun, 405; North Fond du Lac, 440; and Brown Deer, 462.

At the turn, Geidel was tied with Kerns, but on the back nine, the Kewaskum senior slipped a bit to 40, while the Nicolet player shot a 38 for his 75.

The only other Indian to break 90 was Korth, who was consistent with a 45 and 43 for an 88. Playing in his first var-

sity meet, Jacob Durian fired nines of 52 and 50 for a 102, while senior Nick Gutbrod struggled to a 53-56-109.

"Again we had two decent scores. The others were in the hundreds," Eichstedt, confident the scores will start coming down soon.

WAUKESHA- No, coach Jerry Gosa didn't need his head examined when he accepted the invitation for his girls track team to participate in the annual Waukesha Catholic Memorial Invitational.

Gosa felt having an opportunity to compete in a meet with powerhouse Division 1 teams would push his Lady Indians to better themselves, and in many cases it did.

The Indians scored 21 points for 16th place in Saturday's competition, had several personal-best accomplishments and closed the gap on some competitors they may need to beat to get to the WIAA State Track and Field Meet in June.

Hartland Arrowhead captured the title, scoring 109 points. The host Crusaders took second with 74, followed by Appleton North 59.5; Fond du Lac, 49.83 and Brown Deer, 48.33. There were 23 teams in the meet.

"It was a beautiful day. We might have to go a long way to duplicate a day like that," Gosa said about the weather and the Indians' efforts.

Senior Jessie Liniewski brought home Kewaskum's lone first place, winning the high jump with a personal

best.

"What was interesting, they started at four-six (four feet, six inches), and she made four-six, four-eight, four-ten and then five feet on her first jump," the coach said. "She had a very good day."

Two others also made five feet, but Liniewski won because she had no misses, something jumping coach Jason Meinen has been stressing with his athletes this spring. "That was the different between first and third (places) right there," Gosa said.

Junior Haley Gregoriou also posted a personal best in running the 300-meter hurdles. "She placed fifth," Gosa said, reporting her time was 51 and .35 seconds (51.35). "That's good."

KHS also had two other places, one coming in the discus where Lacy Taylor tossed the metal platter 98-5, good for fifth.

Also, the 4x200-meter relay added a sixth with a time of 1:52.92. "They won their heat, but they weren't in the fastest heat," Gosa said, still praising the efforts of his foursome of

Gregoriou, Liniewski, Nichole Kison and Anna Butler. "At Oshkosh (indoor meet on March 19), we were four seconds behind Catholic Memorial, and now we've whittled it down to one second."

Butler, a newcomer to track, is working in nicely with the three others who were on the state championship relay this past June.

While she didn't place, freshman Whitney Bastian cleared 4-6 in the high jump, according to Gosa, who expects she could go higher this year, and Megan Ringwell, another freshman, jumped 14-4 in the long jump.

"She (Ringwell) started the year at eleven feet, then she went twelve and last Tuesday jumped thirteen," Gosa said, to point out the great improvement Ringwell is making.

Two others cited for good efforts were Brooke Waala and Aly Backhaus. "Our milers each dropped 20 seconds off their times," Gosa said, reporting Waala dropped from 6:35 to 6:09, while Backhaus' time went down from 6:54 to 6:34.

"We tell all the kids if they work, they will get better," Gosa said. Many have been doing just that.

PLYMOUTH- Looking at the results of the outdoor quadrangular last Tuesday, April 14, one could easily predict a very exciting battle looms for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) girls track title this spring.

Other top-three finishers included: a third by Eric Turowski in the 100-meter dash, 11.82; Zolp, third in the triple jump 37-0; and Schlice, third in the high jump, 5-6.

"The kids have not been on
