Prost barn complete loss after three-alarm blaze

KEWASKUM- A blaze that could be seen from many points in the village of Kewaskum for a brief time Sunday evening consumed a large barn. While the blaze looked horrific, there were no injuries and the home on the property suffered no damage.

Kewaskum Fire and Police Departments were paged to the Willard Prost property at 8891 Kettle View Drive at 4:30 p.m. for a barn fully engulfed in flames. Assistance was immediately requested from Boltonville and Kohlsville Fire Departments.

The initial blaze had neighbors concerned that with the high heat factor their homes could catch fire. However, that did not occur.

The property is situated at the corner of Kettle View Drive and Highway H west. Highway H was closed at Edgewood Drive by Kewaskum Police and Highland Drive by Washington County Sheriff deputies.

Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groe-

schel stated a resident of the property, Ron Will, was burning a brush pile on the west side of the barn and Groeschel believed a spark or ember from that fire, sparked the barn.

Groeschel said Will noticed smoke near the northwest side and tried to extinguish the fire but was unsuccessful. Earlier in the day, Will and family were baling straw that was loose in the barn. The structure was nearly full of straw which aided in the quick ferocious flames.

Intense heat from the fire sparked a nearby shed that was torn down earlier in the day. A garage and the home on the property were kept wet to avoid catching fire.

Kohlville Firefighters provided a full assist while Boltonville brought water that was later not needed as hydrants from adjacent subdivisions were used.

Sopinski Excavating was called to the scene and provided a backhoe to bring down what was not already burned. The straw was removed by Sopinski and wet so that it would not

smolder and flare up.

Kewaskum Firefighters left the scene at 7:36 p.m.

There is no dollar estimate to the damage and the fire is not being treated as suspicious in nature.

KEWASKUM- Reports of a Swine Flu outbreak at Kewaskum High School are being treated as rumor according to District Superintendent of Schools, Michael Krumm.

Students at the school reported that a member of the junior class has the deadly virus. However, Krumm reported the case was not confirmed and the district will not close the school on the advice of the Federal Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Krumm indicated the student was not in the building since Thursday. He further indicated that attendance has remained unchanged at all district schools.

"It's a mute point, if you're sick, don't come to school," Krumm stated.

We live in a society where many of us have cameras on our wireless phones and the ability to send a text message or make a phone call from the scene a news event. Digital cameras are sized to fit perfectly in your purse or pocket.

You have no idea how important that is to your community newspaper. We need our readers to help tell the weekly story of our community.

The idea behind citizen

journalism is that people without professional journalism training can use the tools of modern technology to tell a community's story. A community's story is the important factor in all of this.

Each issue that is printed is a record of what happened here and leaves behind our legacy as a community. We need to document what happened here so future generations will know. As we find out weekly, (when we make an error) once it's in print, it's here forever.

out the details because it appeared in our Days Gone By column. While at the time, it was a tragic accident, the story was able to be re-told to this man's future generations.

Livestock sales require licenses say state agency

MADISON- Wisconsin animal health officials are issuing a reminder that livestock consignment sales and auctions, as well as buying and reselling animals - even for fair projects - must be licensed under state law, to protect both livestock health and Wisconsin's animal agriculture.

Assistant State Veterinarian Dr. Paul McGraw recently sent a letter to some producers who have organized such sales in the past, reminding them of the requirement. But there are others in the state involved in these activities who may not have come to the state's attention and did not get a reminder in their mailboxes.

It's also common at this time of year for one individual to buy animals either in Wisconsin or out of state and resell them to young people for fair projects. These animals need all the appropriate health papers, and the seller needs an animal dealer license. The dealer license is for the person who sells animals shortly after buying them - for example, by using them as breeder or feeder animals. These animals also need to have all the appropriate health papers.

Animal market licenses cost \$220 a year, if the licensee holds sales on four days or fewer during the year. Animal dealer licenses are \$220 a year.

Applications for animal market and dealer licenses are available by calling 608-224-4889 weekdays 7:45 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

CHOCOLATE CHIP STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

Makes 16 servings

- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) cold butter, cut up
- 2 cups (12-ounce package) Nestlé Toll House Semi-Sweet Chocolate Morsels

- 1 1/2 cups buttermilk
- 1 container (12 ounces) frozen light whipped topping, thawed
- 4 cups sliced strawberries

PREHEAT oven to 400° F. Grease baking sheets.

COMBINE flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt in large bowl. Cut in butter with pastry blender or two knives until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in morsels. Stir in buttermilk with a fork

BAKE for 12 to 14 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to wire racks to cool completely.

CUT one shortcake in half horizontally. Spread the bottom half with whipped topping; top with strawberries. Cover with shortcake top; layer with more whipped topping and strawberries. Repeat with remaining shortcakes. Serve immediately.

Criminal Justice Program added at UW-WC

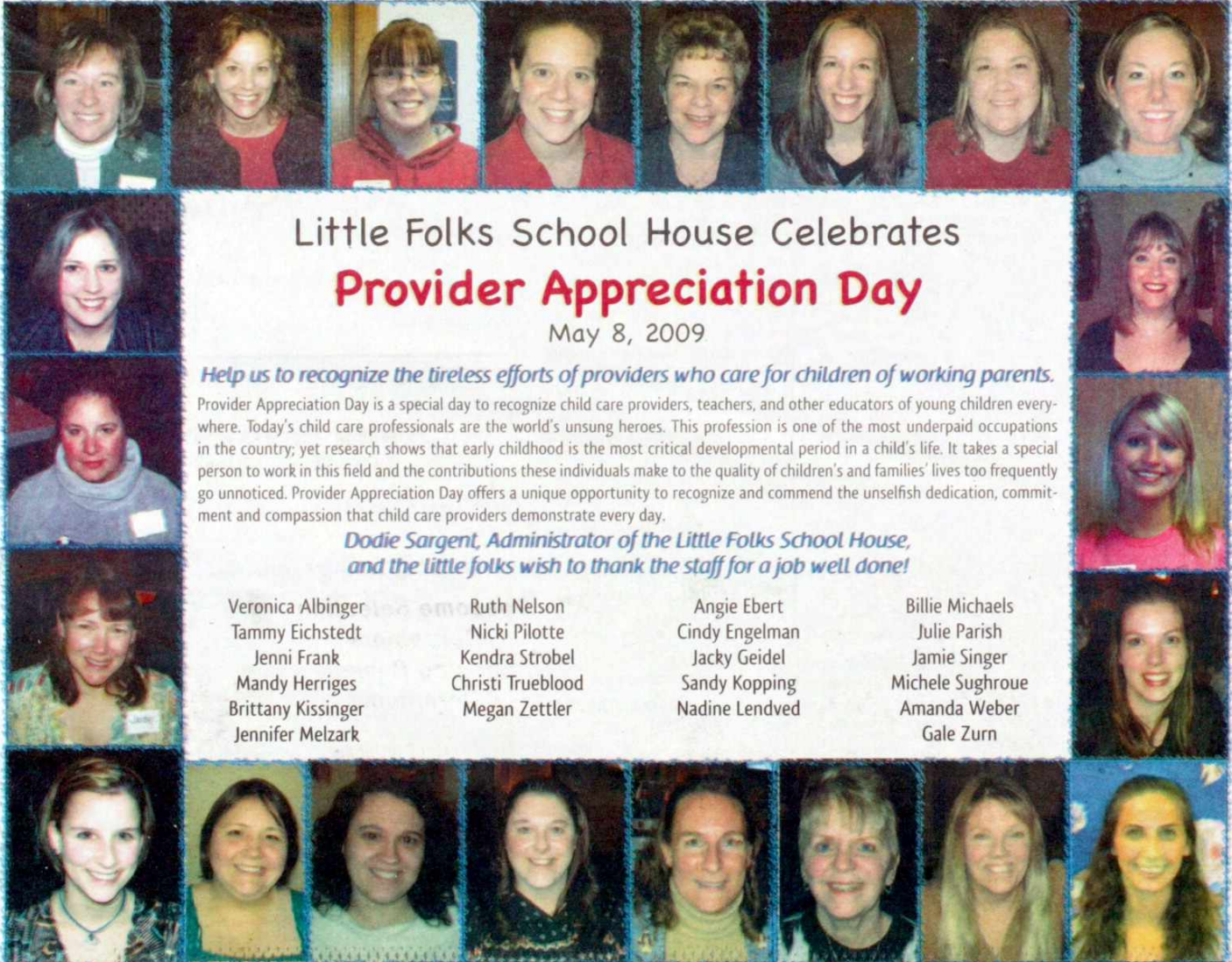

ten objection by appearing before the Board during the first two hours of the meeting and showing good cause for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and files a written objection, that the person provides to the Clerk of the Board of Review notice as to whether the person will ask for removal of any Board members and, if so, which member will be removed and the person's reasonable estimate of the length of time that the hearing will take.

When appearing before the Board, the person shall specify, in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or subject or object to a valuation; if that valuation was made by the Assessor or the Objector using the income method; unless the person supplies the Assessor all of the information about income and expenses, as specified in the manual under Sec. 73.03(2a), that the Assessor requests.

The Town of Farmington has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the Assessor under this paragraph which provides exemptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Section 19.35(1) of WI Statutes.

The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, surgeon or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone.

The A's had their chances in the sixth and seventh innings as they left the bases

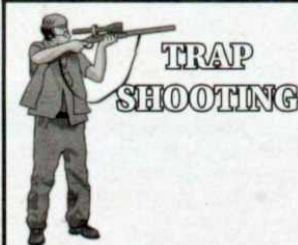

Girls track/field: Dealing with a few adversities

JACKSON- There was good news and not-so-good news concerning the Kewaskum girls track team at the annual Washington County Track and Field Meet last Tuesday night.

Despite the fact it was very cold and windy, there were lots of personal bests, according to coach Jerry Gosa, but the best the Indians could do was finish sixth in the event with 72.5 points.

Germantown won the competition after piling up 136.5 points ahead of Slinger's 121 and the 119 put on the board by host Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

On the flip side, there is the injury Nichole Kison is working through. "She has the start of a stress fracture, how long, we don't know. She's trying to be positive," Gosa said.

Kison was definitely missed in her usual No. 3 spot in the 4x100 and 4x200-meter relays where the Indians finished third with a time of 53 and .50 seconds (53.50) and sixth at 1:54.80.

The runners on both relays were Haley Gregoriou, Jessie Liniewski, Bryana Keller and Anna Butler.

Gosa said their time in the 4x100 was close to their best time of the year.

Then there is the unusual saga of Candace Beine, one of the Indians' key jumpers. "Candace added three feet to her triple jump," Gosa said, referring to Beine's effort of 33 feet (33-0), which gave her fourth overall and was less than two inches out of second and third.

"That's the best triple jump we've

had in seven years," the coach went on, reporting Wednesday morning it was learned Beine has mononucleosis and will likely miss the next week or two of the season.

The pole vault, held Monday on the West Bend High track, was definitely one of the Indians' better events. Senior Alissa Clapper claimed the title by clearing 9 feet, 3 inches (9-3) while Karla Stoffel added a fourth place, going 7-6.

Haley Gregoriou and Molly Potter did well in the grueling 300 hurdles, with Gregoriou taking second in 51.40 and Potter seventh in 55.40.

"She's matured a lot this year," Gosa said about Gregoriou. "She's been doing an excellent job."

Kewaskum also had two places in the high jump, with a tie for fourth by Liniewski (4-10) and a sixth from freshman Whitney Bastian (4-8).

Liniewski added several more points by placing fourth in the 200 (28.90)

Gosa was also very excited about Jessie Beaupre's efforts in the 800. Beaupre, making steady progress all season, finished fourth with a time of 2:42.40.

Heather Schmitt's 106.20 was good for fifth in the 400.

WAUBEKA- The Indians' Ethan Geidel was on his game Friday on the Hawthorne Hills Golf Course.

Dorn recently moved back to Kewaskum, according to Eichstedt, who said he had to sit out a month because of the transfer rule in the WIAA.

"He's a sophomore and he's capable," Eichstedt said.

PEWAUKEE- There wasn't much recovery time for the Indians boys track team last week.

Three days after battling against the teams in Washington County, the Indians were back at it in Friday's annual Altheimer Invitational in Pewaukee with mixed results.

In some case the Indians were better; in others they were unable to duplicate their county marks. One thing for sure, however, their point total was up considerably, to 74.50 points, good for sixth place and just five points out of the fourth spot.

Good handoffs helped in the shorter relay, according to Gosa, who said the Indians were about third heading into the exchange from No. 2 to 3. "We

In the high jump, Dickmann cleared 5-10 for the runner-up spot.

"You couldn't ask for a nicer kid," Gosa said about Dickmann, who is one of the hardest workers on the squad.

The Indians' other two seniors, Eric Turowski and Nick Olla, also helped put points on the board. Turowski managed a seventh in the long jump after going 18-10.5 in the event, and he was among those on the 4x100-meter and 4x200 relays, which both placed.
