Dickmann, Witek advance to state track meet

WHITEWATER-The benchmarks were unusually high at the Division 2 Sectional last Friday, resulting in a major elimination of Kewaskum's track and field teams entrants who had their hopes set on qualifying for the state competition.

Only Jake Dickmann and Amanda Witek finished among the top four in their events to punch their tickets for the trip to La Crosse with the elite track and field athletes from around the state.

Dickmann cleared a personal best 13 feet, 6 inches (13-6) to win the pole vault competition, while Witek was involved in a three-way tie for second in the high jump after clearing 5-0. Both are competing tomorrow (Friday).

"It (Whitewater) was a very tough sectional," admitted coach Jerry Gosa.

Dickmann was up to the challenge, except for a little glitch at 12-6. "Jake had two missed at 12-6," Gosa said, noting he couldn't watch the third attempt but knew his vaulter made it when there was no noise the bar usually makes when it hits the ground.

"Jake then made 13-0, I believe it was on his second try," Gosa went on, and then he went over at 13-6 to take first place. With the state berth secure, Dickmann chose to have the bar placed at 14-1, and, "He had one good attempt at 14-1."

Looking at the state field, Gosa reported he is the fourth seed behind a pair of 14 footers.

After finishing fourth (4-10) in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet, Witek really came on strong in the regional, going 5-1 and the sec-

I think she made five feet on her first jump," Gosa said. "Half the battle is peaking at the right time," and Witek is doing just that.

Among the near misses were Haley Gregoriou and Jessie Liniewski in the 300-meter hurdles and 200, re-

Gregoriou, a junior, was clocked in 47 and .87 seconds (47.87) in the event, her personal best by two seconds. Still she had to settle for fifth place.

The senior Liniewski placed sixth in the 200, running a 27.23 in the fi-

nals after being clocked in 27.49 in the prelims.

"That was her fastest time ever," Gosa said, noting it took a 26.93 for fourth

Liniewski also placed eighth in the high jump (4-10).

The major disappointments, startd with the boys' 4x200 relay (Eric Turowski, Nick Olla, Brandon Zolp and Mat Toles, Nick Olla), which appeared to have the fourth best time only to be disqualified.

"They went for broke," Gosa said. The fourth place team was New Berlin West. They (Indian runners) beat them (West), but then they were disqualified" for being out of the zone on the third exchange.

Kewaskum wasn't the only team to be disqualified. There were four others in the two heats, according to Gosa, who said, "We went under 1:35," which would have easily been their fastest time of the season.

The Indians had more handoff problems later, in the 4x100 relay, and they were also DQ'ed.

The girls ran into similar problems. In the 4x200, Gregoriou, Bry-

KHS student accused of adding drug to rice krispie square

KEWASKUM-A Kewaskum High School student is accused of adding marijuana to rice krispie squares brought as a lunch treat. KHS Associate Principal Kristine Dreher reported that the school was unable to substantiate the story because of a lack of evidence.

The student is said to have brought the rice krispie squares on May 8. School administration learned of the incident after a student made them aware of the situation.

Dreher stated that the student has not been expelled due to a lack of evidence.

Kewaskum Police Chief Dick Knoebel confirmed his department investigated the case on May 15 but it was brought to their attention too late and evidence could not be obtained.

A police report stated a freshman student purchased two of the treats for \$10 in a school bathroom. He didn't like the taste so he threw it in the garbage and gave one to another student. Two other students are said to have shared a treat.

The report also indicated that statements from the students were taken by school officials who refused to turn the statements over to police. After asking for the statements on numerous occasions the police officer was given a letter on school district letterhead stating the district's legal counsel advised them not to turn over the statements.



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

Eagle Scout project benefits YMCA Camp Matawa

NEW FANE- Last year, a girl broke her wrist helping someone get on a horse at

YMCA Camp Matawa. That likely won't happen again, thanks to Erik Adkins' Eagle Scout project.

The West Bend West junior

built a ramp and platform for riders to get on horses without having to step up. Now, they just step over.

"It's working fantastically," said Wendy Mieske, senior program director at the camp. Students with special needs who couldn't ride horses last year now have the chance.

"We've definitely seen

more kids that were here last year that didn't ride get on a horse because of this ramp," Mieske said.

Adkins has ridden horses before, and his sisters volunteer at Rides and Reins, a therapeutic equestrian center in Slinger. He contacted Camp Matawa looking for an Eagle Scout project, and chose the

Adkins sent letters to friends, family and businesses seeking funds for the project, and received \$600 - well more than needed for supplies. Leftover money was given to Camp Matawa for scholar-

In winter, Adkins went to Free S.P.I.R.I.T. Riders in Fond du Lac to do research on its ramp. He came back with plans and dimensions, bought the wood and got to work.

Adkins designed the platform so riders get on horses on the side, not the end, so two people can assist instead

With help, Adkins stained the lumber, put on railings and assembled the 12-foot ramp and 6-foot platform at Country Cabinetry. Business owner Ed Fowell helped build it, and the YMCA transported it to the camp.

Adkins' sister, Jennifer, painted the camp logo on the

The five-month project took between 40 and 60

Adkins was on hand during the first two days the ramp was used to see his work in ac-

"I kinda like that they're enjoying it so much," he said. "They love riding horses now." "Everybody was thrilled," said Erik's mother, Carol, who beamed at her son's accomplishment. "Some of the kids that just didn't want to ride a horse changed their mind and were one of the first ones on

"It's safer for us, safer for the horses and safer for the participants," Mieske said.

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Spring time is bike time

The Kewaskum Police Department would like to take this time to remind everyone about bicycle safety and laws pertaining to them.

Wis. §346.03(9), Rules of the Road, states: "Subject to the special provisions applicable to bicycles, every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway is granted all the rights and is subject to all the duties which this chapter grants or applies to the operator of a vehicle..." In short, this means that all laws pertaining to motor vehicles apply to bicycles, including, but not limited to: Riding on the right side of the road, abiding by all traffic signs and signals, riding single file, etc. NOTE: In the event a child needs to ride on the sidewalk due to safety reasons, they should be aware that pedestrians have the right of way and ride only in single file.

Also, Village of Kewaskum ordinances require that all bicycles operated on the streets of Kewaskum to have a current license affixed to them. The cost of these licenses, which are non-expiring, is \$5.00. They can be obtained at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00

A few safety tips to ev-

eryone operating a bicycle are: Keep your bike in good working order, wear a helmet, wear bright colored clothing to make it easier for motorist to spot you, put a safety flag on your bike, ride single file, be aware of the area you are riding in and be ready to take evasive action if an obstacle

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appears and make sure the bike is the right size for the person riding it.

If we all follow these rules and safety tips we should have a safe bicycle season.

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Grafton man killed in bike crash



Washington County's sixth traffic fatality came after two motorcycles collided at 9:21 a.m. Friday, May 29, in the Town of Wayne on County Highway D just west of County Highway W. Sheriff's deputies at the scene observed two Harley Davidson motorcycles laying on the roadway and CPR was being administered to one of the drivers by a nurse who had come upon the scene. Sergeant Randy Boudry reported the two drivers had been traveling together when the lead cycle, driven by Roger Paul, 64, of Hubertus slowed down and was struck from behind by the second cycle driven by Frank Bednarek, 63, of Grafton. Paul sustained a minor hand injury. He was treated and released from St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend. Bednarek was pronounced dead at the scene by the Washington County Medical Examiner. Authorities do not feel that excessive speeds or alcohol were present or contributed in this crash. An autopsy performed on Mr. Bednarek determined that he died as a result of injuries sustained

The Kewaskum Lions Club held their Incoming Officers Installation dinner at the Amer-


ahn on Sunday May 31st.


Sounds of Disney at FES/WES

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

Imagine that an anonymous benefactor just bestowed upon you an unexpected gift: a new home with everything you could ever want in it.

The temperature in this home is always just right; the furniture, comfortable. You're never hungry when meals magically appear at your table. Exploring this magnificent home becomes more entertaining than anything you've ever seen on TV, and the landscaping astounds you.

The cost? Not a penny.

But then, one little mistake - one very human error - and you're booted from this home and out on the streets. How would you live with the memories of time spent in Paradise? In the new audiobook "Eve" by Elissa Elliott, you'll hear a woman's epic story of loss and love.

Once upon a time, there was Eden and it was beautiful. Animals roamed, flowers bloomed, and Elohim was there. But that was then, and now, pregnant with her latest child, Eve struggles with memories of a happier

She recalls innocent days when she could spend hours in the Garden, just listening to Elohim. Now, when she speaks to Him, He never answers. She wonders if He still loves her. She wonders if He will ever forgive

Eve remembers learning to know Adam, and the delight they had in naming the animals. She remembers the joy of newness. She also remembers how the serpent tricked her, and how Elohim was hurt by her betraval.

It had been a struggle since their banishment, but Eve's family is surviving: Cain, headstrong and angry over nothing.

Sensitive Abel, now a shepherd. Naava, on the verge of womanhood and reaching for independence. Aya, smart and resourceful despite her handicap. And the twins - double gifts - Dara and Jaken.

But everything changed when the People from the City came to visit. Taken aback by the sight of the women, Eve reluctantly gave them what they wanted. Though it hurt her heart, she let them take something precious to her, never knowing that it would set her family down a path of destruction, loss of faith, violence, and

Do you have a patient boss? You'd better hope so, because listening to "Eve" on your commute is going to make you late. You'll want to hear "just one more minute" of this positively beautiful novel.

Spinning a tale that's both lush and lyrical, author Elissa Elliott gives Eve a complex humanity as a mother worried about her children and as a wife who sees her husband slipping away. She feels bereft and abandoned, powerless to stop the changes she sees. Elliott's story sticks pretty close to the Biblical version, though still making Eve seem familiarly, comfortingly contemporary.

What I liked best about this audiobook is that it's read by three different performers. Sandra Burr, Tanya Eby Sirois, and Ellen Grafton bring their characters to life, which gives "Eve" even more listenability.

Take this audiobook to work with you. Take it home, take it on vacation, but don't miss it. If you crave a novel experience, "Eve" will be Paradise

A's win four of five in recent outings

Kewaskum Stays Hot at the Plate in Win Over Oconomowoc

The A's picked up their second Tri-County Night League vicoty last Wednesday night with a win over the Oconomowoc Five-O's. The A's used a seven run third inning to propel themselves ahead and eventually won by a score of 15-5.



Cody Seibel took control of the



"Ethan was one-over par on the back nine, and then he took a triple bogey on No. 16," Coach Glenn Eichstedt said, reporting his senior ace shot a pair of 39s for a round of 78.

Geidel, a four-year starter on the varsity, ends his career with two EWC Player of the Year awards, and berths on all-conference teams three

"The guy who did well

today was Michael Korth. He had five birdies," Eichstedt said. Korth had six threes in his round, three on each side as he came in with a 39-42—81.

This was Korth's first and only year on the varsity golf team, and his 81 came after firing a 101 last week in the regional.

Nick Gutbrod concluded his career on a high note, shooting 40-43 for an 83, and freshman Dan Bohn held his own with a 42-45—87.

Beau Backhaus played in the fifth spot Monday. His was the throwaway score.

Geidel claims regional medal

Geidel must have been one tired young man after the May 25th Division 2 regional at The Bull in Sheboygan Falls because he carried the entire team on his back.

Firing a 3-over par 75, Geidel lifted the Indians into fourth place, which allowed the team to advance to the sectional.

Kewaskum came in with a 373 total, 24 strokes behind the winners from Kiel, whose low four players combined for a 349. Taking second were the host Falcons at 352.

"The top three place winners all finished behind the Indians during the regular season, but we had a rude awakening in the WIAA play-

offs," Eichstedt said. "Most of the Indians' problems were self induced ... three-putts, bunkers, lateral hazards and course management."
