Water tower: 'It's bad' says DPW's Gilles

KEWASKUM- Kewaskum's tin man needs more than a heart.

The well-known water tower near Regal Ware needs a roof and, ultimately, a full replacement with a bill slated to fall in the \$1 million range.

Public Works Director Jerry Gilles told the Public Works and Public Services Committee last week the 1929 tower's roof has deteriorated and rusted, running the risk of leakage and contamination.

"It's bad," Gilles said. "I'm not even sure the DNR will let us open that tank next spring."

Sealing the joints with caulk and getting a new roof could be a short-term fix which could run about \$150,000, but Gilles worries that something else may go wrong on an 80-year-old tower.

Designing and building a new tower is an 18- to 24-month project. The village has a site for it in Kettle Country Estates but the tower alone could run \$875,000, not including digging the well, "so we're looking at a significant amount of money," Gilles said.

Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said once the housing market picks up, impact fees could be used to offset some of the cost.

If the village discontinues use of the tower, it could use its other tower until a second one is built. Then, however, one water main break cuts off water to the entire village.

"It's a risk factor. You have no backup," Gilles said.

But the village receives \$46,455 a year from antennas on the tower. Gilles recommends leaving the tower up - even if it's not in use - to collect the money or until a new tower

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Quick action by EMT trainee saves man's life

KEWASKUM- It was a normal Sunday morning, June 7, for Kewaskum Firefighter Dan Powell. After sleeping in because he was on an ambulance call earlier that morning, he awoke to his pager chirping at 9:25 a.m. A man was down on the 18th hole of Hon-E-Kor Golf Club not breathing and police were attempting CPR.

As with most volunteer firefighters, he listened to the page even while off duty. He quickly realized he could get to the man faster than the ambulance living only a few blocks from the golf course.

He quickly joined law enforcement officers from Kewaskum Police Department, Washington County Sheriff's Department and the Wisconsin State Patrol who were tending to a 61-year-old male who collapsed on the 18th green. When the officers arrived, they could not detect a pulse, and Deputy Kevin Maas used an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to

restore the pulse while Trooper Kristian Perales and Powell administered CPR.

Once the AED was used, Powell and the officers began CPR.

"Within two minutes, we got a pulse," Powell stated. Once they were stabilizing the victim and the ambulance arrived West Bend Intercept also responded.

West Bend Intercept is a branch of the West Bend Fire Department who responds with Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) who have advanced training in emergency medical procedures.

The victim was then transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend. By the time officers arrived at the hospital, the subject was alert and communicating with the officers. He was transferred to the Wisconsin Heart Hospital for further observation.

Powell, who has been a firefighter for two years has been on over 200 rescues. He began as a firefighter and when the

need arose for him to be an ambulance driver he stepped up.

Being an ambulance driver led to him begin training to become an EMT. He started training in August of 2008 and finished classes May 18th. He has one test remaining to become a certified EMT.

"I've never seen anything like this, I was amazed. Being newly trained, I was able to resuscitate a man. As a team we brought a life back," Powell stated. He was thrilled at the chance to be a part of a team who brings a dead man, back to life.

Powell said he enjoys the opportunity to help and assist people, "When that pager goes off at 2 a.m. and your asleep, and you have the opportunity to save someone's life. If you can help, be there to help. I don't feel like a hero, I was trained for this, and this is my job.

Once he receives his official EMT status, Powell said he intends on training to be a dive team member.

is built and the antennas can be moved.

Committee chairman and village president Andrew Pesch said if a \$150,000 roof fixes the problem for 10 years, it only costs the village \$15,000 per year. It is unknown, however, how long a new roof would extend the life of the tower.

"We need some serious estimates on how long a roof would last," said committee member Kevin Scheunemann.

Gilles said he would do

some research and bring information back to the committee.

Scheunemann also wants to know if another 300,000-gallon tank will handle population growth.

"I don't want to be looking at this issue again in 2020," he said.

Security discussed for wastewater treatment plant

The village will add a security system to its upgraded waste water treatment plant, pending Village Board approval.

Last week, the Public Works and Public Services Committee informally agreed to recommend the change order to the board. The system is estimated to cost \$2,500 to design and \$12,000 to install, said Jerry Gilles, village public works director.

"We can do this out of the contingency fund," he said.

Cameras can deter break-ins and catch people dumping and double check on trucks using the honor system.

Committee member Kevin Scheunemann supports the idea provided the cameras are effective, like if they can see license plate numbers.

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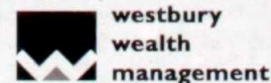

for this young lady. She's got a family that loves her," Fink said.

When it was discovered, the body was partially decomposed and clothed in blue jeans and a black top with pink trim.

Through medical and anthropological workups the following information was determined.

The victim may be Caucasian, but anthropology suggests that she also may be of Hispanic, Asian, or Native American descent.

She is 5 feet, one inch tall, give or take three inches, and was estimated to weigh between 110 and 135 pounds. She is age 15 to 21 give or take one or two years

The victim might also have been knock kneed or pigeon toed, based on the anthropo-

logical examination. Hair is light brown to dark blond in color, and 12-14 inches long, with some color variation light and dark.

It is believed that the body came to this location sometime mid-summer to fall.

FOND DU LAC- The sheriff's department released a composite photo on Tuesday in hopes it will lead to the identification of a female body found last fall in a secluded wooded area in the Town of Ashford.

On November 23, the department recovered the body, then clothed and partially decomposed. They have since not been able to identify the girl, expected to be between 15 and 21 years old.

"Our monumental hurdle in this case so far has been identification," said Sheriff Mylan Fink at a press conference Tuesday.

The case is being treated as a homicide, but cause of death

remains undetermined.

"We can't get anywhere in this thing until we get this kid identified," Fink said. "It's really going to be tough to bring someone to justice if it is a homicide."

Fink hopes the national media shows the photo as investigators believe the girl is not from the area. She could be from anywhere across the country, Fink said.

The department created Facebook and MySpace pages to help spread the photo.

Among experts creating the composite photo were three artists affiliated with the Smithsonian in Washington D.C.

The girl had filled teeth and sealants, evidence of a good family support structure.

St. Michael Parish will hold Corpus Christi procession Sunday

TOWN of FARMINGTON - St. Michael's Parish will be bringing a little history back this Sunday.

The church will hold a Corpus Christi procession on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, headed by Father Padre Floriano Vargas, pastor of their sister parish of Santa Ana, Waspam, Nicaragua.

A Corpus Christi procession is where "people follow the blessed sacraments," said Mike Strock, director of music and liturgy for the church.

The priest carries the sacraments in a vessel called a monstrance from church to church and altar to altar, celebrated with incense and prayers. The procession is popular in Latin America and the Hispanic community. St. Michael's hasn't done one since the late Father Jose Valdez was assisting priest in 1998.

"It's like St. Michael when Father Jose was alive. When we realized Father Floriano was coming, we thought, hey, let's do another Corpus Christi procession," Strock said.

St. Michael's procession will start around 10 a.m. Sunday, after the 9 a.m. Mass. It will proceed out of the church to an altar setup near the statue of St. Michael, then to its chapel in the cemetery where another altar will be setup. It will return to the church for the benediction and closing hymn, then to the hall for a reception.

The dance troupe Ballet Folklorico Mexico en la Piel from West Bend will perform at the reception, Strock said.

Father Floriano is one of two pastors taking care of 50,000 people in Nicaragua. His associate pastor will visit St. Michael Parish July 11-12.

The church is building a brick and mortar building after Hurricane Felix destroyed its log building in 2007.

"We basically adopted them and we helped them out. We're trying to make life better for them," Strock said.

The church has taken up collections of hygiene kits, religious articles, medical supplies and money.

Two injured in double motorcycle crash

TOWN of FARMINGTON - Three individuals were arrested for operating while intoxicated after a double motorcycle crash on Saturday, June 6, at 4:00 p.m. on Highway 144 north of Newark Drive.

Langlois suffered severe injuries and was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital, then later transferred by Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital. Birch was injured but refused transport from the scene.

Speed and alcohol were factors in the crash. All three operators were arrested for Operating under the Influence.

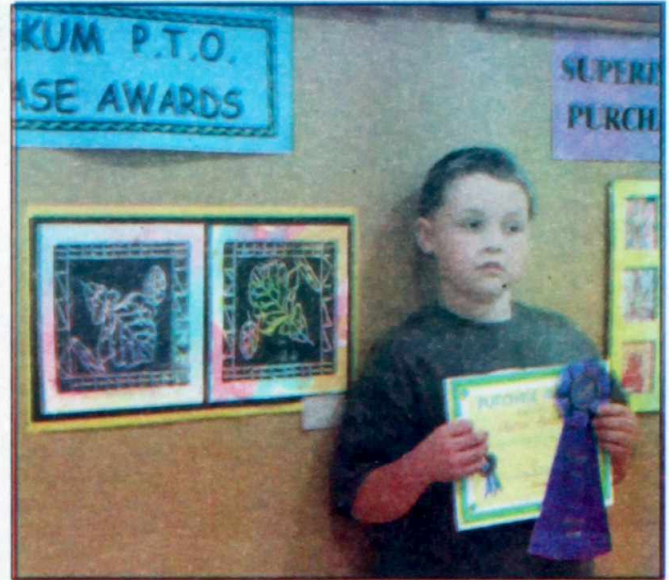

Why is it that we are so fascinated with old paintings?

Is it because we can sympathize with the poor soul in Munch's "The Scream"? Do we long for a cool dip in Monet's "Water Lilies"? Or maybe we know just what DaVinci was thinking when he gave Mona Lisa her devilish smile.

Perhaps we spend time gazing at the Old Masters because we think there's little chance we could pick up a brush, dip it in paint, and create such a work of art.

Laura Rider knows she's capable of great things, but she only needs a boost. In "Laura Rider's Masterpiece" by Jane Hamilton, Mrs. Rider doesn't wait for inspiration to happen. She makes her own.

Everybody who meets Charlie Rider thinks he's gay but Charlie's wife, Laura, can attest that "everybody" is very, very wrong. Charlie is a virile man; so much so that Laura has told him she's tired of everything in the bedroom, especially him.

But that doesn't mean their marriage is over. Charlie and Laura Rider live a happy life. Side by side, they run the Prairie Wind Farm Nursery in Hartley, Wisconsin. Together, they have their cats and their plants. Separately, Laura has her new-found writing career and Charlie... well, he has whatever he has out in the nursery.

Charlie may be virile, but he's not the smartest shoot in the garden. So when he meets Jenna Faroli by chance and Jenna Faroli seems taken by Charlie Rider, Laura is quite amazed.

Jenna Faroli, host of Milwaukee Public Radio, former Survivor cast member, former

Mrs. America contestant, is probably the most well-known resident of Hartley. Laura has been listening to Jenna Faroli's radio show since forever. Laura is a big fan and she wonders what it might be like to be Jenna Faroli's friend. But Jenna Faroli seems to be a fan of Charlie's, and the two strike up a fond e-mail friendship, the likes of which Laura Rider can't ignore. If a woman wants to become a famous writer, what better way to research a romance story than to watch it develop - with more than just a little assistance - right in front of her eyes?

I wanted to love this novel, but I didn't.

And yet, I didn't hate it, either.

I found "Laura Rider's Masterpiece" to be merely okay. A "five" on a one-to-ten scale. Right smack in the middle between "must-read" and "throw-away".

Maybe it was because none of the major characters are very likeable. Laura Rider is a clueless manipulator, Jenna Faroli is a silver-spooned snob, and Charlie Rider is well beyond completely loony. Author Jane Hamilton is usually known for peopling her novels with players you care about, but I really didn't give a hoot what happened to anyone here. Yes, readers will find a few (few!) smiles in this story, but nothing gut-busting. A laff-a-minute it's not.

If you're in the mood for a good summer read, look at another Jane Hamilton book instead. As for "Laura Rider's Masterpiece", paint it middle-of-the-road beige.



The young Indians were equally spectacular on the track. Every athlete who competed in the meet placed in their event. This all around consistency contributed to the victory.

Derek Aupperle and Dustin Crego got things started on the track with second and fifth place finishes. The 100 Meter Dash saw Corey Burdick and Austin Kerkela finishing fourth and fifth and their times were separated by only nine-hundredths of a second.

On the season, the young Indians won dual meets against Pewaukee, Badger, Slinger, Silverbrook, and Northern Ozaukee and took home first place honors at the Scenic Moraine Conference Relay Meet.
