KHS Class of 2009 remembered Area man as 'nice class' says principal

Nearly 200 high school seniors literally crossed one stage and figuratively another Saturday afternoon as Kewaskum held its annual graduation ceremony.

A few senior citizens, not high school seniors, received one of the biggest ovations. Six veterans who served the country in war and didn't receive their high school diplomas were finally honored. Two could attend, Harry and Herbert Justman. They wore caps and gowns just like the other grads and walked across the stage to receive their diplomas.

The several graduates just starting their military careers were singled out as well, receiving the biggest

Student speaker Joshua O'Brien reminisced about the past four years. After being scared of bubbler rides as a freshman, he was introduced to paintball and pellets moving at 300 feet per second during sophomore

"Man, the welts," he said.

Come junior year, O'Brien met more friends and addressed the opposite sex and what girls to do "poor, innocent boys."

As juniors, he said his class "matured and became people."

Senior year began with an experience "that changed me forever."

The football team's loss in the semifinals, its fourth straight season its run stopped one game short of the state final, moved O'Brien. Friends were next to him at every position.

Never in my life was I prepared for something like that," he said. "We lost the game, yes, but we gained so much more."

During senior year O'Brien said he learned "Being moral and wrong is much better than being selfish and

As far as his friends, "Without you guys I couldn't have made it through this place," he said.

Student speaker Michael Herriges reminded his classmates they've become one big family since setting foot in the high school on September 6, 2005.

Memories include dances, assemblies, surviving the switch to block scheduling and "getting hypnotized."

"No matter what tomorrow brings ... today we share a great achievement," he said.

Keynote speaker, English teacher Ellen Westphal-Kuphal, used a camping chair, paper bonfire and a guitar to send her message. Her song reminded graduates to "be truly good people."

Principal Christine Horbas, in asking teachers about the class of 2009, was told the class is "nice."

This is a very nice class," she said. "I want you to know it's been a pleasure and I'm glad I've gotten to know you."

Horbas listed each of the 92 high honors (3.5 GPA) or honors graduates (3.0), and honored Shaylah Haire for missing a whopping 10 minutes of class in four years. That translates to a 99.98 percent attendance rate.

Horbas reminded graduates to believe in themselves, regardless of the circumstances.

"When the going gets tough, be tough and believe in you," she said. "Let's get these diplomas handed out so you can get out there and pursue your dreams."

killed in Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS- An area family is mourning the loss of their son and brother after a tragic twist of fate took the life of a 22-year-old man. An investigation continues into the sequence of events surrounding the young man's life.

The Nevada Highway Patrol announced Monday, June 15 that Eric R. Nothem was running east across southbound Interstate 15 about 3 a.m. Sunday, June 14 and was struck and killed. Trooper Kevin Honea, spokesman for the Nevada Highway Patrol stated he died after running into the path of a Chevrolet sedan, as he entered the right travel lane. The crash occurred near the Flamingo Road interchange.

Nothem was taken to University Medical Center's trauma unit, where he died, Honea said. The Clark County Coroner's Office states the cause of Nothem's death was a fractured skull and injuries from a collision with the sedan, a spokeswoman for the coroner's office said.

The driver of the Chevrolet sedan stayed at the scene and voluntarily submitted blood samples, Honea said. The driver likely won't be charged, authorities said.

Nothem graduated from Kewaskum High School in 2005 according to KHS Principal Christine Horbas who made the announcement to staff on Monday.

The investigation into Nothem's death is somewhat of a mystery at this point. According to his mother Lisa, their family traveled to Las Vegas on vacation.

"We arrived there at 9:30 a.m. on the 13th and had such a good day, Eric was just in awe of everything. It

Historic welcome sign falling into disrepair

KEWASKUM- The village is hoping the Kewaskum Kiwanis or another community group will foot the bill to upgrade the landmark welcome sign along Highway 45 near the south entrance.

The sign is starting to fall apart, Public Works Director Jerry Gilles told the Public Works and Public Services Committee last week.

When the sign was painted two years ago, "the wood came right off of the sign board," he

"It's going to need to be replaced and something done with it. Maybe not immediately, but if we want community involvement we should get it started now," Gilles said.

Committee Chairman and Village President Andy Pesch asked to move the sign a little farther south to Highway H, closer to the village limits.

Gilles said perhaps the village could ask Dairyland Seed if it could put the sign on its

The village is now paying \$100 a year to keep the sign on private land. A 10-year lease agreement was signed in 2005.

One of the sign's posts, however, is on the Eisenbahn Trail. The village had to get a permit from the county to keep it there. Gilles said getting a permit to put the entire sign on the trail is unlikely.

The committee agreed to move the sign and to keep its format and style, "partial to the historic current nature of the sign," Pesch said.

"It definitely is a landmark for Kewaskum," he said.

The village will ask the Kiwanis for financial help with the sign, since the group donated money for the original

Village may mow Hwy 45 median



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Seven of eight liquor license holders sold minors booze

KEWASKUM- Call it the underage 180.

Last fall, seven of eight businesses holding liquor licenses in the village got caught selling to someone underage.

A recent test had seven of eight refusing to sell to an underage person, and the eighth was close.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel said in the one failed case the owner of Victoria's Cornerstone Inn was in the basement getting something when her boyfriend, not an employee, went behind the bar and served the underage girl a beer

"The owner came up. She grabbed the beer out of her hands and she never got a chance to take a drink," he said.

The boyfriend received a citation for more than \$300, Knoebel said.

"I was happy that we turned it around. Last time one didn't sell. This time one did, and it wasn't even an employee," he said.

The tests, done by Washington County's Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse, are held once or twice per year, Knoebel said. This time, the test came a few weeks after liquor license holders took

a class on how to determine if a patron is underage or

not, including fake or expired identification.

Farmington Land Use Plan discussion tabled

TOWN OF FARMING-TON- One request for a land division in an area zoned agricultural has the Plan Commission looking at growth areas across the entire town.

One landowner near Fillmore wants to divide a lot into a smaller size than the agricultural zoning requirement of one lot per five acres. The land is located within one fourth of a mile of a hamlet area on the southwest edge of Fillmore.

The town wants to establish one-fourth of a mile radius around all of its growth areas, or hamlets, but that's not what its land use map presently shows for the specific portion in question.

If the growth area is extended, the land would be zoned residential and the lot size requirement would drop to 1.5 acres.

The Plan Commission tabled action on the request and began to look at growth areas in Boltonville and St. Michaels to see if the one-fourth-mile radius exists there.

The Plan Commission tabled action on the request and may discuss the issue at next week's Plan Commission meeting if time allows. Any changes to the map would come to the Town Board for final approval.

Next week's Plan Commission meeting begins at 7 p.m. on Tuesday at the town hall, 9422 Highway 144

Governor Jim Doyle has announced \$237,895 for projects at the West Bend Municipal Airport. One project will design and reconstruct Runway 13/31. The other project will install an upgrade to the automated weather observation system (AWOS). The Governor's action releases \$67,947 in state funds to help complete the projects. The City of West Bend is contributing \$19,948, and the Federal Aviation Administration is providing \$150,000.

According to Craig Butler, airport project manager with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the runway project will repair the pavement of Runway 13/31, which has deteriorated to the point that safety for arriving and departing aircraft is a prime concern. The AWOS project will enable the Federal Aviation Administration to continue to publish aircraft instrument approach procedures that have lower minimums. These lower minimums will provide inbound aircraft greater access to the airport.

The projects are scheduled to begin in April 2009 and should be completed by December 2009.

The airport consists of two runways, parallel taxiways, apron area, connector taxiways, terminal building and auto parking lot. Together, the runways accommodate about 51,000 aircraft take-offs and landings each year.

MPTC provides credits to Project Grill students

Moraine Park Technical College has announced they will provide three credits of advanced standing to the 62 students who successfully completed Project GRILL.

Project GRILL is a Fond du Lac Area Association of Commerce program that paired high school technical education students with manufacturing partners in a challenge to design, test and build working charcoal grills from scratch. The teams worked throughout the school year to complete their grills; the finished products were unveiled recently at a public event at MPTC.

The three credits, which have an estimated 2009-2010 value in excess of \$350, are good at any of the three MPTC campuses.

"Activities like Project GRILL provide students a window into the world of work and an opportunity to work in teams and show off their creative skills."



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
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The Bookworm Sez

Beyond the Miracle Worker by Kim E. Nielsen



Remember the last day of school before summer vacation?

Oh, for sure, your brain had checked out weeks before. There would be no learning, no writing, and very little sitting still. The long school year was over and a seemingly-unlimited summer stretched ahead.

Now imagine how your teacher felt.

By most accounts, being a teacher is the most frustrating, thrilling, teeth-gnashing, wonderful job anyone could have. So now, in celebration of a summer out of school, here's a book about the woman who may be the world's most famous Teacher: "Beyond the Miracle Worker" by Kim E. Nielsen.

Born into poverty to Irish immigrants in 1866, Anna Sullivan was ten years old when she landed in the Massachusetts States Almshouse, a horrible place she "spent her life... trying to forget." Although Anna (later, Annie) hadn't yet attended school, it was impressed upon her that education was the way to a good future. So when a state official visited the almshouse, the fourteen-year-old, never one for shyness, reportedly found him and demanded an education.

Because she suffered from an infliction that left her nearly blind, Annie was sent to the famed Perkins Institution. Six years later, the formerly-illiterate girl graduated as valedictorian but with no job prospects. When someone recommended that she become a teacher, she dismissed the idea immediately.

Near the end of the summer after graduation, the owner of Perkins forwarded a letter to Annie from a Mr. Keller in Alabama. Keller was looking for a governess for his "little deaf-mute and blind daughter." Reluctantly, but with no better ideas for the future, Annie took the job.

Much has been written about the "little savage" Helen Keller was when Annie Sullivan arrived in Alabama, and Helen herself (as well as many biographers) took up the story after the famous "W-A-T-E-R" lesson

Lesser-known is the story of the rest of Annie Sullivan's life.

For a time when Helen was still young, Sullivan had a tumultuous love-hate relationship with her former Perkins headmaster, which resulted, in part, in a grave scandal involving possible fraud. As Helen grew up, Sullivan fretted over her own future, assuming that she would never fall in love or have a family (Sullivan did, eventually marry). And although she fought fiercely for rights on behalf of Helen Keller, Anne Sullivan wasn't always just Keller's Teacher.

Exhaustively researched and not always complimentary, "Beyond the Miracle Worker" goes way beyond all the stuff you read in school about the complicated, headstrong woman who gave Helen Keller words.

Using documents and diaries, author Kim E. Nielsen offers the sometimes heartbreaking, often frustrating life and work of Anne Sullivan Macy. While the narrative can occasionally become tedious, Nielsen gives readers a definite sense of the times and social mores under which Anne Sullivan lived, as well as some juicy tidbits about a woman that history often glosses past.

If a biography is on your reading to-do list this summer, "Beyond the Miracle Worker" is a worthy one for you. Grab this book and learn a thing or two.

Nothern killed in Las Vegas

was like someone who just opened his eyes to the world. We had all gone down to Fremont Street for the night and came back to the strip around 10 p.m. We were at a place right next to our hotel (Imperial Palace) until midnight when my husband and I went up to our room for the night. He stayed down with three of the other people. He was with older adults. Then he went up about 1:30 and he said he just wanted to see the strip yet for a bit. He talked to his girlfriend on the phone about 2:15, right by the motel. He was pronounced dead at 3," his mother recounted.

"No way would he have gone miles to the freeway and started running across it in that amount of time. He was drinking, but he was not impaired whatsoever. He also had \$300 in his wallet that was missing. He had to have been somehow thrown in a car and either pushed out on the freeway or jumped out, he would have never gone there. I told him earlier, never go off the strip, and he said 'I won't mom, I'm not stupid," Lisa continued.

Law enforcement will not confirm the possibily that Nothem could have been abducted, robbed and thrown from a vehicle. While this type of crime is commonplace in Las Vegas, especially on the strip, it rarely ends in murder.

Lisa Nothem stated she has had a difficult time trying to get answers from law enforcement. "We had such a hard time even getting anyone to call us, much less give us any answers, I can't believe they are treating this like that. To them he was just another drunk kid. Even if he was drinking, he could never have climbed barriers and run across a freeway four miles away from our hotel in that short of a time," she stated.

In working with The Las

Vegas Sun, a sister publication to the daily Las Vegas Review Journal a reporter confirmed the difficulty in getting answers surrounding the case.

"Someone stole my beautiful son and tossed him like a piece of garbage. He was the most wonderful person, loved by many, and will be so dearly missed. He is and will always be my angel," Nothem contin-

Danielle Dreher Kewaskum went to school at UW-Stevens Point with Nothem. "He was such a wonderful person, so full of life, always a smile on his face. It is truly a tragedy," she stated.

If These Walls Could Talk...
Memories part of Bob Ellis Classic

When we put a new bathroom in this old cabin in 2007, we found a note on a two-by-four scribbled some 50-odd years ago by my uncle, Bob Ellis. He was a young man then, building four cabins staggered on 1500 feet of lakefront on the Manitowish Chain near Boulder Junction in Vilas County. He was literally building his dream so that he might follow a bigger dream of fishing muskies, hard and often.

We found out from the scribbled note that it was raining that summer day and the exact time when he worked alone in the quiet of northern Wisconsin. Bob has been gone for two decades this year. But his nephews and nieces and our spouses who found the note, scribbled something personal back to him, signed the piece of lumber, dated it and put it back in to hide across the ages until maybe someone else finds it on some rainy tomorrow.

There are old memories up here on the top of Wisconsin. Our family vacationed at Uncle Bob's, invading his resort once a year with a ruckus that only seven kids can bring. But it seems that new secrets like hidden notes or people from yesterday pulling up to the pier to tell a story that they remember most about Bob Ellis never end.

Bob's nephews and nieces bought the cabins when Bob was killed in a boat collision while row trolling on a November day for muskies on Papoose Lake in 1989. We didn't have homes. We didn't have money for luxuries like cabins and property. But some memories are priceless and you find ways not to lose them forever. Papoose, anyway, was the lake several years before where Bob had taken his biggest musky, a 41 pound fish mislead by a home-made bait crafted during the winter months and brought to its end

by an old man fishing in an unstable, 12-foot rowboat; a boat he would often push across ice to find the open water and the big fish he so loved to chase.

Work and stories elsewhere have kept Lori and me away too long in 2009. This weekend, I arrived at the cabin and began the annual chores of raking pine needles and oak leaves and cutting shin-high weeds and grass. My brother and cabin partner, John Ellis, was futilely trying to coax water up an old well in the garage next to more dates scribbled on lumber by Uncle Bob that told him exactly when the sandpoint well was pulled and re-driven over the years. 2009 will be added to that workman's journal. To the east, my brotherin-law, Bob Johnson, hammered away at a new deck on the Uncle Bob property he had purchased with my sister Barb.

If you walk into our small cabin, you will find musky baits hanging from strip boards nailed at the top of bedroom walls, some of them the Bob Ellis specials made with care so long ago. When Bob died, my brother Jim Ellis began to make the home-made lures. I know it was part of his grieving for a lost uncle. His not-so-good first baits evolved into killer baits over the years. Those of us who row troll...all of us... catch more muskies and big walleyes on Jim Ellis Specials over the deep water that Uncle Bob coveted for big fish than any store-purchased lure.

Last week, Jim Ellis and Bob Johnson returned to represent our family in the 6th Annual Bob Ellis Classic, a row trolling tournament held in his honor and superbly coordinated by Patricia Strutz, a northern Wisconsin musky guide with her own expertise in row trolling and musky chasing. Friends of Bob Ellis and row trollers in all shapes and makes of boats come to simply fish

for muskies and remember a life lived well. Strutz calls it "an eclectic group full of camaraderie and spirit."

Jim and Bob returned also to Papoose, the deep lake where Bob's life ended but also where he caught his largest fish. A plaque at "Bob Ellis Landing" reminds visitors to use the water with safety and respect. My brothers launched no doubt hoping that some of the Uncle Bob magic would shine down on their efforts. But they also launched armed with Jim Ellis Specials.

Twenty minutes after setting out, Bob Johnson waved Jim over. A musky conservatively measured at 44-inches had already fallen to a Special over 60 feet of water. Two hours later, a 41-inch musky fell for the same Special in deep water. Both fish were released, and Johnson would claim first and second place in the Bob Ellis Classic. More memories.

Day-time work done at the cabin this weekend, we launched our row trollers and set out to work the deep with the sun slipping in the west. Usually, at this time of year, with enough family row boats on the water we can find the occasional big suspended walleye and a cooperative musky or two over a few days of fishing. Not this time.

Before the long drive back to the Milwaukee suburbs Sunday, there were boats to pull from the lake, and a few clean-up chores to tend to. Two musky rods were stowed, and I hung two musky baits on the strip board in the bedroom; back in line with all of the other the old and battered soldiers of yesterday's musky battles. If these walls could talk, I think.

Then again, in a Bob Ellis cabin... sometimes they do.

BOB ELLIS CLASSIC BRINGS TROLLERS, FISH

According to Bob Ellis Classic Coordinator Patricia Strutz, the 6th Annual event was held in June, a return to the roots of the first classic after four consecutive October tournaments. Beautiful weather and good fishing, she said, helped make the decision a good one.

Participating anglers brought crafts ranging from vintage restored rowboats to modified canoes and skiffs to a brand new cedar strip boat built by Cindy and Kim Neurohr. Famed guide and Hall of Fame inductee Buckshot Anderson rowed in one of fellow hall of famer Porter Dean's rowboats. More women and youths participated than ever before.

Each of the three lakes that rowers could choose to fish produced muskies. addition to Bob Johnson's winning fish at 44 and 41 inches taken on Papoose, Presque Isle produced a third place" big fish" for Ted Scharl in 84 feet of water. Three muskies were also caught and released on Crab Lake. George Jacques and Mark Zahn took fourth place trolling a Cisco kid in 35 feet of water, and Leon and Gary Duffin took fifth place with a 38 inch fish on Crane bait in six feet of water. Finally, Strutz caught a "small musky" in 16 feet of water on a crankbait.

Strutz thanked Adam and crew at the Skyview Restaurant for great hospitality, Jurvis Ozols for his outstanding photography on the water and off, Steve Budnik for skippering the camera boat, and Geoff Crandall who entertained with song and guitar at the banquet. "She Rows Hard for her Muskies", sung to the tune of She Works Hard for Her Money, was played in honor of Strutz.

What a great way to finish his senior season!

Jake Dickmann, Kewaskum High's lone male representative at the WIAA State Track and Field Meet in La Crosse, concluded his successful career in the sport, standing on the second rung of the victory stand.

Dickmann cleared 14 feet even (14-0) in the action-packed pole vault competition. It was his best effort by six inches and put his name in the KHS record book alongside Josh Parrent, the school's current pole vault coach, and Garett Donath, who, since he left high school, has quickly developed into one of the University of Wisconsin's top rugby players.

Dickmann said earlier this week, he knew he was going to have a good day in the event and that he was satisfied with the way his season went

E2I would have liked to have gotten first, but second's not bad," Dickmann said, recalling how the day unraveled.

"It was nice and sunny, and we had a tailwind," Dickmann said about the conditions in La Crosse on June 5th.

Dickmann had one early miss at 12-0, but he said, "That was because the standards were too far back." Once that was resolved, the lanky athlete just kept making height after height, 12-6, 13-0, 13-6, and 13-9, all on the first try.

He finally missed one try at 14-0, then came right back and flew over the mark. And did he think he was going to go over at 14-0? "I did," Dickmann said, adding, "I went over by about six inches."

River Valley's Scott Liegel, cleared 14-0 on his final attempt, but he won the competition by going over the bar at 14-3 on his first try.

"Jake vaulted great," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said. "What was really neat was after missing at 12 feet, he made five straight jumps, including 13-9, which he had never made before."

Not only is Gosa proud of Dickmann's athletic endeavors, but he praised the young man for the kind of person he is. "You couldn't ask for a nicer kid," he said.

"It was also neat for Josh Parrent. He gets to coach the kid who tied his record," Gosa said.

Dickmann started as a high jumper and hurdler in middle school, then started vaulting midway during his freshman season.

"Alissa Clapper kind of sparked my interest to do it," Dickmann said, reporting he cleared 11-6 as a freshman, 12-6 by the end of his sophomore year and 13-0 as a junior. He was happy to add a foot to that mark this spring.

This is not the end of the line for Dickmann as a pole vaulter either. "Next year, I am going to UW-Oshkosh, and I plan to do track there, too.

Of course, the standards will be a little higher, according to Dickmann, who believes the school record there is 17 feet.

"My guess is he will just continue to improve," Gosa said. "I don't think he has come close to reaching his potential."

Amanda Witek cleared 4-10 to finish 15th in the high jump. "She made the opening height, which was 4-10, then she couldn't make 5-0," Gosa said, figuring Witek was a bit nervous in her first state appearance.
