Village Public Works Committee gets updated on sign, water tower

KEWASKUM- Kewaskum Kiwanis is interested in helping fix the village's dilapidating welcome sign along Highway 45 on the south side.

Public Works Director Jerry Gilles said he talked to incoming Kiwanis President Clark Pearson about possibly helping with the sign, as years ago the Kiwanis donated money for the original sign.

"He's very interested," Gilles told the Public Works and Public Services Committee Monday.

Trustee and committee member Kevin Scheunemann said a few Kiwanis members have already been talking about the sign.

When the sign was painted two years ago, "the wood came right off of the sign board," Gilles said at a committee meeting in early June, prompting the committee to examine funding options for fixing it.

The committee at that early June meeting agreed to move the sign and

to keep its format and style, "partial to the historic current nature of the sign," said committee member and village president Andrew Pesch.

The village is trying to move the sign as well – farther south to the village limits. The village is now paying \$100 a year to keep the sign on private land. A 10-year lease agreement was signed in 2005.

One of the sign's posts, however, is on the Eisenbahn Trail. The village had to get a permit from the county to keep it there. Gilles said getting a permit to put the entire sign on the trail is unlikely.

Gilles said he sent a letter to Dairyland Seed to see if the sign could sit on its property.

In other action the committee approved nearly \$10,000 for eight change orders to the village's wastewater treatment plant upgrade proj-

The committee refused to approve another change for nearly \$10,300 for stainless steel swivel pip-

ing. The village will seek a lower bid for the job, said Gilles.

Another change order, to put on supports to the headworks building for \$5,270, was recommended to be approved by the Village Board. Any change order estimated to cost \$5,000 or more requires board approval.

The approved items include adding mowing strips at the clarifiers, stone at the headworks and U.V. buildings, adding a waterstop at the primary clarifier pump station, thicken the slab over the primary clarifier pump room, adding concrete sidewalk along the south side of the digesters, fill the RAS trough and pour sidewalk over it, raise low sections of the aeration tank walls.

The money will come from the project's contingency fund.

Village raises suspended

KEWASKUM- Like many communities across the state, the Village is tightening their belts in regards to spending. The latest cost saving measure affects nine village employees not represented by village union organizations. All but one had a one percent pay increase scheduled for July 1, cancelled at a June 25 Village Board meeting. The ninth, Administrator Matt Heiser had a 7.66% increase taken away.

Eight department heads received their annual pay increase of two percent, effective January 1, 2009. They were scheduled to receive a second one to 3.73 percent increase July 1. The increase and wage freezing does not affect those represented by the LAW or AFSCME union.

Crossing guards, library employees and seasonal employees received a straight two percent raise in July. Crossing guards receive \$30.80 each day they work. Librarians receive anywhere from \$8.33 to \$9.57 depending on their years of service.


Village Administrator Matt Heiser, who began his employment with the village a year ago, has his salary frozen at his starting salary of \$75,267.

Chief of Police Richard Knoebel, who became Chief in 1988, will receive a \$64,480 salary. Department of Public Works Director Jerry Gilles who started with the village in 1991, will receive \$65,125. Treasurer/Deputy Clerk Janet Knops, the longest serving department head, who began her employment in 1983, will receive \$43,916. Police clerk Patty Blackstone, who started in 1999, will receive \$24,687.

The village operates on a system where new hires receive "step increases" annually for the first five years of their employment in addition to normal increases. They receive these "step increases" based on their length of service on the anniversary of their hire. Those employees hired after June 25, will not receive their step increase this year.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel, who started as Chief in 2006, had already received his step increase because he was hired January 3. In total, he received a two percent increase at

Police Chief reminds fireworks enthusiasts to be safe and legal

With the Fourth of July approaching, the Kewaskum Police Department would like to review the laws dealing with fireworks and safety factors.

People often question what fireworks can we legally use in the Village of Kewaskum? The definition for legal fireworks is: Fireworks that stay put and just smoke or fizzle are OK. This includes sparklers, stationary cones and fountains, snakes, smoke bombs, caps, noisemakers or confetti poppers with less than a quarter grain of explosive mixture.

The definition for illegal fireworks is: Anything that explodes or leaves the groundfrom Roman candles, firecrackers, and bottle rockets, to streaming, booming fireworks displays. Although they can be purchased in Wisconsin they are not legal to use unless a permit is issued by the municipality that they are to be used in. Fireworks vendors cannot issue them and individuals cannot receive them. Anyone found in possession of using illegal fireworks in the Village of Kewaskum will be fined \$121.60. According to Village ordinance, Section 62-4 Any person causing damage or fire while lighting fireworks will be held responsible.

Even when using legal fireworks safety must be practiced. Over 10,800 people were injured using fireworks in 2005. To prevent you or your children from becoming part of those statistics follow these safety tips:

Never allow children to handle, light or play with fireworks.

Read all instructions and warnings on fireworks labels.

Common sparklers burn at a temperature over 1000 degrees and are hot enough to melt metal.

Stick to what's legal without a permit.

Also be reminded that lighted fireworks of any kind are prohibited in the park during the fireworks display.


If we all follow these tips

County Board piecing together master plan

WEST BEND- The Washington County Board will get its first look at a master plan for county land at its July 14 meeting.

The plan is designed to help the county expand its buildings in the right places and will essentially serve as a 2035 plan for county land and facilities, said Doug Johnson, county administrative coordinator.

"The county owns quite a bit of land, some of which is developed land like the new highway shop, but we also have grassy fields," he said.

For example, Johnson said, the Highway Department's building was in a different location and torn down and rebuilt near Amity. All equipment from the building is sitting in the land that used to be next to the Highway Department building, "and now it's a block away," Johnson said.

Consultants are also looking at the county's PAC building. Many of its departments have been reorganized since the building was constructed, and it may be remodeled to put people in better locations and increase efficiency, Johnson said.

The Executive Committee may recommend the PAC remodeling project be put in the county's capital plan, he said. The committee could finalize its recommendation at its July 21 meeting. The County Board could act on it at its September meeting.

No action will be taken at the July

No action will be taken at the July 14 meeting on the master plan.

"For the plan itself, all we're expecting is the board will receive the plan. It will be a guide for discussions on future topics," Johnson said.

Potter Lawson Architects of Madison was charged to create the plan.

UW-WC partnering with UW-Plattville

WEST BEND- The state didn't include funding for the University of Wisconsin-Washington County's four-year engineering degree program, so it's on to plan B for the time being.

UW-WC has partnered with UW-Platteville to offer four-year, electrical and mechanical engineering degrees slated to start this fall. Since funding for face-to-face classes wasn't included in the state budget, UW-WC has to make do until it gets the money.

"We're going to use distance technology," said Dean David Nixon.

He said this is new and improved distance technology, not like distance classes in the past. Lectures can be seen on students' computers at home, either live or taped, depending on when they log in.

"If you want to sign on to this class at two in the morning, you can do that," Nixon said.

Students may e-mail the professor questions or ask them in real time during live lectures.

The camera can move around and zoom in to see the professor, and it can zoom in to see what the professor is writing on the white board, Nixon said. The default screen will be a split between the professor and white board. Lectures are saved, like Podcasts, so students may watch them multiple times.

"It has its advantages, You can keep coming back to it," Nixon said.

Labs will be set up on a temporary basis. Professors will come in to administer the lab portions of the classes.

Engineering will remain an accredited degree, Nixon said. The distance technology portion is 95 percent of what the school is looking for.

Diverting money at UW-WC to fund the program wasn't an option.

"We'd have to close something else down. We're really reduced to a zero sum game," Nixon said.

Delaying the program was not an option, either.

"We have a commitment to the potential students and the businesses in the county," he said. "We as an institution have made a commitment to make this happen, and we're going to."

While Nixon understands times are tough "and the state budget has to reflect that," he said he has every reason to believe the program will be a high priority once the economy improves.

Fourth festivities

This promotion partners the Postal Service and the USO, and is meant to boost morale of the men and women serving overseas. It's an easy way for families and friends to send care packages to the troops stationed overseas.

The Kewaskum Post Office received a supply of Mili-Kits and will be distributing them free of charge to local customers, as well as groups and organizations. The kits are designed specifically for military families sending packages overseas. Each kit includes six Priority Mail Flat Rate Boxes in a variety of sizes, six Priority Mail labels, one roll of Priority Mail tape and six customs forms with envelopes. The mailing kits can be ordered by calling 1-800-610-8734, option 1, and follow the prompts.

Anyone bringing a Mili-Kit Priority Mail Flat Rate package (or any other Priority Flat Rate Box) addressed to an APO/FPO on a scheduled "Snow Day" will be able to affix the official "Season's Greetings - Without the snow!" seal to their package. The "Snow Days" for the Kewaskum Post Office will be Tuesdays and Thursdays in July. Service organizations overseas will be watching for packages bearing the seal and directing them to Wisconsin and Upper Peninsula service men and women. The seals will only be affixed on "Snow Days" at the time of mailing.

Season's Greetings – Without the snow! only runs through July 31st.

"Care packages from home are a big morale boost for military service members stationed around the world," said Postmaster Monica Lepak. "With Priority Mail Flat Rate Boxes, you can lift spirits without weighing yourself down. If it fits, it ships for one low price."

received a two percent increase at the beginning of the year and his 3.58 percent increase on January 3 (his hire date). His salary is set at \$51,544.

Instead of a two percent raise at the start of 2009, Library Director Steve Baker, who began in 2000, received a 4.88 percent increase due to his "step increase." He is in the third year of his step increase because he was not included

in the first five years of his employment with the village. His salary remains at \$45,203.

Building/Zoning Administrator Chad Cook and Clerk/Deputy Treasurer Stephanie Justmann who both started in 2007, each received a two percent increase at the start of the year. However, because Cook was hired on July 16 and Justmann on September 10 they both lose their step increases. Cook's salary is \$48,033 and

Justmann's \$39,632.

It is unknown if this is an attempt to avoid furloughs that are occurring at the state or if village employees also face that prospect.

60 years and Esser is still making sweet music for God

CAMPBELLSPORT—Many would look at nearly four decades of teaching music as a career, but for Sr. Jeanette Esser (Joan of Arc), more aptly it has been a vocation, one that began when she was a young girl at St. Matthew's Catholic School in Campbellsport and is still going strong today as she enters her 61st year as a member of the School Sisters of St. Francis.

"I had a music teacher (at St. Matthew's) I admired very much," Sr. Jeanette said earlier this week, indicating she first knew God was calling her to the religious life in "sixth or seventh grade."

And God is still directing her life in "retirement," including sing-a-long visits at Ivy Manor Senior Home in Campbellsport

Sr. Jeanette was born in Lomira, but when she was seven, the family moved to a farm near Campbellsport, "which made Roy (her brother) very happy." Roy Esser would later become a teacher and administrator at Kewaskum High School. He died in 2007.

Sr. Jeanette finished grade school at St. Matt's, then she left her home to join the convent in Milwaukee. "I was an aspirant for three years, then a postulant for several years before becoming a full-fledged nun.

Sr. Jeanette said her family was a bit surprised with her decision to join a religious order. "I think my dad gave me two weeks," she recalled, but the elder Esser would have to wait until his two younger daughters grew up to handle the baking chores Sr. Jeanette had once handled for the family. She stayed.

"I was received on June 14, 1949," Sr. Jeanette said, reporting there were many moves to different schools in different dioceses since that day, and she enhanced her own education, obtaining a degree from Alverno College in Milwaukee.

Sr. Jeanette first taught music in the Diocese of Chicago, then in the Madison Diocese at St. Charles in Cassville, WI., St. Anthony and Philip School in Highland and later St. Francis Xavier in Cross Plains.

For the Rockford (Ill.) Diocese, Sr. Jeannette served as musician at St. John the Baptist School in McHenry, before coming to the Milwaukee Archdiocese at St. Patrick's, Beaver Dam, Holy Redeemer in Milwaukee, St. Sylvester in South Milwaukee, St. Mary's. Menomonee Falls and St. Monica, Whitefish Bay.

"I finished up (teaching) at St. Monica's," she said, but her ministry continued as she served in a pastoral position at Blessed Sacrament Church before being called back to Campbellsport in 1995 to be the musician at St. Joseph's Convent there. She served in that position until 2006, and,

for 19 years.

Limbach recently earned her Bachelors Degree in Management and Communication from Concordia University, and was attracted to the Greater Leadership West Bend Program as an opportunity to further apply her education in a way that would give back to the community. She is an ac-

"That's when I retired," Sr. Jeanette said.

Retirement for nuns simply means they pare down their schedules a bit and help out where they can. For Sr. Jeanette, this means she provides sing-a-longs and music direction for the nuns at St. Joseph's and for Ivy Manor, and she also serves as the organist for the Methodist Church in Campbellsport.

That's right a Catholic nun serving a Methodist congregation. Sr. Jeanette is all in favor of Ecumenism. "Very much so," she said, pointing to the fact she is very active in an ecumenical association of parishes in the community.

"We (members of the association) do a lot of things together," she said, including the presentation of an annual Christmas concert.

And what does Sr. Jeanette see as the best part of being a nun? "Reaching out to people... ministering to God's people in many phases," she said emphatically, adding, "It has been very, very rewarding having some of my students become music teachers. I still stay in touch with some of them."

Fifteen sisters at St. Joseph's recently celebrated milestone anniversaries, on-Saturday, June 20, 66 School Sisters of St. Francis were honored with a Mass and dinner at the St. Francis Convent on South Layton Blvd. in Milwaukee.

One of the honorees has been in the order for 85 years, according to Sr. Jeanette, who said she personally is happy with her decision to become a nun. "I can't complain. It's been fruitful."



Tanzanian drought brings urgency to 'Brick by Brick' efforts

KEWASKUM- A severe drought that has devastated the Arusha region of Tanzania, east Africa brings increased urgency to Brick by Brick for Tanzania!, Inc.'s current efforts to raise funds to build two preschools currently planned for this region. Massive crop failures of maize (corn) - the region's leading cereal grain - have left much of the country struggling to find sustenance with as many as 34,000 families without food in the Ngorongoro district alone.

District Commissioner, Jowika Kasunga called the situation, "...the worst in history." Humanitarian efforts from many international organizations are helping to air in supplies of grain, but it is not enough to sustain. With families in Tanzania averaging less than \$300 USD income per year, the ability of commerce to help provide for food is minimal. Most Tanzanians traditionally rely on bartering of sustenance crops to get by.

John Kenworthy, Executive Director of Brick by Brick for Tanzania!, Inc. says that while efforts are well underway for new preschools in the King'ori district and the Young Roses School in rural Arusha, the tax exempt organization will ramp up its efforts in order to provide employment for struggling Tanzanian workers. "I have found that the generosity of Tanzanians is incredible. Even if a family has little, if a neighbor is hungry the meager portions will be shared without pause. If we can supplement that income - more families can eat. And it doesn't cost that much!" In Tanzania, a family can eat for approximately \$3 USD a week.

"A good part of our expense for each preschool is labor." Kenworthy continued. "This translates directly into food for our brothers and sisters in need."

Brick by Brick has partnered with Capitol Drive Lutheran Church and the Milwaukee Lutheran School to raise funds for the King'ori School. A brickselling fundraiser at Kewaskum Middle School netted almost \$500 USD toward the Young Roses School. Each preschool costs approximately \$12,000 USD.

On August 20th, a fund-

featuring raising concert singer/songwriter A.J. Croce will be held at the Kewaskum Theatre with proceeds going to both schools. Additional donation opportunities are available through direct donations via PayPal at www.brickbybrickfortanzania.org or on the "Build the Young Roses School in rural Arusha" cause on Facebook. Kenworthy added that Brick by Brick is always looking for additional partners in its efforts and would welcome organizations, churches and schools to step up to help at this critical time.







Work was started whereby the Kewaskum Creamery plant will be made considerably larger. A new building, one story high, 40 by 52 feet. will be erected on the com-



The new unit will be a complete unit by itself of which the Chicago Board of Health will have no jurisdiction. As the supply of milk received, will increase additional help will be employed. The Kewaskum Creamery has for years been a very successful institution.




