## Farmington seeking legal opinion on necessity of permit for Dyno Tuning

TOWN of FARMINGTON- The Town Board is seeking a legal opinion on whether or not a local auto tuning business needs a conditional use permit and advises residents to contact a board member when the noise from the shop gets too loud.

At their monthly board meeting, one couple presented a petition requesting the board do something about the noise from West Bend Dyno Tuning at 8450 Trading Post Trail. Donald and Terrilee Zimdars live across the street from the business and claim the noise, especially late at night and into the wee hours of the morning, has been unbearable. Nineteen people from 12 addresses signed the petition.

The Zimdars said they contacted

business owner Brad Riekkoff both verbally and through written communication, contacted Town Chairman Gary Schreiber and the county sheriff's department.

"It hasn't gotten better," said Don Zimdars

Riekkoff said his hours are from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday, 10-5 on Saturday and by appointments on Sunday. He said he tries to shut down the dyno - the biggest noisemaker, before 10. He said the sheriff's department said he could be open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. and said he is willing to shut down the dyno earlier.

'He's just got a personal vendetta against me since I built the house there," Riekkoff said of Don Zimdars. Whether or not the shop's doors are closed is a major element in the noise

control. Riekkoff claims the doors are closed when the dyno is running. Terrilee said she has video of the shop running with its doors open at 2:40 a.m. She also complained about cars revving their engines as they leave Riekkoff's property.

Neighbor Chris Elbe who runs a farm said his workers can't sleep due to the noise. He said the business would need a conditional use permit according to the town. Riekkoff claims it doesn't.

The Town Board said it would check with its attorney on the issue. "I'm not satisfied he needs a con-

ditional use," Schreiber said. About 20 residents came to the



TOWN of FARMINGTON - For Tim Dobberphul, the switch to organic farming wasn't difficult but it was much more profitable.

The longtime farmer whose grandfather began an operation in 1925 and moved to the present location on the corner of Boltonville Road and Highway H in 1952 already rarely used sprays. He easily transitioned to full organic and became certified in organic farming four years ago.

"It's the economics of it. I had to get paid more for my milk," Dobberphul told a crowd of about 40 at last Monday's organic farm field day sponsored by Midwest Organic and Sustainable Education Service (MOSES) with help from Horizon Organic.

He used to average 70 to 80 pounds of milk per cow, but Dobberphul noticed everyone was making money - the vet, feed mills, etc. but him.

Getting certified meant making more money

"It just made sense to get certified," he said

Now, Dobberphul gets 45 pounds per cow but other costs are way down.

"All we ever see the vet for now is breach birth," he said. "We never have sick cows." Pregnancy rates are up, mastitis is not a

problem and he doesn't cull cows anymore. Dobberphul credits his wife, Melissa, for her gift in tending to calves. He has two young boys and while his dad at 72 still milks every day, Dobberphul basically is a one-man show

working his 90 acres and milking 75 cows. Organic farming experts were on hand to explain some tricks of the trade to organic farming.

The on-time state budget includes a dent in shared revenue, and Kewaskum is no exception.


The village will receive \$21,846 less next year in shared revenue, Village Administrator Mathew Heiser told the Village Board Monday night.

### Red Cross searches for new director

WEST BEND- The Washington County Chapter of the American Red Cross is reassessing itself as it searches for a new executive director.

After Betsy Hanson abruptly resigned July 1, the board is taking a look at what kind of functions the chapter will perform in the future and how that relates to the Milwaukee chapter, said Jim Vest, chairman of the American Red Cross in West Bend and West Bend fire chief.

'What we're doing is looking at forming a transforming committee," he said.

The board is developing a plan to "meet core Red Cross functions," he said.

One example is switching the medical transport program from the Red Cross to the Interfaith Caregivers of Washington County. Vest said the transport program didn't fit the Red Cross' mission.

Changes in structure have recently occurred and more are on the way, Vest said. A year ago, the chapter's coverage area covered the northern half of Washington County. Now, it covers the entire county.

The board is working with the Milwaukee chapter on developing a plan to meet the Red Cross' functions, he said. That will determine the role of the new director.

'We're very lucky in that the people who are working for the Red Cross have been able to take over and keep it running right now," Vest said.

Vest said the board wants to hire a new director as soon as possible, and will be able to focus more on the process after this week's Real Heroes awards dinner. He said the two office employees at the chapter and volunteers have been doing a great job and he doesn't want to lean on them too much.

'We still haven't finalized all dollar amounts, but it looks like we should be underneath that," he said.


Traffic has mostly been cooperative, but Wronski said some people have tried to move barricades and get around the construction, and a motorcycle drove through wet concrete.





### Regents freeze UWWC tuition for third year

MADISON – The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents approved an annual operating budget and set tuition rates for the 2009-10 academic year at its July meeting in Madison on Thursday.

UW System President Kevin P. Reilly's budget will freeze tuition for the third consecutive year for 12,735 resident students enrolled at 13 freshman-sophomore UW Colleges campuses including UW-Washington County (UW-WC).

"Maintaining tuition at 2006 rates for the 2009-2010 academic year means that the UW Colleges will continue to be the most affordable access point for anyone who wants to start, continue or complete a degree," said UW Colleges and UW-Extension Chancellor David Wilson, who has spearheaded the push to keep the UW Colleges affordable, especially in these challenging economic times.

With this tuition freeze, UW-WC will maintain its long-held reputation as an affordable choice for incoming students of all ages who can then complete a baccalaureate degree at UW-WC or at any four-year UW campus.

The tuition for two semesters at UW-WC will remain at \$4,268 for 2009-10. This is approximately \$1,100 less than the four-year comprehensive campuses, \$2,600 less than at UW-Milwaukee and \$3,000 less than the tuition at UW-Madison.

According to UW-WC Dean, David Nixon, "UW-Washington County continues to provide a quality and affordable college experience for area students. In addition to saving substantially on tuition costs, statistics have shown that students who begin their education at UW-WC (or one of the other 2-year UW campuses), have higher graduation rates than those who begin their studies at a 4-year campus. The small class sizes and experienced faculty (not teaching assistants) provide the solid foundation needed for students to complete a baccalaureate degree."



**TOWN of POLK-** The Washington County Fair's annual livestock auction turned 40 this year, and a few select people and businesses have attended every one.

West Bend Elevator bought an animal each year, including the first when it won the champion hog from Kewaskum's Robert Schreffler.

"Every year we bought something. It's mainly to support the youth in Washington County and keep them interested in agriculture," said David Gonring, whose family owns West Bend Elevator. "Hopefully, some of them go into ag because our farmers are getting much older by average age."

Kewaskum Frozen Foods hasn't missed one, either.

"Being in the business we're in ... you deal with all the local, rural farmers. Plus, you get to know their kids. The auction is really for them. Sixty or 70 percent of the animals at that fair will come here to get processed," said Paul Ries, coowner.

For the businesses, the event is as social as it is anything else.

"You see a lot of people you haven't seen for the past year. You like to see the kids smile when they're getting a good price," Gonring said.

"You see people you do business with year round also. They like to see it. And you've got to support the kids," Ries said.

Kids often use proceeds from the sale of their animals for college. They receive much higher price than the market rate.

Gonring said auctioneer Pat O'Brien has done every auction, and Rollie Bast did 39.

Ries said this year was a record sale, despite the recession.

"It's amazing what they did," he said.

Gonring this year again provided the winning bid for the Golden Gallon of Milk for an all-time high of \$1,200.

"It's just a donation, really," he said. "We kind of like to bid on it, period."

Gonring said he attends auctions at fairs in Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Fond du Lac counties as well. He has a plan for each purchase.

"In some cases we have employees who want a steer or part of a steer. If not, we ship the animal. If someone wants a quarter, then they end up in the carcass show. Kids can see how it grades out there," he said.

The carcass show is held the Wednesday evening after the fair, at Kewaskum Frozen Foods. Experts grade the different aspects of the various animals, checking for how much fat, etc.

Ries said the carcass show gives a better grade. While at the fair animals are judged as animals, "here we can actually see how they're really going to judge."

Gonring admits that's not his cup of tea.

"I'm not an expert on that. All I care about is if it tastes good."



It's a small world. And it's getting smaller.

Case in point: you strike up a conversation with a stranger at the airport and find that you both worked in the same building twenty years ago. Or you overhear a dear friend discussing someone you just met that morning – and it turns out she's distantly related to your new acquaintance. Or you suddenly discover that you really are "six degrees separated" from the Queen of England and Brad Pitt.

Our paths cross with so many people every day, it's almost inevitable that we're all connected. But in the new novel "A Disobedient Girl" by Ru Freeman, two women with different lives are linked in the most heartbreaking way.

Latha loved the finer things in life.

Though she couldn't use the Lux soap in front of Madam, the wonderful smell made her smile, perhaps in part because the soap was stolen. Stolen, like the best things Latha owned. Sure, she wore nice saris, but they were always hand-me-downs. Because she was a servant, Latha was expected not to want the finer things in life.

She didn't remember a time before she came to the Vithanage home. They told her that she had no mother, and that was why she became Thara's servant. Latha and Thara were friends, but Vithanage Madam never let Latha forget her place.

Long ago, Biso tried to drown herself and her three children in the ocean but when the waves broke over her body, she lost her courage, walked out of the water, and returned home to another beating.

Biso loved her children: the oldest, Loku Putha, bigboned like his father but way too impressionable. The middle child, Loku Duwa, who knew her mother's favor lay elsewhere. And Chooti Duwa, the baby, the child whose father was not Biso's husband. The favored daughter whose father was stabbed and killed by the man Biso was forced to marry.

Latha always wanted children, but who would marry a servant? Her first child, con-



ceived in revenge, was taken from her. Her second, conceived by an American, was ripped from her. But her third child would allow her to make a family.

Every now and then, I get a book that makes me want to do nothing but go to the sofa to read. This is one of those kinds of books.

Beautifully written (although a little wordy at times), "A Disobedient Girl" pulls you into another world completely. You know that no good will come to defiant Latha, and though you truly want her to have those fine things, you know it will come at a price. You'll want to wring haughty Thara's little neck. Watching Biso unravel is unsettling, and - while you may have the "secret" figured out by the middle of this book - it hurts to read the way it happens.

Judging by this - Ru Freeman's first book - she's an author you're going to want to keep an eye on. For a debut novel, "A Disobedient Girl" ain't no small thing.

### CITRUS SALMON WITH ORANGE RELISH

1/4 cup orange juice

- 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 1/2 teaspoons McCormick(r)
- Thyme Leaves, divided
- 4 salmon fillets (about 1
- pound)
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon McCormick(r) Paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Orange Relish: 1/2 teaspoon grated orange

- peel 2 seedless oranges, peeled,
- sectioned and cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 2 tablespoons chopped red bell pepper
- tablespoon honey
  tablespoon chopped red onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon McCormick(r) Ground Ginger

Mix orange juice, oil and 1 teaspoon of the thyme in small bowl. Place salmon in large resealable plastic bag or glass dish. Add marinade; turn to coat well. Refrigerate 30 minutes or longer for extra flavor.

For the relish, mix all ingredients in medium bowl. Cover. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Mix brown sugar, paprika, remaining 1/2 teaspoon thyme and salt in small bowl. Remove salmon from marinade. Discard any remaining marinade. Rub salmon evenly with paprika mixture.

Grill over medium-high heat 6 to 8 minutes per side or until fish flakes easily with a fork. Or, place salmon on foil-lined baking pan. Bake in preheated 400° F oven 10 to 15 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork. Serve salmon with Orange Relish.





REMEMBERING DAN... Sporting clays event helps shatter fundraising goal

With the last words of his young life on an August evening in 2008, Dan Ross asked his mother not to wake him the next morning. The sporting clays season at Wern Valley Sportsmen's Club in Waukesha had concluded, a banquet was scheduled for the following evening, and the 16-year old would not be expected to report early to work.

Dan was comfortable and talented with a shotgun himself, and had gone to state competition twice as a member of the Junior Team for Wern Valley, winning a Division 1st place once. He also shot in the Winter Sporting Clays League at the McMiller Sportsman's Club with his parents and other team members. As a member of the Wern Valley's Bird Crew, he raised pheasants from chicks, many of which were sold to farms for release in the fields of South Dakota and captured and released adult birds on site as needed at the facility when the hunters came.

Dan never woke. His parents, Lynn and Charlie Ross Genesee, found their son in bed, his life ended by a cause that would not reveal itself easily despite any pain or grief suffered by a mom and dad and sisters who really needed to just know why. Medical evaluation seeking a cause of death that included toxology level and brain aneurism reports and tests of heart, liver and other too-common causes of premature mortality came back normal.

"No, my 16 year old son is gone," Lynn Ross responded. "He ran up the stairs a healthy boy. That's not normal."

Eventually, a tryptase blood test delivered conclusive evidence that Dan had died from an "anaphylactic reaction to an unknown allergen", or allergic reaction to something he had eaten. According to Lynn Ross, a tryptase reference level is typically 11.4. With an allergic reaction, the histamine level measured by the Tryptase test might elevate into the 20s. Dan's tryptase level was over 200.

"Dan died in his sleep," Lynn said. "I asked the Doctor what would have happened if he would have had the reaction at the table when we were there with him. He said, 'your husband would have called 911, you would have administered CPR and Dan still would have been gone in seconds."

In the few seconds it took for loving parents to check on a son, a family's life was shattered forever. Instead of enjoying an evening at the place where Dan had spent much of his life, at the Wern Valley sporting clays banquet a hat was passed and shooters raised \$1,000 in memory of a generous young boy who everyone liked and who, his mother said, had never had a bad day.

"Dan touched the community," Lynn said. "This kid never had a bad day in his life. He smiled from the day he was born, and literally he had a smile on his face when he died. My father died in his sleep five weeks before at age 78. Now I think Dad had to go to receive Dan."

In passing Dan would continue to touch the community through the courage of a family that had seen firsthand the extraordinary generosity that their son carried in his heart. Two years ago, Dan's help had been solicited from a Kettle Moraine School District coach when the State Trap Shoot held at the Waukesha Gun Club needed more personnel (to be paid at an hourly rate) to help coordinate events. Revenue raised at the shoot would be donated to the District's Share the Field Project.

The project is an ongoing collective fund-raising effort to purchase at a cost of \$425,000 a synthetic athletic field to be used by multiple sports and activities by Kettle Moraine and surrounding communities. The existing natural surface was used by the KM football team only. By the third game each year large sections of the field were reduced to dirt, and a great potential resource was limited in use. If a synthetic field could be installed, lacrosse, field hockey, soccer, marching bands and many other users could all utilize the resource.

Although still not old enough to drive, the then-15 year old had saved his money and had purchased a 1991 Camaro in need of work. Dan worked at the state trap shoot for four days, earning a paycheck of almost \$500.00. "He

asked us if we would be disappointed if he donated the money to 'Share the Field," his mother said. "Any parent would be proud of that decision. That's what we live for. At 15, he was living to buy car parts, but he wanted to give away the money."

In making service preparations for their son, the funeral director asked Lynn and Charlie Ross if they would like to set up a memorial to Dan. Although that issue hadn't been discussed at home, in unison, they answered, "Share the Field."

After dismissing the possibility of an August date too close to the day a year before when the Ross family had said goodbye to their son, the "Share the Field" Memorial Shoot for Dan Ross was held on July 11, 2009 "Dan passed in August," said Lynn. "How do you set up a memorial almost a year after he died? I couldn't do it. I need August to myself."

So very fittingly, it was the memorial shoot that put the long-time quest to raise the funds necessary to buy and install what to many would be a literal field of dreams virtually within reach. With a goal of \$5000, the shoot raised \$7200 and placed the ultimate target just \$12,000 away. Even now, Dan continues to give back to the community while a family learns to let go.

"When Dan died with a smile on his face, the Pastor asked 'wouldn't you have a smile on your face if the Good Lord came to get you?"" Lynn said. "If I had to give up being a mother, at least I gave it up to God. I can't compete with God. We're blessed. We got to be Dan's parents for almost 17 years."





Strobel and Adam Martz ripped consecutive singles to

score another run and Adam Sarauer capped the scoring with a RBI double to deep left giving the A's a 7-1 lead.


