Town obtains judgement against Sterns, gives clean up deadline extension

KEWASKUM- Seeing significant progress, the Town Board granted an extension to a court-ordered deadline for Donald and June Stern to complete the clean up of their property that has been occurring off and on since 2005. So far, the Sterns have removed over 150 tons of material from their property at 3350 E Moraine Drive.

Washington County Circuit Court Judge Patrick Faragher awarded a summary judgement to the town on June 24. The summary judgement required the Sterns to have the court ordered debris removed within 15 days from the date the judgement was entered. If they did not follow the order, Judge Faragher gave permission to the town to handle the cleanup and place a special assessment on

the property for the costs involved.

Don Stern stated traile

June Stern then sent a letter to the town's attorney and chairman Ellis Kahn on July 9, asking for an extension to the judgement. She asked her and her husband be given until September 1 to finish the clean-up.

In the letter Stern noted that her husband Don removed 151 tons of material and 100 cars from the property. She also stated that if an agreement could not be reached she and her husband would file an appeal to the judgement.

Supervisor Allen Hron quickly motioned to allow the extension and was seconded by Dan Schmidt. Chairman Ellis Kahn hesitated reminding the supervisors "many extensions have been given without progress."

Don Stern stated trailers are still being loaded. "We hauled another two semi loads of vehicles out, all that's left is four large trucks that I am trying to sell to another yard. I'm committed. It's almost cleaned up. It will be gone by the first of September"

Kahn then stated that he would be okay with the extension if town officials would be allowed to do an inspection of the property before the deadline. "My hat goes off to you, you guys got it cleaned up," he concluded.

The board decided that if there is any non-compliance, A&W Iron and Metal of Kewaskum will be there September 2 to finish the job.



Village board sets rules for celebrating Asphalt adds \$10k to Independence Day fireworks

KEWASKUM- The Village Board on Monday took definitive action to regulate how its residents celebrate the anniversary of being free with the goal of fairness for all and the prevention of fights and anger over just what happened to residents' tarps after being left unattended for days in a park.

Beginning next year, tarps, chairs, roped-off areas and the like will only be allowed to arrive at River Hill Park as early as July 1 for the annual July 3 fireworks show. Those arriving early will be scooped up by village staff and have to be claimed by the rightful owner at a later date.

Reserving space in the park became an issue this year when some people staked claim to their spots as early as Sunday for the Friday extravaganza. Some tarps were taken, but the culprits have not been identified. The village itself claims innocence.

Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said he was "dismayed" at tarps being pulled up this year, and "a little dismayed" that some were laid down a week early. The reservation process, he said, keeps backing up each year.

'What if it's Memorial Day?" Heiser said.

Answers to the inquiry were silent.

Since debating the issue was broken by the Statesman two weeks ago, Village President Andrew Pesch said he took comments from residents on both extremes, some saying don't do anything while others saying only allow space to be reserved starting the day of the show.

Like the voting public, the board was split on just how to fairly enforce partaking in the enjoyment of skyward explosives. The motion to enact the July 1 rule passed 3-1.

Harry Roecker, often a silent board member, took a stand.

"I'd hate to see us put a timeframe on it. It's fireworks, he said. Roecker voted against the motion.

Pesch and trustees Kevin Scheunemann and Norman Kufahl voted for the motion. Trustees Steve Scheunemann, Tom Piwoni and Jim Hovland did not attend the meeting.

The board and village officials engaged in a philosophical, lively and sometimes humorous debate over how much government regulation should be imposed on a public celebrating the birth of its nation formed with the impetus to rid itself of government regulation, though the word

Options of 24- and 48hour notices were mentioned, or none at all.

"How much regulation do you want to make?" said Police Chief Richard Knoebel. "It's a holiday. It's become tradition in the village. You don't want to chase people away."

Knoebel reminded the board entertainment options in the village are somewhat limited, given the fireman's picnic and Kewaskum's Kettle Kountry Kolors are no longer

While Milwaukee lets residents stay overnight in preparation for its "ooh" and "ahs," Knoebel is against that.

"I'm not going to let them sleep there," he said.

Heiser found the 48 hours rule to be "reasonable" and said it would stop the trend of people laying out tarps earlier. Less than 48 hours could result in a mad dash to claim fertile viewing land and cause fights, Knoebel said.

The chief's plan is to establish public notification of the new restriction via signs on trees and articles in the pa-

WAUWATOSA- An exband teacher from Kewaskum High School has been charged in Waukesha County after his babysitter claimed he touched her inappropriately. Another underage female reported receiving advances via text messages on her wireless phone.

Todd R. Paaske was employed with the Kewaskum School District from August 2004 until June of 2007. He most recently was employed Underwood Elementary School in Wauwatosa.

Paaske awaits his day in court regarding three separate charges, Child Enticement, Exposing a Child to Harmful and Exposing a Child to Harmful Descriptions.

A criminal complaint states one of the girls accused Paaske of showing her a photo on his wireless phone of a topless female and spoke of a sexual relationship with the girl. He also described sexual encounters he had with his girlfriend.

"If I, as an administrator, ever had warranted suspicion of an educator having inappropriate relations with a student (verbal or physical), I would walk them out of the building that very day. West Bend Clinic grants patients controlled access to medical records

West Bend Clinic now offers MyChart©, an internet based patient portal that allows patients controlled access to portions of their medical record.

A patient portal provides communication services be tween patients, nursing staff and providers. Through integration with the patient's electronic medical record (EMR), patients can view lab and radiology test results, request appointments, refill medication and send secure messages to providers and nursing staff. It will also allow parents and caregivers proxy access to view a child's records (age 12 and under) and manage the care of the elderly.

Policies and procedures regarding access to and release of medical records conform to state and federal laws and are designed to safeguard privacy. MyChart communications are carried over a secure, encrypted connection directly into the electronic medical record.

To enroll, forms must be completed and brought to West Bend Clinic, West Bend Clinic - South, Hartford Clinic, Jackson Clinic or Kewaskum Clinic with a photo I.D. When enrolled, patients will receive a secure access code that will allow them to enter the My-Chart Web site. Forms are available at any West Bend Clinic location







Patterson joins Teach for America



A native of Kewaskum has joined Teach For America, the national corps of top recent college graduates who commit to teach for two years in urban and rural public schools and become lifelong advocates for educational equity.

The recruit is Katie Patterson, a graduate of Kewaskum High School (2005) and the University of Wisconsin-Madison (2009).



Register now for September ACT Test

Registration is now open for the September 12, 2009 ACT achievement test. Students who wish to take the college admission and placement exam must register before August 7, 2009. The national ACT September exam is the earliest college admissions test date of the school year. For high school seniors, the September test is an excellent opportunity to receive test results in time for early decision applications.

The ACT is a curriculumbased achievement exam. It tests what students have actually learned in school, not their aptitude for learning. The ACT also measures what students need to know to be ready for entry-level college-credit courses based on ACT College Readiness Standards™. Every student's results can be tied directly to these consistent standards.

The ACT has four sections English, mathematics, reading and science - and takes about three hours to complete. Students who take the ACT Plus Writing complete an optional writing test that requires an additional 30 minutes. Unlike other exams, students are not penalized for guessing or answering all the questions on each test section. In fact, it is beneficial for test takers to answer all questions within the

time allowed.

During registration, students may select up to four universities to receive their score reports. ACT scores are accepted by all four-year colleges and universities across the United States. ACT reports scores only when requested to do so by the student. Additional score reports are available for a small

All students complete a detailed inventory of questions during ACT registration. Each test taker receives an ACT score report that includes a wide variety of information to assist with high school course selection, college readiness, career planning, and college admissions.

The cost for the ACT test without writing is \$32. When combined with the optional ACT Writing Test, the total cost is \$47. Students who qualify may apply for a fee waiver through their high school counselor.

The ACT website, www.actstudent.org, has helpful information, free sample items, and options to order inexpensive test prep materials to assist test takers get ready for the exam. However, the best preparation is to take rigorous core courses in school, study hard, and learn the academic skills needed in college.



But sometimes, the rules of grown-up games are strictly set and the stakes are more than mere bragging rights. In the new book "Sidney Sheldon's Mistress of the Game" by Tilly Bagshawe, the loser of this skirmish may end up penniless.

As Kate Blackwell's coffin was lowered into the ground, Alexandra Templeton and Eve Blackwell Webster stood sobbing over their grandmother's remains. Iron-fisted Kate had ruled over internationally-trading Kruger Brent for decades. She made the corporation the giant that it was, and now her only remaining heirs were grieving. But just one face had authentic tears.

Identical at birth, Eve and Alexandra were completely different now, physically and otherwise. Alexandra, glowing with pregnancy, was her grandmother's favorite and heir to the company. Eve, the victim of plastic surgery gone awry, was as disfigured inside as she was out. Though she, too, was pregnant, the glow emanating from her face came from burning anger.

Seeing Kate Blackwell's remains underground made Eve smile. She hated her grandmother, and she hated her sister. So when Alexandra died giving birth, Eve rejoiced. There was one less bother on her quest to re-

Despite a traumatic kidnapping when she was a child, motherless Lexi Templeton grew up to be a beautiful media darling, and rumor had it that she would be the next CEO of Kruger Brent. Handsome, dark-eyed Max, Lexi's cousin, inherited his father's looks and Eve's hatred for the other side of the Blackwell family, but his intelligence made him a valid contender, too. Both Lexi and Max had their supporters and distracters at Kruger Brent, and neither trusted the other - for good reason.

Max was fueled by his mother's hatred, but he severely underestimated his cousin. Kate Blackwell was ruthless in growing the corporation – and Lexi very definitely had her great-grandmother's blood in her veins.

Following author Sidney Sheldon's death in early 2007, it was inevitable that his family would hire someone to continue writing under his name. Readers should rejoice in their choice of Tilly Bagshawe.

With over-the-top wealthy characters who jet to other countries as easily as most of us cross the street, furtive financial wars, and barrelsful of scandal, it's easy to develop a love-hate relationship with almost everyone in this book – but yet the story wasn't predictable and the ending was satisfying. While I'm generally doubtful of these "writing under the name of" kinds of sequels, I'm happy to say that "Mistress of the Game" is very, very close to being vintage Sheldon.

Scandal-lovers should buy this book, or take their turn at the library because it's a great deal of fun. In fact, missing "Mistress of the Game" could be dicey.



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

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

First Fire Chief Nicholas Remmel

The Statesman Weekly Newspaper has been covering The Kewaskum Fire Department since we printed our first newspaper on October 5, 1895. The Statesman has been solely published by the Harbeck family since 1932. The department was founded by Nicholas Remmel, who also served as the department's first chief. Remmel is the father of Rose (Remmel) Harbeck, my great-grandmother. My great-grandfather Don Harbeck and grandfather Bill Harbeck also served the department for a number of years.

I've been covering the department since before I could drive. My father would drive me to fires and crashes. Firefighters like Bob Stoltzmann, Jim Schaub, "Tubby" Boden and Mark Herriges helped me in those early years, I'm quite grateful for how they took the time to offer advice and let me see them in action at such a young age. One of my first assignments was a barn fire at the Beck farm on Highway W in Wayne. Kewaskum and many other departments were called for mutual aid.

Covering the department has been a huge learning experience. I've really learned what dedication means to the members of the department. I've met them at all hours of the day and night, I've seem them leave their jobs and more importantly their families, I've seen them on holidays, I've seen them at multiple calls during a 24-hour period and sadly, I've seen them lose their own. What people don't realize is, aside from the emergency calls they answer, they do a lot more. The department trains weekly. They have continuing education they must attend on their own time. They have to maintain and clean equipment as well as the station.

I hope we have provided a keepsake for the firefighters and their families and an in-depth look at the department and their operations for our readers. It has been an honor and a privilege to cover The Kewaskum Fire Department and I look forward to documenting their history well into the future.







Kewaskum Fire Department history

Established on October 7, 1884, under the leadership of Nic Remmel, its first fire chief, The Kewaskum Fire Company came into existence with 17 active members. Remmel served until 1898

The first piece of fire equipment was acquired in 1886. Remmel, who owned Remmel Manufacturing Company of Kewaskum and his brother Mathias, made the first pump, which was used until 1898. This pump required over six men to operate and was placed on a hand drawn cart.


In 1898, the fire company grew to two companies of 30 members each, an engine company and bucket brigade, the other, a hook, ladder and hose company. Volunteers at that time mainly consisted of business owners.

The first apparatus was housed in a frame building that was later razed to make room for the new village hall.

A stationary 400-gallon per minute pump was installed at the Kewaskum Roller Mill in 1904; in addition hydrants were installed at L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Co. and at the corner of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue. The following year a hand drawn ladder cart and a hand drawn hose cart with 500 feet of two and one-half inch hose were obtained.

The first motorized pump, which could be mounted on a hand or horse drawn wagon, was purchased in 1912 from the Watrus Engine Works Company of St. Paul, Minnesota. Three years later, its first motorized fire engine, a Ford Model T chemical truck, was purchased from the American La France Company.

In July of 1916, the fire

department was changed from two to four companies. Hook and Ladder - Dr. William Klumb, Captain and J.H. Martin, Lieutenant; Hose - John Muehleis, Captain and Edward Guth, Lieutenant: Chemical - Nic Mertes, Captain and Fancher Colvin, Lieutenant; Engine - Ed. C. Miller, Captain and John Weddig, Lieutenant. Two years later the Kewaskum Village Board passed Ordinance #24 in December of 1918 that established the Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Department. which was to consist of a chief, assistant chief, and 22-30 men. All four companies were abolished and two divisions were created: engine and hose, which consisted of 12-15 men. and the chemical, hook and ladder division, which consisted of 10-12 men.

A fire siren was purchased from Pyrene Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee for \$300 in 1917 to alert firemen in the event of a fire or accident. It was replaced in January 1926, by a double head siren from Federal Electric Company of Chicago. At the time The Statesman reported, "This new type of fire alarm gives a peculiar penetrating tone, a fire call that is instantly recognized. Its very sound is a warning; be-

cause it is so different from all ordinary factory whistles, fire bells or other alarms. It is the loudest and most powerful electrical siren manufactured. It has two revolving fans, or cylinders, in the sounding mechanism. The effect is to double the volume of the sound. It has a remote control. and can be operated from any number of distant points. Two push-button switches are furnished with each control, one of which is placed in the central telephone office. In case of fire, central can be called who will set the siren in motion, the other will be placed in the fire house from where it can be operated. It will be put in place on a tower on top of the City

As the years passed, the department grew by consistently updating its equipment. In 1930 a used Reo truck owned by the city of Wauwatosa with a 300 gallon-perminute pump was purchased from Peter Pirsch and Company.

At a meeting in the village hall on May 3, 1932, it was announced that a large number of farmers have been approached on the matter of rural fire protection and all were very much interested in

the purchase of a modern fire truck. A plan to raise money by farmers surrounding the village limits would allow the department to purchase the fire truck. Each would pay a fee of \$15. The fee would cover the farmers for the life of the truck, would entitle the member to call the Kewaskum Fire Department, in return for which the Village of Kewaskum would be permitted to use the truck in emergencies.

A second pumper vehicle was purchased from Peter Persch and Sons of Kenosha for about \$6,000 in 1938. The vehicle was equipped with a 500 gallon-per-minute midship pump and 1,000 feet of two-and-one-half inch hose.

In February 1950, the Kewaskum Fire Department purchased a new Ford F7 2-1/2 ton truck chassis. In October a 500 gallon-per-minute pump was added at a cost of \$12,000.

In November 1950 a new fire truck was purchased from Grand Rapids, Michigan. The truck was outfitted by the West Bend Fire Apparatus Company.

In 1951, through the efforts of department member Marvin Martin, chief Schaefer

and Edward "Pat" Miller, a rescue squad became part of the Kewaskum Fire Department. Miller donated the first ambulance, a used Packard-Henney converted funeral coach. Martin served as Kewaskum's first Rescue Squad Captain. which was donated by E.E. Miller. The ambulance was called out for the first time Thursday afternoon, August 23. The ambulance was called to the scene of a truck-car crash on County Trunk H near Fillmore. A few vears later a used 1950 Cadillac Superior ambulance was purchased.

A 1953 International truck, equipped with an 1,800-gallon water tank was donated by Fairmont Foods Company of Kewaskum.

In 1955, a 1949 model equipment van was purchased and used until it was sold to the Beechwood Fire Department in 1963.

A Clintonville four-wheel drive, five-man cab, forward pumper was received in October 1963 at a cost of \$28,000.

In 1967 the department received a Chevrolet Suburban ambulance. In 1974, the department obtained a new Dodge ambulance. The Chevrolet was kept as a backup ambulance. Because of stricter state standards, five department members were trained as EMT's that year.

Ground was broken during a brief ceremony Monday afternoon, April 12, 1976 for construction of the new fire station off Fond du Lac Avenue. The project was expected to be completed by early fall. Village President Charles Miller turned over the first shovel of dirt. The Statesman reported that week "Fire Chief Augie Bilgo and Assistant Chief Rick Boden also put a little pressure on the shovel. All members of the village board namely Roger Strack, Raynor Herriges, Dan Schmidt, President Miller, Elmer Yoost, Gregor Nigh, and Dave Nigh, and some of the available fire department officers including George Koerble, Ed Miller, Chief Bilgo, Don Ehnert, Assistant Chief Boden, Paul Behring and Mike Fierke took part in the ceremony, as did Gary Petri, the architect on the project and Jim Kummer, representative of Badger Structures." Badger Structures was awarded the \$178,198 building contract on February 16, 1976.

The fire department moved into their new station at 1106 Fond du Lac Avenue the week of November 22, 1976. The new station was reported to cost over \$234,000. The Statesman newspaper noted on November 26, 1976 that firemen saved much added cost on the new station by

doing the painting, staining, laying of floor covering and a lot of other volunteer work themselves evenings and weekends.

The fire department purchased the "dream truck" of the late chief, Armin Oppermann, a 1975 Tele-Squirt pumper at a cost of just under \$74,000 in late August 1976. The vehicle was powered by a five-speed Ford caterpillar diesel engine and was purchased from the Snorkel Fire Equipment Company of St. Joseph, Missouri. The new pumper had a 50 foot boom with a snorkel on the end that can be operated at three different places: at the top of the boom, which is attached to a

ladder, at the back of the truck and by a remote control box that can be plugged into the truck and used several yards away. It uses a 1,000-gallon per minute pump. Other features include a 500-gallon water tank for water storage and a hydraulic operating system for the boom that can be rotated through 360 degrees in either direction. There are six different places on the truck to install hoses, so water can be sprayed on seven different places at once, if the snorkel is also used. This was the first diesel truck ever owned by the department. Firefighters had a 30-month wait before the ma-

chine arrived as at that time the equipment was not built until a department officially purchased it.

In 1979, the department purchased a new modular ambulance. That same year the department also received a "Jaws of Life" unit. The equipment, used to extract trapped victims from wrecks, was purchased and donated to the department by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

The fire department marked their 100th anniversary during their then annual picnic on Saturday and Sunday, July 7 and 8. The two-day celebration included two parades and festivities in River Hill Park.

At a special election held Sunday, April 8, 1990 Robert Stoltzmann was elected chief of the Kewaskum Fire Department by his fellow firefighters. Stoltzmann had been with the department since 1973 and prior to his selection as chief had served as First Captain. Also elected in the special election to one-year terms were: Mark Groeschel - Assistant Chief; Mark Herriges - First Captain; Andrew Pesch - Second Captain; First Lieutenant - James Schaub; Second Lieutenant - Thomas Fay; Rescue Captain - Todd Van Langen; Rescue Lieutenant - Tim Miller; Lieutenant Secretary - Phil Fellenz; Lieutenant Treasurer -Ronald Amerling. Stoltzmann replaced Donald "Ducky" Ehnert who had served since the retirement of Augie Bilgo in 1985. Ehnert served a total of 30 years with the department.

On September 5, 1991 the department received a new Jaws of Life extraction unit. The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club donated nearly \$14,000 for the equipment.

On Sunday, December 6, 1993. Robert Stoltzmann announced he would not seek reelection as chief of the department. Mark Groeschel, who previously served as Assistant Chief, replaced him. Mark Herriges, who was the First Captain, was named Assistant Chief. Andy Pesch, was named First Captain after serving as Second Captain, T.J. Fay was named Second Captain and previously served as the First Lieutenant. Pete Dickmann was named First Lieutenant and Dan Jung filled Second Lieutenant. The following officers were reelected to their previous positions: Rescue Captain, Larry Weston; Rescue Lieutenant, Larry Rauch; Lieutenant Secretary, Tom Herri-


ges and Lieutenant Treasurer, Ron Amerling.

On April 27, 2000 the department christened a 2000 aluminum engine truck manufactured by Pierce Manufacturing in Appleton. At that time, the department also celebrated the refurbishment of truck 1864, a 1984 engine truck that received an upgraded aluminum body.

On January 3, 2006 the Village of Kewaskum hired Groeschel, as it's first taxpayer paid, full-time chief.

Over its 125-year history, the department has grown under the guidance of its 12 fire chiefs: Nicholas Remmel, who served from 1884-1898; Nic Mertes, 1898-1915; Edward C. Miller, 1915-1916; John Schaefer, 1916-1920; H.W. Ramthun, 1920-1922; Charles Groeschel, 1922-1931; Harry Schaefer, who served the longest, a period of 30 years, from 1931-1961; Armin Oppermann, 1961-1975; Augie Bilgo, 1975- 1985; Donald "Ducky" Ehnert 1985-1990, Robert Stoltzman, 1990-1993, and present chief, Mark Groeschel who started 1993.

This history was researched searching the archives of The (Kewaskum) Statesman from 1895 until 2009. We recognize this is not a full history of all the department's activities. 




Remembering the rescues

The following are excerpts gleaned at random from The Statesman's archives. The clips are printed exactly as they were at the time of the original publication. The date of the publication precedes the many clips. This compilation was researched by Lana Kuehl:

MAY 22, 1926

William Heberer, of the town of Auburn, residing about two and one-half miles northeast of Kewaskum, suffered a heavy loss by fire, last Friday evening when a 30 x 60 foot machine shed, a granary and chicken coop, were completely destroyed. A truck in the shed is believed to have started the conflagration. The flames made such rapid headway that nothing except two automobiles housed in the shed could be saved. The Kewaskum Fire Department was called to the scene and assisted in saving the house and other buildings from destruction. With the buildings mentioned the following machinery was consumed by the flames: Clover huller, threshing machine, potato digger, corn cultivator, binder, corn binder, milk wagon, potato planter, sulky plow, hay rake, corn planter and mower. Besides this nearly all of the chickens, bee hives, several barrels of oil. farm tools and other utensils were burned to ashes. The loss is estimated between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

JUNE 12, 1926

EXTRA! Shortly after the noon hour yesterday, Friday, the Fire Department was called out to extinguish a fire in the old feed mill. The building is a one-story structure located on Wilhelmina Street. It for the past two months had been rented by Charles Knoebel, who is living in the same, People walking by noticed flames emerging from the window

of the building. Through the prompt action of the fire lads, not much damage was done.

MARCH 19, 1927

On Thursday afternoon at about 3 pm, fire of unknown origin practically destroyed the farm home of Cornelius Fellenz, better known as the John P. Fellenz residence, located about two miles north of Kewaskum, on State Trunk Highway 55. Upon arriving at the scene of the conflagration, the fire had gained such headway that it was impossible to get it under control with the chemical engine. A second alarm was then sent in and the fire engine was sent out. While the latter was enroute to the fire, the chemical was used to save the other buildings on the premises, which at one time were very much in danger. The fire on these buildings, however, was kept in check until the fire engine arrived, after which the flames were soon put under control. The loss is estimated between \$7,000 and \$8,000. The furniture was saved.

AUGUST 19, 1932

Fire early Tuesday morning completely destroyed the farm residence, together with all household furniture on the Wendt Brothers farm, better known as the Julius Geier or John Engler farm, 3-1/2 miles northeast of the village. The Inkman family had a very close call of being caught in the flames, as they were forced to escape with only what clothes they could grab. The Kewaskum Fire Department was called, but as the report came that nothing could be done to save the house, the chemical apparatus was rushed to the scene merely to protect the nearby barn and other sheds. The loss was estimated at approximately \$3,000.

AUGUST 9, 1940

A fire caused by a bolt of lightning striking the steeple of the Peace Evangelical Church in the village during an electrical storm at about 5 am last Saturday morning, did extensive damage to the interior of the edifice. Pastor Richard M.A. Gadow and Fire Chief Harry Schaefer of the Kewaskum Fire Department estimated the damage at between \$2,000 and \$3,000. Chief Schaefer sent the first group of firemen up inside the steeple with a hose where their work could be the most effective. Part of this group narrowly missed being injured when a trap door from the tower. which had burned loose, fell to the floor below as the firemen were ascending the ladder. One fireman, Albert Hron Jr., was injured when struck on the head by the nozzle of the hose.

SEPTEMBER 20, 1940

Residents of St. Michaels were greatly shocked about 4:15 Monday afternoon when a cloud of smoke attracted them to a barn fire on the John Lehnerz farm, located about three miles southeast of Kewaskum. The barn, together with an adjoining machine shed and the contents of both were completely destroyed. The fire started in the grain stored under the roof in the upper part of the barn and spread rapidly that within a few minutes the entire barn was ablaze and it was impossible to save much besides the house and other small buildings. The Kewaskum and Barton Fire Departments were both called to the scene. The barn, machine shed, farm tools and machinery, straw stack and entire crop yield of this year, including about 10 tons of hay and 1,300 bushels of grain were destroyed.

MAY 26, 1950

Kewaskum firemen were called out at 11:30 pm Wednesday to the Monroe "Bob" Stahl farm north of Beechwood during a thunderstorm. The barn burned to the ground after it was struck by lightening. By the time the local firemen were called only the foundation of the barn remained standing and the blaze was beginning to burn itself out with the help of a heavy rain. The rain helped prevent adjoining buildings from catching fire.

At 6 am the same morning the firemen received a call from the Kewaskum Utensil Company when fire broke out in the plant's dust collector outside of the building. No one was injured.

DECEMBER 29, 1950

The New Fane mill, a century old landmark at New Fane, was completely destroyed by fire early Thursday morning. Loss was set at \$15,000. The historic mill, located on the east branch of the Milwaukee River at the southeastern tip of Fond du Lac County, was owned and operated in recent years by Fred and Henry Dickman, brothers. The fire was discovered by a passing motorist shortly before 1 am and it already had a good start. By the time the fire department arrived the building was enveloped in flames. The blaze, fanned by a high wind, spread very rapidly and the mill was beyond saving when firemen reached the premises. The firemen, called out in subzero weather, remained on the scene until nearly 3 am, protecting the Dickman home nearby and other buildings. Cause of the fire is unknown.

AUGUST 17, 1951

Fire which was believed to have started by the generation of heat in a threshing machine blower, caused an estimated \$25,000 damage at the Herman Falk farm in the Town of Auburn, Route 3. Campbellsport, Saturday afternoon. The farm is tenanted by the Albert Wesenberg Jr. family. The flames shot up from the blower into the havmow and destroyed the main 36 by 66-foot barn, an 18 x 24foot granary, adjoining sheds, 800 bushels of grain, 1,000 bales of hay, and eight bags of clover seed. Also lost in the fire were a tractor and other farm machinery, tools, dairy equipment and other supplies. The livestock was removed from the barn at the start of the fire. Both the Kewaskum and Campbellsport fire departments were called.

AUGUST 27, 1976

The barn on the Albion Lehnerz farm located on Mill Road just west of New Fane, northeast of Kewaskum, was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon. The roof was already caving in and the barn was engulfed in flames when firemen arrived and damage to the barn was nearly a total loss. The fire broke out while the Lehnerz family was putting straw in the barn and had gone out for another load. The barn, about 40 by 80 feet in size, was almost full of hay, oats and straw. Only the lower portion of the barn and milkhouse were saved. With southwest winds blowing, a chicken coop on the John Felten farm across the road also was smoking but the Felten grandsons doused this fire.

JANUARY 28, 1977

Fire completely destroyed the upper portion of a 136 foot by 40 foot barn on the Henry Oppermann farm on East Auburn-Ashford Drive west of New Fane, about three miles north of Kewaskum Monday night. Kewaskum firemen

were called to the scene about 10 pm. Also reported damaged was a Harvestore silo and the milk house. The roof of the milk house was burned off but the equipment was saved. Oppermann was able to save all the livestock which included over 60 milk cows and several young calves. When Kewaskum firemen arrived the entire sky was aglow.

JANUARY 25, 1990

An early evening fire Monday, January 22, 1990, destroyed a two-story storage shed on the Lloyd Roden farm located at 8459 Kettle Moraine Drive in Kewaskum.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was called to the scene at 6:30 pm. Firefighters found the building engulfed in flames with strong winds fanning the blaze. The department called for mutual aid requesting a tanker truck from Boltonville Fire Department.

By 7:15 pm the firemen had the fire extinguished except for a few hot spots. The crew remained on the scene until approximately 9:30 pm.

The structure was vacant and no other property was damaged or lost as a result of the fire. Kewaskum Fire Chief Don Ehnert said the fire appeared to have been caused by electrical wiring in the shed.

April 26, 1990

A fire early Wednesday morning completely destroyed a home under construction on Hickory Drive, north of Highway 28, in the Town of Kewaskum. The blaze was discovered by a neighbor who was awakened by the smell of smoke. The Kewaskum Fire Department received the first call about 4 am. When firefighters arrived on the scene the house was totally engulfed by the inferno. The Kewaskum Fire Department then called for mutual aid from Beechwood, Boltonville and Campbellsport. The newly completed home, estimated to be worth over \$300,000 was being built by Wayne and Rose Riekkoff.

NOVEMBER 1, 1990

Almost 100 firemen battled a suspected arson fire which destroyed a 75 x 300 foot pole building at the Brookside Poultry Farm on Wescott Road in the Town of Farmington. Boltonville Fire Department was the first called to

the scene and requested full department mutual aid from Kewaskum, Beechwood, and Fillmore Fire Departments. Kewaskum assisted with manpower and equipment including their telesquirt which was used to pour water down on the fire.

JANUARY 16, 1992

Billowing clouds of dense smoke filled the Kewaskum sky Tuesday morning, January 14, when the Barrel Haus tavern and restaurant located on the corner of Main Street and Railroad Streets, was the scene of one of the largest fires in the village's history. The Kewaskum Fire Department responded to the call around 10:15 am, when it was discovered by the owner, James Rinas, The Boltonville and Campbellsport fire departments were called in to assist with manpower and equipment.

The fire apparently originated in the kitchen area, where the flames quickly spread in the overhead exhaust fan and up into the walls.

Thick smoke rolled through the village for hours, fanned by strong northerly

winds. At times visibility was reduced to zero hampering the efforts of the firefighters. The dense, choking smoke permeated into surrounding businesses and at one point, evacuation of Holy Trinity School was considered due to the school's close proximity to gasoline containment units.

The fire completely destroyed the building and its contents, including two upstairs apartments. Firemen remained on the scene throughout the day and into the evening. The corner building was a Kewaskum landmark, originally built as the Central Hotel over 100 years ago.

APRIL 16, 1992

Washington County's first and second traffic fatalities of 1992 came as a result of a fiery two-car accident Sunday afternoon at the intersection of Forest View and County Line Roads in the Town of Kewaskum. Killed in the crash were James J. Netzer, 20, of Random Lake, and David Grimes, 17, also of Random Lake. The Kewaskum Fire Department and Rescue Squad arrived on the scene just minutes after the crash, remained on the scene for about two hours.

Besides the burning vehicles and attending to the victims, the firefighters had to extinguish a grass fire which erupted in the hayfield as a secondary result of the accident, potentially threatening two homes directly to the south due to the brisk north wind. Three Kewaskum firefighters were also injured fighting the fires and trying to rescue the victims, and were transported to St. Joseph's Hospital. Netzer and Grimes perished in their vehicle despite valiant efforts by firemen and private citizens to rescue them.

SEPTEMBER 7, 1998

The Kewaskum Fire Department lost one of their own in a multiple vehicle crash involving two Washington County Sheriff's Deputies



responding to assist a Kewaskum Police Officer.

John "Spike" Schmitt, 31, of Kewaskum, an eight-year veteran of the Washington County Sheriff's Department and member of the Kewaskum Fire Department was pronounced dead as a result of injuries he suffered in a three-car accident that injured several people.

The accident happened when Schmitt's partner, Donald Kapla attempted to maneuver around a pickup truck that had not pulled over to allow the squad through. The squad car then sideswiped a southbound car and went out of control.

Schmitt was active as a firefighter and EMT. His brother Pat was one of the many personnel who responded to the scene.



Former Holy Trinity Pastor, Father Mark Jones told mourners that "Maybe when you hear a siren, say a prayer for the person who is putting his life on the line, and maybe a second prayer for the one who is in need."

Over 75 departments with over 180 squad cars joined in the funeral procession from all over the state. Gov. Thompson ordered the US flag to fly at half mast on the Capital in honor of Deputy Schmitt.
