## 16th annual KEYS Run brings out 800 despite less than ideal temps

**VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM-** A new course. Two new record times. And the same old Kewaskum community spirit highlighted Sunday's 16th annual K.E.Y.S. (Kewaskum Youth Scholarship) 5 K Run/ Walk, according to Jerry Gosa, the perennial coordinator of the event.

"We had approximately 800 people. We had 90 sign up the day of the event," Gosa said Monday evening. "When you look at what's going on in the economy and how damp and cold the weather has been, it's (the turnout) a wonderful show of support for the KEYS Scholarship organization. We're very pleased ... The community comes out. They believe in what we do."

While the event is held basically to raise funds for scholarships for Kewaskum High students and consists mainly of amateur joggers and walkers, there were some serious runners who participate.

First to cross the finish line was Andy Ruffalo of West Bend. He

toured the new, 5-kilometer course in a time of 16 minutes and 37 seconds (16:37), 17 seconds ahead of Jason Meyer, a former cross country and track standout at New Holstein High and former collegiate runner, who now resides in Grafton.

Madison's Bethany Brewster was the fastest woman in the race. Her time was 17:58.

"What's interesting is the girl finished third overall, just one minute and four seconds behind second place," Gosa said.

Both of the top runners were in the categories from 19 to 29 years old.

These times were fast, faster than the records on the old course. Kyle Moss held the old men's mark of 17 minutes flat, according to Gosa, who said Sue Daggett Miller holds the women's record on the old course, an 18:58, "so a whole minute was taken off that."

Concerning the new course, Gosa said, "We don't cross Highway 45 anymore ... it's a lot safer and a lot easier on traffic" as it uses some of the Eisenbahn Trail, which is limited

to runners and cyclists.

While exact totals were not available Monday on how much money was raised, Gosa is confident it will be close to 2008 when 825 participated. "When the economy changes, I'm hopeful we'll get back up to 900 or maybe even 1,000. We've only broken 1,000 once."

Gosa also praised his group of volunteers, including Jackie Burtard, who handles the management of the money that is raised from the race, Ric Leitheiser, the KEYS treasurer, and Connie Zemlicka, who, he said, does a good job recording the participants' bib numbers with the times they cross the finish line.

Gosa praised three of the local elementary schools for their participation in the event. "Wayne and Farmington and Kewaskum Elementary Schools did really well this year," he said. They literally practice for this.

"For one day, we're on the same page, doing the same thing, for the good of all," he concluded.

The top places winners of all the age groups will be included in next week's Statesman.

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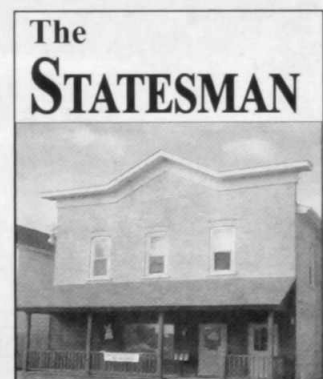

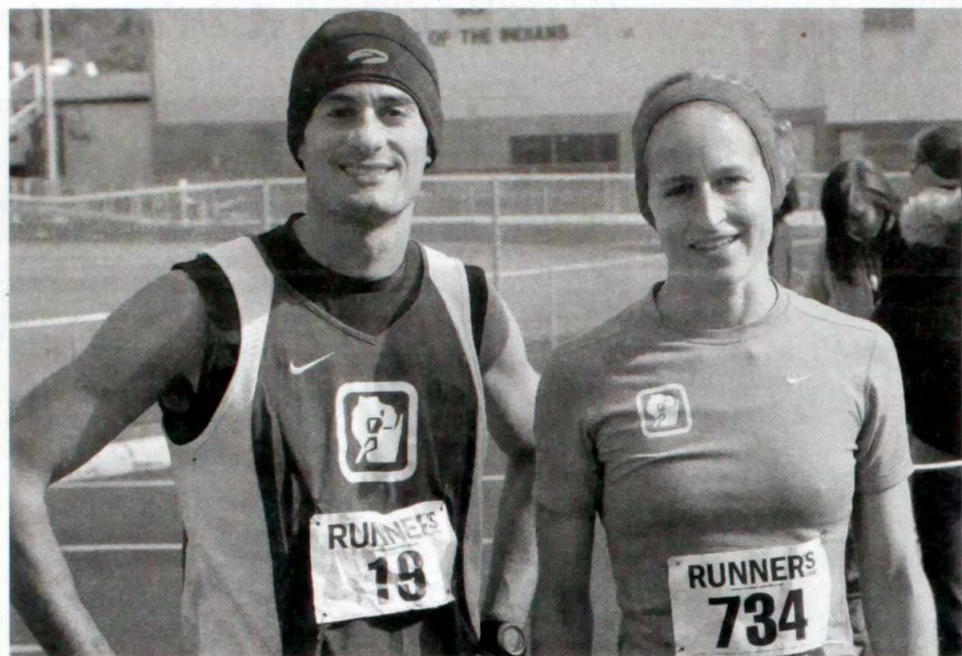

## Village Board Briefs

### Board drowns 3% water increase

Attention, village residents: Your water bills aren't rising by 3 percent.

The Village Board last week unanimously denied an option to raise the water utility rate by 3 percent, despite the allowance to do so from the Public Service Commission.

Village President Andrew Pesch voted it down because of the "static" the village is already getting from the present water bills.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann said he "almost choked" when he received his nearly \$1,000 water bill for his Dairy Queen restaurant. \$1,000 used to cover an entire year.

"I just can't vote for a 3 percent increase now," he said.

Public Works Director Jerry Gilles said the water utility's rate of return is down to

2 percent and not raising the rate now may result in a larger increase in the future.

The vote was 5-0. Trustees Harry Roecker and Steve Schuenemann were absent.

### Sump pump ordinance now in place

Kewaskum residents may want to make sure their sump pumps are in compliance.

The Village Board approved a sump pump ordinance and inspection procedure in order to minimize storm water entering the wastewater treatment facility.

The inspection procedure claims the village is suffering from clear water entering its sanitary sewer system after large rains, and an examination wasn't able to identify the source.

The procedure and ordinance call for the village build-

ing inspector to enter private residences to inspect sump pump discharge connections.

Initial inspections will be done at each residence on a schedule agreed upon by the building inspector and property owner.

Sump pump discharge piping must discharge to the structure's exterior or connect to the storm water lateral. Sanitary sewer connections are prohibited.

Those in noncompliance will be notified and given 30 days to fix the problem. A second inspection will be done after 30 days.

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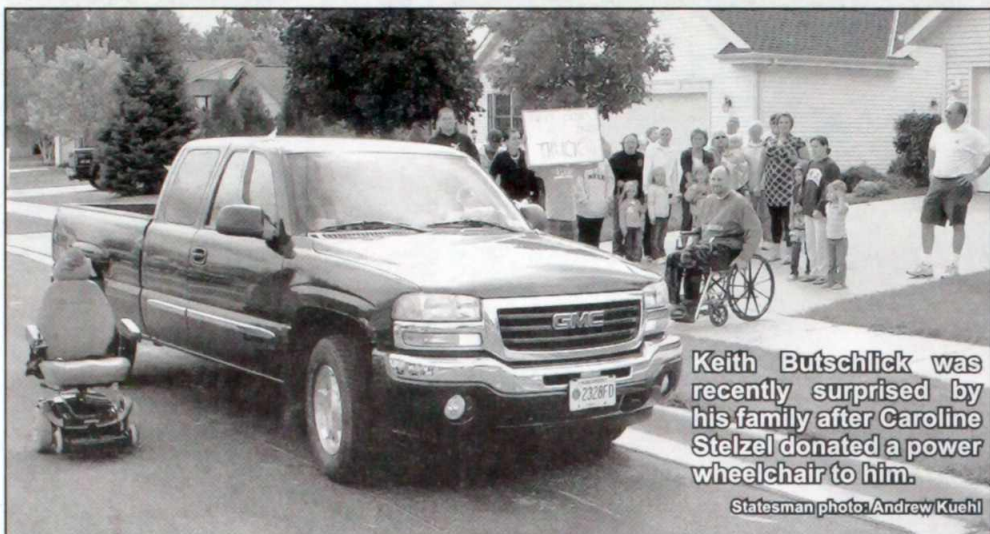
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## Family planning benefit for Keith Butschlick Oct. 24

Keith Butschlick isn't the kind of guy who wants a benefit held in his honor.

It may make him all the more deserving, and his family wasn't about to give up.

At 24, the Kewaskum native was diagnosed with Friedrich Ataxia, a genetic disease that slowly deteriorates the nervous system. His brother, Jason, died from the disease in 2002.

Keith and his three other siblings got tested after Jason's death. Only Keith had it. He had a pacemaker put in to prolong his life.

Keith, married with two young girls, has already outlived doctors' expectations. Keith's wife, Carmen, knew about the disease the entire time they have been together.

No cure or treatment exists for the disease, but his cousin said something can be done.

"There is a medication you can take to prolong it," said Katie Fechter, one of the event organizers.

A benefit on Oct. 24 at the Boltonville Firehouse will go toward expenses for Keith to see a specialist to help prolong his life.

While the disease attacked Jason's heart, Keith's legs were the victims. The disease gets progressively worse and Keith cannot walk without assistance of a walker.

The family gathers for an annual family camp-out but this year, Keith couldn't stay overnight because it was difficult for him to maneuver a walker and his sadly his two daughters wondered why their dad could not spend the night.

That's when Fechter and her sister, Carrie, stepped up.

"We were camping on Sunday and the next day we said let's do it," Fechter said of the benefit.

That day a printer began making posters. Carrie and Fechter began business hopping around Kewaskum.

"Everybody knew him and contributed, cousins and aunts and uncles as well," Fechter said.

Among the raffle prizes are four tickets to the Nov. 1 Green Bay Packers game against the Brett Favre-led Vikings and a tailgate party at Favre's Steakhouse before the game, an autographed Packer Simplicity tractor and photos of the 1996 Super Bowl team, a football autographed by the 2008 Packers and \$150 cash.

Keith's parents, Tony and Sue Butschlick are amazed.

"They're shocked that it's happening and how good it's going," Fechter said.

Family and friends already presented Keith with a prize. New Fane resident Caroline Stelzel, said her husband died before he could use it. Upon hearing of Keith's benefit, she decided to give it to him.

The family did it up big. Nobody told Keith until it was time to present the scooter, and they hid it behind a truck in the street. Like the popular show "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition," everyone chanted "Move that truck" to reveal the scooter.

"He was ecstatic," Fechter said. "It was so cute because he said I'm not sure on what I can say, but I am really good at giving hugs."

Initially telling Keith about the benefit didn't go quite as smoothly, but he was persuaded.

"I knew he was going to

say no. He wanted us to do the benefit to find a cure for the disease, not to benefit himself," Fechter said.

They told him they wanted to do it for him.

"He eventually accepted it," she said.

Keith's friends were blown away. They tried a similar effort five years ago and "he said absolutely not."

"He's the kind of guy who thinks of others first," Fechter said.

Now it's others' turn.

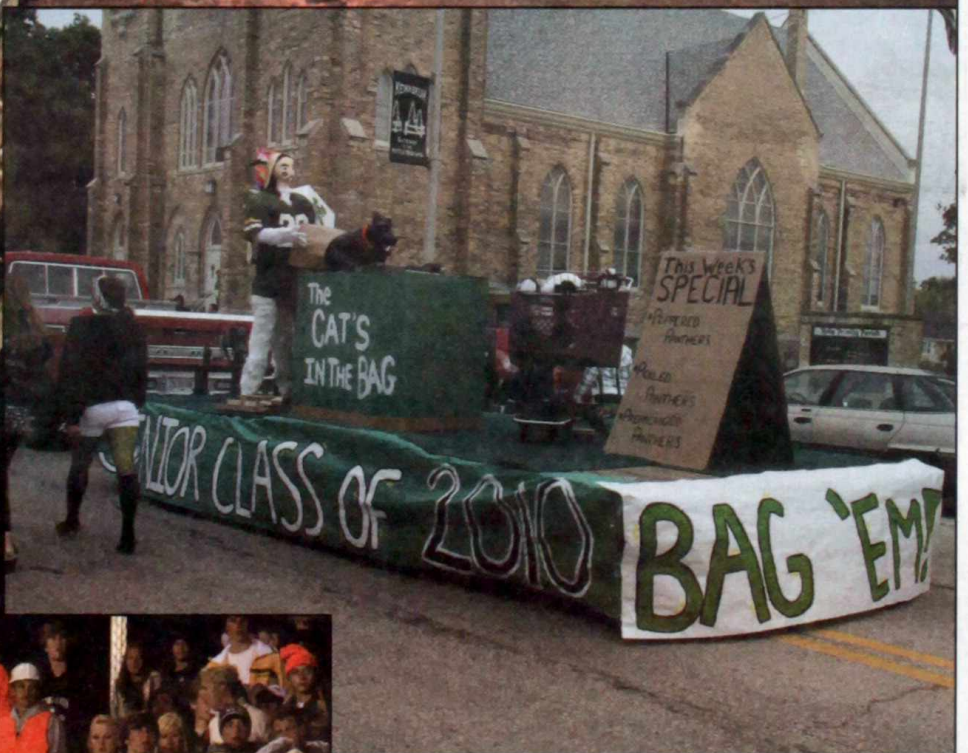

For a third consecutive year, Mrs. Robrahn's first grade class at Farmington Elementary School (FES) has participated in the monarch tag and release program. They do this with the assistance of Mary Laatsch who is certified in the tag and release program.

This year, the class tagged six butterflies that they raised in class with the hopes they will safely make the trek to Mexico.

Students learn about the life of a monarch from egg to caterpillar to chrysalis to butterfly. They learn how to identify butterfly gender, how to properly tag butterflies, how to release butterflies and more.

"Every year the students ask a question I can't answer and then I do the research and learn alongside the kids," said Laatsch.

Last year, Laatsch had one of her tagged monarchs logged in at the Mexico butterfly sanctuary. It was not a monarch tagged at FES, but it was one from the Kewaskum area. She received a certificate which she shared with the class. It was exciting for the students to know that butterflies from our area successfully make the nearly 3,000 mile, three month journey.

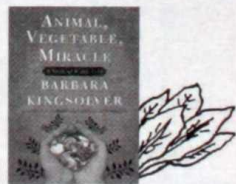

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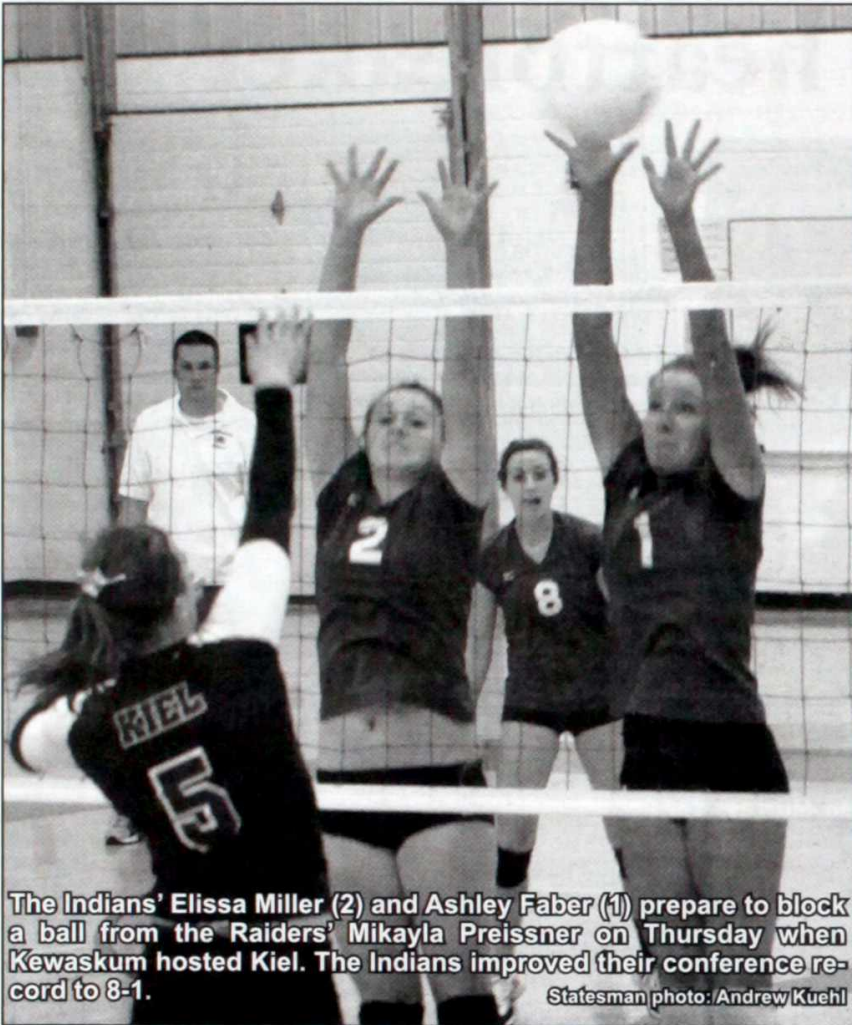
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## Indian netters turn the tables on Kiel at home

Senior and parents night turned out to be revenge night last Thursday for Kewaskum's volleyball team.

After losing to Kiel in a tournament the Saturday before, it was time to even the score at home and solidify second place in conference.

"We just came out of a loss. Our defense we worked a lot on so we had some good ups," said senior Erika Heberer.

The Indians battled back from a 22-18 deficit to take Game 1, 25-23 and held off a late run to win Game 2, 25-18, before losing a neck-in-neck Game 3, 25-23.

Kewaskum pulled away midway through Game 4 to seal the match, 25-18. The Indians moved to 8-1 in conference with one match at Plymouth left before Saturday's conference tournament. Kiel slipped to 6-3.

A look at the stat sheet says it was senior night for Kewaskum's super six. Elissa Miller had 11 kills and Monica Dehler 10. Heberer had 21 assists and five kills and Ashley Faber 15 assists and five kills. Lauren Gonring had 12 digs, sophomore Kayla Bastian nine, Faber seven, Haley Rauch six and Heberer five. Miller served up five aces.

"We practiced a lot after that Saturday match," said Coach Joe Moser. Kiel's Katie Freitag, who had 12 kills in two games against the Indians in the tournament, was held to nine in four games.

He was impressed with the dig totals, one benchmark of hustle - "a lot of people moving around," he said.

Moser was especially pleased with Bastian, who served 15 times with two aces and no errors.

Game 1 featured 12 tie scores, the second last at 17-17 before Kiel began to pull away.

A couple of errors helped Kewaskum get back to 23-21 when Rauch took over serving. Her first serve caught the top of the net and dropped to the floor for an ace. Miller had a block kill to tie it at 23-23. Faber smashed a kill to the back court for the lead and a Kiel kill attempt that fell out of bounds finished the game.

"Every time I serve I say mentally 'Just get it in,'" Rauch said.

"We just talked about consistency," Moser said. "We let them get ahead by missing our serves and hitting the ball into the net. Once we cleared up those errors we came back and won."

Up 13-9 in Game 2, Miller went on a 6-0 serving run that included two aces, a dig from Dehler that turned into a bump kill and a corner-to-corner smash from Bastian that caught all floor.

Up 20-10, Bastian served the Indians to 23-10 on three Purple Raider errors.

After Kewaskum getting all the bounces early, Kiel closed to 24-18 before George Abfall had enough. A blast down the middle was deflected and flew out of bounds to finish the game.

Kiel built an 18-13 lead in Game 3 before the Indians fought back to take a 21-19 lead. This time, Kiel won the fight to the finish. After ties at 21-21, 22-22 and 23-23, two Kewaskum kill attempts missed their mark, the last on a long rally, and the table was set for Game 4.

Tied at 8-8, the Indians built a 13-10 lead they would maintain most of the game through trading points. At 18-15, Kewaskum pulled away to 24-16 with the help of three Heberer kills and one from Dehler.

Dehler closed out the match with a tip that fell to the floor.

Game 4 featured sideout runs of six, four and four. Moser said he doesn't mind trading points as long as he has a lead.

"We can side back right away and we're still up by three," he said.

The Indians know more work is on the table to finish the season strongly.

Last weekend's Washington County tournament gave Kewaskum some tough competition to prepare it for the stretch run.

The Indians finished with two straight wins, beating Living Word Lutheran, 25-10, 25-16, and avenging a loss to Hartford earlier in the day, 25-23, 25-21.

In the morning round, Kewaskum started by losing to Hartford, 19-25, 23-25.

"Close games. Played well, but

couldn't put together the runs when we needed them," Moser said.

The Indians were then edged in three-game matches against Germantown, 25-23, 14-25, 6-15, and West Bend West, 25-17, 16-25, 7-15.

"We played really well in the first games limiting our errors, keeping the ball in play and putting in our serves. Then in the following two games we would seem to give up a run on four or five points on serve receive and then just not be able to come back," Moser said. "We were close in the third against West, but Miller sprung a bloody nose around 7 to 7 and we kind of fell apart from there."

"After lunch we beat Living Word Lutheran and was able to play some bench players. We also beat Hartford in the rematch when they didn't seem excited to play us again," Moser said. "More consistent passing will be our focus in practice this week."

**KEWASKUM-** It was Oct. 8, 2004, almost five years to the day. The opponent was Sheboygan Falls, the score 14-7.

That's the last time the Indians walked off their field with less points than their opponents.

Until last Friday.

Plymouth beat the Indians 14-6 to spoil homecoming and get the inside track to the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title. The Panthers moved to 5-0 (6-1 overall) and the Indians 4-1 (6-1 overall).

Statistically, Kewaskum was doing all right long but still had a couple of chances in the end.

With 5:31 left in the game, Plymouth fumbled a punt return and Tony Crossman recovered. Kewaskum had the ball on the Panthers' 42.

Crossman gained seven on a short pass from Cody Nuernberg and two runs by Cody Seibel had Kewaskum on the Panthers' 30. On second and 10, Nuernberg looked for Bo Seibel down the left sideline but was intercepted inside the 10. Mat Toles sprinted over and laid a tick on the defensive back to negate a return.

With 4:08 left and Plymouth at its own eight, the Indians' defense held tough, holding three runs to two yards.

Brandon Zolp fair caught the punt at the Panthers' 39 with 2:37 left and Kewaskum tried one more time.

Seibel went nowhere on a pitch right, and Nuernberg threw incomplete on second down. He scrambled for two yards on third down and another seven up the middle on fourth, falling a yard short and allowing Plymouth to run out the clock.

"The kids kept slugging away. We gave ourselves a chance," said Coach Jason Piittmann.

The game will be one to re-

member for Plymouth senior linebacker and running back Ian Murray.

"Their homecoming on their home field, beating them, I mean, this is awesome, the greatest feeling," he said. "Best high school atmosphere I've ever played in. It was awesome. So loud, it was great. And getting a W makes it even better."

Plymouth seemed bigger and stronger most of the night, outgaining the Indians 271 yards to 178. The Panthers held Seibel, the conference's leading rusher with four straight 100-yard games, to 21 yards on 13 carries. Nuernberg ran 13 times for 41 yards.

Plymouth's big gun, Hayden Potts, finished with 30 carries for 177 yards, singlehandedly almost outgaining the entire Kewaskum team.

That, said Plymouth coach Dan Knaus, was the key - "our ability to stop the run compared to theirs."

"Our defense played great, we've been playing great all year, physical all night ... just stuffing the run making them one dimensional, making them pass the ball," said linebacker and running back Ian Murray.

Kewaskum mixed in some new offensive formations with different receivers lining up wide - nothing Plymouth would have seen on film.

"We knew we were going to have to do something to keep Plymouth off balance. They're a very good football team, a good offensive team and a good defensive team," Piittmann said.

Kewaskum took an early lead on a bad snap on a punt by Murray. From the Plymouth 33, the ball sailed over the punter's head and by the time he picked it up and tried to kick it, Indians swarmed. Toles blocked it and Kewaskum took over on the Panthers' nine.

On third and goal from the five, Nuernberg faked a pitch left to Seibel, rolled right and found an open Bo Seibel streak-

ing toward the sideline in the end zone. The point after was blocked and the Indians went up 6-0 with 6:07 left in the first quarter.

Plymouth evened the score late in the quarter on a 47-yard run by Potts, who found a hole up the middle and was gone. The PAT was good and Plymouth had a 7-6 lead.

The team's traded punts in the second quarter before Plymouth then regained, driving from its own 36 to Kewaskum's 1, converting a fourth and 1 on a quarterback sneak on the drive.

From the Indians' seven, Potts ran right for three, Murray up the middle for two and then one, setting up fourth and goal from the 1. The Indians had been giving up chunks of yardage in the running game on the drive and it looked to be academic.

Not this time. The entire middle of the line got a huge push and shoved Murray back a yard, dodging a bullet and escaping with a halftime deficit of only one.

In the third quarter on fourth and two from the Panthers' 26, Plymouth returned the favor. Steven Chapman didn't have a chance as he was pushed back the instant he got the handoff as Plymouth dodged a bullet of its own.

Plymouth had another fourth and one to start the fourth quarter, driving from its own 26 to Kewaskum's 21. This time, Potts tried the middle but Chapman and Jordan Blank converged to hold him to no gain.

On the ensuing possession on third and seven, Nuernberg scrambled to the right sideline and came back left and saw a wide open C.J. Bowe. He threw on the pitch as the crowd gasped in anticipation. Just as Bowe reached out his hands to catch the ball, defensive back Craig Grosshuesch knocked it away to prevent a huge gain and force a punt.

After the punt, Plymouth

went to work on the 50 and wouldn't be denied. Potts gained 51 yards on four of five plays - Kewaskum held Murray to a one-yard loss on the other - as Plymouth took a 14-6 lead with 7:10 to play.

Three more Indian possessions resulted in no points as the Panthers held on.

Nuernberg finished 10-23 with 116 yards and a touch-down and interception. He hit six different receivers and found some new targets in Seibel and Toles, who hadn't caught passes all season. Zolp, the team's leading receiver and return specialist, caught five balls for 65 yards and was held to one punt return for zero yards.

The Indians had already clinched a playoff spot with the Oct. 2 win at Two Rivers, and after Friday's loss Piittmann gave a speech the first of its kind in five years.

"I said if you stay with me, we're going to have a successful close to the season and we'll see how deep," he said. "Football is a game about life. You gotta overcome adversity. You gotta respond versus react."

On Friday, the Indians get their chance to respond at Sheboygan Falls which lost 43-21 last week to Waupun. The Falcons are 2-3 in the conference, 4-3 overall. The Indians close at home against New Holstein.

Plymouth hosts Two Rivers and nearby rival Sheboygan Falls to close out its season. Kewaskum is the only team that can mathematically catch the Panthers for the conference title.

"That's all we're going to harp on this week. For us, that was the only downer to me all night. Dang, how can't we get those two fourth and ones. We could have put them away."

## THE STREAK

Kewaskum's 30-game home winning streak began Sept. 2, 2005, with a 25-14 victory over Cedar Grove-Belgium. The last win was a 22-7 score over Waupun on Sept. 25, 2009.

The run was threatened in 2006 when it took overtime to beat Kiel, 13-7, on Oct. 13. The closest game came on Nov. 4, 2006, a 29-26 playoff win over Waupun.

The stretch included nine playoff games, five shutouts and 20 times holding opponents to seven points or less.

Kewaskum outscored its opponents 834-234 for an average of 27.8 to 7.8.

The conference streak reached 16 games, starting with a 44-6 win over Manitowish Roncalli on Sept. 9, 2005. The Indians outscored their EWC opponents 463-132, an average of 28.9 to 8.3.
