TIF developer suing village for trespassing, contract bread

VILLAGE of KEWASKUM- Local developer Gary Gavin is suing the village of Kewaskum for trespassing and breaching the developer's agreement in the village's embattled tax incremental finance (TIF) district.

The lawsuit, filed in June, includes plaintiffs Gavin and his two land development corporations, Nature Haven LLC and Kewaskum Trading Post LLC within the 115-acre TIF district.

According to the lawsuit, in late 2004 and early 2005, Gavin discussed with the village developing the 37acre Trading Post, located on the south end of the village along Highway 45. Gavin approved development plans done by engineers Ruekert Mielke Inc. and submitted them to the village.

The plan included two storm water retention ponds, leaving 27 developable acres. Gavin told the village the development plans were to maximize the number of develop-

During the same time, Bullseye

Construction LLC and United Construction Group Inc. (collectively called United) contacted Gavin and the village with plans to purchase and develop Trading Post and certain lots of Nature Haven Subdivision in a \$100 million project in which Gavin says United Construction Group made a deal with the Village to pay back \$8 million of infrastructure

Bullseye Construction was tied to Laurance Chmielewski, a local resident and United Construction Group to his brother Gregory Chmielewski, a former Kewaskum resident.

Gavin entered into contracts to sell Trading Post and certain lots of Nature Haven.

The village negotiated a developer's agreement with United in which the village would do improvements for Nature Haven, Trading Post and other TIF District properties while the developer would do certain improvements to developer-owned properties.

The village, the lawsuit claims, did not inform Gavin on the nature or status of negotiating that agreement though Gavin still owned the

The village presented Gavin with the developer's agreement on July 8, 2005, and said he must execute the agreement immediately if he wanted any help developing the property. The village told Gavin an amended developer's agreement would be done later to substitute United for Gavin and impose developer's responsibilities on United.

Gavin executed the developer's agreement, the lawsuit says.

United submitted a develop-

ment plan for Trading Post that differed from Gavin's, namely in that two retention ponds were situated to decrease developable land by two acres. The additional acreage was taken from the most valuable portion of Trading Post, the lawsuit claims.

The village approved United's plan in part because it benefitted landowners in the TIF District other than Gavin, the lawsuit says. The village did not consult Gavin about the plan before approval despite Gavin

Kewaskum Township sets 2010 budget

TOWN of KEWASKUM- A small crowd of electors quietly approved a 2010 town budget of \$462,527.75 without comment Monday night.

The tax levy was set at \$286,659. compared to \$273,562 in 2009.

Town Clerk Nancy Boden said the tax levy rise is the maximum allowed by the state. Town treasurer Daniel W. Stoffel, who typically leads the annual budget hearing, was home sick.

There are numerous changes in this year's budget. The town will receive no funds from Use Value Assessment, one of four tax sources, for the second straight year, Boden

The town has also budgeted to receive \$4,000 for the lottery credit and \$6,300 for payments in lieu of taxes, Boden said.

"We only receive money from that if farmland has changed to be residential," she said.

The 2009 budget also included \$2,547.36 in county aid that will not be available this year, Boden said.

Shared revenue from the state dropped from \$34,523 this year to a projected \$29,345, Boden said. State highway aid, however, will rise from \$76,670.75 in 2009 to \$78,192.75 in

The town will also apply for a \$20,000 sign grant to replace aging and damaged road signs on town roads, Boden said.

The town's largest budgeted expenditure is its public works budget, which includes \$131,300 for transportation and \$19,000 for sanitation

Electors also approved a 2010 Highway Expenditures budget of \$350,000.

"That would cover for a tornado, a bridge got washed out or something. Something major that we would have to borrow money to do it," explained Chairman Ellis R. Kahn.

Hydrant hullabaloo

Kewaskum's hydrant flushing ordinance has taken another turn as the village attorney is concerned with the idea of letting private residents do the work themselves.

The Village Board on Nov. 2 decided to send its version of an ordinance back to the attorney with the idea to loosen certification requirements to flush hydrants. Otherwise, residents would have to take a class and apply to the Department of Natural Resources for certification, said Public Works Director Jerry Gilles. Continuing education is required to renew certification.

On Monday, Village Administrator Mathew Heiser told the board Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer said residents doing their own flushing would expose the village to liability.

Kiefer instead suggested the village either do the work itself or create an internal policy encouraging but not requiring annual flushing of hydrants on private drives.

The board has the option to not require the flushing, Heiser said.

The board has been discussing the issue for months after two residents on private drives, Jim Verhalen and Jerry Stilb, complained to the village in September that all public hydrants were being flushed but not those on private drives. Some private drive hydrants may not have been flushed for years, they said.

Residents who live in planned unit developments are responsible for flushing their own hydrants, usually through their condo associations. The village flushes

public hydrants annually to clear out sediment and ensure they're working properly.

The board took a copy of the City of River Hills' ordinance on hydrant flushing and tweaked it. The ordinance allows private residents to have the city flush their hydrants or a private company. Regardless, private hydrant owners must submit certificates to the city showing the hydrant is flushed. Penalties ensue if the hydrants are not flushed.

Kiefer's suggestion of an internal policy would not require private hydrants be flushed. That policy could be presented as early as the next board meeting.

Heiser said the issue is different from that of private and public garbage pickup, known as the great garbage debate of '08, in that developer's agreements were silent on garbage collection. They have specific wording on maintenance of structure, he said.



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TOWN OF FARMING-TON- The town doesn't have a 2035 plan yet but the Town Board came mighty close to approving one at last week's meeting, despite two of three supervisors voicing their displeasure with it after another long debate over the concept of "coordination."

The Town Board scheduled a special meeting for next Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. and could act on the 2035 plan. Supervisor Art Seyfert had 10 changes he wanted to go over with Washington County planners.

Supervisor Mark Foyse moved to approve the plan at last week's meeting. Nobody seconded the motion so it died.

Town chairman Gary Schreiber said he disagrees with the plan "almost totally and completely," but he was "tired of dealing with it" so he was going to support it. Foyse said he agreed with Schreiber.

Seyfert has been urging the town to incorporate "coordination" into the plan to replace "intergovernmental cooperation," saying it would better preserve land use rights since coordination provides the town an equal seat at the table in disputes.



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

Kewaskum High School students didn't shake the hands of veterans in the middle of the gym to personally thank them this year to slow the spread of swine flu and other illness.

Skipping the one tradition, however, did nothing to deter the sentiment.

Students this year heard from Army Sgt. Corey Skaggs, who asked all veterans to stand at one point during last Wednesday's Veterans Day ceremony. A long ovation ensued.

"Ordinary people who accomplished extraordinary things," Skaggs called them.

Skaggs has done three tours of duty overseas: two in Iraq and one in Kosovo. He told the story of soldiers whose heroism in Afghanistan and Iraq earned them medals.

"Their country called and they answered," Skaggs said. The soldiers "served in the cause for freedom of all mankind and that was their reward."

"We owe them a debt we can never repay," he said. "But we must honor them with deeds and not just words."

Skaggs said to take full advantage of American's rights vote, write a letter to the editor, mentor a child and serve on a jury.

"Live your lives and be good Americans," he said. "Then all veterans can know their sacrifices won't be in vain."

Kewaskum Principal Christine Horbas told students honoring veterans will fall on them.

"It's going to be your responsibility to continue these traditions," she said.

Skaggs is originally from the Beaver Dam area and grew up in Virginia Beach. He works at the Army Recruitment Station in West Bend.





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

Developer lawsuit

still owning the land.

The village constructed the two ponds in United's plan without consulting or notifying Gavin, the lawsuit claims.

United never developed Trading Post (United renamed the development Village Lakes Center) and ended up breaching the contract for purchasing Trading Post and portions of Nature Haven, and never closed on the properties.

The lawsuit claims the village trespassed on Gavin's property and built the two ponds without consent. Gavin is suing the village for the loss of value of the extra two acres of property the ponds cov-

The lawsuit claims the village breached its development

agreement by not completing various site improvements, including site and ditch grading, removing rock and waste, extending a cul-de-sac, extending sewer and water service, putting up an entrance sign and placing vegetation. The lawsuit claims Gavin has been hurt by the lack of improvements as the properties and less attractive and valuable to potential developers and buy-

The lawsuit asks Gavin receive damages in an amount to be determined at trial.

The lawsuit also claims the village failed to reimburse Gavin for installing an oversize sewer pipe in the TIF District for benefit of the village's sanitary sewer collection sys-

The lawsuit says the performance schedule has been rendered unenforceable due to United's failure to buy and develop Trading Post, the village's approval of United's development plan and the village's construction of the two ponds. The village claims

the performance schedule remains and plans to enforce it.

The lawsuit also disagrees with the village's claim that Gavin is to set aside 10 percent of proceeds from each property sale in the TIF Distrct as a security for payment of obligations according to the developer's agreement.


