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# Hydrant policy approved in Village

VILLAGE of KEWASKUM- The Village Board last week unanimously approved a policy that will encourage but not require private fire hydrant owners to annually flush their hydrants, putting a cap on a monthslong debate.

Residents who live in planned unit developments are responsible for flushing their own hydrants, usually through their condo associations. The village flushes public hydrants annually to clear out sediment and ensure they're working properly.

Private drive residents Jerry Stilb and Jim Verhalen complained to the Village Board in September after seeing a notice that the village would be flushing hydrants in mid-August. Public hydrants were flushed; private hydrants were not.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said he didn't know some hydrants in the village weren't being flushed. He indicated the fire department and village would look bad if firefighters tried to use a hydrant that didn't work.

Stilb and Verhalen said their major concern was public safety. They repeatedly attended board meetings since as trustees debated what to do. The two pleaded with the board to flush all the hydrants in the village – public and private – and then decide on an ordinance.

The board continued to discuss

the issue but didn't flush the private hydrants.

Local developer Gary Gavin said the problem was communication.

"A lot of people assumed the village was doing it. Just notify the people you want it done," he told the board in November.

The board took a copy of the City of River Hills' ordinance on hydrant flushing and tweaked it. The ordinance allows private residents to have the city flush their hydrants or a private company. Regardless, private hydrant owners must submit certificates to the city showing the hydrant is flushed. Penalties ensue if the hydrants are not flushed.

The board wanted to allow private drive residents to do the work themselves instead of paying someone else. But that would require residents to take a class and apply for certification.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann wanted to make the process easier, but Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer advised if the village required the flushing it should control how it's

Without controlling the process, the village would open itself to liability, Kiefer said.

The other option was the internal policy to encourage private hydrant flushing but not require it or stipulate how the process is done. The board unanimously passed that policy Dec.

Stilb said he hopes private drive

residents flush their hydrants.

"Hopefully, all private owners will recognize the importance of public safety relative to the maintenance recommended for private hydrants. Certainly enough has been stated and publicized on this matter," he said via e-mail.

"While the onus of responsibility for annual maintenance of private hydrants rests with the private owner, village water still flows through this private infrastructure to these private hydrants, and it is still the responsibility of the Village Fire Department and its first responders to activate these private hydrants in the event of a fire. It is still all about public safety ... for all concerned ... we should all recognize this fact, and act responsibly," he said.

While the major policy debate is over, a detail remains. The board directed village staff to look into sending annual reminders to private drive residents to encourage them to flush their hydrants. Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said Kiefer may not like the idea as the reminder could serve as an indicator of liability.

Should the village decide to send reminders, Heiser said it would ask condo associations and the like to keep the village updated on who should receive them as condo presidents often change.

Heiser said the board will discuss sending reminders at a future meeting.

# KHS student will face expulsion

**KEWASKUM**- The student who brought an unloaded gun to Kewaskum High School faces an expulsion hearing on Jan. 4.

The School Board will decide the 14-year-old's fate.

The student was taken into custody early afternoon on Dec. 15 after authorities were informed he was carrying an old .38-caliber gun at school. He has not been at school since.

While rumors of ammunition and a hit list spread throughout the community, the district said it found nothing.

"There's lots of rumors going around the community he brought ammunition, etc. He was searched that day; his locker was searched that day. Nothing was found," said Principal Christine Horbas.

Associate Kewaskum Principal Kristine Dreher said she "went through every notebook" and other items and found nothing.

The student brought the gun to school to "be cool," according to a statement from the school district and confirmed by Kewaskum Police Chief Richard Knoebel.

"Our school is safe today due to the collaboration between students and a teacher who took appropriate actions. It is when we all work together that our school will remain a comfortable place to be," the district said in a statement Dec. 15.

The district sent a letter home to parents to inform them of the incident and to encourage parents to talk to their children "to help them to understand that this type of situation will not be tolerated," the letter says.

The expulsion hearing is closed to the public.



The training classes will be held on 12 consecutive Tuesday evenings from February 9 to April 27 from 6 to 9 p.m. in West Bend. Cost of the program is \$135.00, which includes printed materials and a copy of the: Handbook for Wisconsin Gardeners.

To become a Certified Master Gardener, pants must attend the classes complete the final exam and volunteer time back to the community in a horticultural related project.

The general class is intended to be introductory, covering a wide range of horticultural topics including: Plant Propagation, Entomology, Annuals and Perennials, Weeds and Pests, Native Plants, Invasive Plants, Vegetable Crops, Plant Pathology, Soils and Fertility, Woody Landscape Plants, Backyard Wildlife, Fruit Crops, and Turf Management. The classes are presented using live interactive video conferences. University of Wisconsin horticultural faculty and other specialists will be providing the instruction.



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### Winter Sports in Washington County Parks

The Washington County Park System is geared up for another active winter sports season. Cross country skiing, sledding, and ice fishing are very popular. With the free entrance to the Washington County Parks visitors are taking advantage of every opportunity to enjoy this Wisconsin winter season.

The new lighted sled hill that was opened last year at Glacier Hills County Park, located at 1664 Friess Lake Road in the Village of Richfield, was a hit with early snow, it will only gain in popularity this year. It features a 35' drop for a fast ride before leveling out, so this is not a hill for toddlers. A plowed parking lot, flush restrooms and warming house are also onsite and open for your

There are two other lighted sled hills in the park system and they are located in Ridge Run County Park in West Bend, and in Homestead Hollow County Park on Freistadt Road in Germantown, Both have lighted parking lots and heated flush toilets. All sled hills are open to the public, weather permitting, at no charge. Please do not build jumps on these hills because of the potential for injury.

Lake access for ice fishing is available at Ridge Run and Hillside County Parks in West Bend, Glacier Hills County Park in Richfield, and at Ackerman's Grove County Park on Highway Z in the Town of Polk. Fishermen are strongly urged to use common sense in judging proper ice conditions.

Cross country skiers in West Bend and northern Washington County are encouraged to try Sandy Knoll County Park, just northeast of West Bend at Trenton Road and Wallace Lake Road. This park has a unique three-loop trail system that has been growing in popularity because it allows for short, medium and longer trips. The trails here are gently sloped and very scenic.

Residents in Germantown and southern Washington County are urged to try Homestead Hollow County Park on Freistadt Road in Germantown for another easy to moderate, but very scenic trail. All those skiers looking for more demanding trails should check out Glacier Hills County Park on Friess Lake Drive in the Village of Richfield. Cross country ski trails here are rated moderate to difficult. The heated warming room and flush toilets located in the park are available for use by all skiers. None of the cross country ski trails are groomed.

Ice skating, when conditions permit, is available at Ridge Run County Park and Homestead Hollow County Park. Again, skaters should use common sense in judging proper ice conditions.

Parking is available for those wishing to snowmobile on the separate trails running through Glacier Hills, and Sandy Knoll County Parks. Snowmobiles are only allowed on the northern segment of the Elsenbahn Trail that begins at Lighthouse Lane and heads north in Fond du Lac County. ATV's are not allowed on the Washington County segment of the Eisenbahn Trail at this time. Snowmobilers should call the Washington County Association of Snowmobile Clubs hotline at 262-334-6061 or check their website, www. wcase.org to make sure the trails are open before venturing out. Anyone planning to use the Fond du Lac portion of the trail should check with the Fond du Lac County officials for their winter rules and


Seibel is currently 7-0 on the year.
