Village water rates increase in April

Village households and nonprofit entities will see their water rates rise come April 1 as a result of a percentage change in how the village's water utility is reimbursed for fire protection.

Small, medium and large residential rates are slated to increase by about \$7 per quarter, depending on meter size and usage. Commercial rates, dependent on the same factors, could rise from \$32 to \$169 per

quarter. The Wisconsin Public Service Commission each year examines municipalities' water systems and determines through a mathematia cal formula how much water utilities will be paid for fire protection. How that money is paid is up to the individual municipality.

The Village Board during last year's budget process approved

switching the percentage from 25 percent from rate users and 75 percent from the fire department budget to 50 percent from each. That means rate users start picking up 25 percent more of the tab come April.

As a result, the fire department budget went down, though Village Administrator Mathew Heiser hadn't figured those savings for taxpayers.

"It's a shift," he said.

The village years ago paid the water utility with only money from the tax rolls. Several years ago the percentage switched to 50-50.

Heiser said most communities have switched to put the entire charge on the rate users.

A public hearing with the Public Service Commission will be held at 10 a.m. March 9 in the Municipal Building's Council Room, 204 First \$222,519 to be paid to the water donations. The present stand presents St. The Village Board is not required to attend and no action will take place at the hearing.

The Village of Kewaskum has approved charging \$170,963 of the total \$222,519 Public Fire Protection (PFP) charge to general service customers under the equivalent meter method. The PFP charge billed to the Village of Kewaskum would be reduced by 50 percent (51,556) and the remainder 50 percent (\$51,556) of the existing municipal charge would be recovered from general service customers.

A small residential rate could go from \$62.24 to \$68.99, medium residential from \$83.76 to to \$90.51, large residential from \$151.01 to \$157.50

This year, the PSC came up with utility for fire protection. With the new percentage, rate users will pay \$170,963.

replacement at Kiwanis

The Kiwanis Park baseball diamond used by the high school and village got the go-ahead Monday night to make two improvements this spring that won't cost the village anything beyond installation labor.

The Village Board unanimously approved the Kewaskum Athletic Club's (KAC) request to replace the concession stand and the Kewaskum Athletic Association's (KAA) request to replace the old scoreboard.

A 16x20-foot concession stand will replace the 6x6 version mostly with problems in that concessions must be shipped to the stand and beer must be hidden during high school games, said Jason Strobel, KAC coach.

The new one would have electric hookups for coolers and a refrigerator, he said. Space would be made for bathrooms and running water but those items aren't in the plans now. Issues may arise with piping through the Department of Natural Resources since the pipes would have to run below a stream in the ground, he said.

The club is paying for the roof and some other materials. The rest - labor, excavating, concrete and two trees - are all being donated, Strobel said.

A new, 6x16-foot scoreboard will replace the present version that has problems with lights and electrics.

The new, \$4,138 scoreboard will have wireless control from the dugouts and have LED lighting, said Randy Schlice, KAA president.

The KAA may choose the color of the scoreboard, and a 16-foot long strip on the bottom is open for a possible sponsor name. The board comes with a five-year warranty.


Schlice asked the village for help installing the scoreboard, which would be mounted around eight feet off the ground. The village has equipment that could do the job, and the board went along with the idea.

The present scoreboard is essentially trash given its problems, Schlice said.

The KAA is looking into replacing the dirt on the infield as well. Price quotes will be given at the association's March 15 meeting. Fundraising has started for the project, which Schlice expects to cost \$20,000 to \$30,000.





Village Board Briefs

ATVs on Eisenbahn approved by Village Board

Taking all-terrain vehicles on the village's portion of the Eisenbahn Trail passed one of three hurdles Monday night as the Village Board approved an ordinance similar to its restrictions on snowmobiles.

Terms of the ordinance include state traffic laws, regulating speed to 10 mph or the posted limit and no ATV operation between 2-6 a.m.

The ordinance can be undone by the board if problems should arise. Given that, Trustee Kevin Scheunemann said he supported the ordinance. The board approved it, 6-1. Norman Kufahl voted against.

ATV usage must pass the Department of Natural Resources and the Washington County Planning, Conservation and Parks Committee before riders make take to the trail in the village. It is unknown if or when those entities will take up the issue.

Committee member/Board salaries discussed

An ordinance adjusting Village Board member compensation to only pay committee members to attend committee meetings could be approved at the next board meeting.

The ordinance was introduced at Monday night's meeting. Village President Andrew Pesch likes to wait to approve ordinances at a later meeting to give time for the board and public to mull them over.

The ordinance maintains

trustees' pay at \$1,500 per year and the president's pay at \$2,000. It keeps the \$51-perday payment for Village Board members attending full-day educational workshops and \$25.50 for half-days.

The change comes in attending committee meetings. The present ordinance pays board members \$30 each for attending board and committee meetings such as the Plan Commission whether they are members or not. The new ordinance only allows for paying committee members who

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The board expects to approve the ordinance before this April's election but won't put it into effect until after the April 2011 election. That way the ordinance impacts all board members at the same time rather than half one year and half the other, given the election cycle.

Board members' salaries are not allowed to be changed during the middle of their terms of office.

put in from 250 - 500 hours of sweat equity.






Mom's Night Out is a chance for moms to get out of the house without the little ones. Free

Registration is now open for the April 10, 2010 ACT achievement test. Students who wish to take the college admission and placement exam must register before March 5, 2010.

The ACT is a curriculumbased achievement exam. It tests what students have actually learned in school, not their aptitude for learning. The ACT also measures what students need to know to be ready for entry-level college-credit courses based on ACT College Readiness Standards". Every student's results can be tied directly to these consistent standards.

The ACT has four sections-English, mathematics, reading and science—and takes about three hours to complete. Students who take the ACT Plus Writing complete an optional writing test that requires an additional 30 minutes. Unlike other exams, students are not penalized for guessing or answering all the questions on each test section. In fact, it is beneficial for test takers to answer all questions within the time allowed.

During registration, students may select up to four universities to receive their score reports. ACT scores are accepted by all four-year colleges and universities across the United States. ACT reports scores only

when requested to do so by the student. Additional score reports are available for a small

All students complete a detailed inventory of questions during ACT registration. Each test taker receives an ACT score report that includes a wide variety of information to assist with high school course selection, college readiness, career planning, and college admissions.

The cost for the ACT test without writing is \$32. When combined with the optional ACT Writing Test, the total cost is \$47. Students who qualify may apply for a fee waiver through their high school counselor.

The ACT website, www.actstudent.org, has helpful information, free sample items, and options to order inexpensive test prep materials to assist test takers get ready for the exam. However, the best preparation is to take rigorous core courses in school, study hard, and learn the academic skills needed in college.

Most students register online at www.actstudent.org. Students may also pick up registration forms from their high school counseling offices; these forms must be postmarked by March 5, 2010. Late registration is available until March 19, 2010 for an extra \$21 fee.

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

He and his wife resided in West Bend during his work with Badger Packaging. The couple lived in Appleton during their retirement years.

Earlier he was a national sales representative for Inland Container Corp., Chicago, as well as a sales executive for Reynolds Metals in Akron, Ohio. During World War II, Mr. Laue was a military packaging specialist for government contractor, Forest Products Laboratories, Madison.

In 1948 Mr. Laue became chief packaging engineer for the Lustron Corp. in Columbus, Ohio. The "Lustron" was a fiveroom steel porcelain enamel home that was delivered with all of its 4,000 parts on trucks and long flatbed trailers. "The entire house could be packaged in conventional corrugated fibreboard boxes," Mr. Laue wrote in a 1949 trade magazine. Total cost of packaging and loading each 25,000 pound home was (in 1949 dollars) \$100, he added, stating that the Lustron home was then "America's biggest line-produced package."

Mr. Laue was an active golfer well into his 80s; he was also an accomplished swimmer still logging miles in the pool well into his mid 80s. Early in the Depression of the 1930s, when jobs were difficult to find, he competed with thousands of young people for the coveted position of lifeguard on the beaches of Lake Michigan near downtown Chicago. He was one of the select few hired.

Spearers harvest 656 on opening day

OSHKOSH- It was a record smashing day on Lake Winnebago for the start of the 2010 sturgeon spearing season. Fish biologists working on the Winnebago Pool of lakes have been handling fish in their spring spawning surveys in excess of 200 pounds for several years now, and finally one of these large super-trophies has shown up in the spear harvest. Ron Grishaber of Appleton registered a 212.2 pound, 84.2" sturgeon at the Harrison Registration Station.

Another record - the largest male sturgeon ever registered in the spear harvest -- 116.8 pounds, 71 inches -- was brought in to the Winneconne registration station at Critters.

A record number of fish greater than or equal to 100 pounds were also registered. Thirty-one of these were taken from Lake Winnebago and three from the Upriver Lakes.

Both the Lake Winnebago and Upriver Lakes seasons are set to run from February 13 through February 28 unless spearers reach pre-set harvest caps.

Harvest caps for Lake Winnebago are set at 280 juvenile females, 666 adult females and 800 males. Caps for the Upriver Lakes are set at 70 juvenile females, 74 adult females and 200 adult males. Caps for the entire Winnebago System are 350 juvenile females, 740 adult females and 1,000 males.

Saturday's Lake Winnebago take was 515 including 324 female sturgeon (68 juvenile females and 256 adult females) and 191 males.

System-wide, there were 656 sturgeon taken Saturday -- 96 juvenile females; 294 adult females; 266 males.

Commenting on the number of very large fish in the Winnebago Pool population, Ron Bruch, DNR Senior Sturgeon Biologist, says his team has seen it increasing over the last 15 years due to regula-

tions developed by DNR fisheries staff and the Winnebago Citizens Sturgeon Advisory Committee. These regulations were implemented in the 1990's and were designed to decrease the annual exploitation of adult female sturgeon (which are the largest fisn in the stock, but the most vulnerable to overharvest). Another reason for these regulations was due to large hatches of sturgeon over a 20-30 year period in the early 1900's that are now entering the supertrophy size in their life. Lake sturgeon, especially females, are believed to be able to live for 150 years or more. The 211 lb record breaker harvested today has not been aged yet, but it is likely in excess of 100 years old.

KEWASKUM - Last December wasn't far from the minds of the girls' basketball team last Friday.

Waupun smoked the Indians, 66-46, on their court. On Friday in Kewaskum, the tables turned, though it took more than three quarters to do

The Indians, still with a mathematical chance to tie for a conference title, blew open a two-point game entering the fourth quarter on their way to a 57-41 victory.

She snagged an offensive board and threw up a layup that sat on the rim long enough for every fan to bite off all of their fingernails, do their laundry and grocery shopping and help Congress solve health care, before the ball fell through the hoop for a six-point lead.

The Warriors were in the midst of three straight turnovers that helped the Indians build a 41-34 advantage.

Waupun only dressed seven for the game and two players got four fouls in the first half. The Indians were well aware.

"We kind of took advantage of the foul trouble so we could drive it a lot more and get those open shots," Miller said.

Butler came screaming through the lane for a basket to make it 43-34, followed by a Buker free throw and two more Butler buckets inside. With 2:37 to play, it was 48-34 and the rout was on.

That December loss weighed heavily on Butler's mind.

"It was major. We knew that that was not our team when we played that game. And we knew we had to come out tonight and prove that," she said. It took until the second half, mostly the final eight minutes.

"In the locker room we kind of got fired up," Butler said of halftime. "We knew the last time they beat us by 20 and they came out thinking that they were going to do it again and we weren't going to be a big problem for them. But we wanted to prove that so once we got to the third quarter and saw that we weren't playing our game yet still, we needed to pick it up."

Kleinhans said he painted the picture at the half.

"You're in second. This hasn't hap-

pened in two decades. Do you want to go to third or do you want to move to first? Go out and play basketball. Do what we're supposed to do," he told his team.

He remembered that first meeting and called for a better sequel.

"I didn't want to get beaten by 20 again. I didn't like how we played over there. We didn't play as a team," he said. "We're learning what team is."

The second half was more like it.
"We're getting patient. We're not rushing stuff," he said.

Kleinhans credited Bohn with some second-half poise after not playing the first half.

"She kept her cool and now she's starting to get it, too," he said.

The coach was happy to get Beine back from a wrist injury. He brought her off the bench and said she played some good defensive minutes. He praised Erica Rammer, filling in for Beine in the starting lineup, for her defense.

The Indians, after a rare slow start at home, did more last Friday than get their 11th win of the season and stay in the conference race.

"It shows that we're a team to reckon with and yeah, we had our slower start tonight, but we brought it back," Butler said.

"I think it shows us that even if

we're in a tight game that any game we can still pick it up and come out with a win," Buker said.

"We know that we can play with intensity and when we play with intensity we can beat anyone," said Miller.

Notes: The second quarter ended with a flurry as Warrior Kaitlyn Bronkhorst hit a wide open three-pointer in the corner for a 24-21 lead. With about three seconds left, Buter took off with the ball down the middle of the court. She launched a three at the buzzer that hit the backboard and bounced on the rim a couple of times before going through for a 24-24 game. It didn't sit on the rim as long as Miller's shot but it did give fans a chance to start in on their fingernails.

"When I saw that they weren't going to guard it, I just shot it and hoped," she said. "And it went in."

Indians fall behind Cougars in hosting Regional meet

KEWASKUM- After going to the WIAA Team Sectional the last three years, Kewaskum's wrestling team was going to be home Tuesday night (Feb. 16) as it gave way to Campbellsport in Saturday's race to the Division 2 regional title.

The Indians do advance nine to the sectional at Milwaukee Lutheran, however, and that number would certainly have been one higher had junior ace Brad Bentz been able to compete.

Behind eight champions, the Cougars piled up 264.5 points to win the crown by 21.5 points over the host Indians, who came in with 243.

Finishing a distant third was Milwaukee Lutheran with 128, followed by Grafton (92) Brown Deer (89) and Mayville (29) which all came with only partial squads, another factor in determining the outcome.

We're coming out of here with nine guys going on, and they're all healthy," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said afterward, referring to his five champions, Jared Koffke (119), Caleb Olla (135), Rob Maertz (140), Bo Seibel (160) and Cody Seibel (215), along with runners-up Brett Scoles (103), Derik Muckerheide (125) Austin Goeden (130) and Joey Wollner (145).

After winning an Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) title last Saturday, Koffke (26-9) added his second in a week and did so with ease. After receiving a bye, the junior athlete won a commanding 11-0 major decision and followed that up with a pin in :46 over Nick Neumann of Milwaukee Lutheran.

"He's been looking good for the past few weeks," Aupperle said, confident Koffke has a good chance to qualify for state after making the field his freshman year.

Olla (23-8) had to settle for third in a strong EWC field at 135, but he was the strength of the 135-pound class Saturday, using a bye, a pin in 1:27 and a dominant 10-2 decision over Campbellsport's Greg Blatz to stand atop the victory stand.

"He's had some tough matches this year," Aupperle said. "I'm happy for him."

Maertz (28-9) made it two in a row for KHS, pinning Cody Bobholz of Grafton in 5:33 in the finals after shutting out Cole Sippel 12-0 in the semis and taking a bye in the first round.

"He got the job done," his coach said.

Both Seibels were victorious by pin in the finals, with the senior Cody (27-1) needing just 34 ticks of the clock to put away Tory Dibb of Brown Deer.

In the semis, Cody Seibel needed just 1:29 to put Andrew

Gleason's (ML) shoulders to the mat, meaning he only spent 2:03 on the mat the entire day.

"It's good to see him back," Aupperle said, referring to Cody Seibel's shoulder injury in football that carried over to the early part of the wrestling season. "He did a real nice job."

Bo Seibel is starting to settle in at 160 pounds, which is bad news for others in the sectional field at that weight. He stretched his season record to 29-4 with a bye, a pin in 1:08 and a pin in 3:13 over Alex Russell of Brown Deer.

In his final match, Bo Seibel was leading 13-0 in the second period before putting his opponent away.

No doubt one of the feature matches of the afternoon came at 103 pounds where Brett Scoles and Campbellsport's Ryan Costello met again for the title. It was one excellent match between two competitors, and it went right down to the wire with Costello leaving with a 5-4 victory.

Scoles took Costello down early, but before the first buzzer, the Cougar took the upper hand, with an escape and takedown for a 3-2 lead.

Scoles was unable to score on Costello from the down position in the second period, and neither wanted to make a mistake in the third, leading both to become defensive. The official awarded Scoles a point for Costello stalling then called a double stall, so both got a point.

At the end, Scoles (27-9) had hold of Costello's head but

could not get around for the takedown.

"I thought Brett went out there a little hesitant," Aupperle said, and perhaps anticipating another meeting in the sectional, added, "If he opens up and wrestles like he can, he's fine."


